Mrs. Caroline K. Ehlen, wife of retired Pastor Otto G. Ehlen, died of a stroke about noon Thursday, November 26. She had been a patient at Tri-State Memorial Hospital in Clarkston for five weeks.

Born February 2, 1908, on the Fix Ridge farm to Dave Deobald and wife, Kuni (Hedler) Denner, she was baptized and confirmed by Pastor George Finke of Zion Lutheran Church, Juliaetta.

On April 14, 1929, she was united in marriage with Pastor Otto G. Ehlen in the parsonage of Trinity Lutheran Church in Lewiston. Pastor Edward A. Rein was the officiant.

For about 20 years she served with her husband in Idaho and Washington Lutheran congregations, and almost that long in Minnesota and Ohio. Her interest and hopes were over related to the church and its work.

Memorial services were held Monday, November 30, at Trinity Lutheran Church, Lewiston, with Pastors Nels Carlson and Theo. Meske officiating. Burial was at Fix Ridge Cemetery near the place of her birth.

Four Kendrick Business Firms Hit During Weekend Robbery, Vandalism

Four Kendrick business firms were struck by burglars over the weekend. The thieves broke into the Fleming Truck & Equipment Co., Hedler's Mobil Oil Bulk Plant, Brocke & Sons Seed Co. office, and Fey Bros. Repair sometime Saturday night or early Sunday morning, and left a trail of vandalism in their wake.

Fey Bros. Repair, located at the old Mill site in West Kendrick, suffered the most damage, as the burglars gained entrance by prying open a rear window. A small front office was ransacked, apparently in search of money, and papers and records were scattered about. Not finding

money, the thieves went back into the work area and slashed the upholstery on a pickup truck which was being repaired. They also took a cold chisel or some other sharp instrument and chipped the cylinder walls of a V-8 motor. One of the firm's owners, Roy Fey, said there were also some tools missing as well as a set of jumper cables and a battery, but the tool loss was not too great.

Outside the building, the burglars drained a 275-gallon oil storage tank of its diesel, loaded the tank on a truck belonging to Brocke & Sons Fertilizer plant and drove off. The truck was found abandoned but undamaged near Juliaetta the following morning, but the tank is still missing.

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WILDLIFE VIEWPOINT

It's nearing the end of the hunting season, and there have been several "letters to the editor" in local papers that concern the problem with non-resident hunters. Most of these hunters feel a quota system or a tremendous increase in fees should be instituted to limit the number of non-residents. They also feel our game herds are being overharvested by the large number of both resident and non-resident hunters in the field. There were 14,325 non-resident combination licenses (which would be the elk hunters primarily) sold in 1969, plus about 4,000 deer only non-resident hunters, asking a total of 18,325 non-residents. This compares with about 144,000 resident deer and elk hunters in 1969.

This brings us to the main point in this question. We as professional people concerned with proper management of our wildlife resources must consider their welfare first. If the Fish and Game Department felt the additional hunting pressure contributed by the non-resident was reducing our deer or elk herds to a low level, we would restrict the number of hunters. Most of us are definitely not in this business for the money not at State wages anyway. So we aren't interested in selling more licenses if it means jeopardizing the game. The non-resident more than pays his way with about 60 percent of the Fish and Game's total funds coming from them even though they make up only 12 percent of the big game hunters.

Tag returns from hunters of several hundred elk tagged in the Little North Fork of the Clearwater, main North Fork of the Clearwater near Larson's Bar, and the Selway and Lochsa Rivers show only about a 7 percent harvest of our herds in those areas. Even if this figure were 100 percent off, and we were taking 14 percent, this is still below an allowable harvest of 20-25 percent which is the normal annual production of an elk herd. This is even higher for deer with an annual increase of 30-40 percent being common.

If our information shows the non-residents are not hurting our deer and elk herds, what are the sportsmen primarily concerned about? There are several factors which have affected all of us hunters the past few years which make competition tougher for our sport, and I include myself because I really enjoy it. The tremendous increase in roads has brought people, including non-resi-

dents, into many of our favorite hunting spots. This really rankles when a Washingtonian or Californian is parked in our special territory. Another factor is that people appear to be less prone in our special territory. Another factor is that people appear to be less prone to really work for their animals as they used to in the past. Many of the hunters spend less time and road more than previously. Certainly the animals are becoming more wary and have even changed their habits, partly because of the additional disturbances by more people. I've had a number of old-time elk hunters tell me they just don't see elk out during the day like they used to. Many of our deer and elk feed much more at night than previously. Certainly the increase in height of the brush and the regrowth has made hunting more difficult in the Clearwater region. I hunted in an area of the Lower Selway this fall after a ten-year absence and the same ridge I killed an elk from ten years ago was so covered with young conifers that I couldn't even see out! We are just going to have to work harder to get our game and strive toward preserving our remaining elk areas and managing them properly to increase the food the game needs. In this way, we will have more game to hunt and enjoy seeing in the field.

There are two other considerations if we go to a quota system for non-residents. There is the definite threat of a federal hunter's license, good nationwide, if we get too restrictive on our non-residents. The majority of voters are in the East and on the West Coast, and if they feel they are being shut out of their federal lands, they could vote in a federal license. If the hunters of Idaho think we have too many non-residents now, what numbers would come to game-rich Idaho if we had a federal license? The legal precedent that the game belongs to the landowner—in this case the Federal Government—could even lead to the European system of private ownership of game and our public hunting could go out the window.

SEEDLING TREES

The forestry nursery, University of Idaho, is taking orders now for spring delivery of seedling trees. Order blanks and assistance in planning farm tree plantings are available at your county extension office or the university's department of forestry.

Vernon Burlison, extension forester, said seedlings are available to anyone in Idaho who lives outside city limits. Seedlings may be used for forest windbreak or Christmas tree plantings. They may not be used for ornamental purposes.

The tiny trees are available in species suitable for every area of the state. The order blank lists species by area, so you know which ones to order.

The cost goes down as the number ordered goes up. Price for the minimum order of 100 is \$4; price for lots of 1,000 is \$21, except golden willow, hybrid poplar and blue spruce, which are 4 cents each regardless of the number ordered.

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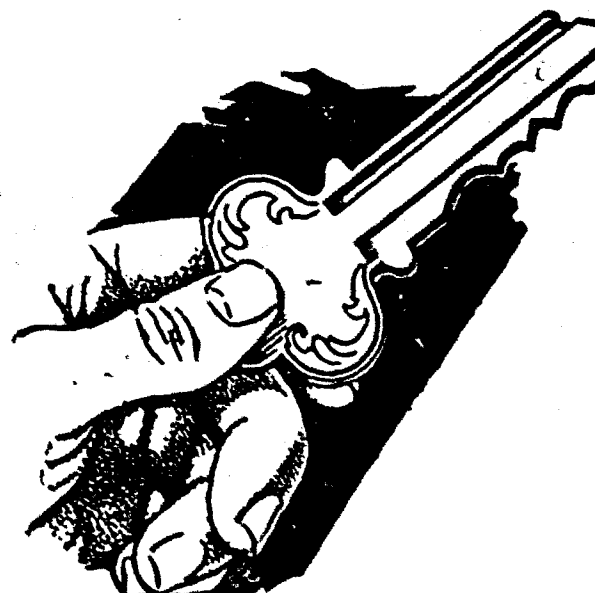

SAINTS PRESERVE US

St. Paul trudging the Roman roads found motels, or mansions as they were called, much the same as our modern-day motels. These were placed some 28 to 37 miles apart—the riding distance for a day. There were also relay stations every six to thirteen miles. By law, all Roman motels were located near public baths, although rich guests could have private baths. Veterinarians were at each station just as mechanics are at service stations today.

St. Augustine complained that some Roman motels served bad cheese. Others complained that innkeepers served asparagus and lettuce with herbs, instead of olive oil dressing. Wall inscriptions by disgruntled guests—better left untranslated—are still visible in some parts of Europe.

Traffic in the city of Rome was so bad that Julius Caesar decreed absolutely no parking in the city's garment-district.

Traffic kept to the left outside the city because the drivers wanted their "whip hand" free to attain more speed. While in the city, vehicles were required to remain on or in such a manner as to endanger a citizen's person or property were dealt with harshly—by flogging.

All this goes to prove that highway officials have their problems whatever their generation.

BOISE—Driver license suspensions

ordered during November by the Department of Law Enforcement totaled 669; the Driver Services reported.

Seven applicants were denied issuance of license and four had licenses revoked during the same period.

The suspensions included 309 for traffic law violations and 360 for failure to comply with the Safety Responsibility Act. Also, during November, 378 drivers who had been suspended under the safety act were reinstated.

Safety responsibility suspensions included 310 drivers and 50 from out of state. Of the total, 185 were suspended for failure to show proof following an accident, 132 for failure to maintain proof and 43 for failure to report accidents.

Driving while under the influence convictions led the list of violation suspensions with 165, the section stated.

Other suspensions were ordered for the following reasons: Reckless driving, 35; driving on suspended licenses, 16; refusal to take blood-alcohol tests, eight; accumulation of traffic violation conviction points, 28; failure to appear for driver improvement hearings, seven; drag racing, 20; altered licenses, two; violation of license restrictions, 20; inattentive driving, three, and habitual violator, five.

FIESTA CASSEROLE

12 slices of bread, diced or quartered
Place 1/2 bread in bottom of casserole.
3 cans tuna or chicken
1 onion
1 grated pepper
1/2 cup celery, chopped
1 cup mayonnaise
Mix meat, vegetable and mayonnaise
Place over bread in casserole and add remaining bread. Mix 4 eggs with 3 cups milk. Pour over top.
It can be refrigerated overnight or for a few hours. Bakes in oven 325d. for 15 minutes, then add 1 can cream of mushroom soup, 1 can cream of chicken soup, 1 cup cheese, grated.
Sprinkle with paprika and bake one hours. Serves 15 to 18 people.

IDEAL CHRISTMAS SALAD

First layer: use 1 or 2 packages of cherry jello, with water. When beginning to set pour in bottom of pan.
FILLING:
1 cup hot water

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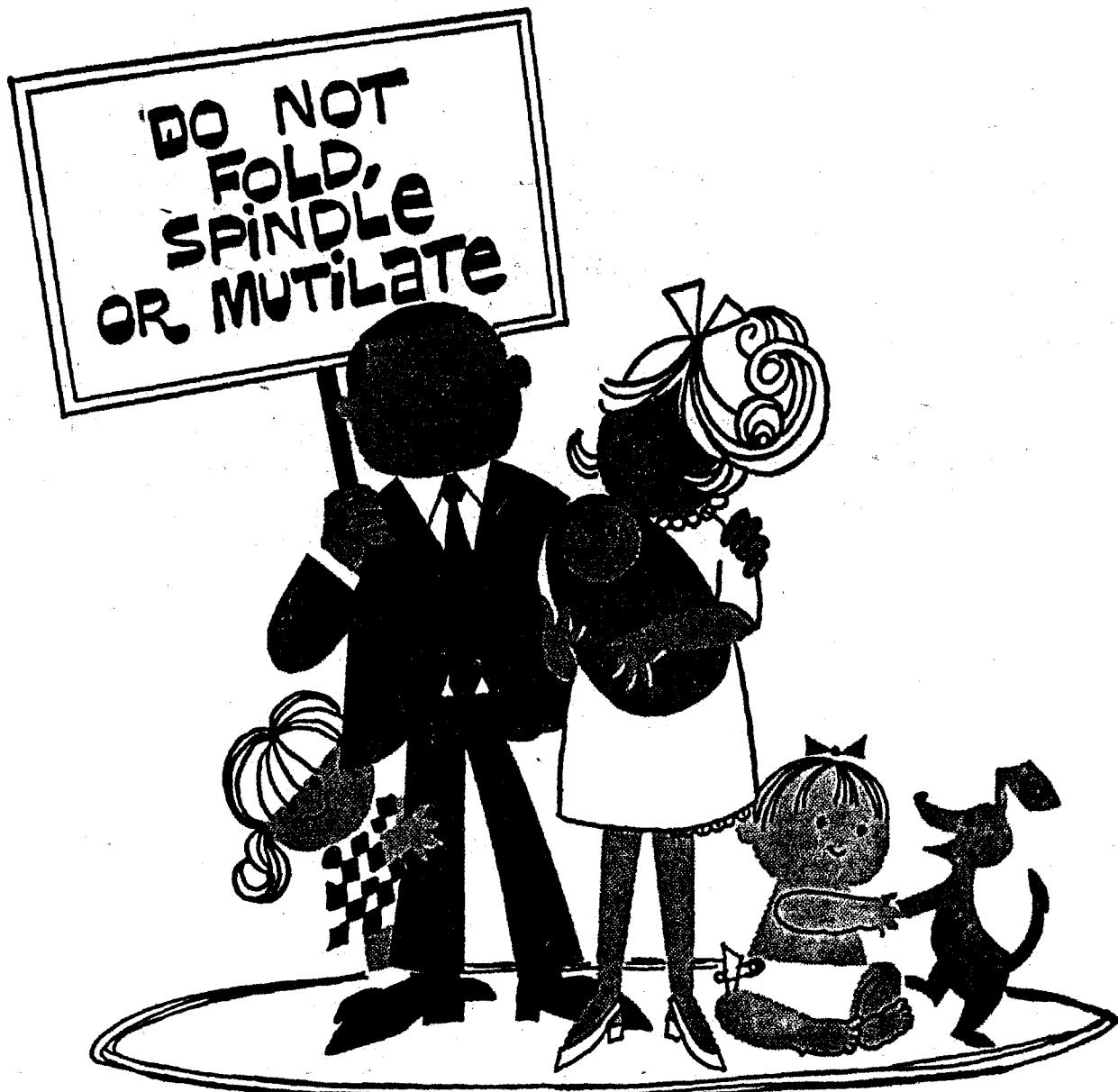

IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

Adverse weather conditions continue to cause increased unemployment in Latah County. Frank J. Hartstein, Manager of the Moscow Office of the Idaho Department of Employment reported that his office accepted 32 new claims for unemployment insurance during the week. He said that the total of persons currently seeking jobs pay now stands at 291. A week ago the total was 283, and a year ago there were only 103 idled workers in the county seeking such benefits. Most of those persons now receiving checks are area woods workers; and many others are construction workers and most of the balance are new comers into the area seeking work here for the first time. In the Moscow area there are now 103 persons receiving benefits compared with 84 last week and 42 a year ago. In the Troy-Deary-Bovill area the totals are now 107, last week 97, and last year 32. At Potlatch there are now 53 claimants, 56 last week and only 20 last year. Other parts of the county and Elk River make up the difference.

10 new jobs were listed with the employment office during the week. Hartstein said, and at the end of the week 15 jobs were still open. Five workers were given job finding help during the week. Jobs still open are for a licensed practical nurse, a cook, waitresses, general office clerks, a TV repairman, and a baby sitter.

PHEASANT SEASON ENDS EXCEPT FOR SOUTHWEST

Pheasant hunting ends this weekend (December 6) in the 16 counties of the Western and Magic Valley regions, the longest season in the state, the Idaho Fish and Game Department reminded sportsmen today.

Daily bag limit is 4 pheasants one of which may be a hen, with a possession limit of eight pheasants, two of which may be hens. Pheasant hunting seasons are over in all parts of the state except the Western and Magic Valley regions.

Elmer Norberg, game bird supervisor, says that all indications are that southern Idaho ranges had excellent ringneck pheasant populations this year, but that the department won't know what the harvest has been in relations to other years until hunter questionnaires have been returned early next year and the data analyzed.

He added that a random sampling of license buyers will be sent hunter questionnaires in January. Soon the recycling of the entire pheasant management program begins again, starting with the sex ratio counts almost as soon as there is a snow cover to facilitate the work.
