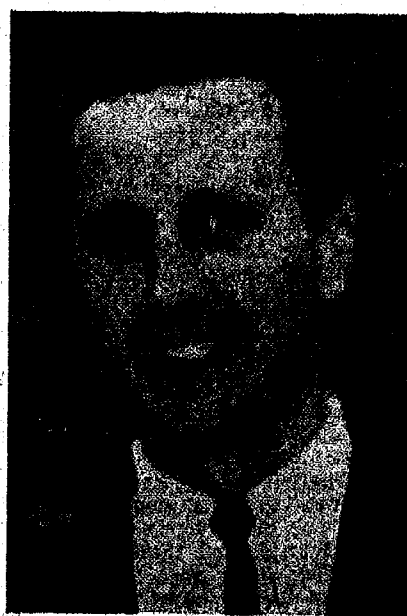

Kanikkeberg Named North Idaho Coach of Year

Genesee—The rest of North Idaho made official what Genesee people had known for a long time now—that Ozzie Kanikkeberg is North Idaho's Coach of the Year for 1970. The Genesee High principal and coach received the award last Wednesday night at the annual Idaho Sports Banquet held in Coeur d'Alene.

The award came just a week after his 1971 basketball team won the Class A3 State tournament at Rexsberg. But it was for his 1970 achievements that Ozzie was selected as the outstanding coach. His 1970 basketball team was also nominated for team of the year honors but lost out in the voting to the Clarks Fork High School squad.

Kanikkeberg came to Genesee in 1955 and in his sixteen years of guiding the fortunes of the GHS ball teams has led his Bulldogs to two state basketball championships, the first in 1964 then again this year; and compiled one of the most outstanding records in eight and eleven man football the state has known. Ozzie is a graduate of Kendrick



High School and the University of Idaho.

The Kendrick Farm Institute, March 17, at the Fraternal Temple was sponsored by the Kendrick Lions Club, in cooperation with the County Extension Offices of Latah and Nez Perce Counties.

This years program proved to be most interesting, covering a wide wide variety of subjects. A movie, "Clean Water", and a slide show on "Our Environment" opened the meeting.

Dr. Glen Murray, Agronomist, U. of I. and Homer Futter, Latah Extension Agent, told of New Crop Varieties, and Our New Seed Program. These included some new wheat and barley developments which will be ready for release in this area. New seed varieties will be handled under the Crop Improvement Association.

Mrs. Marian Tenny, Latah Director of Department of Public Assistance explained how the Welfare Program is handled, and how recipients for the Commodity Foods were approved. John Jennings, Field Representative, explained the new changes in the Social Security Program.

At the free lunch at noon provided by the Lions Club, 130 went through the line. This called for twelve pounds of baked beans, thirty-eight pounds of potato salad, ten dozen rolls, ten dozen doughnuts and two and a half pounds of coffee.

Edgar Oliver Bohn, 77, former Kendrick resident died Thursday, March 18, at Orofino.

Born at Park, Idaho, October 19, 1893, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Bohn. His father farmed and did carpenter work at Park and young Bohn attended school there until he began logging in the Park, Deary and Bovill area. He worked for Potlatch Forest, Inc., for several years at Elk River and then as a sawyer in mills throughout north central Idaho, including Shearer's Mill at Elk City from 1962 to 1965. He also was a sawyer for Mead and Howard Lumber Co. at Juliaetta for several years and later helped as caretaker for the parks in Kendrick.

He was married to the former Celia McPhee at Lewiston September 27, 1922, and then moved to Kendrick in 1965 where he was semi-retired. They moved to Orofino in 1968 where he maintained the Sof Spru car Wash. Bohn had been in ill health for the last several years.

He was a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows at Orofino and the Ascension Lutheran Church.

He is survived by his widow at home, a daughter, Mrs. Lindsey (Alfreda) Haynes at Coeur d'Alene; a sister, Mrs. R. J. Garner, Clarkston; two brothers, Axtell and Arthur Bohn, both of Lewiston.

Funeral services were held Monday at Gilbert's Funeral Chapel at Orofino with the Rev. Wendell Stakkestad, pastor of the Ascension Lutheran Church, officiating.

Constable Sandberg is getting ready for another holdup, having purchased a new overcoat and gun in lieu of the one taken by the bandits last week. John doesn't think he will shed them so easily next time and we would not like to be in the shoes of the man that tries it.

Wednesday night at about 11 o'clock the town was startled by the sound of a revolver shot from somewhere near the meat market. The bullet flew diagonally across the street and penetrated the door of Terry's saloon, passing through the screen door on the inside and lodging in the fixtures.

A number of children have been out of school the past week with a peculiar disease for which there does not seem to be a fitting name. It begins with a heavy cold and sore throat and as the disease proceeds the glands of the neck become swollen and there are gatherings in the ears and head. While there have been no extremely serious cases, several have had it so severely as to excite alarm.

For minor burns from stove or matches, quick dousing in cold water seems to promote faster pain relief and faster healing, overcomes the Idaho Medical Association.

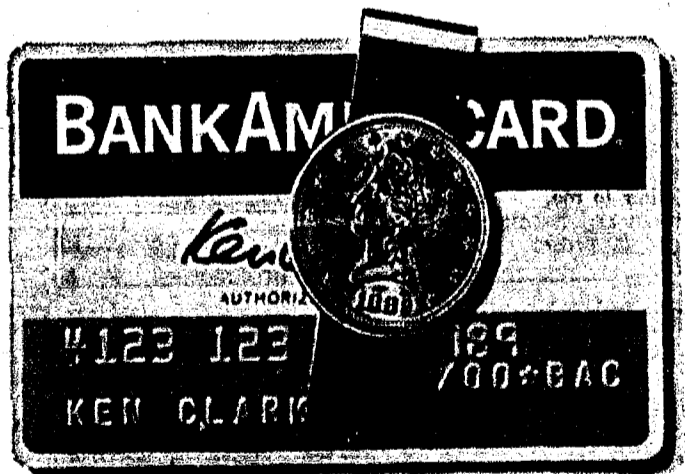

He was employed with the Genesee Union Warehouse Co., operated a shoe repair shop in his home and had the garbage pick-up in Genesee until poor health forced him to retire.

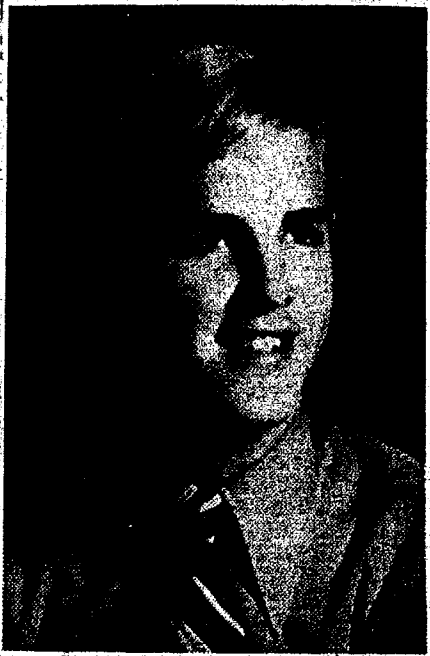

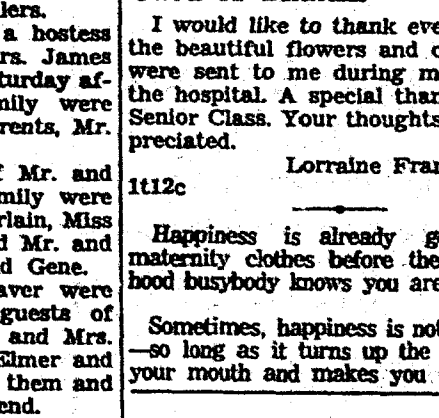

Alert Given To Owners Of Corvair Automobiles

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, issued a Consumer Protection Bulletin on January 14, 1971, to alert owners of 1961 through 1969 model year Corvairs to this possible condition in the operation of their direct air heaters. This bulletin was based on our preliminary investigation begun last September.

Since the date of our Consumer Protection Bulletin, a larger, less biased sampling of Corvairs has been tested for carbon monoxide concentrations during heater operation. While this larger sample has shown lower frequency of vehicles exhibiting abnormal carbon monoxide concentrations, our concern for the motorist's health and safety continues.

We welcome this opportunity to reiterate our warning to Corvair owners and our recommendations that they drive with a window open when using the heater.

Mr. Toms, on January 14, 1971, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration said that "the public should be alerted to the potential health and safety hazards indicated by the preliminary findings" of its investigation of the Corvair heaters. Action Corvair Owners Should Take First would you agree that the Corvair owners should refrain from using their heaters to the extent that they can?

Mr. Toms: Yes. Senator Hartke: Would you suggest that Corvair owners operate their vehicles with their windows down an inch whenever possible?

Mr. Toms: Yes. Senator Hartke: Would you urge owners of Corvairs in those areas where testing equipment is available, to have their cars checked for carbon monoxide levels?

Mr. Toms: If they can find a place where they can check officially with a proper tester, yes; and take a minimum check by a mechanic for fumes and tightness of bolts.

Senator Hartke: Would you advise those owners of Corvairs who decide to seek repairs to be cautious?

Mr. Toms: Yes. Senator Hartke: That they might only have temporary repairs?

Mr. Toms: I think that is very important.

Senator Hartke: And also that the repairs might be quite costly if they are not covered by the warranty?

Mr. Toms: Yes. Senator Hartke: Is that a fair summary?

Mr. Toms: I think that is a fair summary.

Senator Hartke: Mr. Toms is it my understanding that you are continuing this investigation of the Corvair heater. Is this correct?

Mr. Toms: Yes, absolutely.

Senator Hartke: When do you think the final investigation will be complete?

Mr. Toms: It is our hope that it will be completed some time in late March or at the very latest, early in April. Senator Hartke: I don't think I

need to remind you that this committee is very anxious for you to complete that investigation and have that report as soon as possible.

Mr. Toms: We wished very much we could have completed it before the winter months.

Senator Hartke: In other words, you expect at least the outside by the first of April to have a complete report and recommendation at that time, right?

Mr. Toms: Correct.

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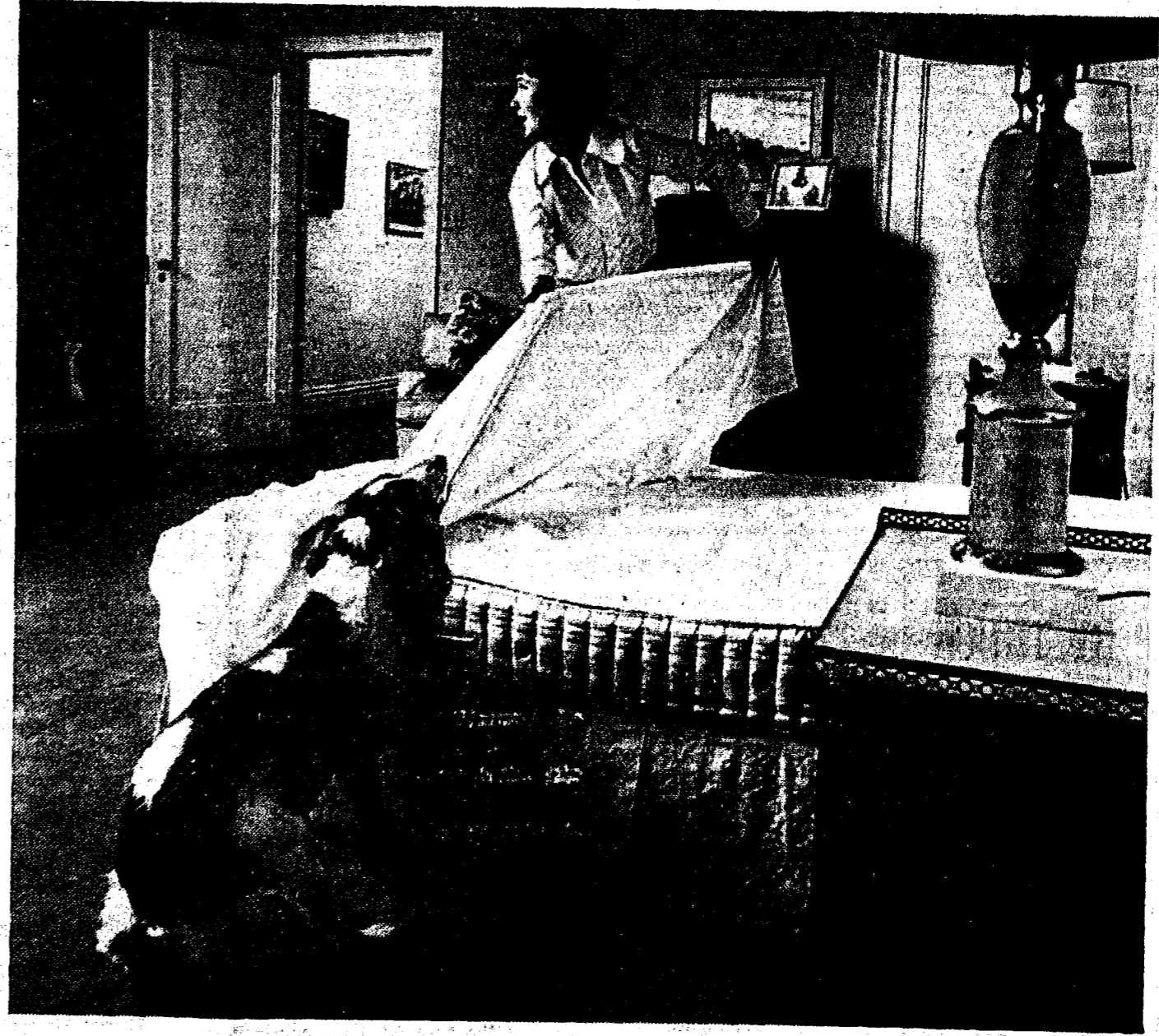
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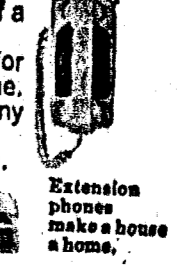

WILDLIFE VIEWPOINT

The Study of Water

Limnology (the study of freshwater bodies of water) is my subject for this week. It is a fascinating one and a fisherman can put the knowledge in this field to good use once he learns some of the basic ideas. One of the main findings in limnology is that most lakes and reservoirs develop different temperatures at various levels in the water. During most of the year the colder water which is heavier remains at the lower levels and the warmer water at high levels. This arrangement of water levels affects the food available for fish and where they can be located in the lake. For example, in Pend Oreille Lake the kokanee salmon is found at levels from over 100 feet deep in the winter to right near the surface during the spring. This migration to different levels is determined by both temperature and food supply. Each year lakes such as Pend Oreille have water turnovers in the spring and the fall. The heavier water near the top exchanges places with that near the bottom until there is a thorough mixing. This mixing is also accelerated by wind action. It is very beneficial for all the living organisms in the lake because it brings new nutrients to the surface layers and these, combined with the sun's energy, produce abundant food. For the kokanee this food is plankton. Plankton comes in many forms with most of the plants and animals in it being microscopic. However, such things as the group of freshwater shrimps are easily visible to the eye when swimming in the water. Kokanee have a special arrangement of five "rakers" on their gills that allow them to strain out the microscopic plankton. Because of this adaptation the kokanee can live in open water and utilize smaller food than other species of fish, such as rainbow trout. The spring turnover occurs about mid-April in Pend Oreille Lake and this is when the kokanee come to the upper layers because of the abundant food. It is also one of the best fishing periods. The fishery biologist can put this knowledge of fishes' food habits to good use. In addition to trout, we have recommended planting kokanee in Dworshak Reservoir when it is filled because there will not be adequate food produced along the steep banks and fluctuating water areas near shore for trout. In a natural lake the shallow water areas around its margins are the most productive. Another basic idea in wildlife or fishery management is that the most productive soils produce the largest number of animals, birds, or fish just like any other crop. Since Dworshak Reservoir has poor soils primarily composed of granitic sand then there will be an initial release of nutrients into the water and it should pro-

duce lots of plankton. Studies on reservoirs of this type have shown they produce well at the beginning but don't maintain their productivity. Oxygen levels in the water also determine the depth fish are using. During the summer and winter periods the water becomes stratified (layered) with a definite break between the upper, warmer layer and colder layer below. This break is called the thermocline and is where most of the fish are found because the nutrients are stopped by the heavier, colder water below. A fisherman can lower a special thermometer, find this thermocline and set his line depth accordingly. The oxygen levels are usually below those required by fish in the lower layer because plants in the plankton mass do not receive sunlight below about 100 feet in these clear lakes. Since the plants are the ones that produce oxygen for fish in the water, the fish utilize those areas where plants can receive sunlight. This oxygen-deficient layer holds true in reservoirs too and when the water is taken out below the thermocline then the oxygen content is low. This is one of the main reasons why oxygen levels in the Snake River below Hell's Canyon have been dangerous to fish during the summer.

It is important to us as humans to understand the food chain and how we receive our food. In Pend Oreille Lake the plankton receive energy from the sun and grow, then the kokanee feed on them and we, in turn, feed on the kokanee. This arrangement of something bigger feeding on something smaller right down to the plants is go-

Go Ahead and Sneeze!

If you feel like sneezing—sneeze. Just remember to muffle the sneeze with a handkerchief or tissue so that other persons will be protected as much as possible, advises the Idaho Medical Association. Do not try to stop a sneeze. When one tries to choke off a sneeze, the greatly increased pressure in nasal air passages may force disease germs and mucus into the sinuses or up into the ears, through the small tubes that lead from each side of the throat to the middle ear. A sinus infection or middle-ear infection can be much more serious than an ordinary cold. Holding the breath to suppress a sneeze also causes pressure to build up inside the chest, which could have an undesirable effect on persons with chronic lung disorders. Guard others from your sneeze, but do not try to block it.

ing on all around us in the world. Studies have shown that very small amounts of pesticides or other chemical pollution can kill plankton. These pollution levels may be lower than those required to kill kokanee or people, but if they eliminate the base of our food chain we're going to starve. The principles applied in wildlife or fisheries management can also be applied to humans.



Home Cookin'

JELLIED VEGETABLE SALAD

Whether you prefer a salad with cooked or raw vegetables, this basic recipe can be used for either, substituting the cooked vegetables, such as carrots and peas, if preferred:
1 package lemon jello
1 cup boiling water
1/2 cup cold water
1 tablespoon vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup finely shredded cabbage
1/2 cup finely shredded carrots
1 cup diced celery
1/2 cup cucumber cubes (optional)
1/2 cup shredded pimiento
Dissolve gelatin in boiling water, then add cold water, vinegar, and salt. Allow to chill, and when about ready to set add vegetables. If using canned vegetables, drain well. Turn into mold and place in refrigerator to set, and when ready to serve, turn out on lettuce leaves, edges of which have been dipped in paprika. Serve with half mayonnaise and half whipped cream.

However, remember that this applies to small, minor burns such as the housewife gets from the kitchen stove or the electric iron.

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
