Voters of Idaho went to the polls Tuesday, November 3 and elected the first Democratic party governor in 24 years, as Cecil Andrus defeated incumbent Don Samuelson.

Incumbent Republican Representative James McClure turned back the bid of Bill Brauner for the 1st District House seat.
