Kendrick-Juliaetta Schools Will Register Students Aug. 24, 25

Senior and Junior High School registration and elementary school registration will take place in Kendrick and Juliaetta next Monday and Tuesday from 8:00 a. m. until 3:00 p. m., reminded Supt. of Schools Don Blakeley this week. Registration times and dates were made to coincide for the convenience of parents who have children at several grade levels.

A meeting of all school bus drivers is scheduled for Friday, Aug. 28, Supt. Blakeley also said. The time is 8:00 p. m.

Mr. Ed Mielke's school bus run will be the same as two years ago. It was revealed this week, due to the elimination of the short run covered by Ben Cook.

According to a recent State Supreme Court decision no book fees can be charged for book rental, workbooks for current event publications. However an optional student activity card may be purchased.

Grass Fire In Kendrick Sunday Afternoon

Residents living on the North Hill just off Main Street in Kendrick were sharply alarmed at what might have been a disaster, on Sunday, when a grass fire started between 1 and 2 in the afternoon. (It just might have been 1 or 2 in the morning).

The smoke was spotted almost instantly and fire equipment and residents soon had the blaze out. It had begun near the back of the Methodist Church.

To add to the danger, the city residents had been limited for the past week on the use of water as the main pump in the large well had burned out. A big fire with a limited supply of water in the hot, dry situation could have been tragic.

Main Pump Working
As of Tuesday morning the pump was again in full operation. Marshall Buzz Nye reported that the new pump ordered out of South Gate, Cal. had been installed on Monday afternoon and evening. Residents may now resume normal sprinkling hours.

Genesee-Moscow Road Improvements Slated

District Engineer Marvin Lotzspeich of the Lewiston office of the Idaho Department of Highways, announced today that bids will be opened August 25 for widening and improvement of two sections of U.S. 95 Highway between Genesee and Moscow.

The new project, known as Genesee-Moscow project No. ST-4114 (569), will widen the roadbed to 28 feet from Genesee Junction to the city limits of Moscow and to 30 feet for approximately one mile to the railroad crossing in Moscow. In addition, a plantmix pavement and seal coat will be provided for the new improvement. The engineer said that deterioration of the pavement over the years has made the construction a necessity.

The Lewiston Design Section is also evaluating plans for construction of truck lanes on the north side of Reisenhour Hill, Moscow Mountain, and Viola Hill, also on U. S. 95 in the vicinity of Moscow. Studies made by the Highway Department this summer have shown that truck lanes are warranted on the north sides of the hill at these locations.

Due to the requirement for additional right of way, the truck lane project could not be incorporated with the Genesee-Moscow project and still be advertised for construction this season. However, the Highway Department plans to have proposals for this improvement ready for construction in the future.

LEGAL NOTICE

NOTICE TO PARENTS AND GUARDIANS OF SCHOOL AGE CHILDREN

In compliance with the requirements of 33-202, notice is hereby given that: In all school districts of this state, every parent or guardian of any child between the ages of seven and sixteen years shall cause such child to be instructed in certain specified subjects. Every such parent or guardian shall cause such child to attend a public, private or parochial school, during a period equal to that portion of each year during which the public schools are in session in such district, and shall cause such child to conform to the attendance regulations established by the board of trustees of such school district.

When a duly licensed physician or psychiatrist shall certify in writing that the physical or mental condition of a child is such that it does not permit attendance at school and upon a finding by the board of trustees that the best interests of the child or the school will be served by exempting such child from attendance, then the board of trustees may grant such exemption during the continuance of such disability. A petition for exemption for such cause may be initiated by the child or by its parent or guardian.

Before the board of trustees may exempt any child who is an habitual truant whose conduct would disrupt school order or discipline, the board shall notify the parents or guardian and afford them an opportunity to appear and show cause why the exemption should not be granted. When exempted for such cause, the probate court shall be notified and said child shall come under the purview of the youth rehabilitation law.

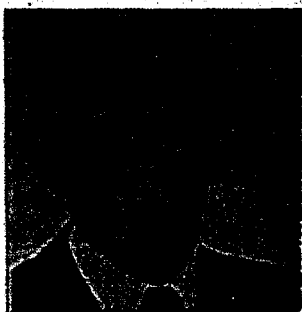

State License Vendors Shipped Big Game Tags

All authorized Idaho fish and game license dealers throughout Idaho who are bonded and who have ordered new supplies, have been sent new licenses, tags, regulations and several printed leaflets covering such subjects as the care of game meat, survival tips, what to do when lost, and other information.

Total business volume, according to A. Kay Bessag, chief of business administration, is indicated by the sale last year of 166,997 deer tags, not including over 30,000 others which were returned unsold to the Fish and Game Department at the end of the sales year. Sales figures also show a total of 78,267 elk tags sold. This does not include over 13,000 returned by vendors to the department at the end of the sales season.

Other 1969 tag sales figures are moose 102; bighorn sheep 52; mountain goat, 311; antelope, 1,818, and turkey, 69.

All hunters are required to attach the appropriate game tag to the carcass as soon as the animal or turkey has been killed, after having punched the tag in two places to show the correct day and month of the kill. Hunters also are required to stop and report at any check station encountered enroute to and from the hunting area, regardless of whether or not game or fish are in possession.

Hunters also must show for inspection all licenses, tags, game and fish, when requested by authorized representatives of the Fish and Game Department.

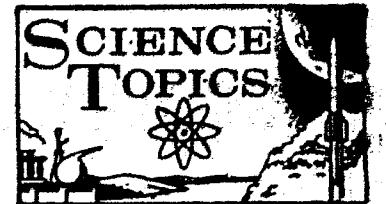

EQUIPMENT designed to examine lunar soil samples soon may find potential dental cavities at the University of Chicago. The device, an "ionizing radiation detector" is being modified to study the density of tooth enamel. When fully operational, the probe will enable dentists to spot areas on individual teeth where the enamel has started to dissolve and where dental decay is almost certain to start, even before there are any physical changes or decay that can be detected by current methods.

TEES up to 60 inches in diameter produced on a new forming press and elbows up to 84 inches can be that weighs a million pounds and has a pressing capacity of 3,000 tons. Capacity of the behemoth is twice that of the largest press previously used by Tube Turns to form elbows and tees for piping systems and permits it to enlarge greatly the size of these fittings to meet piping systems demands.

THE ABILITY to diagnose, at an early stage, an unusual form of cancer of the thyroid gland, medullary carcinoma, has been achieved by a team of scientists from several universities and hospitals. The diagnostic test developed by these researchers involves the use of a radioimmunoassay method which measures the concentration of a hormone—calcitonin—in the blood of patients.

MAGNETIC FIELDS created by electrical currents in the heart offer an opportunity to check heart performance in a minute; it now takes 20 by conventional electrocardiogram. The equipment, called a magnetocardiograph, is undergoing tests at Syracuse University.

GERMAN COPPER MINES in the Middle Ages called it "Kupfernickel" (devil's copper) because it was an unwanted nuisance, an ore that looked like copper but didn't yield any. Today, known simply as nickel, the metal is still a puzzle in medical science. Of trace metals found in the human body, few have baffled researchers more. It seems necessary in some way; chickens raised without it develop leg deformities. Yet nickel is a cancer producer, found in tobacco smoke, car fumes and the air of some industrial plants.

AT LEAST THREE MISSILES from space, each a mile in diameter, smashed into South Africa about two billion years ago with an explosive force that may have generated the "biggest bang" our planet has known, says a research scientist at the U. S. Geological Survey. The U. S. Geological Survey. The missile cluster apparently consisted of fragments of a larger body, perhaps the head of a huge wandering comet, that broke up when it was snared by the Earth's gravitational field.

Our recipes this week are from Mrs. Janet Nail. The Nail family moved here a few months ago from Lewiston. Her recipes are for Ranch Cookies and Boiled Cookies. I'll vouch for the Boiled Cookies as a very generous sample accompanied the recipe. With school starting soon, after school snacks will be a must—and what is better to stay the pangs of hungry till suppertime than a handful of cookies and a glass of milk. Our other recipes are from a reader who wishes to keep her name unknown. Fine, just so we have her recipes to share with our readers, and thanks so much friend.

Mrs. Nail says this Ranch Cookie recipe is one of her favorites, because it can be varied in so many ways. It stays moist for a week, (if, she adds, they last that long.

RANCH COOKIES

Cream Together:
1/2 cup shortening
2 cups brown sugar
1/2 cup margarine
2 eggs

Sift Together Twice:
3 1/2 cups flour
2 teaspoons soda
1 teaspoon cloves
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1 teaspoon baking powder
2 teaspoons nutmeg

Add to creamed mixture alternately with 2 cups applesauce. Last add 2 cups rolled oats, 2 cups nuts, and 2 small packages of chocolate chips. Drop on ungreased cookie sheet, by rounded teaspoon full. Bake at 375 degrees for 12-15 minutes. Makes about 60 cookies.

BOILED COOKIES

This recipe, Mrs. Nail adds, requires no baking, and it is nice to prepare on these warm days.

2 cups sugar
1/2 cup milk
4 tablespoons butter or margarine
4 tablespoons cocoa

Bring to boil. Boil 2 or 3 minutes. Add 1/4 cup of peanut butter (the chunky kind), 1 teaspoon vanilla and 3 cups rolled oats. Mix thoroughly. Place on waxed paper, by teaspoonful. Let set for 45 minutes to a hour.

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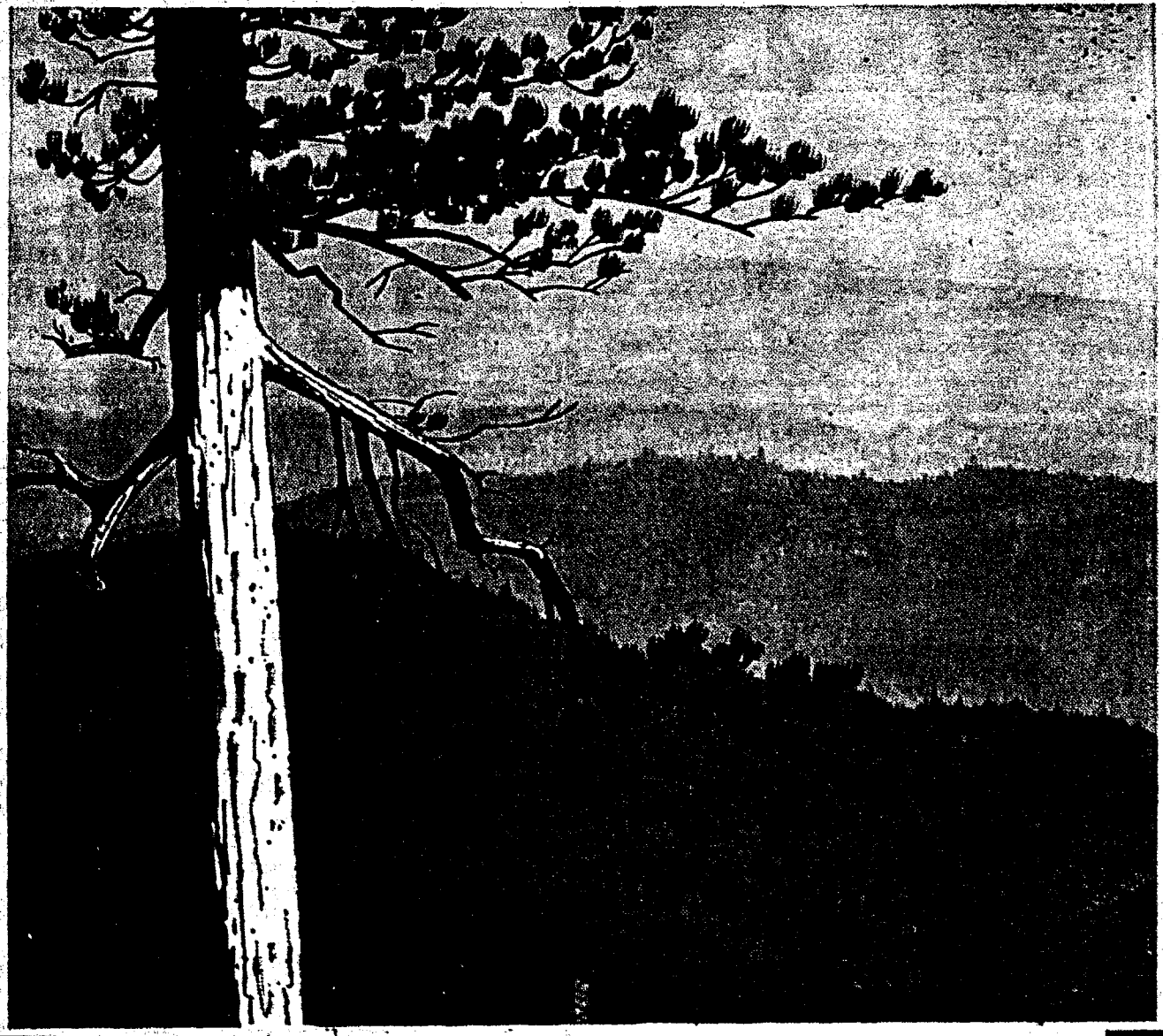
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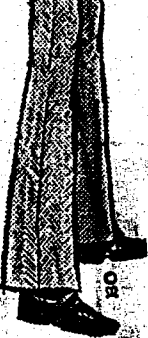
