"Rub Out Rubella" Campaign Date Is Set

A long step toward prevention of birth defects in Idaho will be taken during the week of Sept. 28 - Oct. 2 with the "Rub Out Rubella in Idaho" campaign. Latah County will take part in the program Oct. 1st and 2nd. Rubella, or German measles, has been known to cause birth defects since 1941, but a vaccine to prevent the otherwise mild disease was not available until last year.

The Health Department, Clinic Coordinator locally, says all area clinics will be conducted in schools, which, during the day, house most of the children, ages one to twelve, who are to be immunized during the urged to bring their pre-school children to be immunized during the evening to the schools.

Tigers Trampled Prairie 30-18 For First Grid Win

Kendrick High School's Tiger football team spotted the visiting Prairie Pirates of Cottonwood an early first quarter touchdown then proceeded to shred the Pirate defense apart and score a 30-18 victory before a happy hometown crowd Friday evening.

While it was a combined team effort that brought victory for the Tigers, the outstanding work done by the offensive and defensive line of Kendrick spelled the difference between the two teams. The Tiger offensive line opened gapping holes for its running backs and provided excellent pass protection for quarterback Donnie Parks. On defense, the KHS line smothered its opponents many times, giving Prairies' good quarterback, John Reiner, little time to get set.

An interception and a face-mask grabbing penalty in the early minutes of the game set up the first Pirate score and Prairie drove over the goal line from 3 yards out. The conversion try failed. Parks returned the Prairie kickoff forty yards and then passed down to the 21-yard line. Kimbley smashed down to the Pirate 8-yard line before being driven out of bounds. Parks moved the ball to the four and Kimbley bulled the oval over from there on the next play. Kendrick's conversion failed and it was a 6-6 game.

The Pirates caught Kendrick napping on the second play following the kick and swept 70 yards on a reverse to take a 12-6 lead again after the extra point try failed.

Parks blocked a Prairie punt on the Pirate 11-yard line after the stubborn Tiger line wouldn't yield, and on the next play handed off to Steve Holt on a reverse, who slipped through the center of the line without being touched and tied the game at 12-all at the end of the first half. The Kendrick Girls Drill Team pranced through two snappy half-time routines and were well-received by the appreciative fans.

In the third quarter, Kendrick's line stopped the Pirates cold as they forced the visitors back deep inside their own territory and then blocked a punt attempt to take over on the Prairie 10. Parks cracked through from seven yards out and the Tigers had a lead they never gave up.

Ahead 18-12, Tiger back Steve Holt intercepted a pass on the Pirate 22 and wiggled his way down to the eight but a 15-yard penalty set the Tigers back to the 23. From there they worked the ball down to the 13-yard line and on the next play Parks powered his way through the center of the line to score, dragging three Prairie tacklers with him as he crossed over the line.

It was in this final quarter that the smaller, but stronger Tiger line completely demoralized the Pirates. Linemen Boyd Candler and Lowell Hoffman spent so much time in the Pirate backfield that if the game had gone one more quarter, both could have qualified for a Prairie letter.

Kendrick's final touchdown came after the Pirates had been driven back to their own 13 and gambled on a pass in a fourth down situation. The pass failed and Kendrick took over. Workhorse Alan Kimbley pocketed the pigskin across and the Tigers had it 30-12.

Prairie, dead-game to the last, scored in the final minute of play on a pass to make the score 30-18 as the gun sounded.

At Highland Saturday because of the Latah County Fair, Kendrick will play at Highland Saturday night, September 19 at 7:30. The Huskies defeated Culesac 20-6 last Friday.

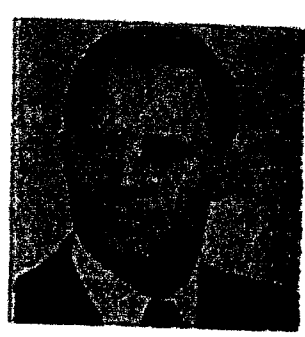

GUMDROP COOKIES
 1 cup shortening
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 2 eggs
 1 teaspoon baking powder
 2 cups oatmeal
 2 cups gumdrops, cut in pieces, (fruit flavors are best)
 2 cups chopped walnuts
 1 cup brown sugar
 1 cup white sugar
 2 cups flour
 1 teaspoon soda
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 cup coconut

Cream shortening and sugar, add eggs and vanilla, beat well, then add all remaining ingredients. Mix until well blended. Roll in balls about the size of a walnut and flatten on greased sheet. Bake at 325 d. until lightly browned. These next two cookies will stay moist and good for a month if put in an airtight container after they are cooled.

APPLESAUCE COOKIES
 1 cup applesauce
 1 cup granulated sugar
 1 cup seedless raisins
 1/4 cup shortening
 1 egg, unbeaten
 2 cups all-purpose flour
 1 teaspoon each salt, baking powder, and cinnamon
 1/2 teaspoon each soda, nutmeg, cloves
 1 cup chopped nuts

Mix applesauce and raisins, set aside. Combine sugar, shortening and egg in mixing bowl; beat until fluffy. Stir in applesauce and raisins. Sift flour with salt, baking powder, soda and spices; add and mix well. Stir in nuts. Drop soft dough by teaspoonfuls 2" apart on greased baking sheets. Bake at 375d for 12 to 15 minutes. Makes 4 to 5 dozen cookies.

PINEAPPLE OATMEAL DROPS
 1/2 cup shortening
 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
 1 egg, unbeaten
 1 cup all-purpose flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup chopped nuts
 1 cup granulated sugar
 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg
 1 cup (8 1/2 oz. can crushed pineapple, undrained)
 1 1/2 cup rolled oats

Cream together shortening, sugar and spices until fluffy. Beat in egg. Stir in pine apple, then add flour sifted with salt and soda. Add rolled oats and nuts; mix well. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased baking sheet. Bake at 375d for 12 to 15 minutes. Let cool a minute before removing from baking sheet. Makes about four dozen.

A wise grandfather was asked by a concerned parent what he could do to be sure his children would not be rebellious when they grow up.

"Tell them bedtime stories," came the quick reply.

There's no better way to get to know the inner thoughts and hopes of our children than at he bedside, in the quiet moments before sleep comes. To know the inner hopes of your child is essential to the guidance only a parent can give.

Bedtime stories, begun when the child is just a toddler, lay the foundation for a lifelong "open line" between parent and offspring.
