

Henry Reil, Prominent Leland Farmer, Dies of Lukemia At Seattle Hospital

Lukemia claimed Henry Reil, 64, prominent Leland area farmer, on Thursday night, Sept. 17, at the Virginia Mason Hospital in Seattle. He had been ill for three years.

Born at Edewecht, Oldenberg, Germany, June 21, 1906, Reil was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Heinrich Reil. He left Germany, arriving in Nebraska in 1924, where he remained for only a few months before coming to the Leland-Kendrick area. He had been engaged in farming there since that time.

He was married to the former

Henny Sander, Nov. 9, 1934, at New York. She survives at the family home.

Other survivors include a brother, Johann Reil, and two sisters, Mrs. Freda Schroder and Mrs. Helene Diskus, all of Germany.

He was a member of the Cameron Emmanuel Lutheran Church.

The tough Kamiah Kubs gave the Genesee High School Bulldogs their sternest test of the young season and fought all the way before going down to a 27-0 defeat on the Genesee field Saturday night. Genesee held a 12-0 halftime lead.

Dan Tyler, the speedy scabbard of the Bulldog team, scored the first Genesee tally, banging over from seven yards out after the ball had been moved down into scoring position by a 33-yard run from Doug Tyler and a smashing ten-yard dive by Ray Morscheck. 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

Home Cookin'

Mrs. Laverne Anderson is guest cook this week and her recipes are timely, using the always-favorite fruit, apples, which have been so plentiful this year. There are so many various ways to prepare this fruit and Mrs. Anderson's are some we know you'll enjoy.

With cooler weather just around the corner and fall and winter activities already beginning to hum, the housewife will start planning warmer meals for her family. So look in your files, ladies, and send in more recipes. I had such a fine response to my appeal for cookie recipes that perhaps I should ask for casserole dishes. Well, why not?

EASY APPLE CRISP

4 or 5 good sized apples
1 cup flour
1 cup sugar
¼ teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 egg
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/3 cup butter
Peel and core apples, slice them thin and arrange in bottom of greased baking dish. Mix flour, sugar, salt and baking powder blending well. Break the egg over this mixture and stir until crumbly. Place this mixture as a topping over the apples. Dust with cinnamon and pour melted butter over the top. Bake at 350 degrees until apples are done—depending on variety, 35 to 50 minutes.

APPLE ROSETTE

1½ cups sugar
1½ cup water
½ cup red cinnamon candies
Boil together and simmer 5 minutes. Pour into 8x12 pan serving ¼ cup for topping.
2 cups sifted flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
¼ cup sugar
1/3 cup shortening
1 egg, plus enough milk to make 2/3 cup
Make a biscuit dough, cutting in shortening, adding liquid; knead and roll into rectangle 10x15".
Spread dough with 1 T soft butter, add 3 cups finely cut up apples and roll up as for jelly roll. Cut into 1½" slices, place in pan, bake for 30 min. at 425 d., spoon reserved syrup over biscuits and continue to bake for 10-15 minutes.
Serve warm with cream or ice cream.

Horne noted that wild game is exempt from the Idaho meat inspection law and can be processed in any meat handling facility, providing the following sanitary precautions are observed:

1. Wild game with the hide on cannot be placed in a cooler with domestic

Game Bird Seasons For Clearwater Region

Chukars, all species of quail, Hungarian partridge, and all species of forest grouse seasons open on Sept. 19th in Idaho. Prospects appear excellent for all of these birds in the Clearwater Region with personnel of the Idaho Fish and Game Department counting some of the highest brood numbers seen in several years. Bag limits are liberal with 10 chukars, 10 Huns, 10 in the aggregate of quail species and 3 forest grouse in the aggregate of species allowed per day. The possession limit is double the daily bag limit.

Chukars are the most numerous game bird in this area and some of the better hunting spots are the steep rocky slopes in the Eagle Creek area of the lower Salmon River, the hillsides above Highway 12 from Lewiston upstream along the Clearwater River to Cherry Lanes Bridge and the main Salmon River drainage from Whitebird to Riggins. Huns can be found scattered throughout these same locations.

The best quail hunting occurs along the lower draws with flickers of rose, hawthorn, and blackberry being the preferred cover. Much of this land is privately owned so be sure to ask permission first.

The forest grouse are usually located at higher elevations with some excellent ruffed grouse populations to be found in the logged over lands east of Moscow and in upper Potlatch Canyon. Blue and spruce grouse can be found in much of the pack country with the lower Selway and National Forest lands in upper Shookumchuck and Slate Creek drainages being three of the better areas. Hunters are reminded that forest grouse season in big game Unit 11 on Craig Mtn. does not open until November 14th.

Pheasant season opens October 10th in north Idaho with a reduced bag limit of 2 cocks per day in the Clearwater Region, consisting of Latah, Lewis, Nez Perce, Clearwater and Idaho counties. Although there are not large numbers of pheasants in this area there has been an excellent hatch and hunters should enjoy good hunting. The Idaho Fish and Game Department releases about 5,000 cocks in north Idaho each year to supplement the natural population.

Big Game Seasons In Clearwater Region

There are several big game units that will open with the early big game seasons on September 19th in the Clearwater Region. These include Units 9, 16A, 17, 19 and 20. This seasons runs until Nov. 29th in Unit 9 and December 6 in the others. Hunting should be excellent if the weather provides the proper conditions. Here was a reduced kill on deer and elk last fall, which was followed by a mild winter. This combination usually means a good fawn and calf crop.

These early seasons in Idaho's less accessible areas provide the best opportunity to bugle in a trophy bull elk. Here are ginger numbers of these bigger animals in such units because the hunting pressure is not as great.

The general big game season begins on October 3rd and runs through November 1st in Units 10, 11A, 14, 15 and 16 and 18. Unit 10 does not have a split season this year. Unit 13 starts on October 3rd but ends early on October 18th and Unit 10A runs two extra weeks until Nov. 15, just for deer.

Most of north Idaho, including Unit 8, starts October 31st and ends November 29th. These late seasons are designed to allow the white-tailed deer under a better chance to bag his gamer under snowy conditions.

There have been some changes made in non-resident license fees with the non-resident combination license increased from \$100 to \$135, non-resident bird license to \$35, and a \$50 deer license added, which is good statewide for one deer.

Some of our best elk units include 8, 9, 10, 15, 16 and 17. The better deer units are 8, 11, 11A, 13, 18 and 14. Many of these deer areas have private land throughout them, so be sure and ask permission if you plan to hunt on such lands. However, we have plenty of public land, either state or federal, that is available for big game hunting in the Clearwater Region.
