Kendrick's speedy Tigers marked up two wins over the week-end in District A-3 basketball competition as they defeated the Clearwater Valley Rams 79-66 Friday night at Kooakia, and then came home Saturday to edge the Potlatch Loggers 70-64. The Potlatch game brought the Tiger season record to 6 wins against 5 losses.

Four Tigers scored in the double figures Friday night at Kooakia, as the KHS team built up a sturdy 44-22 halftime lead and then made it hold for a 79-66 final score as Coach Wayne Dust swept his bench clean during the second half.

Don Parks was high point man for the Tigers with 18 points, while Alan Kimbley scored 12; Dave Hutcherson 12; Kim Trout 15; Doug Pratt 9, and Dave Wilken 8.

Kendrick won the B game 55-54. Trout Scores 24

Kim Trout scored 24 points against the visiting Potlatch Loggers Saturday night as the Tigers won their sixth game 70-64. Potlatch held a slim 30-29 lead at the halftime but the Tigers scored 27 points in the third quarter to lead 56-51 going into the final frame. Trout was high man on both teams with his 24 point effort, and Don Parks added 18 more.

Potlatch romped to a 84-54 JV victory.

Genesee's high-flying Bulldogs marched off with their 11th and 12th wins of the basketball season last Friday and Saturday, as they defeated the strong Lapwai Wildcats 69-49 Friday night, and then survived a shaky first half to edge out a determined Orofino squad 69-63.

Friday night the Bulldogs, who have been the only team to defeat Lapwai, led 27-22 at the half time, then staged a 24 point outburst in the third quarter to break away from the Wildcats for good.

Genesee hit 42 percent of their field goal attempts compared to 31 percent for the Wildcats. Mike England contributed 23 of Genesee's 69 points, while Ron Hopkins got 16 and Bill Schlueter 14.

Genesee's JV team won their game 55-29.

Orofino Beaten

Paced by the scoring of Ron Hopkins and Bill Schlueter, the Genesee Bulldogs climbed back from a 12-2 deficit to finally overpower the Orofino Maniacs 69-63 Saturday night at Genesee and keep their win streak intact at the 12 game mark.

Genesee, ice cold, couldn't even get on the score board for the first five minutes of the game and scored only 2 points in the entire first quarter. Orofino kept the pressure on and were out in front 27 to 13 at the half. Genesee, who managed a pitiful 17 percent field goal average in the first half, boomed back with a 60 percent average in the second, as Hopkins and Schlueter provided the spark and the scoring that finally put the Bulldogs ahead for the first time near the end of the third quarter. Hopkins ended the game with 22 points, while Schlueter hit for 19 more.

Genesee's sharp JV squad took the preliminary event 65-48.

Kendrick School, Juliaetta Business Vandalized, Burglarized Monday Morn.

Kendrick High School and the Wander Inn Tavern in Juliaetta were burglarized and vandalized early Monday morning in incidents which county law enforcement officers suspect might be connected.

Receiving the worst damage was Kendrick High School which sustained \$1,925.00 damage in lost cash, equipment damage and cost of clean-up and repair. The estimated loss was reported late Tuesday afternoon by Supt. Don Blakeley.

Damage was so extensive that school was unable to open Monday morning in Kendrick. Classes resumed Tuesday morning while repair work was still underway.

The vandals spared nothing in the school as they struck at the Hot Lunch room kitchen, Chemistry department, offices and classrooms, plus the gymnasium. Several potentially dangerous chemicals were taken from the Chemistry department.

Blakeley estimated it would cost \$555.00 to repair or replace the typewriters and bookkeeping machine, \$9.70 to replace four windows; \$125 to replace a Coke machine; \$150 for a Pepsi machine; \$179.00 for a sewing machine stolen; \$49.20 for clean-up and paint; \$30 for food items destroyed or damaged; \$241.26 for lock replacements (many keys were stolen); \$16.60 for a spirit duplicator; miscellaneous repairs, and \$200 in cash taken from the concession stand.

Receipts from the ball game Saturday night, which were placed in the superintendent's office were overlooked by the thieves. The cash box containing the receipts from the concession stand, containing state tax money, was recovered in a locker at the school Tuesday noon.

Fainted and marked on walls, fountains and other places inside the school were the phrases, "LHS"; "LHS Wins" and "LHS Lives".

The crime is being investigated by officers from the Latah Sheriff's office. Supt. Blakeley said he and his principal were at the school Sunday night until 8:30 p. m. Marshall Nye checked the school at 11:00 and the Latah County Deputy Sheriff checked the building again shortly after 1:00 a. m.

Supt. Blakeley said the property damage was insured but the loss of cash was not. He also added he was very grateful for the number of people who helped and offered to help clean up after the crime was discovered.

At Wander Inn

Person or persons unknown also gained entry into the Wander Inn Tavern at Juliaetta sometime late Sunday night or early Monday morning, smashed a juke box, spilled ink and stole glasses and pitchers before departing, said Juliaetta Marshall Ervin Mabbott.

Mabbott said the thief or thieves entered the building through a fuel door in the basement, made their way upstairs where they demolished a juke box and stole approximately 50 records, 15 to 20 beer glasses and 6 or 7 beer pitchers. Damage to the juke box was estimated at \$200.

Officers investigating the crime were inclined to feel there may be a connection between the Kendrick school break-in and the Juliaetta robbery.

Rain Removes Weekend Snow; Winds Were Heavy

An all-day snow storm last Thursday, which dumped over two inches of cover across the area and forced the early closure of Kendrick and Juliaetta schools, disappeared by Friday under the drenching rain and warm winds which swept the ground bare.

Snow began falling early Thursday morning, accompanied by moderate to strong winds. When the storm showed no signs of slackening by midday, Supt. Don Blakeley closed the schools in Kendrick and Juliaetta, and sent the rural children home on the busses. The storm finally slackened late that afternoon, but travel was difficult on the grades and ridges.

Friday the weather had warmed and the snow turned to rain, and the rain converted the snow on the roads and streets to slush. The winds increased in velocity throughout the day and night and over the weekend the wind reached gusts of almost fifty miles per hour, which resulted in damage to trees and some roofs. A tree by the water pump house in Genesee was toppled by the wind.

The wind had abated by Monday, but the periods of rain continued.

MISSING ADDRESS LABEL DELAYS REFUND

Many taxpayers have delayed their federal income tax refund by not putting the name and address label onto their tax return. The blue label is on the front of the package of federal income tax forms and instructions that was mailed to taxpayers about January 1. The label must be lifted off and attached to the Form 1040 being filed. A tax return cannot be processed without name, address, and social security number—all reprinted on the label. These means of identification ensure proper crediting to the taxpayer's master file account.

In case the label bears incorrect data, the taxpayer should still use the label but should cross out the wrong item and substitute accurate information.

The Idaho State Tax Commission announced today that Senior Citizens are eligible again this year for refund of unused sales tax credit. To qualify, a person must have reached the age of 65 on or before December 31, 1970, must have been a resident of Idaho for the entire year of 1970, and must not have utilized all of his sales tax credit on his income tax return.

Claim forms will be mailed about January 20th to all persons who received refund payments last year. If an individual does not receive a claim form in the mail, he may obtain one at any of the offices of the State Tax Commission in Boise, Coeur d'Alene, Lewiston.

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Home Cookin'

Some time ago Mrs. Wm. (Elaine) Haxton gave us two books with recipes from the Idaho and Washington Food and Lentil Commissions. We will publish more through the coming weeks.

CHILI LENTILS

2 cups cooked and drained lentils
3 No. 2 1/2 can tomatoes
1 tablespoon chili powder
1 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 clove garlic
1 teaspoon ground oregano
1 pound ground beef
1 large onion (minced)
Brown meat in small amount of oil, breaking it into bite size pieces. Add onion and garlic and saute until limp but not brown. Discard the garlic. Add all other ingredients and simmer for about an hour.

The December, 1970 issue of Idaho Potato News gives an excellent recipe for preparing Idaho potatoes, called Idaho Fritters. They tell us to fry up a new idea with the potatoes you know are going to taste better to start.

IDAHO FRITTERS

2 Idaho potatoes
2 egg yolks
1 cup cold water
1 1/2 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon each, salt and paprika
2 teaspoons curry powder
Salad oil or shortening in deep fat fryer, heated to 375 d.
Peel potatoes and slice thin. Spread on towel to dry. Mix remaining ingredients lightly. Batter should be a little lumpy. Dip potatoes in batter and fry a comfortable amount of time, turning until fritters are puffy and golden. Serve right away. Makes 4 or more crunchy servings.

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INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE LISTS TAX DATES

It's income tax time again—and here are some important dates and reminders from the Internal Revenue Service.
ALL TAXPAYERS—April 15 is the general filing deadline, with the exceptions noted below. File early, but carefully, including correct social security numbers. Errors delay processing of the returns and refunds.

FARMERS—February 1 is due-date for the annual social security tax report (Form 943) on all 1970 farm employees. March 1 is the final date for farmers 1970 income tax returns, unless estimated tax was paid by January 15 which allows until April 15 to file the return.

EMPLOYERS—February 1 is the deadline for issuing W-2's to employees, also for filing the final 1970 employers quarterly tax returns (Form 941) and annual federal unemployment tax returns (Form 940).

EMPLOYEES—Before making returns be sure to have all W-2 forms from every 1970 employer. Incomplete returns delay refunds. All taxpayers whose income taxes are not paid by withholdings from salaries or wages—February 1 is the due date for 1970 income tax returns for those who did not pay final quarterly estimates by January 15. Otherwise, April 15 is the deadline, including the first quarter estimate payment on 1971 income tax.

Predator Hunting Spot

Hunting at night with a spotlight is legal for predators and can be productive. Coyotes, bobcats, and foxes can be lured within shooting range of a blind or calling stand with sounds that simulate the screams of a rabbit in distress. Varminit shooters recommend the use of 12-gauge shotguns with No. 2 shot for stars in timber and brush and small caliber rifles with four-power scopes for shooting in dim light. Recommended predator calling hours are the first two hours of light in the mornings and the last two hours of daylight in the evening.
