# 26 Magic Number; Bulldogs Win State Championship

Coach Ozzie Kanikkeberg and his victorious GHS Bulldogs came home to a heroes' welcome Monday afternoon, bringing with them the trophy and the title of Class A3 Basketball Champions of the State of Idaho. The team won the championship Saturday evening, March 6, at Rexburg to culminate the best season any Genesee basketball team has ever compiled—a perfect 26 game winning streak with no losses to mar their record.

A large motor caravan of happy Genesee sport fans met the 1971 champs at the top of the Lewiston Hill and escorted them into Genesee Monday afternoon.

Only in their second year as an A3 team, Genesee brought the state's only perfect record into the tournament and fought like champions to preserve it as they defeated Teton High School 61-46 Thursday afternoon; staged a real thriller Friday afternoon to edge Homedale 54-53 and advance to the finals. Saturday night the Bulldogs fought off a last ditch rally by the Sugar-Salem High School squad to become the 1971 champions.

Genesee weathered the usual "first game jitters" in the first quarter, went ahead in the second quarter, faltered in the third period and then stormed home in a 23 point outpouring in the final frame to defeat the

Genesee Basket Does It

Big John Herman, whose performances were steady and reliable, but never shiny during the season, had his moment of glory Friday as he swung around calmly and dropped in a beautiful hook shot with just 16 seconds left on the board to give Genesee back a 54-53 lead and win the second game of the tournament from Homedale. Ron Hopkins stole the ball away from Paul Pearson, the Homedale center, with 8 seconds left to stop that team's last chance to shoot.

Homedale, hitting well from the free throw line moved out to a narrow 16-15 first quarter lead but the Bulldogs tied it all up in the second with Mike Egland's two free throws. Bill Schlueter popped in a 15-foot field goal at the buzzer to give Genesee the halftime margin 26-26.

Teton wasn't finished yet, as they came out in the third period to outscore the Bulldogs 13-11 and were back to within three points, 38-35, as the fourth quarter got under way.

Genesee, paced by the hot hand of guard Ron Hopkins, scored 23 points in the final quarter while holding the Teton team to just 11 points to seal the win. Genesee had a ten-point lead with about three minutes to play and Hopkins went to the free throw line three times, scoring six points, all on one-and-one shots in the last two minutes to delight the Genesee fans and seal the victory. His 18 points led all scorers with Mike Egland's 17 point effort right behind. Schlueter scored 12, John Hermann 8, and Bruce Scharnhorst 6.

Both teams turned the ball over many times but stayed even with each other in the first quarter as that period ended 14-14. In the second quarter the Bulldogs and Teton traded baskets up until the score reached 20-20 and then Genesee's superior height and the rebounding skill of Bruce Scharnhorst pushed the Bulldogs into a 27-22 halftime lead.

# Genesee Council Heard Many Topics Monday

Lustig recommended that grass and vegetation around the lagoon should not be cut to facilitate nesting.

The council will check with the area sanitation and weed control commission to determine if this is feasible. The University will keep the city council informed as to any other findings that come of this study.

Mrs. Charles Swenson, a representative of the Latah County Solid Waste Committee met with members of the council to discuss the county and city's mutual solid waste disposal problems.

The foremost problem discussed was the immediate need for a suitable site for dumping garbage in the area.

Glen T. Utzman, CIA, of Moscow, presented the audit report for the year ending December 31, 1970. He stated that the city was doing a good job of handling its finances and staying within budgetary limits.

He also indicated that the charges for water and sewer were probably not covering the expenditures. The council will make a further study of this matter.

Councilman John W. Myers, street commissioner, reported that the Genesee-Rimrock Highway District is willing to assist the city on the street situation by doing some work of general maintenance, such as grading, for a fee to be worked out later.

The council accepted this proposal and will meet with the road district to work out the details.

In other business, the city agreed to pay 1/3 of the cost of 18 badges for new firemen, with the county paying 1/3, and the firemen 1/3.

The Police Bond Clerks for the City of Genesee are Chester O. Green, Bernard J. Grieser and Donald E. Springer, who were appointed by the City Council at a previous meeting.

The Council had rejected the proposed LED for paving of the city streets, due to lack of signatures.

The Council also OK'd a request by the Civic Association to dig a sewer line from the new Picnic Shelter at the city park to the street.

**ORDINANCE NO. 154**  
**AN ORDINANCE TERMED "ANNUAL APPROPRIATION BILL" APPROPRIATING MONEY FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFRAYING ALL NECESSARY EXPENSES AND LIABILITIES OF THE CITY OF JULIAETTA, LATAH COUNTY, STATE OF IDAHO, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING ON THE FIRST DAY OF JANUARY, 1971, AND ENDING ON THE THIRTY-FIRST DAY OF DECEMBER, 1971, AND CREATING AND ALLOTING SAID APPROPRIATION TO CERTAIN FUNDS OUT OF WHICH SUCH EXPENSES SHALL BE PAID.**

**SECTION 1.** There is hereby appropriated out any monies in the treasury of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho, not otherwise appropriated, and out of any revenue which the City of Juliaetta may acquire between the first day of January, 1971, and the thirty-first day of December, 1971, the sum of \$35,872.00 for the purpose of defraying all necessary expenses and liabilities of such corporation for the fiscal year beginning on the first day of January 1971, and ending on the thirty-first day of December, 1971.

**SECTION 2.** There are hereby created the following funds: A. GENERAL FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$21,000.00 out of the above appropriation for the general expenses of said City. B. WATER FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$12,000.00 out of the above appropriation for the expenses of maintenance and improvement of the water system of the City of Juliaetta, Idaho. C. FIRE DEPARTMENT FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$1,900.00 out of the above appropriation for fire department purposes. D. WATER REVENUE BOND REDEMPTION FUND, to which is hereby allotted the sum of \$472.00 out of the above appropriation for the bond interest and redemption of bond numbered 10.

**SECTION 3.** This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and the first publication thereof.

**Home Cookin' . .**

 4 medium-sized carrots, cut in half crosswise and lengthwise  
 1 pound turnips, pared and cut in quarters  
 1 leek or 3 green onions cut in 1-inch pieces  
 1 can (15 ounces) garbanzo beans, drained  
 1 cup tomato juice  
 1/4 cup water  
 1/3 cup quick cooking tapioca  
 1/2 teaspoon rosemary  
 2 teaspoons salt  
 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Place beef, carrots, turnips, leek, garbanzo beans, tomato juice, water, tapioca, rosemary, salt and pepper in a Dutch oven. Combine thoroughly. Cover and cook in slow oven (300 d) for 2 to 3 1/2 hours until meat is tender. Stir occasionally. 8 servings.

**Coho Fingerling Ready**  
 Nearly three million coho salmon fingerling hatched in Idaho facilities are ready to release in Idaho waters as soon as roads and water conditions permit. These fingerling were hatched at Idaho hatcheries at Eggerman, Hayspur, American Falls, Mackay, Eagle, Ashton, Mullan and Grace from eggs received from the lower Columbia River. The purpose of planting coho in Idaho waters has been to supplement the normal stocking program of reservoirs in an attempt to improve fishing. This is strictly experimental.

Water, one of America's greatest natural resources, is being polluted by community wastes, agricultural chemicals and industrial wastes, notes the Idaho Medical Association.

With our growing population, the need for water is increasing tremendously. The daily rate of consumption is 2,000 gallons per person.

It's called "Corrals for Working and Handling Beef Cattle." The authors are Roy Taylor, agricultural engineer, Moscow; Ed Duren, area livestock specialist, Soda Springs; and John Henry area livestock specialist, Caldwell.

Free copies are on hand in the county agent's office.

The bulletin tells where to locate a corral to avoid drainage problems, the most suitable size for the ranch, how to construct working chutes, arrangement of dipping vats and other devices for control of pests, location of scales, and how to plan and build sorting pens and holding areas. There are drawings and pictures, too.

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## Regular Session Of Legislature Ends

This is the last day of the 41st session of the Idaho Legislature. The third reading calendar had a total of 49 bills for action today. This is the heaviest calendar that has come before us. Today (March 11), the final writing of appropriation bills should take place and as soon as action is taken on these appropriation bills the Legislature should be ready to close down and bring to an end the first session of the 41st. As soon as this session ends there will be a special session called by the Governor to deal with the problem of re-apportionment of the Congressional Districts and the Legislative Districts. It should take about a week to deal with these problems. The major legislation dealt with has been in such things as the field of surface mining, a farm labor act, a new type of public school formula, an act allowing the sale of table wines, through local option, limiting the sale of out of state big game hunting licenses and a teacher's negotiation act. Other legislation passed was the Uniform Commercial Code, the revision of the Probate Code, a revision of the Workmen's Compensation Law, and rewriting of the Election Laws. At this time the House has had introduced a total of 322 bills and the Senate's total is 248, making a total of 570 bills, which is almost half the number of bills handled in past sessions. Some of the bills will be carried over until the last half of the 41st in 1972. Also some of the legislation passed this session will have to be amended
