## Rep. Brocke Reports From Legislature

This first week of the 41st session of the Idaho Legislature was a routine week with the Legislature dealing mostly with committee work.

Monday the Governor presented his State of the State message in which he covered many problems that the Legislature will have to solve.

The Agricultural Affairs Committee is holding hearings on several matters including meat inspection, a new law repealing the present commercial feed law, a new act called the soil conditioner law, changes in the pesticide laws, also changes in the commercial spraying and dusting laws. At this time none of the proposed changes are of a radical nature.

Today the Governor made a fine presentation of the needs of the State, going into detail regarding the many agencies and departments. He recommended a general fund appropriation of some \$128,104,328. The revenue estimate of the year 1/71 to 1/72 is \$113,328,000. This leaves a deficiency of some \$14,776,328. This deficiency will be made up by a cash balance that should occur June 30th of the year of \$4,500,000, changes in reporting of the income taxes, holding back five per cent of the sale tax that now goes to the counties in the inventory tax phase out, taking money from the permanent building fund, and some other minor transfers. This budget does include funds for a State kindergarten program.

So far no major bills have been introduced in the Legislature. However, as committees continue to work major bills will be forthcoming.

## Street Paving Topic For Civic Meeting January 28

Genesee — A proposal to create a Local Improvement District in Genesee to raise money necessary to pave all the streets in the city will be the main topic for discussion at the Genesee Civic Association meets next Thursday evening, January 28.

The meeting will be held in the Firemen's Hall at 8:00 p. m. A short business session of the Civic Association will precede the public meeting concerning the streets.

The Genesee City Council has, with the help of W. E. Thompson, a Spokane engineer, drawn up a preliminary proposal for paving the streets through a LID.

Mr. Thompson and one of his associates will be present at the meeting to answer questions pertaining to the paving of the streets. It is the wishes of the Council and officers of the civic group to have everyone possible attend this meeting, whether in favor or opposed to having the streets paved.

This will be the best opportunity for property owners in Genesee to obtain first-hand information on the cost, methods and other data concerning this proposal.

## Warm Weather, Rain Turns Area To Quagmire

The heavy snows of last week disappeared in less than a 12 hour period Friday when a warming trend settled over the area, turning the snow to rain, and the ground cover to a sea of cold slush. By early Saturday the snow was almost gone and the bare, brown ground was soft with mud. The warm weather has continued on through this week and rain has fallen almost every day, adding to the depth and softness of the earth.

Every road in the area has suffered from the moisture, even the asphalt surfaced ones. The country roads which are rock surfaced are softening badly under the heavy rains and travel is becoming difficult. There are several bad breaks in the highway between Kendrick and Juliaetta that have turned into deep potholes.

Dick Benscoter, who maintains rainfall figures for the SCS on American Ridge, reported that 1.23 inch of rain had fallen between Friday and Tuesday noon of this week.

Over in the Genesee area the rains caused earth slides that forced a temporary closing of Coyote Grade and Central Grade.

## Potlatch River Bridge Now In Use; Old Bridge Washes

Construction of the new Potlatch River bridge which spans the stream just above Juliaetta, was completed enough to allow traffic to cross on Monday afternoon, reported Lloyd Craig, Nezperce County Highway District foreman, who is in charge of the crew erecting the all steel structure. Although the traffic was able to cross the bridge a full two weeks ahead of the planned completion date, high water washed out the middle pier of the old bridge Sunday afternoon, and left those on the other side of the bridge stranded for almost 24 hours.

While travelers are gratefully using the newly finished bridge, Craig said it wouldn't be a good crossing until warm weather arrives and allows the surfacing of the approach and the deck to be coated with asphalt. At the present time the work crews have just spread gravel on the approaches and the bridge, which will have to serve until temperatures rise enough to make permanent surfacing possible.

Plans for approach surfacing call for gravel to lead up to the bridge on the other side of the river, but asphalt will be laid for the approach on this side. At the present time the temporary approach is made through the Henderson field until right-of-way negotiations are completed with the railroad.

Cost of the new bridge was shared on a 50-50 basis between the Nezperce County Highway District and the Genesee-Rimrock Highway District. Nezperce County will pay for cost of approach construction on the other side of the river; Genesee-Rimrock for the approach cost on this side, Craig reported.

## Unemployment Still High

Unemployment in Latah County remains higher than a year ago, reports Frank Hartstein, manager of the Moscow office of the Department of Employment. During the past week, 346 county residents received unemployment insurance compared to 337 last week and only 237 a year ago. Twenty-two new claims were filed during the week. Those seeking jobless pay in the Moscow area total 189 in addition to 17 in Genesee, 66 in the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, 17 in Kendrick, 53 in Potlatch, and four in Elk River.

Five persons were placed on jobs through the Moscow office. Ten new jobs were received and at the close of the week there were 11 jobs available to area workers. Openings listed with the Department of Employment include a farm equipment salesman, insurance salesman, taxi driver, manager trainee, cook, waitress, dishwasher, secretary, sales clerk, shirt presser, and housekeepers.

## YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT

By John R. Woodworth, director Idaho Fish and Game Department MIDWINTER WATERFOWL INVENTORY

Preliminary reports though incomplete indicate that Idaho's waterfowl concentration is higher than it was a year ago at about the same time. The five northern counties of the Idaho Panhandle reported 41,280 waterfowl, compared to 21,800 in 1970. southwestern counties along the Snake River from Brunson to Farewell Bend, found 103,600 waterfowl this year, compared to 84,340 in 1970, with Lake Lowell having about the same both years—30,000 waterfowl.

Fifty-four bald eagles were observed on the shores of Bend Oreille and Coeur d'Alene lakes and the Clark Fork River in northern Idaho. They were feeding on spawned out kokanee which had drifted ashore. In January of 1970 the count was 19 eagles.

**1971 Duck Stamp**  
Cinnamon teal will be featured on the 1971-72 Federal Duck Stamp. The winning entry was created by artist Maynard Reece, of Des Moines, Iowa. This was the fifth time that Reece, a wildlife artist of national repute, has won the contest.

A new duck stamp is issued each year by the U. S. Postal Service. The 1971-72 stamp will go on sale July 1, 1971, and will be valid through June 1972. Every migratory waterfowl hunter 16 years of age or older must purchase this \$3 stamp with a state hunting license. All revenue from duck stamps, except the cost of printing and distribution, is used for acquisition of wetlands for waterfowl.

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## FOOD PRICES EXPECTED TO REMAIN ABOUT THE SAME

Look for food prices to be about the same in the first half of 1971 as they were at the end of 1970, according to Joanne Anderson, County Extension Home Economics Agent. That's the word from marketing analysts on the national front.

Cost of food at stores went up only two and one-half percent in the last quarter of 1970 compared with a year earlier, and is expected to stay at about that level for several months, economists said.

Eating out is a different story. Restaurants raised prices about seven and one-half percent in 1970 to keep up with labor and overhead increases. Further advances are expected, putting the damper on the cafe boom.

For people pushing shopping carts, these developments are likely this winter:

Dairy products will go up before spring. Canned and frozen fruit and vegetables are likely to cost more because of decreased supplies. However, oranges are fairly abundant.

Potatoes, onions and cabbage are expected to be low-price leaders on produce counters. Apples, grapes, pears and cherries are likely to cost more than a year ago.

Pork price will continue down. Beef will go up a little but remain lower than last summer. Lamb will continue to rise. Poultry will be cheaper. So will eggs.

The kind of pork that is produced and eaten today has 22 percent more protein, 57 percent less fat and 36 percent fewer calories.

The change is a result of developments in growing swine that have been going on about 15 years, the home agent said. Consumers asked for less fat and they are getting it. Pigs inherit characteristics of muscling and fat from their parents. By selecting boars and gilts with more lean meat and less fat, producers have improved the quality of pork for the retail market.

An average serving of pork, nutrition people say, provides a man with 40 percent of his daily protein needs, 70 percent of his thiamin, sufficient amounts of other vitamins and minerals, and less than eight

## SOME HUNTING REMAINS

Some hunting still remains for sportsmen hardy enough to get out. For example, the season on cottontail and pygmy rabbits runs through February 28 with bag and possession limit of 8 in the aggregate. Goose season closed statewide January 10 (except for counties in eastern Idaho which closed earlier). The season for ducks and coots also ended in all parts of the state (except the Columbia Basin Mallard Area) January 10. The merganser season also closed statewide January 10. Idaho counties located in the Columbia Basin Mallard Area will not close for ducks and coots until January 24. A new 1971 hunting license is needed, but the federal duck stamp issued for the 1970-71 waterfowl season remains valid. Until youngsters reach the age of 16, they are not required to have a duck stamp. New licenses also are needed for angling or a combination fishing-hunting license will serve for both these sports.

### HIGHWAY CUTBACKS WOULD HURT STATE SAYS OFFICIAL

Idaho State Highway Board Chairman C. Ed Flandro said today that any decrease in the current level of funding available from the State Highway Fund for use on the State Highway System could not possibly be in the best interest of Idaho's highway users—urban or rural.  
 Idaho has a staggering 516 million dollar backlog of needs for construction and re-construction on the State Highway System at this time. A considerable amount of this backlog is on portions of the State Highway System in cities and this backlog is currently increasing at an alarming rate. Thus, any proposals to reduce the existing distribution of money from the State Highway Fund for State highway purposes without increasing revenues to the State Highway Fund would set Idaho's State Highway Program—urban and rural—even further behind.  
 Referring to recent proposals to allocate one cent of the existing State gasoline tax directly to the cities, Mr. Flandro commented that such action could result in a loss of revenue for Department of Highways purposes amounting to over 2.5 million dollars per year. Such a loss would be an extremely severe blow to improvements on the State Highway System where State funds are vitally needed to maintain the Federal-aid and State programs at not less than their current levels. An additional annual loss of nearly one million dollars per year could similarly occur to counties and highway districts.  
 Many people do not realize, Flandro said, that the State Highway Department now spends a sum equal to or greater than the above amounts in the cities of Idaho every year.  
 The Department of Highways is responsible for the construction and most of the maintenance on approximately 307 miles of streets which are a part of the State Highway System and located within Idaho's cities. These are the most important city arterials. Over 50 million dollars has been spent in improving this mileage since 1955. This is over and above the regular apportionment to the cities from the State Highway Fund which totaled about 25 million dollars for this same fifteen year period.  
 The 50 million dollars is for construction purposes only. It does not include costs for the maintenance of these streets—another substantial expenditure in the cities made by the State.  
 In almost every Idaho city, Flandro said, the State Highway System is an integral segment of the total city street system. Idaho highway users, through their share of taxes paid on gasoline and other vehicle related items, finance all construction and a great portion of the maintenance on such facilities.  
 State highway construction in the cities of Idaho amounted to over six million dollars in 1969. This increases by some three times the amount of funding the cities essentially receive from the State Highway Fund. Thus, instead of a distribution of 4 ½ percent of available funding from the State Highway Fund, the cities directly benefit to an equivalent ratio of 12 to 18 percent of the revenue to this fund.  
 Flandro said the Board of Highway Directors is most concerned about the great backlog of needs on the State Highway System. While the Board is aware that needs on other city streets and county roads are also posing problems, any redistribution on revenue available from the present tax structure could not possibly solve the problem. Thus, said Flandro, the Board must be opposed to any such proposal and is prepared to present supportable testimony in this respect to the several committees of the Legislature if desired.

### TECHNICAL COMMITTEE EYES MERCURY REPORT


The technical advisory committee on mercury contamination in Idaho has agreed further study is necessary before it makes any recommendations on data recently received. The committee met in Boise to begin evaluation of reports on about 700 samples.  
 Committee chairman, Dr. Darrell Brock of the State Health Department, said the data was received in the form of 35 pages of "numbers" and "codes" pertaining to a wide variety including animal, vegetable and water samples. The committee has agreed to meet again after members have had a chance to evaluate the data.  
 "Following that meeting the committee may have recommendations to make to the heads of the Department of Health and the Fish and Game Department," Brock said. "I would like to emphasize that this committee is advisory in nature and reports to the department heads rather than to the public," he added.  
 In addition to beginning evaluation of the report, the committee discussed a number of other subjects. Among these were the possible continuation of the mercury study beyond the original deadline, the current status of the feed-

**CHANGES IN LIVING UNITS PLANNED FOR NAMPA SCHOOL**

Some of Idaho's mentally retarded who reside at the Idaho State School and Hospital in Nampa soon will be living in homes on the campus.

Ten new houses being constructed at the State School are nearly completed. Each house will be "home" for eight children and a cottage parent.

The change to a home-like atmosphere for the mentally retarded at the school is under the guidance of Dr. John Marks, director of the Department of Health's Mental Retardation and Child Development Division.

A goal of the program is to help prepare retarded children for life outside an institution—in a foster home, a boarding home or perhaps living independently.

The plan to de-institutionalize the school was started a year and a half ago when the large wards were partitioned into family living units to accommodate 10 to 14 residents. Previously, 50 to 60 persons were "herded" together all day in the large open wards. Now, with the use of colorful rugs and drapes and comfortable furniture, each "family" has an attractive living room and sleeping quarters. All meals are eaten within the family unit instead of in a "mess hall" atmosphere.

Even though this arrangement is makeshift, the personnel of the State School enthusiastically support the change and report that response by the residents has been "unbelievable." Some children have learned to talk and feed themselves. All are much calmer—and therefore are able to learn easier.

With the 10 new homes on campus, 80 children will be housed in real homes. Each house has five bedrooms and two and one-half bathrooms. Special facilities for the physically handicapped were included in the design so that children in wheelchairs can be included in the "family."

Children of both sexes ranging in age from 3 to 12 will be transferred to the new living quarters. Young children placed in a family-living

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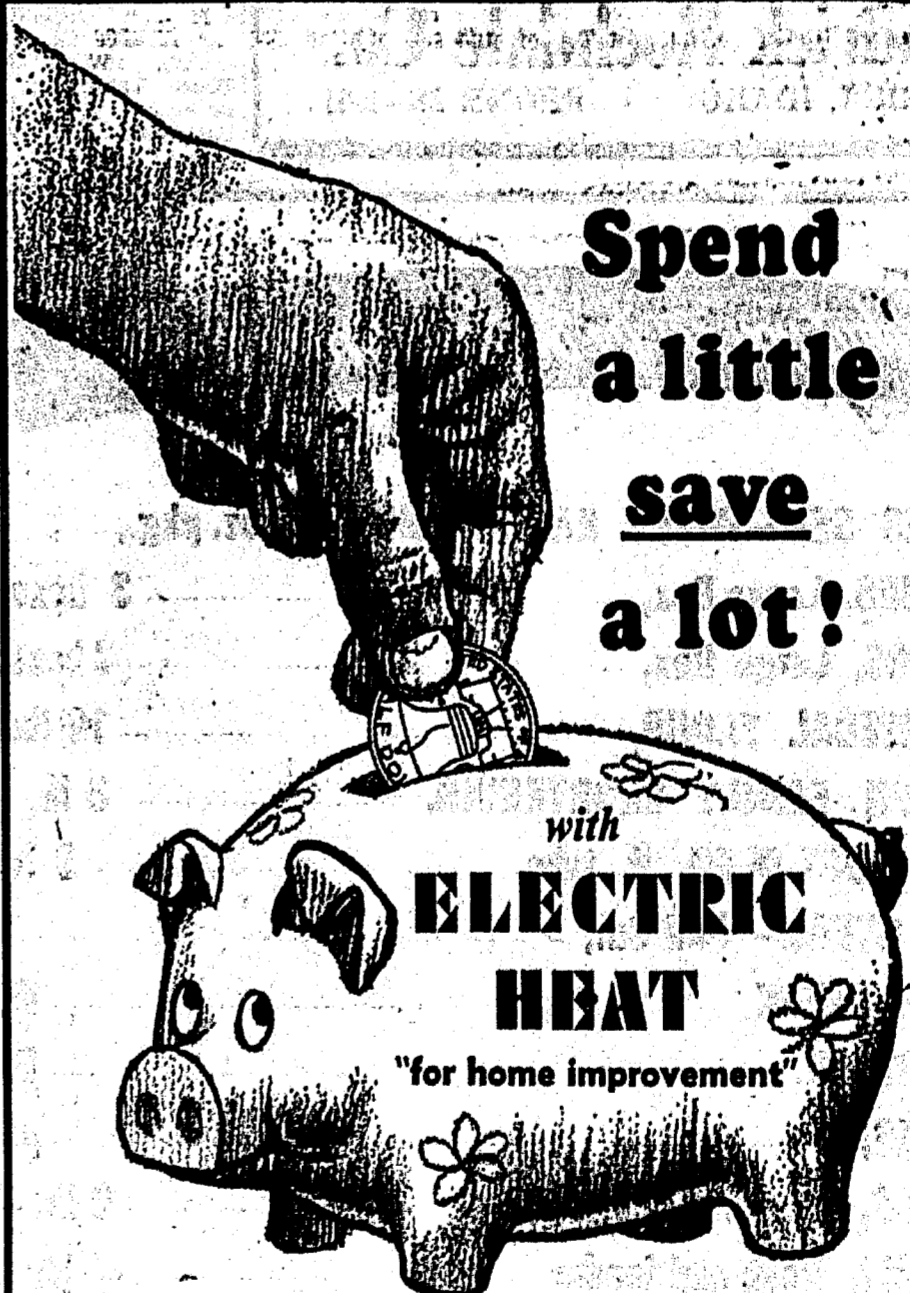

**Wheat Growers End Portland Conference**

Portland — The National Association of Wheat Growers ended their annual convention here Saturday and elected an Idaho grower to the line of succession for the presidency of the national group.

Dick Smith, Rexburg, was elected vice chairman of the NAWG Farm Programs Committee, a position the Association has traditionally used to groom its future presidents.

Two programs proposed by Idaho delegates were unanimously endorsed by the NAWG membership.

One program, called "Food for Tomorrow" is a public relations effort in which information about agriculture is directed at city residents. The plan was developed by the Idaho Wheat Commission and is in the process of becoming a nationwide, all-agriculture project.

The other Idaho proposal was to continue research into nutritional qualities of wheat. A Stanford Research study, financed by the Idaho Wheat Commission, has shown preliminary indications that consumption of wheat products may help reduce the incidence of heart disease.

Gene Moos, Edwall, Wash., was elected president of the National Association of Wheat Growers for the coming year, and he will act as civilian advisor to the U. S. government negotiating team at the International Grains Arrangement conference starting January 18 in Geneva, Switzerland. Moos succeeds E. L. Hatcher, Lamar, Colo., as NAWG president. Hatcher served two terms as president.

A Nebraska wheat grower, Ray Davis, was elected vice president, and Ora Martin of Kansas was re-elected as secretary-treasurer.
