



Coho Fingerling Ready Nearly three million coho salmon fingerling hatched in Idaho facilities are ready to release in Idaho waters as soon as roads and water conditions permit. These fingerling hatched at Idaho hatcheries at Hagerman, Hayspur, American Falls, Mackay, Eagle, Ashton, Mullan and Grace from eggs received from the lower Columbia River. The purpose of planting coho in Idaho waters has been to supplement the normal stocking program of reservoirs in an attempt to improve fishing. This is strictly experimental.
