Julius E. Nordby, 83, Passes October 28

GENESEE—Mr. Julius E. Nordby was born in Soldier, Iowa on April 27, 1887. His family moved West in 1900, and they settled initially on a farm near Palouse, Washington. Two years later the family moved to Geneseo, Idaho, where they established the family farm. Mr. Nordby received both his grade school and high school education in Geneseo. He entered the University of Idaho in 1911, and graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree four years later. While an undergraduate at the University, Mr. Nordby was a member of the livestock judging team, the debate team, and the varsity track team. He also served as editor of the Argonaut, the student newspaper. He was a member of Alpha Zeta, the honorary agricultural society, Delta Sigma Rho, the honorary speech society, and Sigma Xi, the honorary scientific society. After graduating from the University of Idaho, Mr. Nordby attended St. Olaf College, and the University of Illinois from which he received the Master of Science degree in 1916. He joined the faculty at the University of Idaho for the autumn term that same year. He enlisted in the United States Army and took a leave of absence from the University to serve as a Lieutenant in the Aviation Section of the Army.

During his twenty-two years on the faculty at the University of Idaho, Mr. Nordby co-authored the six "Rainbow Series" of books on the selecting, fitting, and showing of beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, horses, and poultry. He also co-authored the Livestock Judging Handbook, which first appeared in 1937. These works have become standard textbooks in many colleges and universities throughout the world. In addition to these books, Mr. Nordby has written over forty specialized articles which have appeared in genetics and other professional journals as well as in more popular magazines of wider distribution.

In 1938 Mr. Nordby was appointed Director of the United States Sheep Experiment Station and Western Sheep Breeding Laboratory in Dubois, Idaho. He served as Director until his retirement in 1957. He took a leave of absence from this position in 1953 to accept a two-year appointment in Cairo, Egypt, as Chief of Livestock Improvement, Foreign Agricultural Service, Department of State.

Mr. Nordby's many and significant contributions to the livestock industry are summed up in a citation which he received in 1951 from Charles T. Branson, Secretary of Agriculture:

"For his leadership in developing and applying scientific principles of sheep breeding and genetics that have contributed directly to improvement of sheep and wool production in the eleven far western states and Texas."

In 1922 he married Martha Barstead, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Barstad of Spokane, Washington. They have two sons, Edward is a professor at the State University of New York at Oswego and Gordon is a physicist at the University of Michigan. An Ann Arbor, Mich. funeral service for Mr. Nordby was held Saturday morning at the Emmanuel Lutheran Church, Moscow, with the Rev. Martin Larsen officiating.

Organist was Mrs. Ruby Ames, and soloist was Mrs. Martin Larsen.

Pallbearers were Kenneth Platt, A. E. Koster, Moscow; Theodore Anderson, Spokane; H. A. Bendixson, Pullman, and Oscar Danielson and John Luedke, Geneseo. Burial was at the Geneseo Valley cemetery with Shorts Chapel, Moscow, in charge of arrangements.

GHS Bulldogs Defeat Kendrick 34-0 In Seasons Final Game

Geneseo and Kendrick High School closed the door on the 1970 football season last Friday night as the Bulldogs scored 20 points in the final quarter to defeat the Tigers 34-0 on the KHS field. Geneseo finished the year with a 6-2 record. Kendrick tied the season with 4-4.

Geneseo went for the long bomb on their first play with Scharnhorst attempting a pass to Hopkins. The pass failed but several plays later, Kendrick was called on a pass interference play that gave Geneseo the ball deep in Kendrick territory. Ray Morscheck scored from eight yards out and Craig Busch, who was to go on and convert 4 Geneseo touchdowns booted a perfect kick for the extra point and Geneseo led 7-0 at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Kendrick's line stiffened and the two teams battled on fairly even terms until midway when Geneseo drove into scoring range with a pass from Scharnhorst to Green putting the ball on the Kendrick 25. Morscheck battled down to the 20, Scharnhorst to the 10 and Dan Tyler to the 7. A penalty against the Tigers put the ball on the 3-yard line and Scharnhorst pushed down to the 1. The Tigers held solid and Geneseo was forced to give up the ball on downs. Kendrick, running for some breathing room, tried to go up the middle but fumbled the ball and Scharnhorst fell on the free ball and Geneseo had another six points. Busch again split the uprights for the conversion and Geneseo led 14-0 at the half.

The two teams battled to a 0-0 tie in the third quarter although one GHS touchdown, by Tyler, was called back after a 22 yard run because of a penalty. Geneseo drove down into Tiger territory again but the Tiger line held firm.

Kendrick's offense and defense, already hurt by Don Parks' badly bruised foot, although Parks gamely played much of the contest, suffered another setback when the officials insisted Alan Kimbley watch the game from the bench for saying out loud what would have been better thought in private.

Rich Green made it 20-0 after an eleven yard run and Busch added the extra point. Dick Green scored from 20 yards out and Busch again made the extra point try.

Ron Moser closed out the scoring with a five yard run and Geneseo had their 34-0 win.

Idaho Elects Andrus; Brocke Returns To House



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
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Health Matters

When a dog bites it should be penned and put under observation to be sure it doesn't have rabies. It is never wise to kill the dog, since rabies might not be ruled out and the victim might then have to take anti-rabies treatment unnecessarily.

Veterinarians point out that dogs with rabies DO NOT foam at the mouth. . . rather there is a sort of drooling with loss of coordination and increasing paralysis. If the dog dies, it is important that the brain be examined to determine whether rabies was the cause of death.

Any warm-blooded animal can have rabies. Idaho is very fortunate at this time because there is little rabies in our wild or domestic animal population, but there are many bats with rabies in Idaho. The virus must enter the body through a break in the skin, so bites or scratches from infected animals are the usual source of rabies. Any animal bite or scratch should be thoroughly cleaned with soap and water, and an antiseptic used.

The Idaho Department of Health recommends that bites which leave even a small wound be referred to a physician WHEN THE ATTACK WAS UNPROVOKED. When a domestic or wild animal has not been disturbed and attacks, there is real cause for concern about rabies. Dogs should be vaccinated against

rabies with a booster every three years. If an animal bites someone without cause, the victim should see a doctor and a veterinarian should also be called. If the animal is not caught and penned, local health department or local law enforcement personnel can aid in finding the animal and keeping it under observation. Be very careful about handling any dead animal. Bats are particularly dangerous.

The Idaho Department of Health particularly warns against keeping skunks as pets, particularly those ordered from pet shops. Most of these pet skunks come from areas where rabies is common in wild skunks. . . and vaccination won't help, because baby skunks would have the disease, without symptoms, right after birth. . . and might not develop the symptoms for several months. At present, however, Idahoans need not be unduly alarmed about rabies in the wild animal population.

Stay away from bats. NEVER keep pet skunks, and keep your dog vaccinated against rabies. . . are the three main precautions against rabies. If an animal bite is unprovoked, wash it out, see a doctor, call a veterinarian, and keep the animal under observation.

Anglers 80 per cent Residents

Resident chinook salmon anglers outnumbered out-of-state fishermen about 4-1 this year, according to figures from a random survey of 4,000, of some 10,600 salmon permit holders.

Anglers from other states numbered 8 percent from Utah, 4 per cent each from California and Montana, and 4 percent from other states. Salmon permit holders for the 1970 season, which is now over, are urged to send in their permits so that they can be analyzed as part of a new survey now underway.

Duck Regs Changed

A change this year in duck regulations provides that hunters now may possess or transport only one day's bag limit of ducks between shooting area and either the hunter's automobile or other principal means of transportation; his home or temporary lodging; commercial food locker or game processor; post office or common carrier. However,

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
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Midway Point in Season Equals 1969 Kill Cards

Midway in the season for harvesting big game animals throughout the state, hunter report cards received at Boise headquarters of Idaho Fish and Game Department indicate that elk and deer kills reported by October 27 were about the same as last year on the same date and that hunters had shot more trophy animals than last year.

Report kill figures on the cards show 1,749 elk, 1,762 in 1969; 5,647 deer, 5,613 last year; 35 moose, 29 in 1969; 42 big-horn sheep, 28 last year; 69 mountain goat, 59 last year, and 886 antelope, 738 in 1969.

Errol Nielson, big game supervisor stressed that these are big game kill cards that were returned voluntarily to the department by cooperation hunters. These figures from them do not represent total statewide kills.

He added that elk and deer harvesting throughout Idaho has reached the halfway point. For deer, this point has come in other years as early as October 24 and as late as November 2nd. Bucks are now starting the rut or mating season and are more vulnerable. Heavy snow in the upper reaches of many drainages is bunching the animals and starting the migration movement to winter ranges at lower altitudes.

For elk the halfway mark in harvesting has come in other years as early as October 8 and as late as October 21. In 1969, a good elk year, half the season's reported kills were made by October 17 and half later. Mid-point for the 5-year period, 1965-1969, averaged October 17 for elk and October 28 for deer.
