## New Mercury Vapor Lights For Kendrick

"It's sort of the end of an era," remarked Clair Reed, Washington Water Power representative as he discussed the City of Kendrick's project of replacing all of the older-type incandescent street lights with the latest horizontal-burn mercury vapor lights.

When the change-over is complete, there will be no more incandescent street lights in the valley, Reed said.

Work crews from WWP began replacing the old street lights Tuesday and Reed said he expects the work to be completely finished by the end of the week. Workers started in the West end of Kendrick and will gradually come East. By Tuesday night the lights up to the post office corner had been converted.

The project requires replacing more than forty street lights all over Kendrick, plus adding two more the city feels are needed to provide more safety and protection.

The new mercury vapor lamps will be 20,000 lumens of power on main street and 10,000 lumens on the side streets. All of the new lights will be of the horizontal-burn type which, according to Reed, is an improvement over the older vertical-burn type.

In addition to the lights themselves, new arm supports are also being installed—all of this will result in a much better light pattern, the WWP man stated.

## Mike Hamilton Set New Pole Vault Record

Mike Hamilton, North Idaho's premier pole vaulter, broke his own record, one he had set just a week ago as he vaulted 13-foot, 10-inches at Orofino's Invitational Track meet last Saturday.

Mike's first place finish over competition from Orofino, Moscow, Lewiston, Lapwai, Potlatch, Grangeville, Highland, Genesee, Troy, Kamiah and Nezperce—accounted for 6 of Kendrick's nine points.

Sophomore Steve Hoogland's third place finish in the 2-mile run gave KHS the rest of its points. Coach Wayne Dust said later in the week that Steve's time for the event was 11:02, very good for this event, and that Hoogland was just a couple of steps from finishing higher.

Genesee Scored 6  
Genesee's 880-yard relay team composed of Ron Hopkins, Dan Taylor, Bruce Scharnhorst and Jerry Green finished third place at Orofino.

Other GHS points came from Bruce Scharnhorst's 4th place finish in the 880-yard run and Terry Green's fifth place in the mile.

## Don Parks Awarded Union Pacific Scholarship

Donald Parks of Kendrick was one of 24 young Idahoans to receive a Union Pacific Railroad Scholarship at the recent convention of Future Farmers of America in Twin Falls.

The awards were presented by Mr. Boyd Baxter, agricultural agent for the railroad.

Don, son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther Parks, is currently attending Kendrick High School and will graduate this spring. He plans to enroll at the University of Idaho and major in agriculture-engineering.

This year the value of the scholarship award was increased to \$400 from the \$200 that has been awarded

in the past. Edd H. Bailey, president of the railroad, said Union Pacific is aware of the continually rising cost of higher education and making the increase available to the recipients in 1971 in honor of the golden anniversary of U. P.'s scholarship program.

Union Pacific has invested well over a million dollars in scholarships since the first U. P. agricultural scholarship was presented in 1921. By increasing each award to \$400 Bailey said Union Pacific is making an annual commitment of over \$58,000 to higher education.

## March Rainfall Slightly Above Average

Total rainfall for the month of March, 1971 was slightly above that of 1970 and considerably above the 1969 figures for the same period.

John Luedke, who maintains rainfall totals for the Genesee area reported that 2.27 inches were recorded by him during last month. This is over the 1.77 inches in 1970 and well above the .77 in 1969.

John also added that since the first of January, he has recorded a total of 7.47 inches of precipitation in the Genesee area.

Dick Benscoter on American Ridge reports that the total rainfall in that area during March of this year was 2.24 inches.

Up on Bear Ridge, Charles Bower recorded a total March rainfall of 2.25 inches.

Farmers Working Again  
Despite the late snow that swept in unseasonably during the Easter weekend and left up to two inches (which melted quickly), the farmers are back in their fields this week and spring planting and field work has begun.

Temperatures have varied from well below the freezing mark to almost into the sixties during the past seven days.

Flowers are blooming, especially in the Juliaetta and Kendrick areas and grass has reached the cutting stage on some lawns.

## Genesee School Levy Vote Set For April 22

GENESEE — People in the Genesee School District will be asked to approve a levy of three mills above the 30 mills allowed by law for maintenance and operation of the schools for the 71-72 school year. This is the same levy that was voted last year and represents no increase in taxes over last year. It was determined by the school board that three mills would be necessary to hold the present educational program at the schools.

The vote will be held April 22 in the lobby of the Gymnasium between the hours of 11 A. M. and 7 o'clock P. M. To be eligible to vote a person must be:

1. Be a United States citizen, Idaho resident for the last six months, school district resident for the last 30 days and 21 years of age or older.
2. In addition to the foregoing qualifications a school elector shall have executed in writing and immediately before voting a form of electors oath attesting that he or she possesses the qualifications of a school elector.

Absentee ballots may be picked up through Mahlon Follett.

May 10th has been set for the Trustee election for the Genesee School Board. The board members terms to expire this year will be Tom Boyd, District No. 3 and Ray Stout, District No. 4. Both men have indicated they will run for re-election.

Nominating petitions may be picked up from Mahlon Follett, Clerk of the Board and must be filed with Mr. Follett 18 days prior to election date.

To be eligible to vote at the time of the election you must:

1. Be a United States Citizen, Idaho resident for the last six months, school district resident for the last 30 days and 21 years of age or older.
2. A resident of the same trustee zone as the candidate or candidates for district trustees for whom he offers to vote.
3. In addition to the foregoing qualifications a school elector shall have executed in writing and immediately before voting, a form of electors' oath attesting that he or she possesses the qualifications of a school elector prescribed by this section.

Regular Board Meeting  
At its regular board meeting Monday, April 12th the Genesee School Board set the date for the trustee election and budget hearing for May 10, 1971.

Don Springer appeared before the board and spent considerable time going over the school's insurance program.

Laws passed by the last session of the legislature concerning education were presented to the board by Superintendent Diehl.

Driver Education Program was discussed and it was decided that we would have one this spring. Our allotment has been cut by the State Board of Education to 60 per cent reimbursement instead of the 100 per cent. The board decided we would run as many students through as possible within the 60 per cent limitation. Only students attending school at Genesee within the district will be eligible to participate. Dates will be set later and the information published.

### ORDINANCE NO. 555

AN ORDINANCE VACATING A PART OF "D" STREET CONTIGUOUS TO LOT 1, BLOCK 36, AND LOT 5, BLOCK 33, ORIGINAL TOWN OF KENDRICK, IDAHO; RESERVING CERTAIN EASEMENTS FOR WATER AND SEWER LINES; AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF DEEDS TO THE OWNERS OF LANDS ABUTTING ON SAID VACATED STREET, AND PROVIDING THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS ORDINANCE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick, County of Latah, State of Idaho, as follows:

Section 1. That all of that part of "D" Street lying and being between and contiguous to Lot One (1), Block Thirty-six (36), and Lot Five (5), Block Thirty-three (33) of Original Town of Kendrick, Idaho, as shown on the recorded plat thereof, be, and the same is hereby, vacated; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that there are hereby RESERVED unto the City of Kendrick, easements over, under and across described street and land for the location, construction, installation, removal, maintenance, repair and replacement of water, drainage and sewer lines, mains and connections, and for all other purposes of every nature pertaining thereto, together with the right of ingress and egress to and from said premises for the purposes aforesaid.

Section 2. That the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick, Idaho, be, and they are hereby, authorized and directed in the name of and on behalf of the City of Kendrick, to execute and deliver to the owners of land abutting on said vacated street good and proper deeds conveying to said owners the one-half of said vacated street abutting on the lands of said owners, subject, however, to the reservations set forth in Section 1 above.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage, approval and publication.

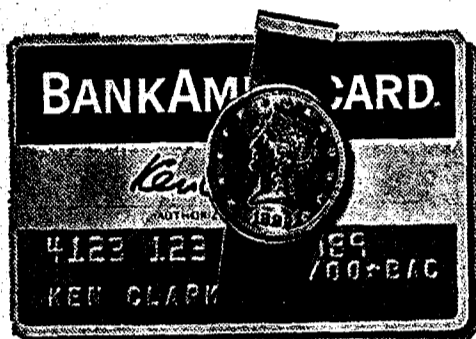

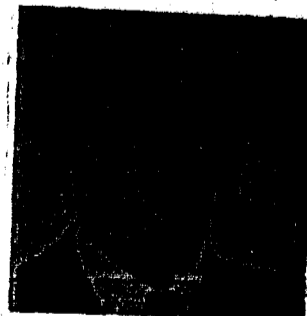
