

MISSING ADDRESS LABEL DELAYS REFUND

Many taxpayers have delayed their federal income tax refund by not putting the name and address label onto their tax return. The blue label is on the front of the package of federal income tax forms and instructions that was mailed to taxpayers about January 1. The label must be lifted off and attached to the Form 1040 being filed. A tax return cannot be processed without name, address, and social security number-all reprinted on the label. These means of identification ensure proper crediting to the taxpayer's master file account.

In case the label bears incorrect data, the taxpayer should still use the label but should cross out the wrong item and substitute accurate

information.

The Idaho State Tax Commission announced today that Senior Citizens are eligible again this year for refund of unused sales tax credit. To qualify, a person must have reached the age of 65 on or before December 31, 1970, must have been a resident of Idaho for the entire year of 1970, and must not have utilized all of his sales tax credit on his income tax return.

Claim forms will be mailed about January 20th to all persons who received refund payments last year. If an individual does not receive a claim form in the mail, he may obtain one at any of the offices of the State Tax Commission in Bolse, Coeur d' Alene, Lewiston.




