# Motorists Passing Halted School Buses Pose Danger To Children Says Supt.

We are getting numerous reports that local citizens and Washington tourists are passing school buses while they are loading and unloading school children, thus creating grave possibilities of killing or seriously injuring your children, grandchildren, relatives or friends.  
The State School Transportation Law states: "It shall be the duty of every school bus driver to report the license number of any vehicle which violates any law endangering school children to his immediate superior."  
"Furthermore, any person operating a motor vehicle, upon meeting or overtaking a school bus which has stopped on the shoulder thereof for the purpose of loading and unloading school children, shall completely stop the vehicle before reaching the point in the highway described in the second paragraph of this subsection; shall not proceed with the vehicle while any school children are leaving or boarding the school bus or crossing the highway; and shall not proceed until the flashing red warning lights on the bus have been discontinued and the stop signal arm has been retracted."  
In other words it is against the law to pass a school bus loading or unloading children while the stop arm is extended.  
We urge your cooperation for the preservation of our greatest resource — Youth. — Don A. Blakeley, Supt. of School, Kendrick Jt. Dist. No. 263.

**Speech Therapist Hired For Area Schools**  
Danielle Parker, a highly qualified Speech Therapist, will start serving the school districts of Genesee, Troy, Potlatch and Kendrick as of October 1st for the 1970-71 school year. Eighty percent of her salary will be paid as ancillary personnel by the state, leaving the remaining twenty percent to be paid by the four remaining school districts.  
Mrs. Parker will start screening grades 1 - 6 in Juliaetta for speech correction problems in about two weeks. Junior and Senior High cases are being noted this week by their teachers and their problems referred to Mrs. Parker.  
A thumb nail sketch of Mrs. Parker is as follows: She received her B. S. in Speech Correction from Bloomsburg State College in Pa. in 1968 and M. S. in Education with a major in Speech Pathology and Audiology from Genesee State University College in Genesee, N. Y. in 1970. She is a member of the American Speech and Hearing Association and recently has been accepted as a candidate to receive her Certificate of Clinical Competence. The past four and a half years she has been doing clinical and public school work in New York State. She is certified by the New York State Education Dept. as a Speech and Hearing therapist, approved by the New York State Health Dept. as a speech pathologist and hearing clinician to work in health related facilities.  
Continuing, Mrs. Parker has had extended diagnostic, therapeutic and consultative client contact with individuals representing such handicaps as: Cerebral Palsy, mental retardation, cerebral dysfunction, sensory and perceptual deficits, emotional disturbances, articulation and language disorders, stuttering, dysarthria, cleft palate, deafness, hard of hearing, voice problems, aphasia, reverse swallowing patterns, learning disabilities.  
Mrs. Parker comes highly recommended from City Schools of Auburn, New York, and the United Cerebral Palsy Association of New York State.  
We are indeed fortunate to have such a well trained Speech Therapist serving White Pine, Potlatch, Genesee and Kendrick school districts.  
Mrs. Nancy Griffith, a specialized Reading teacher with a Masters degree in Elementary Education, is serving the District by working with Reading problems in grades 2 through 6.  
Supt. Don Blakeley stated that with this type of personnel serving our students many problems should be corrected and averted among our youth.  
Mrs. Parker's husband is attending the University of Idaho.

# Bulldogs Blast Orofino 33-0 For Fourth Win

Genesee's Bulldog football team took a giant leap toward the Central Idaho League Championship last Friday night when they battered the previously unbeaten Orofino Maniacs 33-0 on the Genesee field in a contest that saw the strong Bulldog defensive line completely contain and stymie the Orofino attack.  
Both teams showed strong defensive lines in the first quarter which ended in a 0-0 tie with neither squad able to mount a full offensive drive. The only excitement was Dan Tyler's 40-yard run that was nullified by an off-side penalty against the Bulldogs.  
With five minutes left in the second quarter, Dan Tyler broke through the Maniac line on a ten-yard ramble that scored for the Bulldogs. The PAT failed and Genesee held a 9-0 halftime lead.  
Coming out strong in the second half and aided by two penalties against the Orofino team, Genesee made it 12-0 as Ray Morscheck moved the ball to the Maniac 30-yard line; Dick Green gained 11 yards more and then Dan Tyler slipped through the line for 19 yards and pay dirt. Green, playing in his first game of the year, ran over for a two-point conversion.  
Ray Morscheck, on a quick opener broke through the Orofino line and went 52 yards for the next GHS score and it was 20-0 as the extra point try failed. Dan Tyler scored for GHS again after Green almost made it for Genesee running twenty yards and then having one of his own blockers trip him up on the 20-yard line. Danny's 20-yard run made it 26-0.  
Genesee blocked a Maniac punt on the one-yard line and took over possession at that point, Morscheck, on the next play, punched the ball across. The kick attempt by Busch was good and Genesee had their 33-0 win.

SALMON WOES TRACED TO NITROGEN POISON

This year there seems to be some people in the upper Salmon River drainage who are troubled about the future of our salmon and steelhead runs. Their concern has been precipitated for the most part by the problems encountered during the last two years by the salmon and steelhead runs. One should remember though, that both last year and this year were years of late snow melt and high run-off. This late, high run-off posed a two-fold problem to the salmon runs that frequent this area. The high, turbid water hampered angler success in this area, which decreased the total catch and secondly it caused excessive spilling at the lower dams which added atmospheric nitrogen to the water, causing nitrogen disease and significant mortalities to our salmon and steelhead populations. In 1968, the nitrogen poisoning affected both the spring and summer chinook and also the summer steelhead runs so that we had just fair angler success for most of the salmon season with good fishing only during the first

ten days of July. This year our spring chinook run came in earlier than usual, and fortunately, was affected little by the nitrogen poisoning that occurred in late May and June. Since the summer chinook and summer steelhead were in the Columbia and Snake River at this time, they were subject to supersaturations of nitrogen in the water. From information received from the downriver agencies, it appears that we have lost significant numbers of these summer chinook and summer steelhead.

This year we operated salmon check stations near Challis, Smiley Creek and Banner Summit to collect information on the salmon harvest. By early July these check stations provided us with information that indicated that salmon fishing was just fair to slow, due to the high water, and that the number of salmon being caught was down. Since more spring chinook could be harvested without endangering spawning stocks, the season on spring chinook was extended 11 days to July 26 on the upper Salmon River, the upper Lemhi River, and a section of Camas Creek. The main Salmon River below Redfish Lake Creek was not extended because if this were done, we would catch more summer chinook.

The spring chinook run appears to be in a healthy condition so we can have a sport harvest each year when the Ice Harbor Dam count exceeds 32,000 fish. This is not necessarily true, however, for summer chinook. The summers are later in their timing than spring chinook coming over Bonneville Dam after June 1. Since they are later, they are subjected to more dangers than the spring such as nitrogen poisoning in the last few years and also warmer water temperatures. We have also found that the reproductive rate for summers is less. They are just re-producing at a one-for-one rate. This means that unless this rate is improved, we cannot have a sport or commercial harvest without reducing the run size. This is the reason we have set our seasons in the past few years to catch only a minimal number of summer chinook and there was no extension on summer chinook this summer.

This nitrogen poisoning is caused by a supersaturation of nitrogen in the water that causes blisters on the backs, head, fins and inside the mouths of the fish. It can also cause hemorrhaging of the eyes and protrusion of the eyes.

The nitrogen supersaturation develops when the lower river dams are spilling large volumes of water over the spillway. As the water falls over the dam

spillway, it absorbs nitrogen from the air and is able to retain it when it descends into the deep pools below the dams. The upper layers of water having less pressure upon them, expel the nitrogen back to the air, but since the deeper water are subjected to heavier pressures, these waters retain nitrogen concentrations that will sometimes exceed 120 percent of saturation. These high concentrations are the ones that kill fish.

Prior to 1969, nitrogen poisoning was less of a problem. During 1969 and '70 the late, high run off caused excessive spilling at the dams which resulted in significant nitrogen problems. In normal run-off years, we don't expect to experience these same problems with nitrogen.

The construction of new dams is posing a greater problem each year since these new dams are spilling more water over the spillway than through the turbines. This situation aggravates the nitrogen poisoning problem and it could be improved by putting all turbines into operation at the time of dam construction. There are also some disadvantages to this though.

At the salmon checking stations of the upper Salmon River drainage, Fish and Game Department personnel interviewed a total of 3,477 salmon anglers that fished 38,837 hours to catch 1,150 salmon. These check stations were operated from June 16 through July 26 for five days per week from 12:00 noon to 8:00 p. m. These figures do not represent the total harvest of chinook from the drainage, but should be considered as trend information at this time. Additional work will be done to determine what percentage of the salmon harvest these figures represent.

The salmon anglers were spending 86 to 91 hours to catch a fish during the weeks of June 16 and 22, when high water was a problem. Fishing improved in successive weeks so that anglers were spending 68, 51, 18 and 25 hours to catch a salmon. The best fishing occurred on July 13-19 when it took an average of 18.5 hours to catch a salmon.

It was interesting to note that more trout anglers came through the check stations than salmon anglers. During the season, a total of 5,332 trout anglers were interviewed that were not fishing for salmon.

They caught 24,665 trout at a rate of about 1 fish per hour.

The heaviest fishing period for salmon anglers was mid-July and for trout anglers was early June. Most of the local people are interested in salmon fishing during June and July, but we found that 61 percent of all the fishermen are

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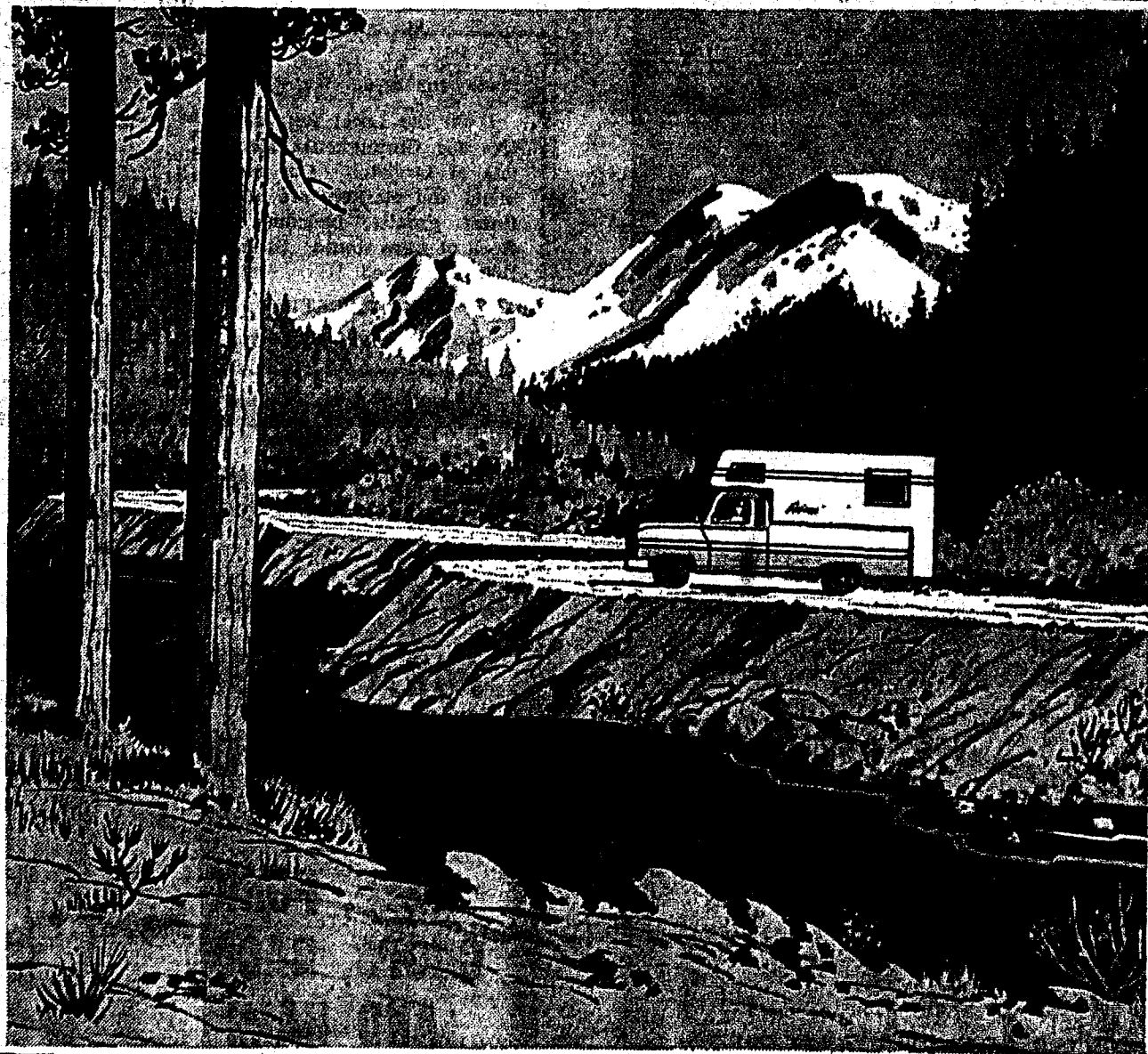

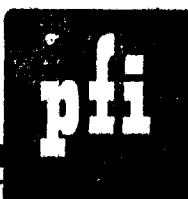
