

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

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

Boise — The announcement of cottontail and pygmy rabbit hunting seasons each year from September 1 — February 28 — the longest of any Idaho game animal seasonscarcely brings more than a dis-interested "ho-hum" from many

Early fall is truly a time for indecision. There is so much gun sport in the offing. The shooting season is on for mourning doves, for example, opens September 1, the same day as cottonial and pygmy,


