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## School District 283 Trustees Seek 3 Mill Levy In Election May 10

Trustees of Joint School District No. 283 at Kendrick met Friday evening April 16th and after examining the preliminary budget for 1971-72 which list revenue losses of \$18,078.41 decided to go to the people for passage of a 3-mill maintenance and operation levy in a special election May 10th.

Losses sustained which are down from the 1970-71 budget are as follows: Elementary tuition \$800; Secondary tuition \$2,500; Additional County School Funds \$3,200; Vocational Education \$1,500; Federal Forest Funds \$2,000; one-mill M & O levy above 30 mills \$2,881.66; a loss in student enrollment \$5,396.76

Supt. Don Blakeley pointed out that the assessed valuation has jumped from \$2,881,653.00 to \$2,917,661.00 the past year; however, this meager increase over 1970-71 provides for only an estimated increase of \$1,117.01. State and County apportionment money has diminished from \$148,509.00 to \$145,912.74, due mostly to a loss of 15.78 students in weighted average attendance.

A 3-mill levy on the assessed valuation would provide \$8,752.98 to help compensate for losses which are very high in Instructional Expenses. The budget shows a loss of \$11,371.15 in this category from 1970-71. According to Supt. Don Blakeley the passage of the additional levy would enable the District to just hold the line until the next legislative session. He stated that the \$4,000,000 legislative increase for education was too small and that if the District was to keep pace additional revenue must come from federal, state or local sources in the immediate future. Part of the proposed 3-mill levy would have to be designated for the retirement of \$40,000.00 in tax anticipation notes which have been a necessity for operation in past years.

The date for the special 3 mill levy election will be May 10. Voting will be at Kendrick and Juliaetta schools. Poles will be open from 1:00 through 7:00 p. m. A simple majority is required for passage.

## Trustee Election

May 25th was set for the election of Trustees in Zones Four and Two. Chairman Harry Newman is the incumbent trustee from Zone Four and Herman Renfrow from Zone Two.

Petitions can be secured at the Superintendent's office but must be filed with the Clerk of the Board of Trustees not less than eighteen days prior to the day of election of trustees and must bear the signature of not less than five school district electors resident of the trustee zone of which the nominee is resident. Other qualifications are: 21 years of age; U. S. citizen and in the county 30 days preceding the election, and a resident of the State 6 months.

## Budget Hearing

The 1971-72 Budget hearing date set by the Trustees will be held at Kendrick High School May 13th, 7:30 p. m.

Clerk and Treasurer A. O. Kanik-keberg stated that indications are the School District would operate within the prescribed adopted 1970-71 budget revenues.

Mrs. Marilyn Vandenberg's contract was officially signed for 1971-72. She will replace Gai Polley as commercial instructor.

School Legislative Laws passed by the first session of the Forty-first Legislature were presented to the trustees in condensed form for later discussion.

Mr. Dave Clayton and Jed Deobald have been selected as Community and Student representative to attend a five-day drug education workshop at the University of Idaho April 16th.

A bid of \$4,650.00 by Morgan Bros. of Lewiston was accepted for the installation of a combination freezer-cooler unit in the school lunch kitchen at Kendrick. Three-fourths of the money involved will be furnished by Federal Funds. The balance will come out of the plant facility levy and local school lunch funds.

## Driver Ed Limited

Adequate funds are not available for 100 percent state financing of Driver Education programs as of July 1, 1971. Reimbursement will be made to school districts on the basis of 60 percent of the amount received the last reporting period. Kendrick received \$1,882.38 for 35 students at a cost of \$53.79 per student. Money available for 1971-72 will be \$1,129.43. Due to the fact the District can't pick up the difference, the class will have to be reduced from 35 to 21 students. Driver Education registration will therefore have to be conducted chronologically 18, 17, 16, 15, and 14—taking the oldest to the youngest.

## WANDELL—NEW DURUM WHEAT IS RELEASED

A new higher yielding durum wheat called "Wandell," has been released by the agricultural experiment stations in Washington, Idaho, and Oregon, according to Dr. Floyd Frank, acting associate director, College of Agriculture, University of Idaho.

Foundation growers are planting Wandell this spring and seed should be available for commercial growers in 1972.

"Wandell is a semi-dwarf spring late maturing amber durum variety that is resistant to prevailing races of mildew and stripe rust disease and is highly resistant to lodging when irrigated," reports Dr. Cal Konzak, plant breeder at Washington State University, who made the selection.

Wandell is expected to replace the varieties Sentry, Leeds, Lakota and Wells which it has been outyielding 10-20 per cent and more under irrigation in the Columbia Basin in Central Washington the past 3 years.

Konzak points out that Wandell has relatively poor emergence quality and has been unsuitable for dryland conditions.

Tests in Idaho show that the new variety performs well but its use may be limited to those areas where there is a market for a durum wheat. Samples of Wandell from plots in Washington have been given a quality test at the Regional Hard Red Spring Wheat and Durum Quality Testing Lab at Fargo, N. D., for four years with a satisfactory quality score.

With her daily household chores, planning and preparing three meals a day for her husband and three healthy sons, and probably helping with outdoor chores when she is needed, all keeps her days pretty well filled.

How about an Enchilada Casserole? Served with a crisp, green salad and hot rolls, you have a delicious meal.

**ENCHILADA CASSEROLE**  
2 lbs. ground beef  
3 hot chili peppers, chopped  
1 medium onion, chopped, or you may use dehydrated onion  
1 clove garlic, crushed, or 1/4 tsp. garlic powder  
oil  
1 can tomato sauce  
salt and pepper  
12 corn tortillas, fried (just dip in hot oil and turn over, drain on paper towel)  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1/2 soup can milk  
1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese  
Brown beef, chili peppers, onion and garlic in oil; add sauce, salt and pepper. Line casserole with 6 tortillas; cover with one-half of meat mixture. Lay remaining tortillas on top, add rest of meat. Pour chicken soup over top; then pour milk on top. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 300 degrees for 20-25 minutes. Yield: 12 servings.

**EASY POUND CAKE**  
1/2 lb. butter or margarine  
1 1 lb. box powdered sugar  
1 tsp. vanilla  
4 eggs  
3 cups flour  
1 rounding tsp. baking powder  
1 cup milk  
Cream butter; gradually add sugar and vanilla. Beat until pale yellow. Beat in an egg at a time. Add flour, mixed with baking powder alternately with milk. Pour in tube pan. Bake for 1 hour at 350 degrees.  
Yield: 12 servings.

Mrs. Stout says this is good served plain or with fruit or ice cream.

**AMBASSADOR CREME DESSERT**  
16 graham crackers  
6 tbsp. butter, melted  
2 cups milk  
1 cup sugar  
4 egg yolks  
1 1/2 heaping tbsp. cornstarch  
1 pkg. unflavored gelatin  
4 Tbsp. cold water  
1 pkg. choc. bake  
3 tsp. vanilla  
4 egg whites  
1/4 tsp. cream of tartar  
1/2 pint whipping cream  
3 Hershey bars with almonds  
Roll out graham crackers; mix with butter. Put in slightly greased 2-qt. pyrex pan. Bake in preheated 300 degree oven for 10 minutes; cool. In double boiler cook milk, 1/2 cup sugar, egg yolks and cornstarch until thick. Dissolve in measuring cup, gelatin and cold water; let stand. When cooked mixture coats a spoon, add gelatin mixture; let cool, add pkg. of choc-bake to 1 cup egg yolk mixture with 1 tsp. vanilla. Let cool.  
Beat egg whites, cream of tartar and remaining sugar until stiff. Fold half of egg white mixture into chocolate mixture; put on top of graham cracker layer and put in refrigerator to set. Whip cream with a small amount of powdered sugar and remaining vanilla; spread on egg yolk layer. Cut into slivers Hershey bars with almonds; sprinkle over top of cream. Put in refrigerator 12-24 hours. Yield 12 servings.

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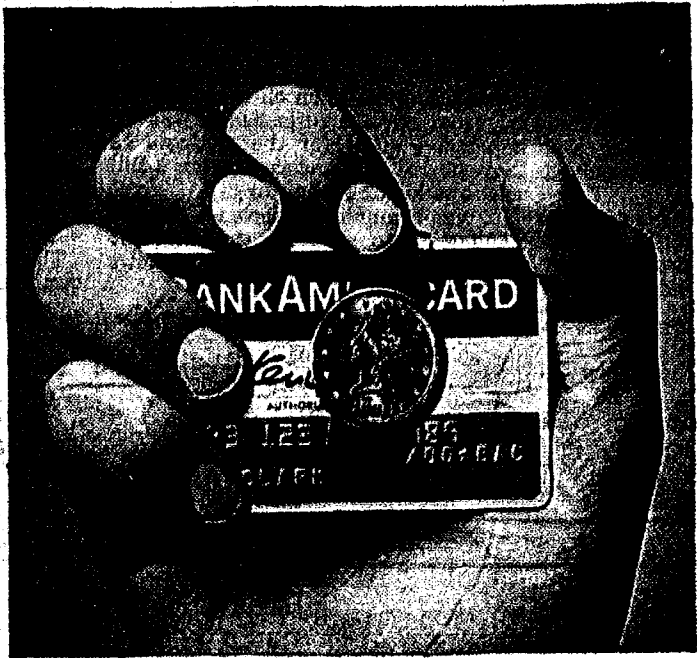

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### Protecting Ornamental Shrubs and Bushes

A three-step program to protect your ornamentals from insect damage until summer is recommended by Roland Portman, entomologist of the U. of I. extension service.

First, prune. Pruning stimulates new growth and keeps plants growing in desirable shapes. It also gets rid of many overwintering insects and their eggs. Another point is that pruning makes it easier to treat ornamentals with insecticides because there isn't so much bushy growth to cover. Second, clear away the debris. Bundle up pruned branches and put them in a container for garbage collection. That action is required these days in many communities that have smoke-abatement regulations. If burning areas are provided, take the trash there. Or, perhaps you may find it practical to stack the branches in a suitable place away from the garden and burn them in your fireplace next fall. Leaves should be raked away from plants and made into compost. Debris under plants provides living space for spider mites and other insects. It also hinders growth of early spring flowers.

Third, spray. Portman says a combination of two percent summer oil spray and calcium polysulfide is very effective. It will get rid of most overwintering insect pests. The insecticide is sold in garden stores as a summer lime-sulfur spray.

### BID CONTRACT DELAYED

Bids to construct the University of Idaho's open football stadium will not be opened until April 13 due to a change in specifications on the steel reinforcing. It was announced today by university officials.

The bids originally were to have been opened April 8. Upper Columbia Construction Co., a division of Willamette Western Corp., Portland, Ore. is currently driving pile which will support the stadium's foundation. Work has also begun to keep moisture out of the stadium area until spring, when permanent bench-type seating will be built on a concrete foundation for 18,000 fans.

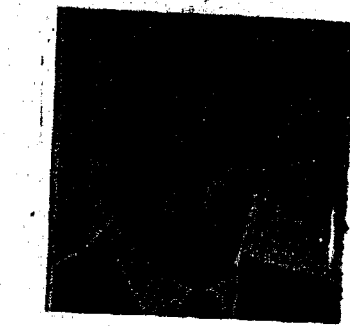

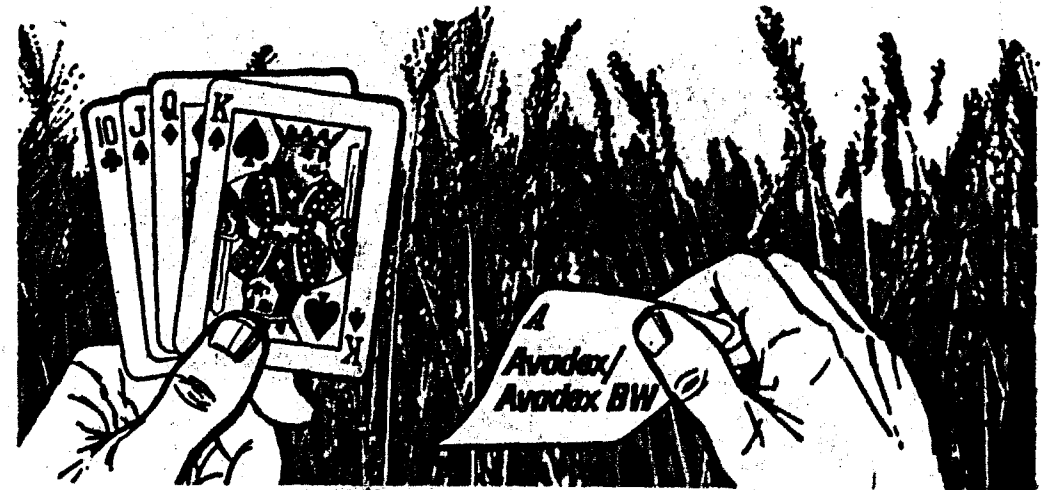

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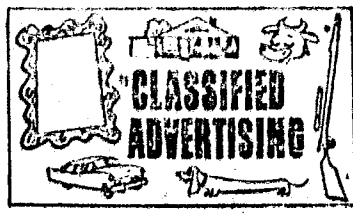
