### Clearwater Steelhead, Trout Seasons Closed

As a means of obtaining adequate numbers of spawning steelhead for tributary streams such as the Selway and Lochsa Rivers and the big Dworshak Hatchery, the Idaho Fish and Game Commission, in a special meeting by telephone at Boise, Thursday, announced that all trout and steelhead fishing in the Clearwater River and its tributary streams shall be closed from April 5 through April 30, 1971.

R. J. Holmes, chairman of the Commission, added that "trout season had been closed along with steelhead to protect juvenile steelhead from Dworshak Hatchery which collect as down stream migrants around the mouths of tributary streams in the main Clearwater River and are quite vulnerable to fisherman, thereby reducing future spawning runs of these fish."

He added that severe losses of adult steelhead moving upstream to spawning beds in headwater streams and downriver migrants, have had severe losses in the lower Snake and Columbia rivers as a result of the nitrogen super-saturation problems. This also is making severe inroads into chinook salmon stocks and both species in Idaho are expected to be at low levels during the next few years, according to Terry Holubetz, Lewiston, regional fisheries biologist.

Idaho anglers should expect reduced seasons and bag limits on both species to protect present stocks and future runs. He said that downstream fishery management agencies should adopt conservative policies for these fish species at this time.

Holubetz said that low steelhead numbers are being observed migrating over the Snake River dams this spring. The count of steelhead at Lewiston dam is far below average for this time of year. Dworshak has less than 1,000 adult fish to meet its spawning needs, and needs a minimum of 3,200 fish. In addition, the usual escapement of spawning steelhead over the Lewiston Dam is about 25,000 annually, compared to 11,305 in 1971 to date.

About 5,000 Clearwater steelhead have been harvested this year.

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### Troy Bank Subject of National Story

(Ed's Note—This is a story that has appeared in many daily newspapers across the nation and gives a unique insight to First Bank of Troy. Parker McCreary clipped this story from the Boise Statesman and mailed it on to us.)

Troy, Idaho—How many banks would make a loan to someone who once held up the place?

The First Bank of Troy in this tiny (population 514) farm center in Northern Idaho did.

But then there probably isn't another bank in the United States quite like the First Bank of Troy.

The bank robber escaped with \$5,400. He gambled all but \$1,200 before he was caught. He served three years in prison.

"He's paid his debt to society," said Frank O. Brocke, president of the bank. "I think he's learned his lesson. I don't hold past mistakes against him. I think he's a much more stable, mature individual now."

"When he asked me for a loan to finance a car recently, I told him I was willing to take a chance. I think he's going to make it. He's been making his payments regularly."

The First Bank of Troy, (about 20 miles north of Moscow), is unusual in many ways.

More than 6,000 persons have accounts there. That's 12 times as many people as live here.

The bank's current deposits are in excess of \$15 million. That figures to roughly \$30,000 for every man, woman and child living here.

The explanation for all this is that people in 45 states and around the world—in Japan, Germany, Australia, South America, Africa and Pogo Pago—do their banking by mail with the First Bank of Troy.

The success of the small bank, one of a half dozen independent banks still flourishing in Idaho, is due to its president, Frank Brocke.

Brocke, 65, joined the bank as cashier in 1928. He was 20.

Deposits dropped to a low of \$250,000 during the depression when many other small banks folded.

"We managed to squeak by," Brocke said from behind a stack of correspondence on his desk.

"I guess we've been pretty lucky mainly because of the personal attention we give all our customers," he added modestly.

"We don't lose many accounts once we get them."

Waino Lauri, retired Conoga Park, (Calif.) high school math teacher, explained why he chooses to bank by mail in Troy rather than with a large chain bank around the corner from his California home.

"I started an account with the bank in 1934 when I was in charge of a CCC camp outside Troy. They've always rendered such good service, I just kept banking with them."

"Do you know I've received a personal note at least once a month from Frank Brocke all these years—asking about the family, telling about the latest happenings in Troy. That's the way he is."

"I was in the Army during World War II and the Korean thing. The allotment checks to my wife were fouled up for several months when I was in Korea."

Frank told my wife to go ahead and keep writing checks for our expenses, that he'd cover them at no cost until the Army got its bookkeeping squared away. That's the kind of person he is."

Lauri insists there's no inconvenience banking by mail and says cashing checks on an out-of-town bank presents no problems, adding:

"The 1st Bank of Troy's reputation surprisingly is well known to most bankers in every state and country I've ever been in."

Eldon Strom, 62, mayor of Troy and owner of an electrical business in the town says:

"Frank Brocke put Troy on the map. This place is known all over the country, all over the world because of Frank."

"It's that personal touch of his. He writes personal notes regularly to

all of his depositors. He's got a terrific memory. He never forgets any one he's ever met or deals with.

"How many other bank presidents do you know you can call any hour of the day or night and get through to? If people can't reach him at the bank, they call him at home."

The bank has a policy of not charging for services. There's no charge for writing checks regardless of how little the balance, no escrow fees, and no charge for other services usually subject to a charge by other banks.

When someone with a loan runs into finance difficulty, Brocke carries that person until he's back on his feet, without dunning him, without piling up interest charges.

He places a great deal of faith in the integrity of 99 percent of the people and claims to have had only a handful of loans go sour during the last 40 years.

"At my age I can tell immediately whether it's a good or bad risk. As a rule I don't miss," he says.

The bank, located in an old-style yellow brick building in the middle of the two-block long business district, is the biggest employer in town. Nineteen people work full time at teller's windows and at desks. The post office across the street delivers more than 1,000 pieces of mail daily.

It is one of the few if not the only bank in the country that has a kitchen in the back where employees cook their noon meals.

"Frank Brocke and the First Bank of Troy," said Mayor Strom, "are the wonder of the whole of Northern Idaho."

#### HOME-MADE BREAD

- 2 pkgs. dry yeast
- 2 cups warm water
- 2 tbsl. sugar
- 1 tbsl. salt
- ¾ cup cooking oil
- 6 cups flour

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Stir in sugar, salt, oil and 3 cups of flour. Beat until smooth. Mix in enough remaining flour to make dough easy to handle. Turn dough onto lightly floured bread board and knead for about 10 minutes (until smooth and elastic). Place in greased bowl, brush top with

#### BEAN AND MEAT CASSEROLE

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 medium onion, minced,
- 1 clove garlic
- 3 tbsl. soy sauce
- 1½ cups water
- 1 tbsl. dark molasses (optional)
- 1 pkg. frozen green beans, broken up
- 3 tbsl. cornstarch
- ¾ cup cold water
- 3 to 4 cups cooked rice

Cook and stir beef and onion in skillet until meat is brown and onion tender. Stir in garlic, 1½ cups water and the soy sauce and molasses. Heat to boiling. Add beans (broken), heat again to boiling. Reduce heat and simmer uncovered 15 minutes.

Blend cornstarch and ¼ cup cold water, stir gradually into meat mixture. Cook, stirring constantly until mixture thickens and comes to boil. Boil, and stir about one minute. Serve over rice.

### Mackinaw Trout Season Nears At Priest Lake

Priest Lake's special fishing season for giant Mackinaw trout runs from April 15 through December 15 with gaff hooks prohibited when landing fish from a boat from April 15 to April 30 and December 1 to December 15 the Idaho Fish and Game Department said today.

This special season for Mackinaw trout also applies to Upper Priest Lake with the same restrictions. The waters at the mouths of streams, for a radius of 300 feet into the lake, have the same season as the streams.

Priest and Upper Priest lakes are open year-round for fishing for kokanee with the daily bag limit, for sportsmen, 50 fish. There is no possession limit.

The general season for taking of fish in the waters of Area 1, not otherwise listed in the regulations this year, is May 29 - Oct. 31 for streams and May 1 to November 30 for lakes.

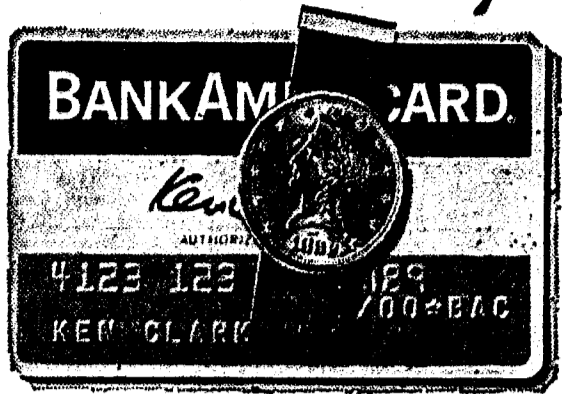

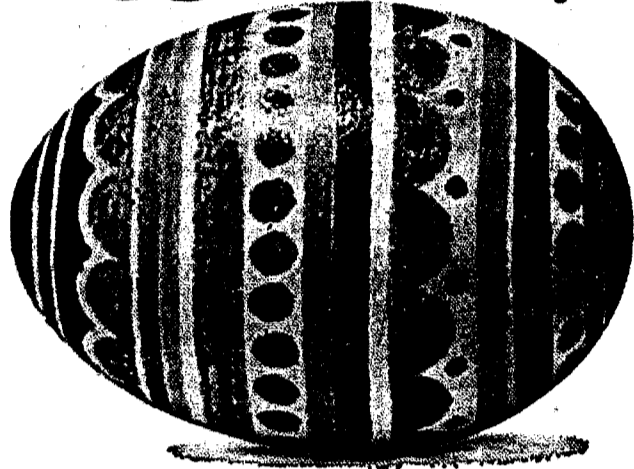

HARD LOOK AT WILDLIFE POINT OF SPECIAL WEEK  
By Jim Humbird

Idaho Fish-Game Department Wildlife is one of Idaho's most important natural heritages, as well as an indicator of the quality of the state's environment, according to a proclamation issued by Gov. Cecil D. Andrus, which designates March 21 through 27 as Wildlife Week. Other state governors and mayors of cities and towns across the land are issuing similar proclamations during the week.

The governor's document points out that increasing amounts of pollution, (air, water, and solid waste) industrial expansion and land development projects are rapidly depleting wildlife populations and depreciating the quality of the environment for man as well.

He urges Idaho residents to take a hard look at their world and the criteria by which they judge, asking the question, "Wildlife—Who Needs It?" This is the theme for Wildlife Week for 1971.

The slogan is being used to motivate people to help maintain and clean up their states and the country. There are strong feelings to the effect that the quality of American life is deteriorating. Questionable standards are being used as marks of progress in our highly technological society. This progress is measured in terms of war capabilities, scientific discoveries, luxuries, new gadgetry and ultimately the gross national product—all of which are placing increasing demands on the natural resource base of the United States.

The loss of wildlife in certain areas of the U. S. is even precipitating resistance to sport hunting. A movement of emotionalism against killing any species of wildlife is developing in the U. S. Hunters are often times characterized as monsters. Individual actions of some hunters provoke such sentiment. Wildlife species produce an annual surplus. Most game animal species can provide wild fowl, meat and fish without hurting the base populations.

For example, in small game such as game birds or rabbits, the surplus may be as great as 70 to 80 percent a year. With deer and elk the annual increase is lower, averaging 20 to 40 percent. Hunters are essential to game managers to harvest the large herbivores. These animals must be held in balance with their food supplies. Without annual trimming, a herd can build up to the point where it causes deterioration of its own winter range. Ultimately the range supports less and less animals. Hunting in its total concept is actively heading to a quality living experience.

There seems to be a growing, though badly misinformed, assumption in some circles that all killing is bad. This is the sheerest kind of nonsense, this emotionalism now being promoted by new comers to wildlife conservation. Carried to one logical conclusion there could be in processing of domestic meats, poultry or fish, no control even of known disease-carrying insects. Wildlife conservation involves much more complicated procedures than complete protection of all fish and wildlife species. If this were not so, the world would be many feet deep in robins, because this species has been protected since the 1800's. One of the first principles of game management is that wildlife populations vary somewhat from year to year, depending on hunter harvest, weather, etc., but the entire population is eliminated forever with the elimination of suitable habitat for housing developments, shopping centers, highways, pollution, stream manipulation and clean farming.

The basic difference between American and English and European hunting, of course, is that game is owned abroad by the landowner. In North America, including Canada, game is public property.

The American hunting tradition was molded chiefly by (1) a vast land area, (2) a great variety and abundance of fish and wildlife species, (3) a concept of free hunting and (4) a need for sustenance for every man. Add to these another factor—"backwoodsmanhood."

American hunters relive their country's youth, savor a measure of the richness and freedom that sets Americans apart from many other people and all other times. In one sense, the act of hunting is a thanks giving as unique to North America as the holiday that bears that name.

The claim that the only alternative is wildlife or people has been exposed as an apology for more pollution and environmental destruction. Americans can and must have both. This exemplifies intelligent environmental concern. Wildlife? Who needs it?

Everybody needs it.

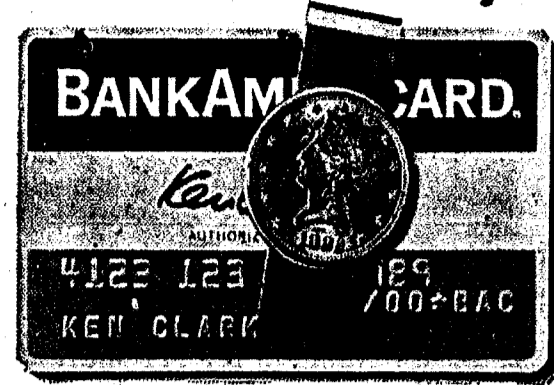

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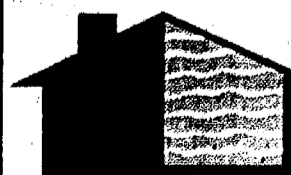

**Wildlife Depredation Charges**  
Damage complaints from wildlife depredations were about 4 percent higher last year than during 1969, with beaver complaints leading all species as a cause for complaints. During the year, 146 of 449 damage complaints (or about one third) were caused by beaver. Other leading causes were made by pheasants, 19 percent; bear, 12 percent; waterfowl, 8 percent; deer and ducks, 7 percent each; geese, 5 percent; elk and non-game birds, 2 percent each; antelope, 1 percent, and other upland game birds and other predatory animals less than 1 percent.

### Sage Grouse Booming

Its early springtime, and sage grouse biologists are getting out into the desert early—or staying overnight—in order to appear at the edge of booming grounds shortly before sunup to watch the ceremonial mating antics of these big game birds. Sage grouse workers visit the same booming grounds year after year for comparative purposes. Some grouse come to the strutting grounds as early as the second week in March and strutting reaches its peak the second week in April in the southwestern part of the state.

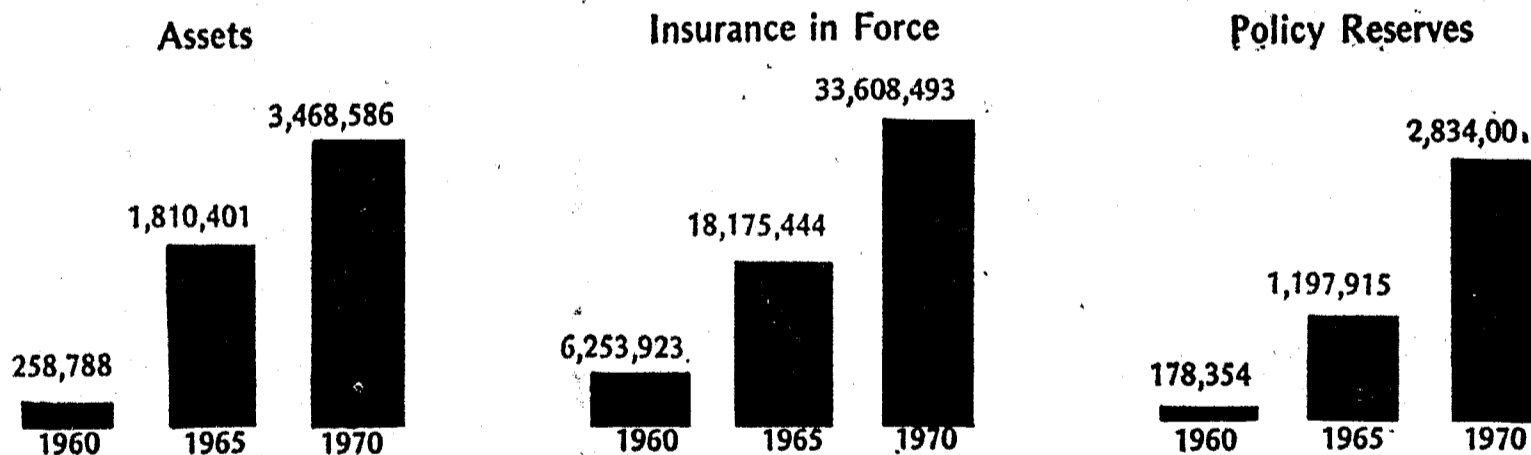
