## City Will Enforce Leash Law Strictly

Because of many complaints and the disregard of a few pet owners for the city's leash law, the city council announced this week that the leash law will be enforced strictly and that dogs running at large will be impounded under the provisions of the city ordinance.

The ordinance requires that all dogs kept within the city limits be licensed and that no dogs are allowed to roam at large between March 15 and October 15. The majority of pet owners have been very cooperative in this matter, the council said, but it is that small minority who refuse to confine their pets who are causing the complaints. The city has no other choice than to enforce the law.

**No Bicycles On Streets**  
Another city ordinance the council will start enforcing is the ban on riding bicycles on sidewalks. The council has received numerous complaints from older people who don't like dodging children on bicycles as they walk down the street. Parents are asked to help in this matter by instructing their children on proper bike safety.

## Fire Calls Keep Crews Busy During Past Week

Richard Benjamin, District Fire Warden of the Kendrick Fire Protective District, reported three fire calls this past week.

A jammer belonging to Bill Justice blew up causing a fire near Potlatch Canyon on Texas Ridge Thursday morning.

A fire of unknown origin was responsible for a three-acre timber loss at Forest Butte near Joel the same afternoon.

Friday afternoon, a truck belonging to Kenneth Wilken caught on fire causing extensive damage to the truck and the wheat field which was being harvested.

Friday morning, fire at the Howard Broemeling farm on Central Grade near Genesee destroyed a truck and burning stubble and some standing grain before being brought under control by the Genesee Rural Fire Protection District firemen.

Monday afternoon in Genesee firemen were called out to fight grain field fire at the Henry Schluster farm. Extent of the damage is not known.

## Water Pump Failure Poses Serious Threat To City Water Supply

The failure of the water pump unit supplying the city of Kendrick has created a serious situation, especially at this time of year when fire danger is high, and residents of Kendrick are asked to curtail water usage as much as possible until the pump can be repaired and put back into operation.

The pump and motor, a submersible unit, on the main well broke down Sunday and since then only a small auxiliary well and two small springs have been supplying the city with its water needs. None of these are completely adequate, Mayor Robert Watts said Tuesday afternoon.

"If we have a fire, we're in real trouble," The city immediately began seeking replacement units and it now appears that the closest unit to replace the broken one is coming out of Salt Lake City and is scheduled to arrive later this week. Until then all residents are asked to cooperate and use as little water as possible.

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## Bids To Be Held On Seal Coating Project

A seal coating project in Latah County has reached the stage for bid advertising, according to Mr. Howard B. Thomason, Vice Chairman, Idaho Board of Highway Directors.

Work on this project consists of constructing plant mix shoulders, leveling course, 0.2" pavement and a seal coat on 16.55 miles of US-99, Genesee-Moscow, Thomason stated.

Bids will be opened at 2:00 P.M. in the Office of the Department of Highways, 3211 West State Street, Boise, on the 25th of August, 1970.

This project will be under the supervision of District Engineer Marvin Lotsepelch of the Department's Lewiston Office.

Mr. Lotsepelch stated that the work is expected to be completed within one hundred (100) working days after the order to start work has been given the successful bidder.

Towels and sundry other items were thrown into the pool and broken bottles were strewn around. The girls at the pool, assisted by Larry Foreman, removed the items from the water and cleaned up the broken glass. The pool was ready for business as usual Saturday.

## Harvest Moves Along; Peas Past Peak

A forecast of threatening rain failed to materialize over the weekend and harvest of the 1970 small grain crop in the Kendrick and Genesee area moved along at a rapid pace.

Although there were no rains the weather did cool considerably from Friday night on well into this week. The mercury slipped down into the forties Sunday night and early Monday morning. Temperatures climbed back into the middle nineties Tuesday, but the weather was nearly perfect for harvest operations.

Warehouses in both Genesee and Kendrick reported the early Alaska pea harvest nearly complete and that wheat and barley was coming in at a steady rate.

George Brocke, Jr., of Brocke and Sons in Kendrick, said Tuesday afternoon that he estimated 80 percent of the spring peas grown under his firm's contract were in the warehouses. Austrian peas and lentils are just getting a good start, it was reported. Although there has been some damage to the peas because of the excessive July moisture, Brocke said the quality of the first lentils coming in were "beautiful". He estimated 10 percent of the black peas and lentils had been cut.

Bill Wood, manager of Genesee Union Warehouse Company, said Tuesday afternoon that the early Alaska peas were "pretty well in" and estimated that just a small amount are still standing in the fields around Genesee. He said the yields were fair and the quality "erratic". Some of the early peas looked good and then the rain hit and dropped the quality of some. Wheat is getting a good start, Woods reported, with good volume and average quality so far. He estimated that possibly 20 percent of the wheat was in by Tuesday evening.

Ben Westendahl, manager of Lewiston Grain Growers Kendrick warehouses said harvest deliveries are rolling in as of Tuesday. "We haven't quite hit the peak on wheat yet," he said, "but there are a few farmers finished completely." He estimated that if the weather holds good, Friday should see the peak of the wheat and barley harvest. Some really good wheat and barley yields have been reported by farmers delivering to the Grain Growers warehouses, Westendahl said. The tops he has heard of this year was a 107 bushel per acre yield, with many 70, 80 and 90 bushel yields. It looks like a good year for barley, too, with lots of two-ton reports coming in. "The quality of the barley is surprisingly good," Westendahl said. He estimated that about 90 percent was testing out to be No. 1 grade. Most of the wheat is testing out No. 1, too.

"We'll be full tomorrow night," was the statement by Bob Watts, manager of Kendrick Rochdale Co. in Kendrick. He estimated that the coop's 300,000 bushel storage capacity will be reached by Wednesday and the company will have to start shipping out by rail to clear the elevators for more grain.

## UI Researcher Studies Thin Sawing Techniques

MOSCOW—Turning sawdust into profit may not be just a lumberman's dream, but a reality, if a new sawing technique being investigated by University of Idaho wood products researcher Ken Sowles proves feasible.

Under a \$15,590 McIntire-Stennis Act grant, Sowles is conducting a study to determine the possibilities of employing the revolutionary precision thin sawing method in Idaho mills.

The new procedure reduces the present saw cut by one-half and permits the marketing of wood previously considered waste.

According to Sowles, "Full utilization of logs would be a boon to an industry troubled by increasing costs, soaring stumpage fees and fluctuating lumber prices."

"For example, if a sawmill which now uses four million board feet of sawlogs to produce four million board feet of lumber at an average price of \$80 per million feet, could reduce its wood waste by 10 per cent, it would develop additional sales of \$35,565 per month."

Sowles' study is divided into three phases. He currently is collecting and evaluating information on experiments with the new technique. He then will work with industry in installing machinery in selected plants and conduct analyses of input-output data from these sources. Finally, he will recommend changes in methods to permit general industrial use.

Cooperating in the project are Potlatch Forests, Inc.; Boise Cascade Corp.; Diamond National Corp.; the Hoff Lumber Co.; Horseshoe Bend; and the U. S. Forest Service.

### Dove Shooting Hours

As usual, the hours for shooting mourning doves will be from a half hour before sunrise to sunset on all days of the season including opening day. The Idaho Fish and Game Department pointed out that this conforms with federal regulations set for all migratory game birds by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Director John R. Woodworth stated that the bag limit will be 10 birds daily and 20 in possession after the first day. This year the mourning dove season starts September 1 and ends September 20. The federal "duck stamp" is not required for dove hunting. However, other federal regulations such as the one requiring that a shotgun be "plugged" so it is capable of holding no more than three shells in the magazine and chamber combined will be enforced.

Woodworth pointed out that due to differences in timing across Idaho, the shooting hours will vary in the different regions.

GENESEE—Fire, apparently started from faulty wiring in a 1963 GMC truck destroyed approximately an acre of grain and four or five acres of stubble at the Mrs. Carrie Anderson ranch Friday. Robinson made the announcement following the regular quarterly meeting of the WPP Board of Directors, held Friday in Pullman.

Company earnings were \$1.77 per share for the 12 months ending July 31, 1970. Robinson pointed out that the dividend increase resulted from the increased use of natural gas and electricity in the Company service area which encompasses 28,000 square miles of Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho.

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### YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT

#### HUNTER SAFETY TRAINING

Nearly 16,000 Idaho youngsters received classroom training in gun safety this past academic year. Many of them have reached their twelfth birthday since the last hunting season and will carry guns in the field for the first time this fall.

The Idaho Fish and Game Department sponsors safe gun handling instruction to curb accidents of all kinds whether hunting or non hunting situations.

During 1969, there was a total of 52 gun accidents involving hunting activities. Of these, 9 were fatal, 43 were nonfatal, 24 were self-inflicted, and 28 were not self-inflicted, but generally caused by a member of the victim's party.

#### Bird Hunt Regulations

Closing dates and regulation details for upland game bird hunting will be set at a special meeting of the Idaho Fish and Game Commission beginning August 19. The first afternoon will be the usual public meeting. Opening dates for upland game birds were set earlier this season so sportsmen could plan vacations.

All hunters should get behind the OPERATION RESPECT program; wear the familiar triangle patch on their hunting jackets; and apply the Golden Rule while in the field. This means asking permission to hunt on private lands, taking litter along with them to their homes, and using extreme caution with fire.

#### General Turkey Hunting

Public inquiries are being made about general turkey hunting this year, since it has been publicized that there will be two controlled hunts with a combined total of 125 permits for wild turkeys in all of units 11 and 39. The answer is "yes, there will be wild Merriam's turkey hunting on the lower Salmon River again this year."

The closing date for general turkey hunting will not be set until the special meeting of the Fish and Game Commission later this month for that purpose. The starting date is September 26. Last year, the general turkey hunting season was September 27 through October 1, in game management units 13, 14, 18 and 23.

#### COUGAR KILL ABOVE AVERAGE

The number of cougar killed last year by hunters and trappers was 143, which is 21 animals less than the year before, but still above the eleven-year average, according to data gathered from field men of the department.

The average annual cougar kill in Idaho since the bounty was removed in 1960 has been 130. Since the bounty was done away with, the total harvest of cougars each year has been consistently higher due mainly to sport hunting of the big cats.

**Operation Respect Helps Solve Landholder Sportsman Problem**

Farmers like to know who is on their property, whether they be neighbor, relative, friend or some hunter trying to find a chinese pheasant. Sure, no one can put up with damage to fences, gates, irrigation pipes, seed crops, livestock or buildings. Not one landholder relishes the thought of a bunch of garbage and litter thrown out on his land. And most farmers really flinch, rightfully so when a car stops on the road in front of the farm and shoots at a pheasant over in the field.

But, if the landholder knows exactly who is out there "on the south forty," he has a peace of mind and an assurance that everything is all right as far as his property is concerned.

Members of the Idaho Landholder-Sportsman Council (founded in 1954) came to this same conclusion. They decided that if hunters would find a handy way to identify themselves as persons who care about the rights of others and then go directly to the landholder for permission to go upon his property the whole matter of property damage from hunters and recreationists could be solved. Thus, the triangle hunting jacket patch and new program, OPERATION RESPECT, was born.

Here is how OPERATION RESPECT works: First, the hunter goes to a sportsman's or service club, a hunting and fishing license vendor or the Idaho Fish and Game Department and buys an OPERATION RESPECT triangle patch kit. Purchase of the kit includes a membership at large in the Idaho Landholder-Sportsman Council. Secondly, the new Council member sews or clips the brightly colored triangle patch on his hunting coat and he is ready to go afield.

When the hunter finds a farm on which he would like to hunt, he goes to the landholder, wearing his triangle patch and armed with his Council membership card, landholders guarantee and OPERATION RESPECT calling cards and asks permission to go on the landholder's property for the purpose of hunting. At the same time, the hunter hands the landholder an OPERATION RESPECT calling card with his name and address on the back and reminds the landholder of the Council's guarantee against damage by members of the Council. It is really that simple.

However simple, the whole idea of OPERATION RESPECT is sound. Any individual who will leave his name and address with a landholder most certainly is not going to cause any damage. By the same token, if he accidentally did cause some damage he would be the type of person who would go to the landholder immediately and make it right. This is chiefly what the landholder wants—assurance that his property right will be respected and that any user will be the responsible law-abiding type.

This is the third year of program OPERATION RESPECT. In 1968 and 1969 about 4000 of the triangle patches were sold around the state. It is hoped that many more will be sold to and worn by

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**Post-Spray Bird Count Shows No Decrease**

by Stu Murrell, Regional Conservation Educator

A bird count conducted by three Valley Garden Club members on the grasshopper control area near Lenore showed good number of birds remaining after the spray was applied. There were 101 birds of 23 species in the pre-spray count and 153 birds of 20 species in the post-spray count. It appears the malathion had decreased the grasshopper population without reducing the food insects to a level that would cause birds to migrate from the area.

Several family groups of kingbirds, robins, and mourning doves were observed which would indicate there was sufficient food available to raise the young to adulthood. Three robin nests were examined and two were empty and one had two eggs that had been abandoned. The empty nests show properly hatched

birds at this time of year and abandoned nests can be caused by many factors other than the effects of the spray.

Post-spray counts by Dale Tanner, Assistant Game manager Idaho Fish and Game Department, on Hatwai Creek showed an increase of Game birds broods, particularly chukars. This is a normal situation at this time of year and shows the spray probably had little effect. He did note over 500 meadowlarks, 250 starlings and about 150 magpies had moved into the area, apparently to feed on the grasshoppers. Part of Hatwai Creek had not been sprayed and grasshoppers were still numerous. These large numbers of insect eating birds should help to control this population in the unsprayed locations.

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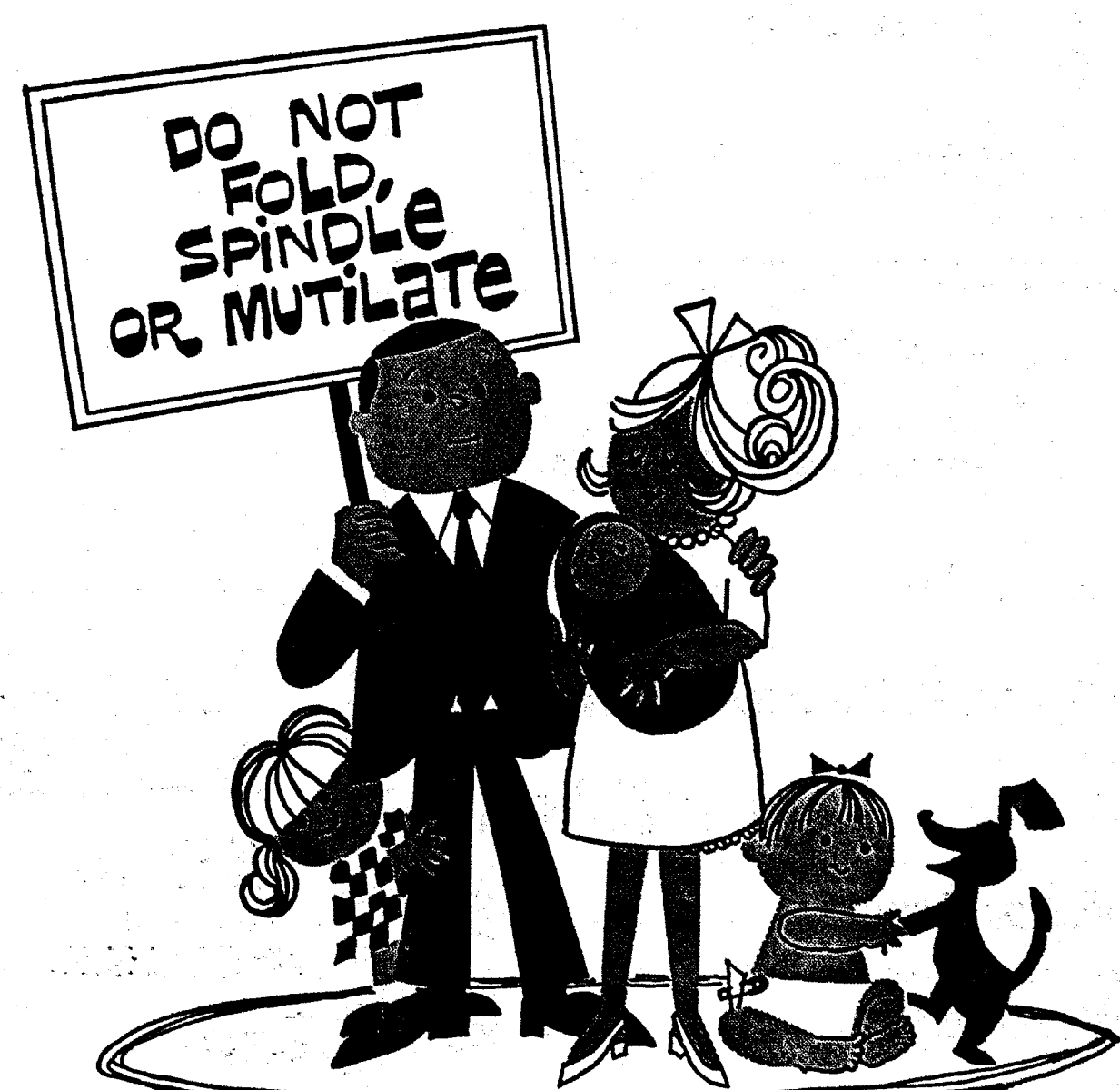
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**Post-Spray Bird Count Shows No Decrease**

A bird count conducted by three Valley Garden Club members on the grasshopper control area near Lenore showed good number of birds remaining after the spray was applied. There were 101 birds of 23 species in the pre-spray count and 153 birds of 20 species in the post-spray count. It appears the malathion had decreased the grasshopper population without reducing the food insects to a level that would cause birds to migrate from the area.

Several family groups of kingbirds, robins, and mourning doves were observed which would indicate there was sufficient food available to raise the young to adulthood. 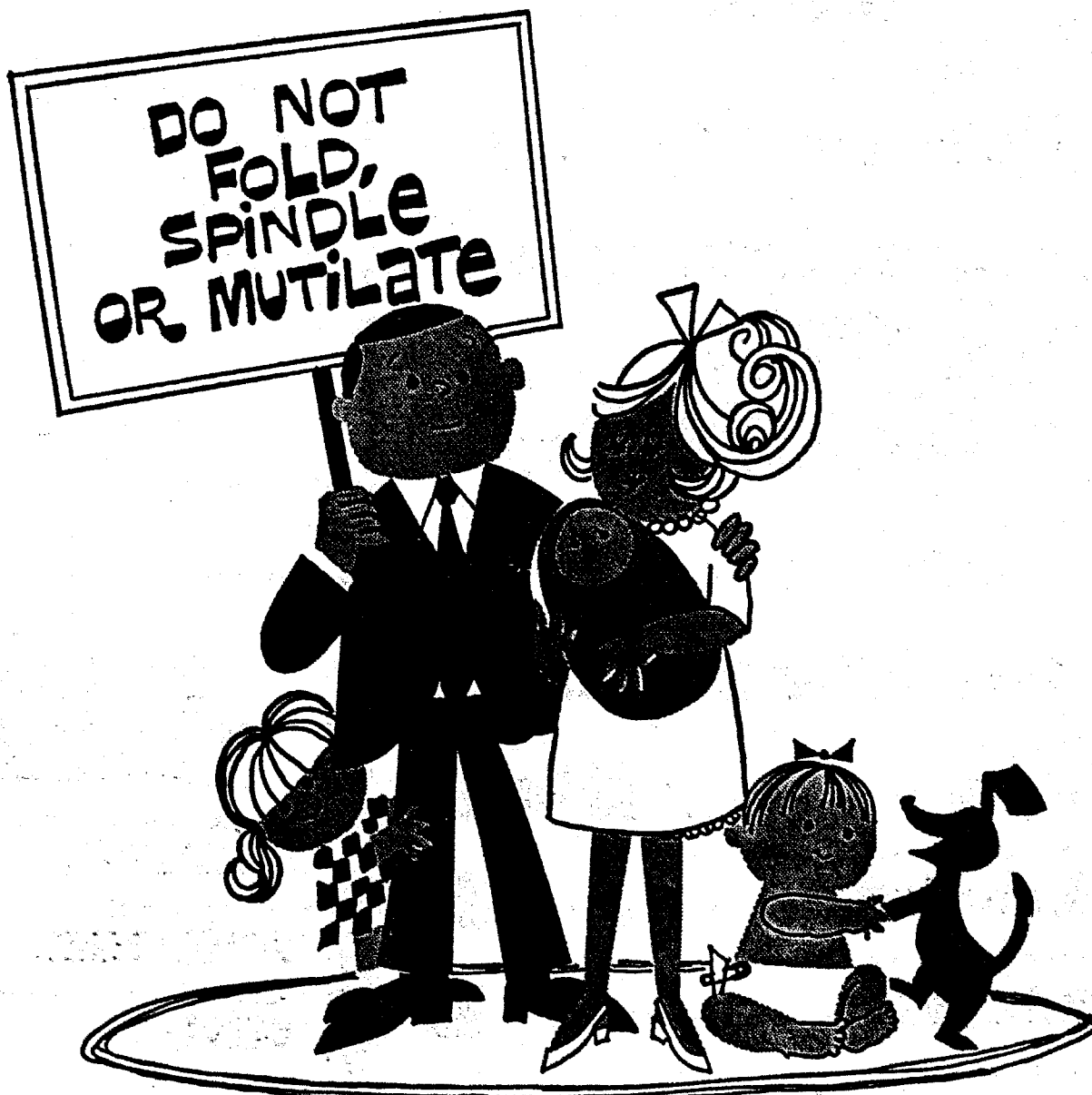

**New Conominium Hall In Pullman**

A new condominium Pullman Professional Hall is in process of reaching toward its goal for this year of housing at least 14 physicians and dentists and widening through all the area easily reached some special services.
