# WANDELL—NEW DURUM WHEAT IS RELEASED

A new higher yielding durum wheat called "Wandell," has been released by the agricultural experiment sta-tions in Washington, Idaho, and Ore-gon, according to Dr. Floyd Frank, acting associate director, College of Agriculture, University of Idaho.

Foundation growers are planting Wandell this spring and seed should be available for commercial growers in 1972.

"Wandell is a semi-dwarf spring late maturing amber durum variety that is resistant to prevailing races of mildew and stripe rust disease and is highly resistant to lodging when irrigaed," reports Dr. Cal Konzak, plant breeder at Washington State University, who made the

Wandell is expected to replace the varieties Sentry, Leeds, Lakota and Wells which it has been outyielding 10-20 per cent and more under irrigation in the Columbia Basin in Central Washington the past 3 years.

Konzak points out that Wandell has relatively poor emergence quality and has been unsuitable for dryland conditions

land conditions.

Tests in Idaho show that the new variety performs well but its use may be limited to those areas where there is a market for a durum wheat. Samples of Wandell from plots in Washington have been given a quality test at the Regional Hard Red Spring Wheat and Durum Quality Testing Lab at Fargo, N. D., for four years with a satisfactory quality score.


