### WATCH FOR TETANUS

Boise — The threat of tetanus should never be ignored, says the Idaho Medical Association. There's good reason why every child should receive immunization against tetanus. Of the five hundred cases of tetanus in this country each year, half are fatal.

Tetanus — sometimes called lock-jaw — is caused by organisms normally present in the gastrointestinal tract of cattle, horses and men.

The germs are transmitted to the soil, and may enter the body through a wound, particularly a deep wound that closes and forms an airless area. They then produce poisons which travel to the brain. Then comes the painful contractions of the jaw and neck, and later the rest of the body.

Children can be protected against tetanus by immunizations. These are usually given at the same time diphtheria, toxoid and whooping cough vaccines are administered. See a physician for immediate treatment following an injury where tetanus might develop.

### Bulldogs Defeat Old-Timers Team

Genesee — The 1970 version of the Genesee High Bulldogs broke loose for an 18-point third quarter barrage and then went on to squeak out a narrow 54-53 victory over two former GHS squads in a benefit basketball game Saturday night. The current Bulldogs were matched against the 1964 State Championship team and the 1969 team that had been runners up in the state tournament.

The former state championship team of Russ Zenner, Jerry Linehan, Wade Hillman, Larry Vestal and Skip Ivie opened against the 1970 Bulldogs. The young Bulldogs got the first points of the game, but the 1964 team came back to control the backboard and the ball as they built a 13-9 first quarter lead.

The 1969 Bulldog team of Mark Busch, Fred Morschek, Nick Eglund, Tim Magee and Ron Zenner started and played the second quarter, and they swiftly increased the lead as the current GHS team was no match for Busch, Morschek and Eglund under the basket. Busch and Morschek, who are playing football at the University of Idaho, moved at will under the nets and grabbed rebounds by sheer physical strength. The "old timers" had a 34-19 advantage going for them at the half.

Coming out for the third period the Bulldogs started to press and used their greater speed and started to close the scoring gap as Ron Hopkins and Mike Eglund began to find the range from outside. The former Bulldogs still had a 39-37 lead going into the final quarter.

Bruce Scharnhorst tied the game at 39-all with a jump shot from the side and the contest was close throughout the final period. Ron Zenner put the young team ahead for the first time since the opening seconds of play and then, trailing by one, Mike Eglund dropped in two free throws that kept the Bulldogs unbeaten this year.

### Walter Moden Named Genesee New Councilman

Genesee — Walter L. Moden, Jr., agricultural research engineer at the University of Idaho, was appointed to the Genesee City Council by Mayor D. F. Scharnhorst, Monday night. Moden will replace Chester Green, who resigned his council position to become police chief of Genesee. Moden was appointed Commissioner of Parks and Recreation, and Health and Welfare, by Mayor Scharnhorst.

In other action Councilman Jack Magee moved that the building permit fees in Genesee be raised from their present one dollar minimum to \$1.00 minimum for the first \$1,000 of construction cost and \$1.00 for each additional \$1,000 per construction cost or portion thereof. The motion was seconded by Walt Moden and approved by the Council. This increase will become effective Jan. 4th.

The city budget for the coming year was presented by Councilman John Myers, Jr., and three ordinances were passed and will be published in next week's News.

The LID petitions pertaining to the proposed street paving were presented to Councilman Myers, who will have them at the January 28th Civic Club meeting. Also at this meeting will be W. E. Thompson and Bob Blair of Spokane, who will answer questions pertaining to the proposed street paving.

A speech of thanks was given by the smiling and grateful groom, with special thanks to the hostesses arranging the affair.

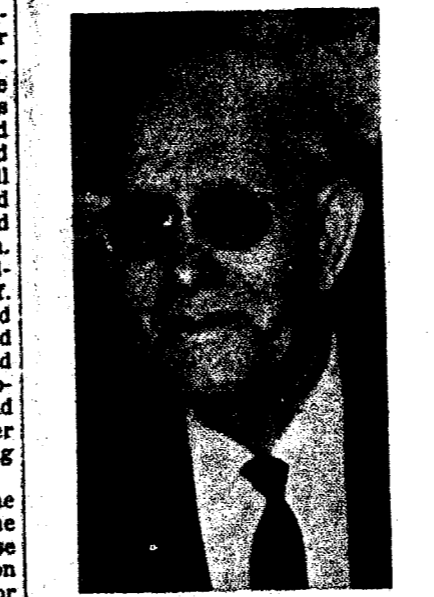

### Ira W. Havens, 88 Area Pioneer, Passes December 30

Ira William Havens, 88, long-time farmer and warehouseman, died at 7:00 Wednesday at Tri-State Memorial Hospital in Clarkston. Death was attributed to a heart attack. Though a resident of Moscow and Kendrick most of his life, he had lived at Juliaetta and later at 1430 Terrace Drive, Clarkston, since 1968.

Born Oct. 13, 1882, at Masonville, Iowa, Havens was a son of George and Emma Havens. He was married to Bessie Pogue, Jan. 6, 1904, and they came to Idaho in 1915. His wife died at Moscow the following year.



On Aug. 18, 1918, he was married to Elsie J. Keene at Moscow. She survives him at the Clarkston home. Havens moved to Kendrick where he farmed until 1933, when he began working for seed warehouses at both Kendrick and Moscow. He retired in 1952 and moved to Juliaetta, where they lived until moving to Clarkston in 1968.

He had been a member of the I. O. O. F. Lodge at Moscow for 46 years and of the Christian Church for 54 years.

In addition to his widow he is survived by a son, George E. Havens, Kendrick; a daughter, Mrs. Stanley (Marie) Mills, Ft. Lewis, Wash.; six grandchildren, six great-grandchildren, and a sister, Mrs. Daisy Anderson of Moscow.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at Short's Chapel in Moscow. Rev. J. Edward Farrelle, pastor of the Clarkston Christian Church officiated.

Organist was Mrs. M. C. Halliday, who accompanied a quartet: composed of Eugene Taylor, Roy H. Ramey, Mrs. Phil Johns and Mrs. George Eggers.

Palbearers were Rayner Havens, Charles Havens, both of Clarkston; Theodore Havens and Ira H. Havens, both of Lewiston, all grandsons; Jay Havens, Pasco, Wn., and Frank Abrams, Kendrick.

### December Was Dry 1970 Moisture Above Aver.

Genesee — December of 1970 was the driest December in the seventeen years John Luedke has been keeping records for the Soil Conservation Service, the Genesee man reported this week. During that 31-day period only 95 inches of moisture was recorded.

Taking the entire calendar year, January to December, however, 1970 will be remembered as a wet year. Seven inches more of rainfall was recorded in 1970 than the same previous year. Luedke said there was 25.20 inches of moisture recorded in 1970; the 1969 figure was 18.41, and the seventeen year average is 20.34 inches per year.

Big Bear Ridge — Chas. Bower, who maintains rainfall figures up on Big Bear Ridge, reported that his records indicate December, 1970, as the driest December since 1965. In 1970 there was just 1.86 inches of moisture. The 1965 record was a scant .33. Bower said his total rainfall figure for 1970 was 31.14 inches, well above the 24 inch average and that 1970 was the wettest year recorded by him.

### Cold And Icy

While there may not have been much moisture in December, what did come down stayed on the roads, walks and highways. Winter travel conditions have been exceptionally hazardous so far this winter. Last week there was a warming trend and rain fell during the early evening hours Wednesday and through much of the night. Thursday morning the mercury dropped again and the result was solid, glare ice facing travelers on many of the highways and county roads. Ice and snow continued to plague the area over the week-end and into this week. The temperatures reached their lowest level Monday night when, unofficially the mercury was at 4 above in Genesee, and 7 above in Kendrick.

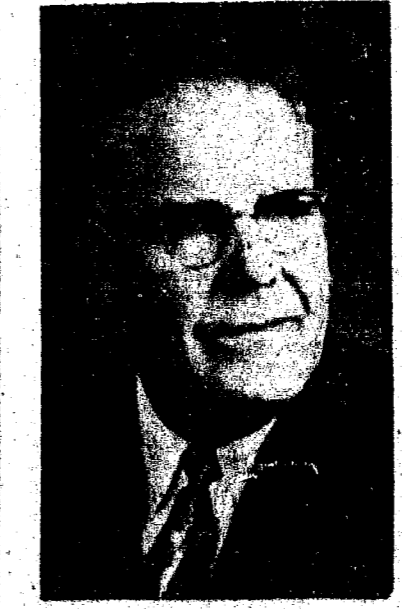

DR. ALMON J. WHITE, 70, FORMER GENESEE PHYSICIAN, DIES DECEMBER 29

Dr. Almon J. White, 70, a retired general practitioner and prominent physician in Lewiston from 1942 until his retirement because of ill health in 1967, died December 29 at St. Joseph's hospital.

Dr. White had been forced to retire from his practice in 1967 because of a stroke and had been in ill health since then.

He came to Lewiston from Genesee in 1942 and was one of the few physicians at Lewiston during World War II, when a majority of the doctors had been called to military service.

While practicing at Lewiston, Dr. White was a member of the medical-surgical group operating Lewiston Clinic. He was one of the original physicians moving from the Kettenbach Building at 5th and Main Streets in 1946 to the clinic building.

Dr. White was a native of Mankato, Minn., the son of Mr. and Mrs. Zeneas White. He moved as a child to Plummer with his parents.

After graduating from Plummer high school, he took his pre-medical training at the U. of Idaho, Moscow, graduating in 1928. He attended the U. of Oregon Medical School at Portland from 1927 to 1931 and interned at St. Vincent's Hospital, Portland. He served as resident physician at the hospital in 1932-33.

In 1932, he practiced at Alhambra, Ore., and in 1934-35 at Multnomah, Ore. He also served as a medical examiner for the Union Pacific Railroad in 1935. He opened his practice at Genesee in 1936.

He was a member of the Masonic lodge and of the Shrine.

Dr. White married the former Ethel Benson in 1933. He is also survived by a daughter, Mrs. D. Richard Wyatt, Lewiston, and two grandchildren.

## WHITEFISH OFFER FINE WINTER ANGLING SPORT

Whitefishing continues to be one of the leading winter fishing activities in many Idaho waters, notwithstanding the popularity of steelhead and peacock cisco, the Idaho Fish and Game Department said today.

It is a cold sport along streams, but such popular areas as the South Fork of the Payette River, South Fork of the Boise River and South Fork of the Snake River often attracts hundreds of fishermen on a good day. Whitefish tend to school in pool areas where they can be caught readily by the angler using the right techniques.

Popular baits are the white grub and rattail maggot. Some fishermen use the light brown nymphs of the stone fly (helgrammites) screened off the creek bottoms. Small pale salmon eggs or light-colored artificial flies are somewhat less effective.

In both stream and lake fishing, the rigging should carry weight enough to drift the hook near the bottom and a one to four pound test leader is usually preferred. Snelled hooks, size 12 to 16, are recommended. Probably the most popular way of preparing white fish, among those who take the trouble, is smoking. Properly handled, smoked whitefish is a real delicacy.

By one method, the fish are packed in an earthenware or enamel container with one-half pound of salt for ten pounds of fish, well distributed through the layers. Then the container is filled with salt water mixed in a proportion of about 2 pounds of salt to a gallon of water.

After about ten hours, the fish are rinsed, dried and placed in the smoke house over a fire of orchard wood or other hard wood. Most smokers recommend a three to six hour curing over a light smoke, with the temperature in the house at about 80 degrees Fahrenheit. Then the fires are built up and the fish are cooked in a dense smoke at about 170 degrees for one to two hours. Timing depends on the size of the fish and the flavor desired.

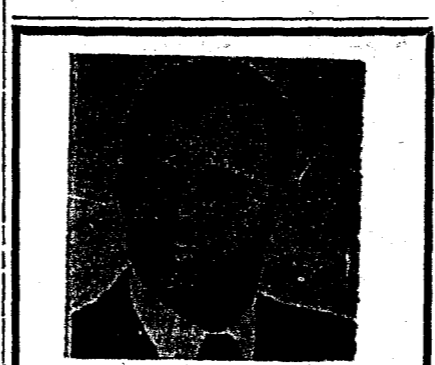
Hers is the first appointment outside of personal aides made by Governor-elect Cecil Andrus, who took office on Monday.
