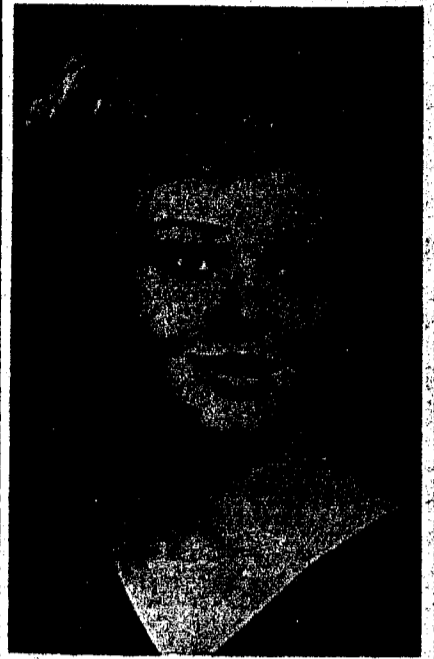
## ROCK CLUB

## COMMUNITY CENTER PROPOSED LOCALLY

A group of young people under the supervision of Mr. and Mrs. John Hunsberger (John Hunsberger is the student minister at the Kendrick United Methodist Church), has proposed the establishment of a Community Center to be located in the Methodist Church basement at Kendrick.

The main objectives of the center would be to provide a meeting place for people who have no other community resources; to provide a friendly, safe environment in which these people can congregate during leisure hours, come and go as they wish, and participate in a variety of recreational and social activities; to provide an opportunity for improving relations with the community and the police; to provide a place where young people and adults can communicate openly and to develop community service activities.

The Center would be open Friday and Saturday nights from 7:00 to midnight. The supplies and equipment necessary for the Center would be purchased by the young people through fund raising projects, donated by the community or provided by a sponsor.

At least one person not younger than 20 would be on the premises during all hours the Center was open and would make decisions reflecting the general policies. Finances would be handled by the teen council and there would be an adult advisory board consisting of professional people who would be available when needed.

## WINTER RETURNS, COLD AND SNOW

Winter weather returned to the area this week as March roared in like a lion, bringing with it snow, wind and temperatures that dipped down into the ten above readings on the thermometer. There were periods of sunshine, however, the mercury still stayed below the freezing mark.

## Bulldogs Gain District Hoop Finals; Kendrick Eliminated

Genesee High School's undefeated basketball team assured itself a berth in the District 2, Class A-3 tournament last week as they continued their winning skein with victories over Clearwater Valley and Lapwai. Kendrick was dropped into the consolation bracket with losses to Kamiah and Prairie. The tournament continues Wednesday evening.

Prairie faces a do-or-die situation Wednesday night when they meet the Kamiah Kubs to see which team will oppose Lapwai Thursday evening. The winner of the Thursday game will face Genesee in the finals Friday night. Should Genesee lose Friday evening, another game will be played Saturday to determine the Championship.

### Bulldogs At 22

Coach Ozzie Kanikbeberg's Bulldogs won their 21st and 22nd games without a defeat in the Tournament as they rolled past the Clearwater Valley Rams 49-25 Wednesday afternoon. Saturday the Bulldogs were forced down to the wire to take a 57-54 win from the determined Lapwai Wildcats.

In an effort to stymie the size and speed of the GHS team, Coach Terry Taylor sent his Clearwater Valley Rams into a stalling, slow-down game against the Bulldogs Wednesday afternoon in the opening game of the tournament. The Rams played their deliberate, slow brand of ball, trying to control the game and shoot only when they had a clear shot. The tactics slowed the game but didn't keep the Bulldogs from pulling out to a 9-2 first quarter lead. The Rams kept up the pressure until mid-way in the second quarter when Genesee broke loose and ran up 10 points in the last two minutes to have a 21-2 half-time advantage.

Genesee's big halftime lead forced the Rams to abandon their stall in the second half, and using his reserve strength freely, Coach Kanik-

berg saw his squad score 15 points in the third quarter and 13 in the final period to post their 49-25 win. Bruce Scharnhorst led the Genesee attack with 11 points. Alan Odenborg had 9, with Ron Hopkins and Bill Schluster each adding 8 more.

### Lapwai Tough

The determined Lapwai Wildcats fought the GHS Bulldogs right down to the wire in Saturday's contest before falling to the Bulldogs, 57-54 in the tournament's best game to date.

The Wildcats gave notice early in the battle that they had come to win. The two teams matched baskets for the first four minutes of the first quarter with Mike Egland leading the way, as he scored all of Genesee's first seven points on three field goals and a free throw. Lapwai then got red hot and ran up an 18-9 lead by the end of the first quarter.

Lapwai was still rolling on as the second period got under way and with less than six minutes remaining until the half they were out in front 22-12. After that Genesee began its slow battle back with Bill Schluster getting four points, Egland two more and Ron Hopkins hit another field goal. Al Odenborg also contributed a free throw as Genesee had closed the gap to 24-21 at the half as they had outscored the Wildcats 12-6 in that frame.

Big John Hermann put the Bulldogs ahead for the first time on a rebound tip-in with just four minutes left in the third quarter. Lapwai regained the lead but Hermann hit another field goal to put the GHS team ahead for good. Mike Egland found the range in the last two minutes of the third, and dumped in six points as the Bulldogs led 39-32 going into the final period.

Genesee looked like they were home free for the first part of the fourth quarter as they ran the score up to 45-38 with less than five minutes left to play. Lapwai put the pressure on the Bulldogs in the final minutes as they fought for possession of the ball while the Bulldogs were attempting to slow the game down. Ron Hopkins and Bill Schluster both weathered the fierce Lapwai press in good shape as the Bulldogs held on to win 57-54.

Mike Egland's 20 points paced all scorers with Ron Hopkins getting 14 and John Hermann 13.

## TIGERS NIPPED

Kendrick's spunky little ball team was tagged with a loss in the opening round of tournament play Wednesday evening as they watched a 37-33 three-quarter lead disappear in the final period as the Kamiah Kubs put on a 17-point rally to win 50-47.

Kendrick kept the heat on the Kubs all night long as they moved out to a 16-10 lead in the first quarter and were still ahead at the halftime 25-22 behind a solid team effort.

Kendrick outscored the Kamiah squad 12 to 11 in the third quarter behind their pressing attack and it looked as if they might go all the way as they went into the last quarter with a 37-33 lead. With about four minutes left in the game the Tigers put a stall on the ball and were attempting to coast home when they ran into trouble. Snyder from Kamiah hit a jump shot to close the gap to 45-42. Kendrick worked the ball back down the court and tried a shot that failed. Kamiah picked up the rebound and scored seconds later to make it 45-44. Kendrick again brought the ball down slowly and worked in deliberately for a good shot. Again they missed and the Kubs rebounded and this time Knight sank the shot that put Kamiah ahead. Kamiah held on in the final frantic minutes to post the 50-47 win.

Don Parks scored 11 points for the Tigers with Doug Pratt getting 9 more. Kim Trout, Dave Hutcherson and Dave Wilken each added 7 points and Alan Kimbley scored 6.

## PRAIRIE WINS

Prairie High School exploded for a 21-point third quarter effort while the Kendrick Tigers could manage only 10 points and that was the big difference as the Tigers were defeated 66-52 Saturday night.

Kendrick had outmaneuvered the Pirates in the first quarter and were ahead 12-9. The Tigers were outscored in the second quarter 13-11 but were still ahead with a slender 23-22 lead at the half. Kendrick was also plagued by coldness at the free throw line, connecting with only 4 of 16 attempts.

In their blistering third quarter, the Kubs caught the Tigers at 27-11 and then scored six more points which were unanswered by the Kendrick crew. Alan Kimbley finally put the Tigers back into the game with two field goals that made the score 33-31 with four minutes left, but the Pirates spurred back into a ten point lead, 43-33 at the end of the quarter.

In the final period the Pirates moved out to consolidate their lead and rolled home with a 66-52 win.

Again it was Don Parks who led the Kendrick scorers with 20 points for the game. Kim Trout scored 14, Kimbley 8 and Hutcherson 7.

**GENERAL THAW SLOWS WINTER ICE FISHING**

Anglers in many regions of Idaho are finding ice fishing "kaput" this winter, especially since early January, because spring-like weather made ice coverings over lakes and reservoirs either "rotten" and untrustworthy, or removed it entirely through melting.

The Idaho Fish and Game Department reported that some fishing is still available through holes in ice at Cascade Reservoir (perch); Jimmy Smith Lake on the East Fork of the Salmon River, where limits of trout have been caught; Stanley and Yellow Belly lakes, (brook trout); American Falls reservoir, where ice covering reaches about 11 feet out, and some fish are being caught; Weston and Johnson reservoir; Mud Lake (perch) Palisades (cutthroat and coho but fairly slow); Fish Creek Reservoir and Richfield Canal, (trout); Little Wood Reservoir; Little Carnas and Gramere.

There has not been much ice fishing available this year in the Panhandle, Clearwater, and Western regions of the state according to the department. Winchester Lake closed February 15. Spring Valley Reservoir ice and fishing season ended at the same time—February 15.

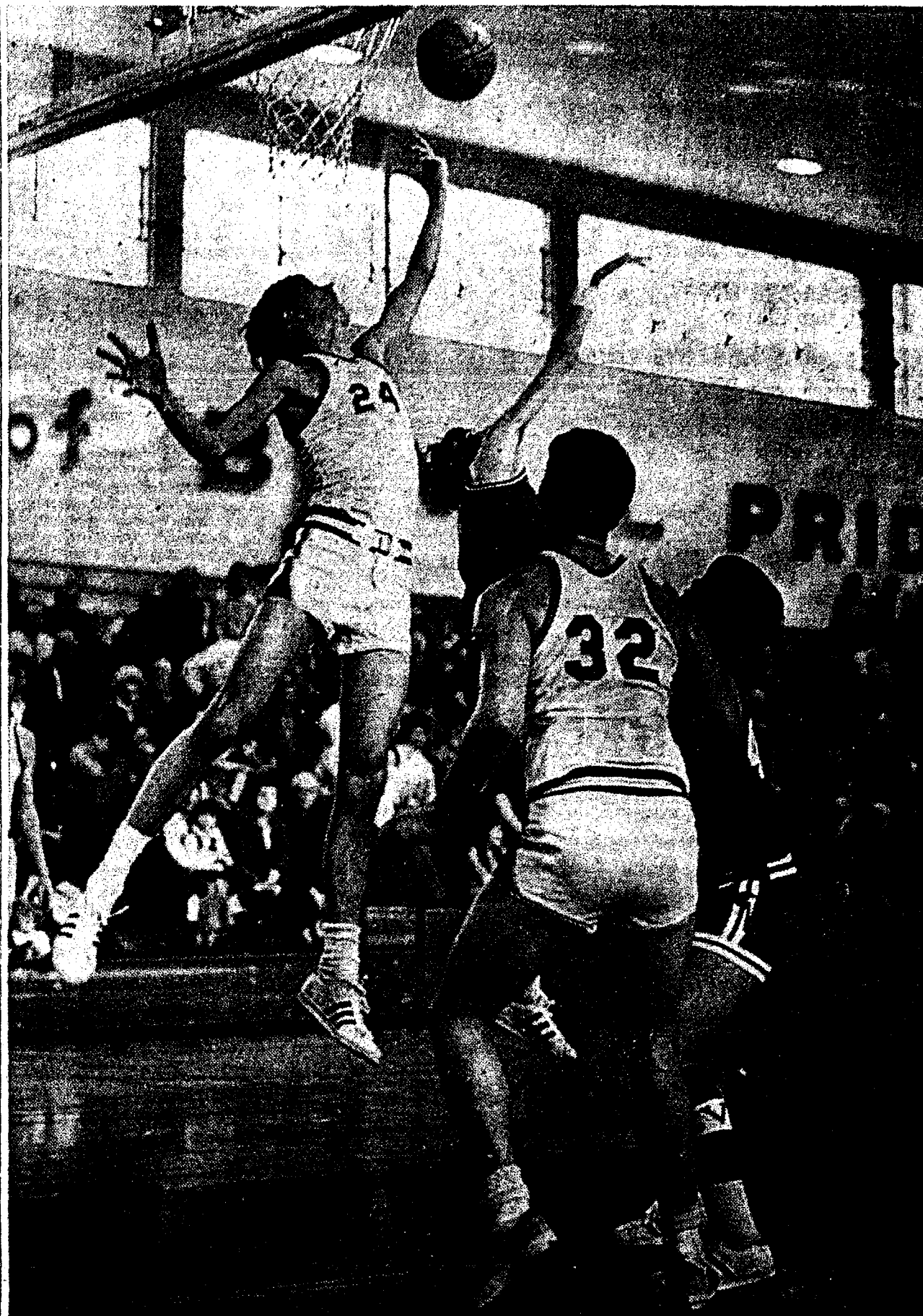

**Understanding Drugs IS Program's Goal**

**Orofino**—A new program at State Hospital North is aimed at improving community understanding of those with drug problems.

Dr. C. H. Auh, William Newman, psychologist and psychiatric nurse Mrs. John (Ariene) Anderson have films and will travel to any group that invites them to participate.

The five films provide information on "Uppers and Downers", LSD, marijuana and heroin. Following the film these three staff members and sometimes a patient, discuss problems and answer questions.

"The intent of the program is to help bridge the gap of communication between the parent and the youth. Parents cannot use scare tactics or punishment, but must provide love, security and understanding for their children," Dr. Auh said.

The hospital exists to help the young people who are admitted with their problems. If the youth is returned to the same situation in the family and community as when admitted, he many times develops the same problems again.

"Unless the community understands the problem, we are of less help," Dr. Auh said.

A second benefit of this hospital program is prevention and building of the bridge across the generation gap, according to Dr. Auh. "If we have communications across the gap—then there is no gap. Parents should not judge children by the parents' standards. We ask the kids to try to understand their parents, too. They must be able to talk to each other with understanding."

So far the trio of speakers has presented a program with patient participation for the Kamiah PTA student meeting. Dr. Auh and Mr. Newman appeared at a church oriented community meeting sponsored by the Luther League in Orofino. Dr. Auh showed all five films to the Orofino Junior High School student body. Mrs. Anderson and Mrs. John Belegante, a volunteer, presented the program at the Cameron Lutheran Church recently.

Beef Prices Down To Consumer

Boise, Idaho, Feb. 5, 1971 - "The consumer is in the driver's seat right now when it comes to buying beef, according to John McBoyle, chairman of the Idaho Beef Council, "but she'd better stock up soon, because higher prices are just around the corner." The combined effect of over production of beef with depressed cattle prices through much of 1970 caused retail beef prices to hold relatively steady while other food costs increased. Beef prices rose only three percent last year, as compared to a six percent rise in food cost generally.

Beef prices are as low as they are likely to be in the foreseeable future. "Because of this over supply, large quantities of quality beef are being sold at bargain prices," according to McBoyle, "but the supply should level off in the next few weeks and a rise in beef prices is anticipated."

IDAHO INCOME TAX REQUIREMENTS

Boise - The State Tax Commission said this week that Idaho filing requirements are substantially different from those for Federal Income Tax returns. Since the Idaho Income Tax Act was not amended to encompass the Federal filing requirements returns must be filed by resident single individuals whose gross income is \$600.00 or more, and resident married individuals filing jointly whose gross income is \$1,200.00 or more. An individual who is 65 years of age or over is entitled to add \$600.00 to the above amounts. Filing requirements of non-residents, part-year residents, and certain military personnel are less than these amounts since the requirement is computed by an Idaho Income total income formula. The filing requirements determine whether or not an individual is required to pay the Idaho Permanent Building Fund Tax of \$10.00; therefore, an individual may owe no State of Idaho Income Tax but would still be required to pay the \$10.00 minimum tax. Amendment of the Idaho filing requirements to conform to the Federal filing has been recommended by the State Tax Commission, but such an amendment would be effective only for 1971 returns filed after January 1, 1972.

YOU AND TAXES

Boise - Persons with net earnings of \$400.00 or more from self-employment must file Federal Income Tax returns and pay a self-employment tax, John C. Andrus, IRS, public information officer for Idaho said this week. The Tax Reform Act of 1969 liberalized filing requirements for many taxpayers so that, for example, a single person without self-employment income is not required to file a tax return unless he had income of \$1,700.00 or more in 1970. However, an individual must file a return if his self-employment income was \$400.00 or more, even if a return would not have been required based on his total income. By filing a return and paying a self-employment tax on part or all of his income, each self-employed person helps finance Social Security benefits that are payable to self-employed persons as well as wage earners. Besides filing an individual income tax return, a self-employed individual must complete Schedule SE (Form 1040), Computation of Social Security Self-Employment Tax. Copies of this form are available at IRS offices.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE DOWN

Moscow - The number of persons seeking unemployment insurance has dropped in Latah County, as many construction workers return to their jobs. During the past week 373 persons received jobless pay compared to 392 last week and 394 a year ago. A total of 32 new claims were filed during the week. Moscow area residents receiving benefits total 190, in addition to 14 in Genesee, 80 in the Troy-Deary-Bovill area, 13 in Kendrick, 71 in Pottlatch and 4 in Elk River. Eight persons were placed on jobs by the Moscow office, reports Frank J. Harstein, manager. Twelve new jobs were received and at the close of the week there were 13 jobs available. Current openings include: Babysitters, cook, cocktail waitress, posting-machine operator, stenographer, office clerk, insurance salesman, radio repairman, office machine repair man and ranch hand.

Wednesday afternoon, February 24, the Hill and Valley Garden Club met at the Kendrick Fire Hall with 18 members and two guests in attendance. Roll call was answered with members giving information on propagation of their scrapbook plants.

Mrs. Armitage commended all those responsible for the Therapy class held at State Hospital North on the afternoon of February 17. Each member had contributed cookies and game prizes, and 14 ladies attended the workshop. There was a noticeable difference in the age level that was ministered to at the hospital this year — many more very young people. Disturbed and inse-

sure youth — yet so appreciative of the gay Valentine decorations, good food, music, and games.

Business included the Club decision to have a flower display and plant and "props" sale at the Locust Blossom Festival this spring rather than present a standard flower show. ### LEGISLATIVE REPORT H. B. MCCLAIN DIES FROM GEO. F. BROCKE AT JULIAETTA

Boise (Feb. 26) — Today is the 46th day of the 1st session of the Idaho Legislature. This leaves 14 days for the legislature to complete its work if it is to finish in the 60 days allotted by law. So far we have had no appropriation bills with general fund monies before us. However, these bills are now being considered by the Finance and Appropriation Committee, and should be forthcoming next week.

If these bills, which should deal with general fund monies, should come out next week and they meet no strong opposition on the floor the Legislature should finish within 60 days.

The Senate passed a Kindergarten bill that would create a statewide kindergarten program. It is estimated that there are some 14,700 to 18,000 youngsters in the state that could be enrolled in this program. The bill provides that the state finance the program, allowing at least the sum of \$320.00 per student. The cost of this program would be from state level some place between \$4.5 to \$5.5 million. This money would come from the present school fund program, being taken from the top of the monies appropriated for public schools.

I understand that the amount of monies that the Finance and Appropriations Committee is suggesting for public schools is \$43,000,000. If you take \$4.5 million to operate the kindergarten from this amount, the foundation program will have a net amount of some million dollars less than what is being spent this year. This would mean only one thing, the local school districts would have to levy more property taxes in order to carry on the public school operations.

The Kindergarten bill is now in the House Education Committee with action set for March 2.

The Education Committee is still working on major legislation. Two bills have been offered in regard to school reorganization or in better terms, a school district consolidation bill.

One bill would set up a commission to formulate plans for consolidation, and the other would put the plans offered into operation. So far these bills are being held in committee. They were presented by the State Board.

The Commission bill carries an appropriation of some \$45,000.00 to fund the commission. (Note): With the shortage of money for public schools this type of legislation is really ridiculous. These bills may not see any action this year.

This coming week the House will have before it the pay bill passed by the Senate. This bill provides for a \$10.00 per day for legislators that have to maintain two homes while in Boise, and a pay of \$3.50 per day when not in session. Another bill will be out in which the people can again vote on legislative pay.
