## Kendrick, Juliaetta Schools Open August 31

Supt. Don Blakeley announces that regular classes will convene at Kendrick Junior-Senior High School and Juliaetta Elementary School on August 31st, 8:40 a.m. Bus students are asked to be at their regular pick-up spots maintained throughout last year and at approximately the same time for the first day of school. Adjustments will be made the first week of school if necessary. Elementary students will be relayed on to Juliaetta from the Kendrick High School and High School students transported from Juliaetta to Kendrick as in the past.

### High School Registration

Principal Bob Heppner and Supt. Don Blakeley announce that Senior-Junior High School registration will be held in Kendrick August 24 and 25 from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Children who will be six years of age before Oct. 15th of the current year may be enrolled in the first grade; however birth certificates are required for registration. Physical examinations will be required for all 1st - 5th and 9th grade students.

### Bus Driver Meeting

A meeting of all school bus drivers is scheduled for Aug. 7th, 8:00 p.m. to discuss bus routes and schedules. Parents with bus problems are invited to attend the School Board meeting Aug. 10th, 8:00 p.m. if they so desire.

### Orientation Meetings

All teachers and School Lunch employees will convene at the Kendrick High School for two day orientation meetings August 27th, 28th, 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

### School Lunches

Regular School Lunches will be served daily at the Juliaetta Elementary and Kendrick Jr.-Sr. High Schools; however, there has been a slight increase in prices, due to rising costs and decreasing Federal commodities. All student meals will cost 35 cents. Adult meals will be 45 cents without milk and 50 cents with milk. Extra milk for students-4 to 5 cents. School Lunches begin the first day of school.

## Dr. Christensen's Brother Passes

Dr. D. A. Christensen, Kendrick physician, has recently received word of the death of his brother Francis Christensen at DeKalb, Illinois.

A native of Utah, Christensen was awarded his baccalaureate degree from the University of Utah, master's degrees from the University of California at Berkeley and from Harvard, and Ph. D. degree from Harvard University. His teaching career began in 1927 at the University of Utah and continued at the University of Wisconsin, DePaul University, and the University of Southern California, where he taught English for thirty years, rising in academic rank from assistant professor to professor as well as serving as university editor for five years. At the time of his death, he was professor of English at Northern Illinois University.

Professor Christensen is survived by his widow, Bonnie Jean; two married daughters, Mrs. Charles Mican of Denver, Colorado, and Mrs. Charles B. Clark of San Francisco, Calif.; three children at home, Lynn, Jonathan Francis, and Bonnie; three grandchildren; a sister, Helen Christensen of Salt Lake City, Utah; and a brother, Dr. Douglas Christensen of Kendrick.

## Mrs. Ida G. Mayer, 89, Passes August 1

GENESEE—Mrs. Ida Christina Mayer, 89, long time Geneese resident, passed away Saturday, August 1 at 5:00 p. m. at St. Joseph's Hospital, in Lewiston where she had been hospitalized with pneumonia following a recent fall in which she suffered a broken hip.

Ida Christina, daughter of John and Anna Sandin, was born September 21, 1880 in Sweden, and as a child came to Mora, Minnesota with her parents, where she grew up and married Albert (Al) E. Mayer in 1900. Mr. Mayer moved to Geneese in the summer of 1909, and Mrs. Mayer and children joined him here in September of the same year. Mr. Mayer was foreman of the Clearwater Ranch for a number of years, before becoming a rural mail carrier, retiring from that position in 1941. He passed away in 1961.

Mrs. Mayer was a member of the Geneese Community Church and a member of the Pythian Sisters.

During the past few years she has been a resident of Paradise Villa Nursing Home in Moscow.

Survivors include three sons, Orland C., Boise; Wade, Lewiston; and Glen, Renton, Washington; one daughter, Mrs. William (Inez) Black, San Francisco, Calif.; 10 grandchildren; 10 great grandchildren. She was preceded in death by two sons, Arthur G., who passed away in February of 1970, and Marion M., in 1932.

## Geneese Schools Open August 31

GENESEE—Geneese school buses will make their regular run the morning of Monday, August 31 bringing children to school for the opening of the 1970-71 term. Supt. Lester C. Diehl has announced that everything is in readiness to receive students the opening day. He added that no changes had been made in the bus routes.

According to Diehl the expected enrollment will be higher in the elementary school than last year and approximately the same in high school.

Curriculum will be about the same, with some course content changed. Added will be another year of German and a psychology course at the secondary level.

Kindergarten will be held again this year, starting sometime in October and continuing until March. Again this year kindergarten students may ride the bus to school in the morning, but must be picked up at noon by the parents.

New members of the faculty include Mrs. Heinemeyer, Miss Ostheiler, Miss Watson, Mr. Carlson, and Mrs. Sanford Evans.

A general teachers meeting is scheduled for August 27-28. Registration for high school students will be August 23-25. Grade school students will register with their home room teachers on the first day of school.

Hot lunches will be served the first day of school. Cost of meals will be the same as last year, 30 cents for students and 40 cents for adults. Milk will be provided again for 3 cents for those wishing to take milk.

The usual general maintenance was performed during the summer months on the school building, such as cleaning, painting, refinishing and waxing floors. The high school library has been remodelled and made into an instructional media center.

## Fees for Senior High

Student Insurance: \$6.75; football insurance, \$14.25; towel fee, \$2.00; annual, \$6.00; student activity ticket, \$4.00.

The only fees that must be paid is football insurance unless the district is provided proof of adequate insurance coverage by parents. Towel fee must be paid by those participating in athletics and P. E. All the rest of the fees are optional to the student.

Junior High:  
Student insurance, \$5.50; student activity, \$4.00.

Both fees are optional to students.

Elementary Fees:  
Student insurance, \$4.00.

Also optional to students.

The school insurance will be provided by Medical Service Bureau again this year as in the past. Families that already are covered by M. S. B. can secure dental coverage at an additional cost of \$1.50.

There will be no book fees charged this year. However, if a student loses a book or causes damage to the book they will be expected to pay for it.

Geneese Trustees Tentatively Approve Budget

A total budget of \$284,295.12 was tentatively adopted by the Trustees of School District No. 382 for the coming 1970-71 school year.

The Geneese School District Budget will operate on 33 mills for M&O and 8.5 mills Bond Interest and Redemption for the 1970-71 year as compared with 30 mills for M&O and 3.5 mills Bond Interest and Redemption for the 1969-70 year.

Listed below are the amounts and for this year compared to last year's budget. Revenue for the 1970-71 year will be \$284,295.12 including Bond and Interest, State and Federal monies. The 1969-70 year revenue was \$280,066.85.

## Harvest Rolls Again As Temps Soar Upward

An unofficial reading of 100 degrees was reported in Kendrick Tuesday afternoon as the weather returned to hot summertime after one of the coolest, wettest Julys on record. The hot, dry weather was welcomed by farmers as it dried the fields and allowed harvest work to continue.

George Brocke, Jr., of Brocke and Sons, reported Tuesday that "everything is coming in now." He said the small-sieve Alaska peas grown under their contract were about 75 percent in and the regular Alaska peas were nearly 50 percent in. A few Austrian peas and some lentils are also just starting to come in. A few Brocke wrenthouses. The wet weather has caused a quality problem with peas showing bleaching damage from the rain.

Bob Watts, manager of Kendrick Rockdale, also reported that the harvest is "starting to roll." He said the wheat is coming in now. A couple of the peas being delivered to the Rockdale were judged by Watts to be "pretty fair." Some of the winter barley was stunted by the weather. Wheat is just getting started, Watts said, and it was too early to tell about yields although some reports he had heard had the wheat running about 40 bushels.

"We're pretty well along on peas," said Ben Westendahl, manager of the Lewiston Grain Growers warehouses in Kendrick. A couple of the lots of peas had been hit by hail and many of the peas were showing bleach damage, which will cause them to be discounted in price. Westendahl reported two or three farmers were cutting wheat and delivering to Grain Growers warehouses and winter barley is coming in from the Southwick area. The Grain Grower manager said he didn't feel the quality of grain would be as good: this year as last. "It's running lighter," he said. "Last year most of the grain was testing out at 64 to 65, and so far this year, we're lucky to keep it in the 60's."

Leonard Singhose, manager of Asgrow Seed Company in Geneese, reported that peas grown under Asgrow contract were about one-third out Tuesday afternoon and the peak of his harvest should be reached sometime this week and that he expected to be nearly complete by August 15. Singhose reported very little rain damage to peas in the Geneese area. "There was some scattering, but very little, really," he said and added the quality was good. One problem peas growers in both Geneese and Kendrick faced—this year was the high weeds that grew and flourished in the fields because of the extra-moisture. The weeds added to the threshing problems.

Geneese Union Warehouse manager Bill Wood was so rushed we were unable to reach him for a harvest report.

The inconvenience of emptying the car each night is negligible compared to the long-term and costly inconvenience of losing clothing and other valuables, Mr. Stedman said.

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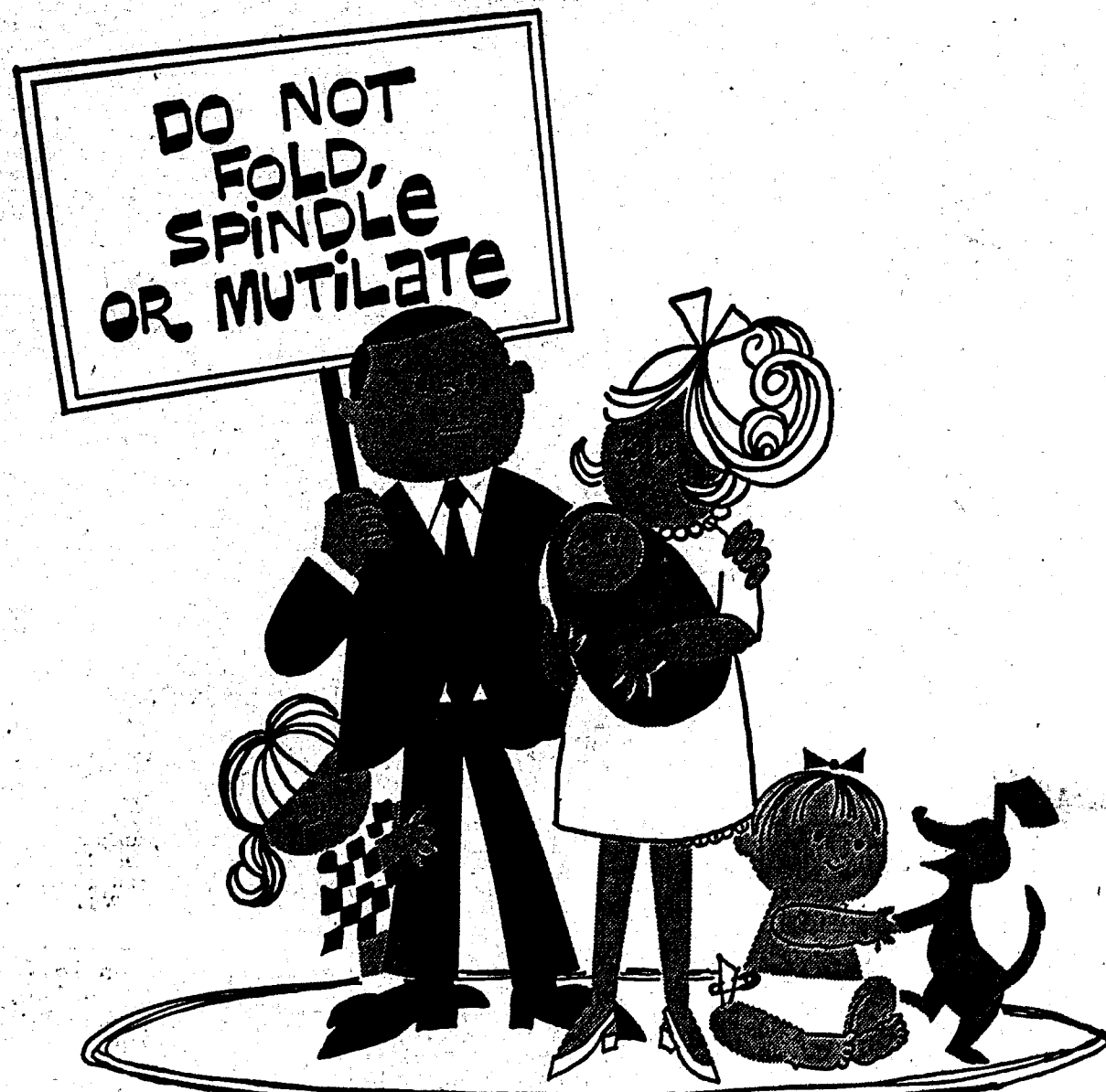



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**Three Groups of Salmon Enter Idaho Streams**

Most fishermen don't realize that Idaho actually has three races of chinook salmon—spring, summer and fall. Studies made of these fish show that the races are separate from one another by time, streams they use, and different spawning areas.

The races are separated primarily by the time of entry into the Columbia River. For instance, chinook tagged in the Columbia River and recovered in Idaho waters provide definite evidence regarding races using particular streams.

There is some degree of overlapping, according to fisheries biologists of the Idaho Fish and Game Department but the main runs come into Idaho waters on the following timetable:

The spring-run group is composed partly of the group that enters the Columbia River in late March, April and May. Some of these fish come to Idaho in June and July, appearing at the mouth of the Lemhi as early as the last few days of May. They usually show up around Clayton, Challis, and Stanley Basin along the main Salmon River around the end of June.

The first salmon usually are caught at Sunbeam Dam about June 30. They start jumping at Dagger Falls on the Middle Fork of the Salmon River about the same time, June 20-25. These spring run chinook salmon spawn in the Lemhi River, upper East Fork, Middle Fork and tributaries, and the main Salmon River in late July and August, and a small number carry over into September.

The second group, or race, of chinook salmon are summer-run fish. These fish swim at an average speed of 10-12 miles every 24 hours. The first chinook move into the Salmon River system by July. They spawn slightly downstream from areas used by spring-run fish.

Prior to the harnessing of the Snake River with hydro-electric systems, there was a fall-run of chinook salmon in Idaho waters. These came in September

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### Insecticide Spraying Will Be Closely Watched By Wildlife Groups

Birdwatchers from the Valley Garden Club counted over 100 birds of 23 species along one mile of road within the 24,000 acres along the lower Clearwater River and Potlatch Creek that will be sprayed for grasshopper control this week. This count was to obtain a pre-spray estimate of birds and will be followed by a post-spray count along the same route to determine any changes that may have occurred in the population. Ruth McCombs, President, Marie Clark, Thelma Bailey and Carolyn Leeger of Valley Garden Club all participated in the census Monday morning near Lenore. They were accompanied by Don McCombs, and Dale Tanner and Stu Murrell of the Idaho Fish and Game Department. The garden clubs of Idaho have been concerned over the drop in songbirds in recent years and the Valley Garden Club has been very active in placing bluebird nesting boxes along highways in the Clearwater Region. Birds act as an important controller of insect popula-

tions. For example, a house wren has been observed feeding about 500 spiders and caterpillars to its young during one afternoon. The upland game birds such as pheasants, quail, Hungarian partridge, and chukars feed heavily on grasshoppers when they are available.

Biologists are concerned that the use of a broad spectrum spray like malathion will remove a significant portion of the insects that are needed by the young birds for food. About 60-70 percent of the diet of young upland game birds is made up of insects for the first six weeks of their lives. This percentage is even higher for the insect eating songbirds such as warblers, kingbirds, and orioles. Some monitoring by the Idaho Fish and Game Department in a similar spray project in 1963 on the Middle Fork of the Boise River indicated a possible drop in the songbird population after spraying. Since the spray does not normally kill birds directly, it was thought most of them moved out because of an inadequate food supply. However, the young birds in nests and upland game bird young are not able to move any distance to obtain new food. Dale Tanner, Game Biologist, Idaho Fish and Game Department, has run pre-spray trend counts in Hatwal and Bedrock Creek drainages. Tanner's studies show most of the pheasant chicks are big enough to survive a reduced insect supply but late hatching chukars and quail are just starting to hatch.

Surveys of Bedrock Creek show a dense population of juvenile steelhead from 1 to 5 inches long. They are crowded into many small holes and under these stress conditions a kill could occur from the spray. More importantly, the previous monitoring program on the Middle Fork of the Boise showed a large scale kill of aquatic insects in the stream. Small steelhead feed almost entirely on these insects and the project could result in a reduced population of fish in the stream. For this reason the Idaho Fish and Game Department has asked that the stream not

#### SUGAR AND SPICE COOKIES

- 3/4 cup shortening
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 egg
- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons soda
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 3/4 teaspoon cloves
- 3/4 teaspoon ginger
- 3/4 cup molasses
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Mix all ingredients together, form into small balls, roll in sugar and place on cookie sheet. Bake in 375 degree oven for about 10 minutes.

#### BEEF STROGANOFF

Cut about 2 pounds of round steak into cubes. Roll cubes in flour, salt and pepper. Brown steak in fry pan in 1/4 cup melted butter or margarine. After browning add 1 can beef broth or 3 beef cubes in water

- 1 can mushroom soup
- 1/2 cup onions, chopped fine

Cook until tender, about 1 hour. Add 1 cup sour cream, and cook five minutes longer. Serve over rice, noodles, or mashed potatoes.

#### OATMEAL BREAD

- 3 tablespoons shortening
  - 1 cup oatmeal
  - 2 cups boiling water
  - 1 tablespoon salt
  - 1/2 cup sugar
  - 3 tablespoons molasses
  - 1 package dry yeast
  - 1/2 cup warm water
- About 6 cups white flour
- Mix oatmeal, boiling water, shortening, salt sugar and molasses together. Let cool to lukewarm. Add yeast, dissolved in warm water. Add flour gradually. Knead about 10 minutes, adding a little more flour if necessary. Let rise. Make into two loaves and let rise again. Bake in moderate oven 375 d. for about 45 minutes.

#### CHEESE CAKE DESSERT

- 2 cups flour
  - 2 sticks oleo (1 cup)
  - 1/2 cup brown sugar
  - 1/2 cup chopped nuts
- Mix the above like pie crust. Spread mixture in a pan. Bake at 350 d. for 15-20 minutes. When cool, crumble up and save 1 cup crumbs for top. Spread remainder of crumbs in 9x13 pan. Spread 1 can prepared pie filling over crumbs. Cream 8-oz. cream cheese and 1 cup powdered sugar. Add 1 pkg. whipped Dream Whip to cream cheese mixture. Spread over filling. Top with 1 cup crumbs. Refrigerate overnight.

#### ZUCCHINI PICKLES

- 4 pounds zucchini
  - 1 pound small onions
  - 1/2 cup salt
  - 1 quart cider vinegar
  - 2 cups sugar
  - 2 teaspoons celery seed
  - 1 teaspoon dry mustard
  - 2 teaspoons turmeric
  - 1 teaspoon mustard seed
  - 2 or 3 red sweet peppers
  - 1 large or 2 small heads cauliflower
- Cut unpeeled squash in small chunks. Slice onions thin, cover with water and salt and let stand 1 hour. Drain. Combine vinegar, sugar, celery seed, turmeric and mustard, bring to a boil and pour over vegetables. Let stand 1 hour then bring to a boil and boil 3 minutes. Put in jars and seal.

#### ZUCCHINI SQUASH RELISH

- 10 cups ground, unpeeled squash
  - 4 1/2 cups ground onions
  - 3 ground red or green pepper, optional
- Cover with 1 cup salt, stir in and let stand several hours. Drain. Wash thoroughly. Wash through two waters and drain until dry. Make following syrup:
- 2 1/4 cups vinegar
  - 6 cups sugar
  - 1 teaspoon powdered mustard
  - 2 teaspoon celery seed
  - 2 teaspoon turmeric
  - 2 teaspoon cornstarch
- Bring to a boil, put in ground ingredients and cook for 15 minutes. Count time from when ingredients are added, do not overcook. Pack in sterilized jars and seal (6 to 7 pints). Mrs. Ludahl added it is delicious with roast pork or on hamburgers.

be sprayed directly. Although malathion is one of the better pesticides to use in such a project, it still kills most insects, including beneficial ones. There is a large grasshopper population in the area to be sprayed but it's hoped a selective chemical, some natural predator of grasshoppers or a disease of fungus of grasshoppers will be found soon to help in reducing them to a tolerable level. The broad effects of such poison as DDT, parathion and malathion have created a great concern about the effects on our environment among ecologists.

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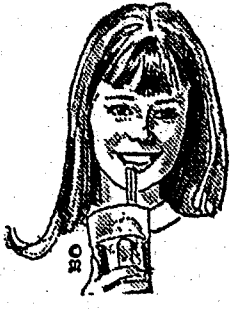

**Public Reaction Cancels Grizzly Bear Transplants**

Tentative plans for transplanting grizzly bears in the upper Priest River drainage of the Idaho panhandle country as a cooperative project of the Idaho Fish and Game Department and the U. S. Forest Service have been dropped for the present. It was announced today in a joint statement.

John R. Woodworth, director of the Idaho Fish and Game Department, and Harold Anderson, supervisor of the Kanku National Forest, said that expressions of public concern, together with problems of handling, shipping and transplanting Ursus horribilus, the scientific name for grizzly bears, resulted in the decision to drop the project at this time. The decision was reached following a conference of grizzly bear specialists.

A committee of specialists was appointed to draft standards for grizzly bear habitat and guidelines for reevaluating potential release sites at a recent meeting of the special Grizzly Bear Committee of the International Association of Game and Fish Commissioners. Woodworth is chairman of this association which was attended by representatives of several western states, the U. S. Forest Service and the National Park Service. It was deemed advisable not to proceed with the cooperative project without knowing the results of this committee's work.

Tentative plans called for six grizzly bears from Yellowstone National Park to be released in the headwaters of the Priest River drainage above Priest

Lake in a relatively remote and inaccessible area where there would be a little likelihood of conflicts with man or his areas of developments and activity. As a further precaution, each bear would have been equipped with a miniature radio transmitter so that the individual animal's movements could be tracked and any bear removed if it migrated from the release site into areas of potential conflict with humans.

If the project is reconsidered in the future, it will be reviewed at public meetings with all interested groups and agencies and every precaution taken to prevent any problems from developing.
