

# Candler, Parks, Holt, Hutcheson Named KHS Players of Week; Troy Tops Tigers

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Don Parks and Steve Holt were selected as defensive backs of the week as they combined to bolster the injury-riddled Tiger line with good line-backing work and pass defense. David Hutcheson was named offensive lineman by Tiger fans.

Kendrick took the opening kick-off of the game and moved down the field on a sustained 55-yard drive that brought them to the Troy 10 yard line, with Parks hitting Trout for a 15 yard pass gain and Kimbley

running well inside and out. Kimbley scored from 8 yards out to put Kendrick ahead 6-0. Park's pass attempt for the extra point failed.

Troy came charging back to even the score as Dan Nelson broke over center at the Troy 38-yard line and went 82 yards for a touchdown. The Trojans ran the extra point over and they had an 8-6 lead.

A pass interception on the Kendrick 30 was run back to the 2-yard line and Troy's Nelson cracked it over from there. The PAT failed but Troy led 14-6 at the end of the first quarter.

Alan Kimbley, who was playing his usual fine game, suffered a severely bruised side on the first play of the second quarter and that injury greatly hindered the Tiger attack, as Coach Wayne Dust moved Boyd Candler into the backfield. Candler took some time getting use to his new position and then proceeded to run with the ball as if he had been playing offensive back all season. Kimbley was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital where he remained overnight. He will not play in this week's game but should be able to return for the remainder of the season.

Troy's Roy Osborn went 90 yards on a punt return in the second quarter only to see the play called back because of a penalty. Troy then marched 70 yards down field to score and convert the extra point for a 22-6 halftime lead.

At the halftime, Miss Lisa Lyons was crowned Homecoming Queen of 1970, and members of the drill team and the band entertained with some precision routines.

Troy was still driving hard in the third period as they moved down the field and scored from 2 yards out to make the score 28-6. Terry Johnson scored again in the fourth quarter to give the Trojans their 34 points.

Mid-way in the final quarter the Tigers started to come to life. Kendrick recovered a fumbled punt attempt on the Troy 20. Candler, running hard, moved the ball to the ten only to have Troy stop the drive with a pass interception.

Troy deep in their own territory, tried to pass their way out of trouble but Dan Nelson's long bomb was intercepted by Kim Trout on the Troy 44-yard line. Kim picked up two key blocks and scooted 44 yards for the six-pointer. The PAT failed and it was 34-12.

With Boyd Candler leading the charge, Kendrick moved the ball down field as the game neared the end. Hutcheson brought the ball to the 24-yard line and a face-mask grabbing penalty moved the Tigers to the 9; Candler boomed to the 5 and on the next play to the 1. Parks slipped over for the touchdown and Hutcheson converted the extra point for the final 34-20 score.


## Steigers - Ahles Vows Exchanged

## Salmon Anglers Questioned To Learn Size of Fish Caught

A random sample of some 4,000 anglers who bought Idaho salmon fishing permits this year are urged to respond to inquiries from the Fish and Game Department requesting catch information for the 1970 season.

In past seasons, this means of gathering salmon catch data was delayed until early in January because the salmon-steelhead questionnaire was combined on one card and steelhead catches had to be recorded on it through December 31. Separate letters will be mailed to a

sampling of steelhead anglers in January 1971, according to Jim Keating, fishery research supervisor, Idaho Fish and Game Department.

He added that about 9,000 chinook salmon fishing permits were sold in Idaho during 1970, and it is important to get information from a large percentage, whether they have been contacted by letter or not. Anglers are asked to return their 1970 salmon permits or fill out and return the duplicate permit that is printed on the reverse side of the letters by September 25.

In addition to catch information recorded on salmon permit cards, anglers are requested to state how many days they fished for this species in Idaho (even if they did not catch any salmon), and how many jack salmon (under 20 inches) they caught in Idaho in 1970; fish not recorded on salmon permits because they legally are classified as trout. Fishermen also are urged to record which section of the Salmon, Snake or Clearwater rivers or tributaries their chinook salmon were landed, at least the general area. For example, lower Salmon River, Little Salmon River, Middle Fork (Big Creek, Camas Creek, Loon Creek, Marsh Creek, Bear Valley Creek, North Fork, Lemhi, Pahsimeroi, East Fork, Valley Creek). Small sketch maps enclosed with the Fish and Game letters divide rivers and tributaries into sections, assigning numbers to each section.

During the 1969 Idaho salmon fishing season, anglers harvested approximately 13,000 fish, according to data based on questionnaires. Major catch areas were in the upper Salmon River above the East Fork; Middle Fork of the Salmon River; and Little Salmon River (mostly Rapid River supplemental hatchery production released as smolts).



## Countryside Cleanup Days In Progress

A call for Idahoans to participate was sounded by Governor Don Samuelson as he signed a proclamation supporting the Johnny Horizon Countryside Cleanup Days that will take place from September 18 to Oct. 19. Johnny Horizon is a mythical outdoorsman symbolizing the user of the public land. The Johnny Horizon nationwide anti-litter program is being coordinated by the Bureau of Land Management for the Department of the Interior.

Governor Samuelson joins Department of the Interior Secretary Walter J. Hickel, entertainer Burl Ives, and Governors of other States in launching the cleanup campaign that will involve thousands of citizens. The Governor noted that KEEP AMERICA BEAUTIFUL INC. estimates litter cleanup costs in America amounted to \$500 million last year. He urged all Idaho citizens to do their share in cleaning up areas where they live, work and play.

Bureau of Land Management State Director Bill Mathews, who witnessed the signing of the proclamation, stated that the main thrust of the Johnny Horizon cleanup program is through cooperation of outdoor organizations and individuals who make the campaign a success by their organized and individual ef-

orts to help clean up litter during outdoor activity. Interested groups and individuals who would like to participate can contact the Bureau of Land Management State Office or nearest District Office for further details, Mathews said. These offices are located in Boise, Burley, Idaho Falls, Salmon, Shoshone and Coeur d'Alene, and personnel in those of-

ices will assist in coordinating activities in their respective districts. The Department of Law Enforcement suggests motorists check their vehicle inspection stickers and driver licenses for expiration dates. Inspection stickers expire every 12 months and licenses become invalid on birthdates every three years.

### EASY CHICKEN AND RICE

1/2 to 1 cup rice  
1 can onion soup (optional)  
1 cup or soup can water  
1 fryer, cut in pieces  
salt and pepper to taste.  
1 can cream of celery or chicken soup  
Sprinkle rice over bottom of baking pan. Pour onion soup over rice. Add water. Wash and dry chicken. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place over rice. Spread cream of celery or chicken soup over chicken. Bake uncovered at 325 to 350 degrees for 1 hour or 1 hour and 30 minutes. Add water as necessary to keep moist.

### CHICKEN AND BISCUITS

1 2 1/2 to 3 lb. fryer, cut up  
1/2 cup flour  
2 teaspoons salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper,  
1 teaspoon paprika  
1/4 cup butter or margarine  
1 10 1/2 oz. can cream of chicken or mushroom soup  
1/2 cup milk  
1/2 teaspoon dill seed (optional)  
1/2 cup sliced olives  
1 can biscuits  
Roll chicken in mixture of flour, salt, pepper and paprika  
Melt butter in 13x9-inch pan. Add chicken, skin side down.  
Bake at 400 degrees for 40 minutes, turning chicken. Combine soup, milk, dill seed and sliced olives. Pour over chicken.  
Place biscuits on top. Bake for 10-12 min. or until biscuits are golden brown. Serve hot. Six servings.

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**Rewards Offered For Elk Parts**

The Idaho Fish and Game Department will again be paying a \$1 reward for the lower jaw from bull elk and \$5 for the jaw plus accompanying reproductive organs from cow elk. These are only for elk taken from Game Units 10, 12, 16, 16A, and 17. Information on how to collect these jaws and reproductive organs are available at the Fish and Game Office in Lewiston or at checking stations at Koostika, Welpe and Lolo Pass. The collection and rewards will only be processed at the checking stations, not in the Lewiston Office.

There is also a reward of \$5 for radio transmitters attached to collars on some of the elk in these units. These can be turned in at either the Fish and Game Office or checking stations.

This reward system is part of a study to determine the movements of elk, their reproductive success and age structure of the herd. The information obtained will also help to determine the success of the prescribed burning program in the Clearwater drainage to improve elk winter range.

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## GHS School Notes

### HOT LUNCH PROGRAM

GENESEE—The Genesee School District, as a part of its regular lunch program, provides lunches at a reduced price or free for students who are unable to pay the full price. The following income scale is used to determine which children are eligible to receive reduced prices or free lunches:

Family Size	Family Income
One	\$1,920
Two	\$2,520
Three	\$3,120
Four	\$3,720
Five	\$4,320
Six	\$4,920
Seven	\$5,520
Eight	\$6,120
Each additional family member	\$ 450

Income, as the term is used in this Notice, is similar to that defined in the Bureau of Census reports, dated December, 1968.

"Income" means income before deductions for income taxes, employee's social security taxes, insurance premiums, bonds, etc. It includes the following:

1. monetary compensation for services, including wages, salary, commissions, or fees;
2. net income from nonfarm self employment;
3. net income from farm self employment;
4. social security;
5. dividends or interest on savings or bonds; income from estates or trusts or net rental income;
6. public assistance or welfare payments;
7. unemployment compensation;
8. Government civilian employee or military retirement, or pensions, or veterans' payments;
9. private pensions or annuities;
10. alimony or child support payments;
11. regular contributions from persons not living in the household;
12. net royalties, and
13. other cash income.

In applying these guidelines, school food authorities may consider both the income of the family during the past 12 months and family's current rate of income to determine which is the better indicator of the need for free and reduced price lunches.

Unusual circumstances such as illness or death in the family, temporary disability and seasonal unemployment are also taken into account when determining eligibility.

The schools will make every effort to insure that the children do not know who is paying and who is receiving a free lunch.

Parents who feel that their children are eligible should apply. Applications forms are available in the school office of each participating school. Genesee Schools will participate in this program.

The district's complete policy concerning reduced price and free lunches may be reviewed in Supt. Lester Diehl's office located at Genesee, Idaho.

### Sixteen Given Job Finding Help In Latah County

Another decline was noted in the number of persons being placed on jobs through the Moscow Office of the Idaho Department of Employment. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager said that his office found jobs for 16 local residents. During the previous week 26 workers were placed on jobs, and during the same week a year ago the same number were given job finding help. The number of new jobs received remained about the same, with 23 new jobs being listed compared with 25 last week and 30 last year. At the end of the week there were 48 jobs still open. Needed in the Moscow area were a truck driver, carpenters, grocery clerks, and checkers, a TV repairman, an appliance repairman, cooks, waitresses and domestic workers, as well as a variety of other workers.

Twenty-four idled workers filed new claims for jobless insurance during the week according to Hartstein's report. He said that most of them were workers from the area's logging industry who were temporarily laid off. Nearly all expect to return to work within a week or two. The total number of workers now seeking unemployment benefits rose from 76 to a new total of 93. A year ago there were 67 persons seeking benefits in the county.

A leaflet containing the State Department of Health's recommendations and precautions is being prepared for distribution to upland game bird hunters through license vendors. The extensive statewide mercury testing program recently concluded on pheasants, the "highest priority category", found that "there is some cause for concern, but no cause for alarm regarding potential health hazards from eating game birds killed in Idaho."

Following are the six recommendations made by the State Department of Public Health to upland game bird hunters:

- (1) That persons not eat more than one meal per week of pheasant.
- (2) That pregnant women should avoid food with a known or suspected mercury content. (There is sufficient evidence which demonstrates the brain of the unborn child may be more susceptible to mercury than that of an adult.)
- (3) That the back and all giblets of the pheasant be discarded. (Giblets indicate the liver, kidney and other internal organs contain higher concentrations of mercury than the flesh.)
- (4) That farmers and handlers be encouraged to clean up any treated grain which might be spilled. Spillage can occur from sack breakage, bin leakage, or row-end spillage during the planting process. These spillages may make mercury-treated grain more readily available in larger doses to pheasants and other game birds.
- (5) That farmers be encouraged to continue a present trend away from the use of ethyl and methyl mercury, sometimes known as hard mercury, and toward phenyl mercury until further studies on all types of mercury can be made.
- (6) That additional studies be undertaken through the hunting season to determine possible seasonal trends in the mercury content of Idaho's game birds.

### Safety of School Children

"Motorists, remember that the safety of thousands of youngsters depends on you as this school year begins," said John Huneke, president of the Inland Automobile Association, as he highlighted the School's Open public information campaign of the local AAA club.

Mr. Huneke said that about 11,000 children each year are involved in traffic accidents as they travel to and from school. "Primary grade children are especially vulnerable," added the auto club official, "because they may be unfamiliar with safe pedestrian practices. Consequently, children ages 5-8 are involved in two out of every three school-age pedestrian accidents."

In reminding motorists that a child and a 3,000 pound car do not make an even match, Huneke asked all drivers to give schoolchildren an extra margin of safety by yielding right-of-way to young pedestrians, slowing down in school zones, being extra alert for children in areas around schools during opening and closing times, and following all safety rules. He noted that it was especially important to show respect for the School Safety Patrols, who have done such a fine job over the years. AAA is currently celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of its national partnership with the school safety patrol.

As a special plea to drivers, Huneke urged them to be patient with young children, who are just forming their walking habits. "Better yet," he said, "take a protective attitude toward them for they are the future of our country."
