Kendrick, Juliaetta Schools Opened

"Really smooth" . . . was the way Supt. Don Blakeley described the opening day of school in Joint School District No. 283 as students returned to their classrooms Monday morning after the annual summer vacation. Blakeley said the first days smooth operation was a tribute to the efficiency of the faculty and staff and he had high praise for both.

Enrollment totaled 387 in the district, down slightly from last year. The largest drop in enrollment was in the elementary grades at Juliaetta where 184 children were enrolled the first day compared to 195 last year.

The breakdown of enrollment is as follows: First-27, Second-28, Third-27, Fourth-31, Fifth-34 and Sixth-37.

In Junior High there are 36 students in the 7th grade and 27 in the eighth.

High school enrollment is: Freshmen-25, Sophomore-39, Juniors -33 and Seniors 33.

In discussing general expectations for the coming year, Supt. Blakeley said, referring to students, "we're going to keep 'em busy and give 'em their money's worth."

A total of 34 students have already signed up for the band program this year and Blakeley said he has high hopes for a really good music program. There will also be a good, strong frosh-sophomore football program this year and increased emphasis on drama and speech in addition to track and basketball programs.

The bigger, stronger alumnal scored four touchdowns, one of which was called back, and held the Tigers scoreless during the contest. Almost fifty dollars was taken in by the Kendrick Tiger Boosters club.

Lightning Set Fires Battled By Fighters

Twelve lightning-set fires were manned around the clock for some 33 hours by the Kendrick Fire Protective District, reports Marshall Dick Benjamin. The District crews were working on over twelve fires with only one fire on an accessible road. A bulldozer was used in some cases to get equipment in.

Five other fires were manned by rural fire departments as the number as the number of lightning strikes during the storm were beyond the District man power. All were in the mopping up stage as of Tuesday morning.

There were a few spot fires again on Monday night, though some rain accompanied the storm.

Sunday night and Monday night the area was subjected to electrical storms of spectacular proportions with the lightning causing most of the dreaded fires.

Kendrick Was There First
Clint Herman, owner of the house, barn and other buildings on the old Robert Kuhn farm, that burned last week asked the Gazette to correct the article in last week's issue concerning the fire. The crew from the Kendrick Fire Protective District were the first notified and the first to arrive on the scene—not the Genesee Rural Fire Protection District, who was not notified until later. Clint said he appreciated Kendrick District coming up to the fire and wanted to make certain they received proper credit. The Gazette regrets the unintentional slight.

A Nye family potluck picnic was held in the Kendrick City Park Sunday with forty-two present for the reunion.



A rash of burglaries have plagued Kendrick businessmen for the past two weeks. One service station, a cafe and a tavern have been hit by thieves during a fourteen-day period. All of the break-ins have occurred during the weekend.

Sometime Sunday evening or early Monday morning thieves broke into the Antelope Inn and Burt's Cafe, taking merchandise, money and damaging property. Mrs. Dorothy Van Fraag, owner of Burt's Cafe discovered the robbery at her business Monday morning at approximately 5:30 a. m. as she prepared to open. Burglars had gained entrance by breaking a window over a table opposite the grill area. The thieves broke open a pin ball game, pop corn machine and pool table taking roughly \$150.

The busy burglars, either before or after striking at Burt's Cafe, tried three times to enter the Antelope Inn before finally gaining entrance by breaking the lock off the front door. The juke box was broken into and burglars broke off the end of the pool table trying to get at the cash box. Money from a money changer on the bar was also taken.

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Extra Time Afield Gives Big Rewards

Most Idaho hunters already are planning fall hunting trips, and one big item is to allow a little extra time for good measure. Experience teaches that a hurried hunt is unsuccessful more often than a leisurely trip. It also may be disappointing from a strictly recreational point of view.

Modern living moves at a fast pace and people are turning in ever-increasing numbers to outdoor recreation to escape the tensions of jobs and other day-to-day routine. Frustrating "hurry-up-and-wait" habits are not transferable from market place to a big game safari, however, and hunters on the lookout for modern shortcuts sometimes try to take "hurry hurry" habits with them to the back country. It does not work.

Game managers whose lifetime goal is helping perpetuate good outdoor living sometimes keeps records of hunting time as reported by gunners returning from the field. Trip planners who ponder some of these records are prompted to ask the boss for a few days more as an extra block of hunting success "insurance".

Time is the stuff from which life is made, according to an old adage that goes back to Benjamin Franklin. Records show that it also is the basis of a successful hunt, especially elk. No two hunts ever go off quite the same. It's a thrilling day when a guy locks out and finds an old bull standing within shooting range alongside a road on opening day. But other things being equal, a hunter has a better chance to score if he allows enough time to get the job done. This is true regardless of the quarry, whether game birds or big game.

Idaho hunters claim an average of almost 15,000 elk a year. The success ratio is about 4-1, one of the highest in the nation. Men and women who do bag elk say the season was good. Those who do not score wail that it was a bust. Nonresidents who have hunted in other states say that Idaho is the place to go for elk, whether or not success crowns every trip.

While more hunters bag elk, and average success figures are higher in the Gem State than anywhere else in the land, it is a fact just the same that hunting can be tough and odds against scoring are high. Elk have most of the advantages and won't give a man a break.

Elk hunters have fairly heavy odds running against their chances for success because they are big animals and never as abundant as deer or antelope. Their food requirements are greater. During September and October they still are in the high country on summer range and scattered. They will be found, if at all, on warm days early in the season in dense thickets close to stream bottoms. The first and last hours of the day are the only times an elk can be caught out in open clearing away from brushy cover.

Experienced hunters aver that elk on summer range have all the advantages, rarely making a mistake in judgment or getting careless. They are in the prime of condition and ready to match wits and strength with sportsmen in rough, timbered areas far from roads and the haunts of man. Anyone who thinks hunting elk is like shooting cows in a pasture should stay home and buy his meat across the counter, and a trophy from the taxidermy shop.

Early season elk hunting does have some points that are lost in late October and November. Weather usually is fine and it's great just to be out enjoying the crisp autumnal beauties of Indian summer. One of the most thrilling sounds in nature is the shrill bugling of bull elk. Mating drives these noble animals with the slender, tower antlers which often rise a to wering four feet above their heads, is so strong that they will not break off their shattering challenge to other bulls even when they are aware that hunters are within earshot. Hunting during the rut, consequently does give the elk hunter some edge.

Much more snow is needed to move elk down from summer to winter range than other animals. They always spend the cold months at higher elevations than deer, depending on cutting winds of winter to keep snow swept from browse shrubs and plants on ridgetops, and on the upper fringes of scrub timber, which give some shelter from storms. Usually there is not enough snow in Idaho to start much elk migration until after the hunting season ends in late November and early December.

When cooler weather comes, elk wander over the range much more than deer which means that hunters must walk and walk. They often know that a hunter is on the trail long before they catch a glimpse of him because of their well-developed senses of smell and hearing. The scent of man causes elk to break for the nearest cover, without waiting to find him by sight.

This is the big argument for learning every detail of the countryside and the habits of the quarry long before the first gun booms to start a new hunting season. Big game animals are wily masters of deception. They know how to use the landscape and cover to best advantage in eluding pursuers.

Outfitters and guides who know the country and the habits of elk usually can forecast just where a herd will go when trying to escape from one place to another. By detailing members of a hunting party to cover these natural avenues of travel, it generally is possible to assure shooting for at least some individuals in the group providing that wind currents are favorable to such approach.

When a man learns enough woodlore to glance over country that is strange to him and can tell where elk are most apt to be, he can save much time and energy that otherwise must be spent trying to locate game.

When he can do that, he cuts down the odds against bagging an elk because he knows what his quarry eats, where it sleeps and where the best place will be to find it at any time of day.

Until then, a little extra time afield will bring extra rewards. Every hunter hopes these can include something in the bag, and the record shows that additional time will improve a man's chances of scoring.

HUCKLEBERRY CAKE

½ cup shortening
1 cup brown sugar
½ cup white sugar
1 egg
½ tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. soda
1 cup sour milk or buttermilk
2 cups flour
2 cups huckleberries (mixed with a little of the flour) and fold into the dough.
Bake 350 degrees, 45 minutes

ORANGE BREAD

Juice of 1 large orange (put in cup and fill cup with boiling water)
Grind orange and pulp
Add 1 cup cut dates or raisins
Add 1 tsp. soda
1 cup white sugar
2 tbs. melted shortening
1 beaten egg
2 cups flour
1 tsp. baking powder
¼ tsp. salt
Beat well and pour into greased loaf pan.
Bake 350 degrees for 50 minutes.

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Morse Code Exposes Litterbugs

When you hear a horn sounding "beep, beep, beep, beep" on the road this year it may mean that someone has caught a litterbug in the act and is calling attention to the deed.

The national campaign to call attention to litterbugs has been adopted by the Family Camping Federation this year in an effort to combat the mountains of trash that are spread along the nation's highways, campgrounds and waterways.

The idea was the brain child of Mrs. Ann Ward of Cunningham, Colorado. The basic idea was borrowed from the World War II era when the coded signal "V" for victory was sounded throughout the nation.

Not only campers, but all concerned citizens are urged to sound the "beep, beep, beep, beep" signal when they catch a litterbug in the act.

Fire Fighters Needed

A call for 25 forest fire fighters was received by the Moscow Office of the Idaho Department of Employment on Friday, according to Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow Office manager. Hartstein said that this accounted for nearly half of the new job listings received during the week. Several workers had been referred by the close of business Friday, but it appeared that additional workers would be needed early next week. In addition to the fire fighters, a total of 17 workers were placed on jobs throughout the area during the previous week. At the end of the week there were 35 other jobs still open in Moscow. All jobs were for workers seeking full time work, and included calls for cooks, waitresses, a bookkeeper, salespersons, TV repairman, service station attendant and managers, secretaries, pressers, and farm hands.

Hartstein's report also indicated that unemployment remained about the same as for the previous week. A total of 133 persons were continuing to seek jobs, compared with 141 workers during the previous week. A year ago, however, there were only 82 workers seeking unemployment insurance. Of the total currently seeking benefits, 86 were women. Many of the workers will return to employment in college connected activities during the next two weeks.
