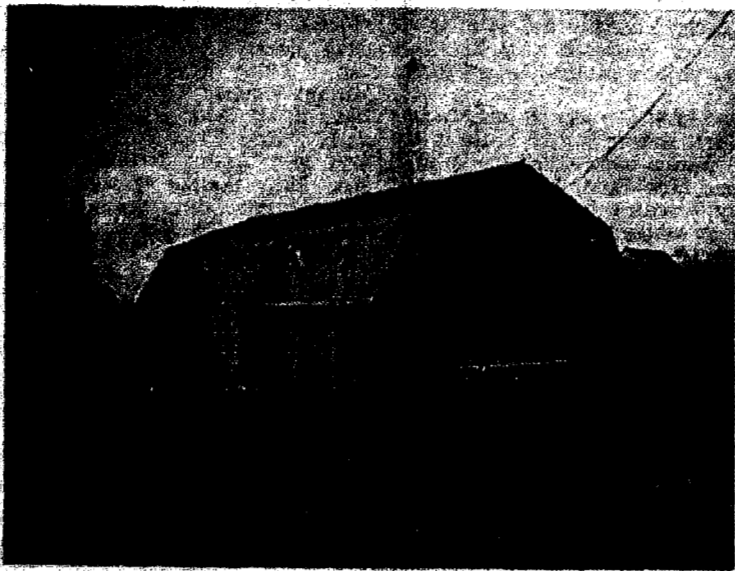

NEW GENESEE APARTMENTS READY



Genesee — A four-unit apartment complex in Genesee is now ready for occupancy. It was announced last week by Scott Brown, owner of the new units. Brown said Genesee's location between Moscow and Lewiston provides an excellent opportunity to live away from the city bustle and at the same time have ready access to the urban services. The apartments, built by Craftwall of Lewiston, feature an mansard style roof, cedar shake exterior, and a unique location which affords an panoramic view of the rolling Palouse Hills. It is located on Laurel Street, across from the Leonard Singhose residence.

All of the units will be two bedroom with carpeting, drapes, and ap-

pliances included. Each will have ground level access and private sun deck or patio.

As the availability of these units has just been announced, not all of them have been spoken for. Before starting construction, however, Brown conducted a survey of the Genesee rental market area which indicated a definite shortage of rental facilities. Brown hopes to fill all units with retired persons living in the Genesee area now in housing that does not meet their needs adequately.

Brown added that final landscaping of the area will be completed as weather permits. The units were begun in October of 1970.

January Rainfall Exceeds Three Inches

Rainfall during the month of January in both the Kendrick and Genesee areas totaled over 3 inches, it was reported this week by farmers who maintain these rainfall figures for the Soil Conservation Service.

John Luedke, reporting for the Genesee area said Monday that he recorded a total precipitation of 3.66 inches during the thirty-one day period. This was not nearly the amount recorded for the same period in 1970 which saw 6.43 inches of moisture fall. This 1970 figure was an exceptionally high amount. In 1969 there was a rainfall of 2.95 for January. It was .94 in 1968 and 3.88 in January of 1967.

Charles Bower, who keeps moisture records for the S. C. S., on Big Bear Ridge said Monday evening he recorded 3.33 inches in his area for January. Bowers records also indicate the wet January of last year when he tallied 6.86 inches.

The slightest amount of January rainfall was reported by Richard Benscoter on American Ridge, who reported 2.31 inches for the previous month.

Spring-Like Weekend

Warm, spring-like weather hovered over the region last week-end and pushed the temperatures into the sixties beneath a bright and sunny sky. After a windy Friday and Saturday, the weather calmed and gave almost unbelievable January weather. The good weather remained on Monday, but the skies had clouded over Tuesday, and if any groundhogs were out February 2, they did not see their shadow.

Proposed Genesee Street Paving LID Meets With Hostile Reception

Genesee — Less than five percent of the over 100 persons who came to a public meeting to hear an engineer and a bonding attorney from Spokane explain a proposed street paving LID for Genesee were in favor of such a project. The meeting was held last Thursday evening in the Genesee Fire Hall, with the Civic Association as the host group.

William Thompson, a Spokane engineer, had been retained by the City to obtain a cost estimate of paving all of the seven miles of city streets in Genesee; classify the various streets according to their current condition and help determine a basis of assessment to pay for such an undertaking.

Using present construction costs, Thompson told the group that he estimated a total bond issue of \$168,300.00 would be needed to completely pave the streets in Genesee.

Robert Blain, a bonding attorney from Spokane, explained how the cost of this could be met by creation of a Local Improvement District (LID). If sixty percent of the resident property owners of Genesee wanted this project to continue they would sign a petition and present it to the council. The council would then adopt a resolution of intention and prepare the legal notices and call a public hearing on the matter. During this time if two-thirds of the property owners did not object the council could then proceed to pass an ordinance establishing the district and call for bids, then issue the bonds to raise the necessary money. The bonds could be for several time periods, but Blain suggested 20 years as the most practical.

Many Questions

During the presentation of the explanations by the two Spokane men, the cool attitude of the crowd could be felt, but once the meeting was thrown open to a question and answer period, the hostility and opposition was immediately apparent. Questions ranged from intelligent and pertinent; such as, condition of water lines over which the paving would be applied, type of surfacing to be put down, cost of upkeep and queries pertaining to drainage and the general condition of the streets. There were also more than enough questions asked which were not intelligent nor pertinent.

Just before the meeting adjourned, Street Commissioner John Myers, Jr., asked for a show of hands from those who were in favor of the paving project. Less than five or six hands were raised. When a showing of hands for those opposed was asked, there was no doubt as to the sentiment of the group.

Petitions Available

Following a meeting of the City Council Monday evening, Commissioner Myers said that petitions asking for the creation of a paving LID would be available at First Security Bank or Springer Insurance office for those who might wish to sign them.

IDAHO ECONOMIC OUTLOOK
"FAIR TO GOOD" PREDICTS
BANK NEWSLETTER

The economic outlook for 1971 is rated fair to good among most economic segments and the rate of inflation is expected to decline and real growth should be more apparent.

This is the report of the quarterly First Security Bank News Letter being distributed this week according to James Hoogland, Jr., Manager. The News Letter is edited by Dr. Elroy Nelson, First Security economist.

According to First Security, employment is expected to increase on a modest scale in most economic categories, and there is a healthy outlook in the agricultural, lumber trade and construction industries.

Personal income, employment, production and trade in Idaho last year all increased at rates slightly above the national average. Total personal income for the year which was estimated at \$2.27 billion increased by \$150 million or seven per cent, somewhat above the national percentage increase.

"After adjustment for a five per cent rate of inflation, there was a real increase of approximately two per cent," according to the News Letter.

Farm marketing in Idaho during 1970 should total cash receipts of about the same as 1969—at \$631 million. Income from the sale of livestock and livestock products increased by about five per cent, while income from crop sales declined by four per cent. Livestock accounted for approximately 45 per cent of all cash receipts in the state, crops for 55 per cent.

First Security projects that fed cattle prices for 1971 should average approximately the same as last year. Feeder cattle prices may be affected by increased cost of feed and the fact that these prices are slightly out of line with fed cattle prices. Lamb prices, the lowest in many years, have probably reached the bottom and should increase as the spring marketing approaches. Milk prices continue to increase both for market and processed milk.

Production of crops in the Gem state last year varied depending on the type of crop, but total production

was down somewhat. Fruit production, because of the freeze during the blossoming season, was below that of 1969. Prices were generally higher, but total receipts were below those of the previous year.

Potato production in Idaho as in the nation established new records in 1970. Nationally, the fall potato crop was estimated at 251.9 million cwt., about six per cent higher than the previous year. Idaho's production of 73.2 million cwt. accounted for almost 30 per cent of the national total of fall potatoes.

Lumber production last year varied considerably from season-to-season and totaled an estimated 1,625 million feet board measure, down slightly from 1969. The outlook for 1971 has improved considerably with an anticipated increase in construction especially for housing throughout the marketing territory.

The value of mineral production in the state last year was reported at \$118.5 million, a decrease of about two per cent from the record value reported in 1969. Quantity production of most major metals have decreased. The outlook for 1971 is mixed with extensive exploration and development continuing, according to the News Letter.

Silver output last year was reported at 18.8 million ounces, almost equal to totals achieved during the previous year. Silver represented 30 per cent of the state's value of mineral production, while gold output totaled 3 million ounces, valued at \$110,000. Lead production at 59,861 tons was nine per cent below that of the previous year.

Estimated value of all construction contracts awarded for the first eleven months of 1970 totaled \$188.8 million, an increase of about \$17 million over that of 1969. Increases were shown in residential and non-building construction such as highways and utilities—more than offsetting a \$21 million decrease in non-residential construction. The construction outlook for 1971 is generally good, especially for residential building.

Employment last year continued on a month-to-month basis above 1969. By November, the total employment of 288,900 was 4,000 above the previous year. Unemployment, listed at 14,500, represented 4.8 per cent of the labor force, compared with 3.3 per cent in 1969.

FISH RESTORATION FUND
UP, BUT DOWN FOR GAME

Idaho's 1971 federal aid allocation for approved fish restoration projects is more than \$30,200 over the previous year, but new allocations for wildlife restoration in the state are down by \$8,100, it was announced today by the Idaho Fish and Game Department.

This money comes from excise taxes on guns, ammunition and tackle and presently is appropriated to the states at the rate of about \$50 million annually. The U. S. Treasury Department collects the money and then turns it over to the Interior Department's Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife for allocation to states, following a formula based on the area of the state and number of hunting and fishing licenses sold.

The hunting equipment tax began with the 1937 Pittman-Robertson Act, and since its enactment more than \$350 million has been collected. In Idaho, over \$7 1/2 million in "P-R" funds has been spent. The 1971 P-R allocation for Idaho is \$604,072.62 which is down \$8,171.82 from the previous year, according to Vernon Rich, federal aid coordinator.

Examples of P-R work in Idaho include big game trapping and transplanting; management investigation studies on all big game species; rehabilitation of winter range, including controlled burning; and land acquisition.

The fishing tackle tax was provided by the 1950 Dingell-Johnson Act. It has resulted in the collection of more than \$100 million. Of this, \$1,973,876.79 has been spent in Idaho in "D-J" funds. The D-J allocation for Idaho for the 1971 fiscal year is \$222,659.92, which is up \$30,238.31 over the previous year.

Examples of Dingell-Johnson projects include construction of Horse-thief Dam, which was completed last year; studies of salmon and steelhead, and other anadromous fisheries investigations; lake and reservoir investigations; evaluation of catch and release regulations for cutthroat on the North Fork of the Clearwater; cutthroat and squaw-fish studies on the St. Joe River; statewide fish harvest studies; and land acquisitions.

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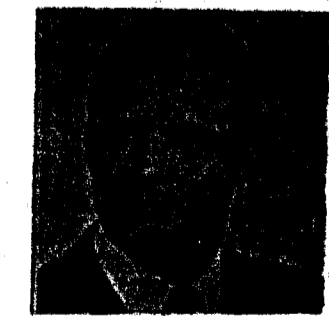

Additional Mercury Surveillance
Additional monitoring in 73 locations and six fish hatcheries will involve the testing of 1,450 fish, 78 water samples, 24 bottom sediment samples, and 12 invertebrate plankton samples. The first samples will be pooled and analyzed in groups of five by gas chromatograph. Resampling of individuals can be done if the pooled sample indicates one or more fish in excess of 1 ppm.

Steelhead Regulations Simple
The thing to remember, now that the weather apparently is moderating along the lower Snake, Clearwater and main Salmon rivers is that steelhead trout are rainbow trout (Salmo gairdneri) which exceed 20 inches or more in length and are caught in the Snake River below Hells Canyon, the Salmon River drainage and the Clearwater drainage. Daily bag is two steelhead, possession limit is four steelhead. No more than four steelhead may be taken during any seven consecutive days. It is unlawful for any person to take more than 20 steelhead in any calendar year. Steelhead anglers must have in their possession steelhead permit cards which are valid throughout this calendar year. There is a fee for these of \$1.00 each, and they are obtained from license vendors. Anglers are required to list steelhead catches on permits by date. In addition, they are asked to record the river section from which each fish is caught. Section numbers are shown on maps issued with each permit.

There are also big game season opening such as mountain goat, bighorn sheep, pronghorn antelope and moose. But with respect to rabbits early in September, comments may range from a devastating "oh?" to a flat "who hunts them?" Of course the hunter questionnaire every year shows that the people who actually do hunt cottontail and pygmy rabbits approach six digits, depending on what kind of rabbit population is found as the season progresses.

The little cottontail, actually, is the most important game animal in the United States. In many places, it is the only game animal existing in substantial and consistently hunt-able numbers. Millions are taken annually, and seasons are carefully regulated in spite of the tremendous reproductive capacity of the species.

A new year has started, reminds the Department of Law Enforcement, and motorists who had vehicles inspected last January are advised another inspection is due before the end of the month.

TWO RABBIT SPECIES ARE GOOD HUNTING AND EATING

Boise — The announcement of cottontail and pygmy rabbit hunting seasons each year from September 1 — February 23 — the longest of any Idaho game animal season — scarcely brings more than a disinterested "ho-hum" from many sportsmen.

Early fall is truly a time for indecision. There is so much gun sport in the offing. The shooting season is on for mourning doves, for example, opens September 1, the same day as cottontail and pygmy, to be followed shortly by opening for blue, ruffed and spruce grouse in sheep and goat units.

Some of the sportsmen do not overlook the early August 1 season on chukar partridge in the main Salmon River gorge (within one-half mile of the river) from the mouth of Sheep Creek above Riggins to Horse Creek and the Middle Fork of the Salmon upstream to the mouth of Indian Creek. Then, of course, is the general season on chukar, Huns, quail, sage grouse, sharp-tail and for-
