Sixth Graders Rocket Launch A Success

The students in the sixth grade had their rocket launch last Friday despite windy conditions. The launchings were witnessed by the students in the other grades and by about thirty parents.

Although there were a few parachutes that did not open and a couple of rockets had a mind of their own as to which direction they wanted to fly—the launchings were dubbed a tremendous success with some rockets reaching heights of over 2,000 feet. The final rocket that was fired was a Saturn V replica which stands some 46 inches high and is powered by a cluster of 3 solid propellant engines. It rose from the launching pad with a roar and soared to between 400 and 500 feet. Large Crowd Witnesses Kendrick High Graduation Ceremonies Sunday, May 16

"When man attempts to deal with his social problems he is likely to forget that causes are numerous and complex," Dr. Dwight Ingle told the thirty-two members of the Kendrick High School graduation class of 1971 at commencement exercises Sunday evening, May 16.

Dr. Ingle, a graduate of Kendrick High School and now a professor of physiology at the University of Chicago, addressed one of the largest crowds to ever assemble for a Kendrick commencement ceremony.

The physician went on to draw analogies between the many factors which influence research into such complicated fields as cancer and diabetes and the causes and effects of many of our present social ills. "We have a tendency to look for a single simple cause of an event, a disease, or a problem. This isn't the way things are," he added.

Man's Value Internal

"Have we not yet learned that a man's value is internal?", asked Miss Debra Johnson as she delivered the 1971 salutatory address. The understanding of humanity was one of the quests which face the young people graduating today, she told her classmates and audience. The future also holds knowledge, dreams, success and this search for understanding.

"Winds of Change"

"The winds of change are rustling the leaves," Donald Parks, the 1971 Valedictorian, said in his address. He told the audience that young people have been given an important gift—the gift of knowledge—and that they must use this knowledge not only for the betterment of themselves, but also for the betterment of mankind. Mr. Parks also made reference to the valedictory speech his father had made at KHIS twenty-one years ago and the changes which have occurred since that time.

Lawrence Sorensen, Former Genesee SCS Man, Will Retire This Month

Wood River Journal, Thurs., Apr. 29, '71 Fairfield—Lawrence (Larry) Sorensen, USDA Soil Conservation Service Technician for Camas County, has kept busy and made many friends since coming to the area.

A native of American Falls, he started with the Civilian Conservation Corps at Preston in 1937. He changed to the Soil Conservation Service in 1939 and has served with them ever since, except for a hitch with the U. S. Navy from 1943-46 in World War II.

After quite a few years in the Malad area he spent 18 years at Genesee. One of his major accomplishments there was the installation of about 250 miles of tile drainage which brought about 26,000 acres of sub-marginal land under cultivation. He also conducted a conservation education program in the schools.

Sorensen is considered quite an expert on flood control dams, so was called to Montpelier on the Montpelier Creek dam project where he was construction inspector. Since coming to Fairfield he was "borrowed" for the Cooper Creek dam project in Sutherland, Oregon. This last fall he was detailed in September to Victor, Idaho, as field inspector on the Trail Creek watershed project.

If present plans work out, Camas county will lose Sorensen in June, as he plans to retire and move back to his home in Genesee.

His name will remain in soil conservation circles as he invented and built the "Sorensen Board," an object to hold a liquid column measure in place while gathering data to make a soil density test, so that one man could complete the project instead of two men. He received a cash award of \$500 for the idea, which was issued jointly by the conservation service of Oregon and the U. S. office in Washington, D. C.

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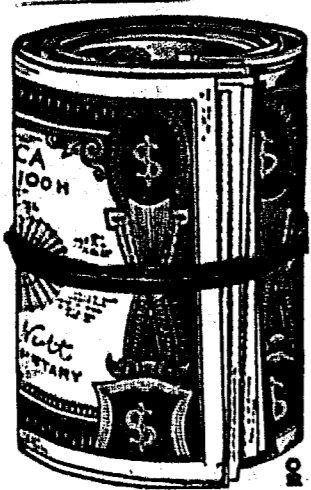

Dangerous Traffic

State Police records indicate week ends were the most dangerous traffic periods for Idaho motorists and pedestrians last year when 47 per cent of all accidents and 53 per cent of all fatal mishaps occurred.

More fatal accidents occurred on Friday last year than on any other day and more accidents were reported on Saturday with fatal accident listed second when compared to other days.

Sunday ranked third high in fatal accidents and sixth in the number of all accidents.

Tuesday was the most dangerous week day, traffic-wise, with fatal accidents ranking fourth and the total of all accidents fifth.

Statistics indicate Wednesday was the safest time, traffic-wise, as there were fewer fatalities and nearly the fewest number of accidents on that day last year.

A. S. C. COMMITTEE PROMOTES CONSERVATION

Moscow — Conservation of our resources and improved living conditions received a boost last week when the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee approved \$11,700 in cost-sharing funds. Roy Glenn, vice chairman of the Latah County A. S. C. committee says: "The principal reason for sharing costs with farmers is that overall public benefits from conservation work go far beyond any returns that the individual producer might hope to gain."

The new Rural Environmental Assistance program (REAP) emphasizes improvement activities that have wide public benefits. Establishing permanent grass cover has the highest priority, followed closely by pollution abatement and forestry practices.

Mr. Glenn pointed out that farmers have always carried out thousands of conservation practices without cost sharing. To improve the over-all farm operation they have maintained grass waterways, they have done hand shovel work to control run off water, they have cultivated noxious weeds in patches and strips, and without fan-fare they have left cover and feed for wildlife — and the list goes on and on.

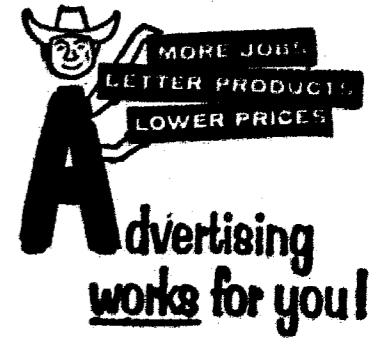
Cost sharing is now extended to include such practices as pollution abatement in the form of concrete holding pits for liquid or dry manure. Dairy operators, beef and hog producers can now receive some help in establishing measures which will clean up air and water and improve sanitary living conditions. Facilities must be built to specifications handed by Wayne Robinson, engineer, Soil Conservation Service.

One of the great needs in America is to improve rangeland pasture, and to plant evergreen trees to sustain our timber supply. Thinning and pruning of old timber stands and the planting of new trees is supervised by Frank Schoeffler, Idaho State Department of Public Lands, and John Galea, District Ranger, U. S. Forest Service.

Canada Goose Nesting Platforms
Canada goose nests on the islands of the lower Payette and Snake rivers between Marsing and Boise are scheduled for rechecking this week to learn what the hatching success rate has been. The initial survey was made several weeks ago. This year a number of sportsmen from Homedale and Marsing helped out. Nesting platforms built and installed by department workers with an assist from Explorer Scout Troop No. 60 prevented many nests from being flooded out by high water, particularly on the lower Payette River. Melting snow started early this year on the Payette River and forced the geese to re-nest on higher grounds. If the runoff had come later, this might not have been possible.

This year there were a total of 189 active nests found, with 1,124 eggs. This compares with 202 active nests and 1,121 eggs last year. In other words, 13 fewer active nests were found this year than during the 1970 season.

OPENING DAY FORECAST PREDICTS HIGH WATERS

Idaho's main event for rod and reel addicts start May 29—opening day of the general fishing season, statewide. This is an event throughout the state, even in the panhandle region where general stream fishing begins the same day as the rest of Idaho notwithstanding the opening of the special lowland lake season May 1.

In general, the year's opening day won't be ideal in the sense that anybody who wants them can catch fish anywhere in the state. The general statewide forecast is for too much spring runoff water, according to James C. Simpson, chief of the fisheries division.

Around the state low altitude snow is gone and at high levels the snowpack still is substantial and must come off as days and nights warm with the advance of the spring season. For this reason, river and stream trout stocking schedule has been delayed somewhat and won't get into high gear until snow waters recede. There's no way of knowing when that will be because so much depends on unpredictable weather factors.

Simpson pointed out, for example, that in McCall at the fish hatchery, spring-like weather made its appearance two weeks earlier than usual this year, but the snow pack at higher elevations is still deep.

Streams and rivers mostly are expected to be boisterous to hold a line on opening day. They are expected to be muddy and bankfull in some places. Large irrigation reservoirs probably will also be turbid and in some places high because of the snow melt. Lowland large irrigation reservoirs should be good fishing as should some spring-fed streams. Most streams are expected to improve by late June or early July as the runoff waters recede.

Simpson says some streams already

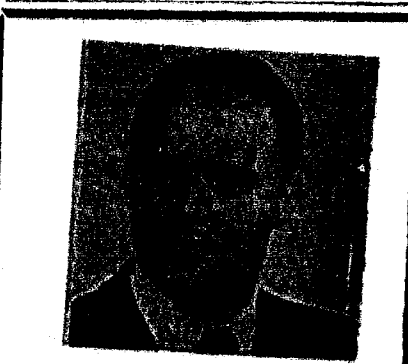

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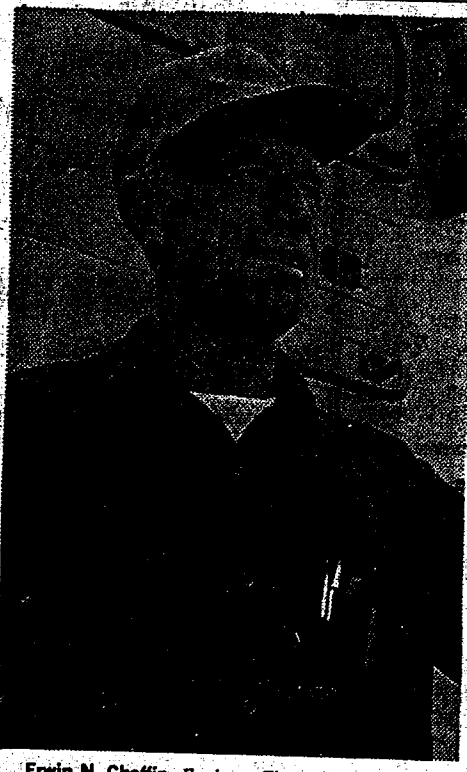

According to firemen, another 10 minutes would have made a big difference. Damage was confined to the attic and a very small ceiling area. All the wiring in the house must be replaced.

The house, owned by John Thiessen and leased by Fred Funke, was insured and is being repaired. Van Den Tops also had insurance on their belongings, which covered dry cleaning, etc.
