

Wildlife Depredation Charges Damage complaints from wildlife depredations were about 4 percent higher last year than during 1969. with beaver complaints leading all species as a cause for complaints. During the year, 146 of 449 damage complaints (or about one third) were caused by beaver. Other leading causes were made by pheasants, 19 percent; bear, 12 percent; waterfowl, 8 percent; deer and ducks, 7 percent each; geese, 5 percent; elk and non-game birds, 2 percent each; antelope, 1 percent, and other upland game birds and other predatory animals

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
