Manning Onstott, Kendrick SCS Man Will Retire After 31 years of Service

A career that has involved 31 years as a government employee, about 260,000 miles of accident free driving in Nez Perce and Latah County Soil Conservation Service, and a host of new acquaintances, accounts for a memorable and rewarding objective for Manning Onstott of Kendrick, Soil Conservation technician, as he approaches his retirement at the end of May.

He first began working as an employee of the United States Department of Agriculture with the Forest Service in the Blister Rust Control of 1933 as a "Ribble Puller." Later he was promoted to Camp Foreman of the Blister Rust crew and continued in this until 1939.

In 1941 Onstott was selected by the State Forestry Department as the first State Fire Warden to serve in the Kendrick area following the organizing of the Kendrick Fire Protective District.

His enthusiasm for outdoor life and conserving practices were keenly observed by Russell Smith, Kendrick work unit conservationist and with Smith's encouragement and recommendation Onstott was hired as Assistant by the Kendrick District in 1944. After working several years under the supervision and training of Smith he took over the duties as Work Conservationist when Smith was transferred to the Lewiston district.

In 1960 Onstott was promoted to Soil Conservation Technician, the position he still holds as he nears his retirement. During his position in conservation he has laid the plans of about 50 miles of tile drainage and approximately 400 farm ponds. These ponds are being utilized for livestock watering, irrigation, fire protection and recreation. Apart from this he has also done a lot of planning and surveying of diversion terraces and contour farming, has assisted in grass seedings, woodland improvement practices consisting of thinning and pruning of woodlots. Also included in his work was assisting farmers with spring developments, and in assisting farmers with a complete conservation plan.

Onstott remarked that in the process of staking farm ponds or tile drainage systems he was sometimes given the able assistance of the farm wife, if help was necessary, and if her farmer husband was involved in other field work.

"In the years I have been with the Service they have been good years. When I first started with the Conservation unit I recall the sky was full of smoke from stubble burning, which in turn caused a serious amount of field erosion. In helping emphasize the importance of stubble straw being turned back to the field, today stubble burning is almost non-existent and erosion is at a minimum," Onstott said. "Another major change I have seen through the years," he continued, "is the almost complete disappearance of bean crops and very little clover. In previous years I laid plans for contour farming of beans. The crops that have taken their places consist of peas and lentils. The cropping system has changed to mostly an annual system with very little summer fallowing being done."

He has received two monetary awards from the Soil Conservation Service in 1962 and 1963 in special recognition of his outstanding achievements in working with farmers.

It has been traditional for several years for the staff officers of the Latah and Nez Perce county work units to hold a staff meeting at the Kendrick office and then transfer from there to the Onstott home where they were treated to a delicious beef stew and corn bread dinner prepared by Mrs. Onstott. At their arrival Mrs. Onstott would nonchalantly disappear for the evening while the visitors satisfied their ravenous appetites.

Onstott summed up his 31 years as being rewarding as well as interesting and educational, by learning the techniques of the work in Soil Conservation.

Onstott was born in Clarkston in 1909, coming to Kendrick with his parents Mr. and Mrs. Adolph Onstott in 1914. They settled on a farm on the edge of Big Bear Ridge where they lived for three years, then moved to Kendrick for permanent residence. Their first home at Kendrick was on an acreage presently owned by Brocke & Sons for their fertilizer plant. The Onstotts operated a truck gardening project for local residents and also raised hay. He (Onstott) worked at various jobs around Kendrick when he was younger until his position with

the Blister Rust unit.

When he opened his first office of the Soil Conservation it was located in a corner of the Kendrick Hotel. This office was closed and his records had to be filed in their home for about two years, then Abrams Hardware offered him office room on the balcony of the store. From there an office was made available at the rear of the Christensen Building. Later the office was moved to its present site in the Silflow Building on Main Street. With his interest in youth, Onstott has worked a great deal with the Boy Scout troops, Future Farmers of America, and grade school students promoting the importance of soil conservation and its practices.

He plans to spend his retirement years working in his yard, flowers and garden, which is some of his main interests. The Onstott flower garden holds many remembrances of his farm trips as many farm housewives took pride in sending home with him a root or bulb of their most prized outdoor plants or trading for some of his. Apart from gardening they are ardent campers and fishermen, belonging to the Kendrick Camper Karavan.

One incident he recalled with a chuckle was a visit to a farm, and the housewife presented him with a box full of mushrooms. She said she would guarantee them to be safe and if they weren't to bring them back.

Mrs. Onstott has played an important part in her husband's work by helping with conservation dinners, tours and other various projects pertaining to conservation. As she put it, "She has been my faithful sidekick."

Manning's periodic visits with the farmers in the Kendrick and surrounding areas will be sincerely missed in the years ahead, but his projects will always be thought about as one drives over the country side. The grass waterways now run clear water into the streams and the tile drains allow the farmer to work the dyes that in previous years were eye-sores and made no money. The many happy hours owners will spend fishing in the local ponds and the convenience of watering stock will bring back memories of Onstott's knowledge in planning his soil conservation practices.

The Onstott's have two children, a daughter Mrs. Dee (Jeri) Miller of Lewiston, and a son, Ray, of 150 Mile House, B. C., Canada.

In 1958 when Roy Glenn was chairman of the Board of Supervisors for Latah County Soil Conservation Service and Mrs. Glenn was a member of the Auxiliary, they sponsored a poster contest on conservation. Among the contestants were the two Onstott children, Jeri and Ray. The posters were hung in Moscow stores and later Onstott returned his children's posters to his office where they have been displayed ever since. They will take their place with his other prize souvenirs and with the scrap books that Mrs. Onstott has so faithfully kept in order with each event throughout his career.

The couple are members of the Kendrick Camper Karavan of which he is secretary-treasurer. He also is Overseer of the Kendrick Grange, Past Master of the Masonic Lodge, and previously Scoutmaster for some six years. They are also members of Pomona and the National Star.

A farewell banquet in honor of Onstott's retirement was held at the Red Shield restaurant Friday evening by the Soil Conservation Service with present and past Conservation officers and fellow workers present. He was presented with a certificate for distinguished service for 27 years of dedicated work assisting the people of Latah county and the surrounding area. Their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Dee Miller, were also present.

He has a brother, Oscar, of Pocatello, who is also a Conservation technician; two sisters, Mrs. Lloyd (Muriel) Cook, Lewiston and Mrs. Margario Hansen of Spokane.

William A. Riley, Kendrick Pioneer, Passes At Moscow

William A. Riley, 69, a native of Kendrick, died at the Gritman Memorial Hospital in Moscow, Saturday at 4:00 a. m., where he had been a patient one day.

He was born on Texas Ridge, near Kendrick, March 23, 1902, and had spent all of his life in the area. He farmed, raised cattle and worked for lumber companies, his latest employment being with the Gem State Lumber Co. at Juliaetta.

He was united in marriage to Matilda Doyendorf, May 26, 1928 at Southwick. She survives him at the family home on Texas Ridge.

Other survivors include three sons, Donald R. Riley, Roy V. Riley and Delmer D. Riley, all of Spokane; two daughters, Lela Hazeltine of Spokane and Mrs. Arlene Green, St. Maries, Idaho; eight sisters, Miss Mary Riley and Alice Gilbert, both of Kendrick; Mrs. Matilda Konen, and Mrs. Rachel Shaw, both of Lewiston; Mrs. Lulu Tout, Deary; Mrs. Carrie Knudson, San Luis Obispo, Calif.; Mrs. Minnie McCoy, Stanfield, Ore.; Mrs. Nancy Henderson, Irrigon, Ore.; 10 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, May 25, at the Assembly of God Church in Kendrick, with Rev. Theo Meske officiating. Vocalist was Douglas Small was accompanied by organist LeAnn Rogers. Pallbearers were old-time friends, Roy Glenn, Bud Fey, Robin Stackpole, E. A. Deobald, Louis Wright and Bob Kimbley.

Burial followed in the Kendrick Cemetery with Shorts Chapel of Moscow in charge.

W. L. McCreary Festival Grand Marshall



W. L. McCreary, former editor and publisher of the Kendrick Gazette, will reign as Grand Marshall of the 11th annual Locust Blossom Festival Parade this Saturday morning, May 29.

McCreary, "Bill" to everyone who knows him, was born April 9, 1905 in Santa Fe, New Mexico to P. C. and Virginia Alice McCreary and started to learn the printing trade as a small boy at his father's shop in Genesee. He remembers feeding an old style press while standing on an empty dynamite box at the old Genesee News office.

Before coming to Genesee, he lived with his family in Canton, Illinois, Colorado Springs, Colo., and Yakima, Wn. They moved to Genesee in 1912. He learned the printing trade at Genesee and in 1926 was married to Floy M. Griffith at Spokane. In 1929 he went with his father to Stanwood, Wn. where they had purchased a paper. Bill left Stanwood in the early fall and went to work as a Linotype operator at the Lewiston

Tribune, joining the union there in October of 1929.

In December of 1929 Bill came with his father to Kendrick where he was associated with him in the Gazette until his father retired in 1946 when he took over the operation assisted by his wife Floy. Floy passed away in 1961. They had two children, Mrs. R. A. (Pat) Stenland of Seattle and Frank P. McCreary, Moscow. There are five grandchildren. In 1966 he married Francis Bateman Trout.

In August of 1968 Bill sold the Gazette to Jane and Bill Roth and retired, but he still manages a few hours per week at the old Model 14 Linotype in the Gazette Office.

Looking back on his long newspaper career, Bill considers one of the highlights as being a key figure in the fight to prevent Moscow, Pullman and the University of Idaho from damming up the Potlatch River and taking its flow for their own use in 1966 and 1967.

Home Cookin' . . .



When the name of Mrs. Ethel Liberg is mentioned in Genesee, old friends and neighbors think of her as one of Genesee's good cooks. She sent us some recipes last week you'll add to your favorite recipe files. They feature the timely and ever-popular, rhubarb.

MY OWN THING CAKE

5 cups prepared rhubarb
1 cup sugar
1 3-ounce pkg. raspberry gelatin
3 cups miniature marshmallows
1 package white cake mix
2 eggs
Water

Cut rhubarb into 1/2-inch slices. Arrange in greased 9x13-inch pan. Sprinkle with sugar and gelatin, top with marshmallows. Prepare cake mix as directed on package with eggs and water as indicated. Spread batter evenly over marshmallows.

Bake at 350 degrees, 50 to 55 minutes, until cake tests done. Cool 5 minutes. Then turn out of pan upside down on serving tray. Serve warm with whipped cream if desired. Yields 12 to 15 servings.

Variations: Use fresh or frozen huckleberries and raspberry gelatin, peach slices and orange gelatin.

FAVORITE RHUBARB CRISP

1 egg
3/4 cup sugar
3 cups diced rhubarb
4 tablespoons butter
1/3 cup packed, brown sugar
2/3 cup flour

Beat egg, stir in sugar and 2 tablespoons flour. Add rhubarb. Blend well. Spoon into 8-inch greased baking dish. Combine butter, brown sugar, and 2/3 cup flour with fork. Sprinkle over rhubarb. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes until rhubarb is tender.

Yield: 6 servings.

SOUP CREAM RHUBARB PIE

1 9-inch unbaked pie shell
3 cups cut-up rhubarb
1 cup dairy sour cream
1/3 cups sugar
3 tablespoons cornstarch
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Place rhubarb in unbaked pie shell. Beat egg slightly, add sour cream, sugar, cornstarch, and cinnamon. Pour over rhubarb. Bake at 425 degrees for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 325 degrees. Continue baking for about 40 minutes until knife inserted midway between edge and center comes out clean.

RHUBARB ORANGE CANDY JAM

6 cups finely diced rhubarb
5 cups sugar
1/2 cup water
2 tbb. lemon juice
1 lb. candy orange slices, cut up
2 cups or can use tangerine slices also

Measure rhubarb, sugar, water and lemon juice in large kettle. Stir to mix. Bring to a full rolling boil, stirring add orange slices. Continue boiling, stirring until mixture reaches the jelly stage, about 12 minutes. Remove from heat, skim. Ladle into hot sterilized glasses. Seal at once.

Makes 7 cups. (real good). More of Mrs. Liberg's recipes will be published next week.

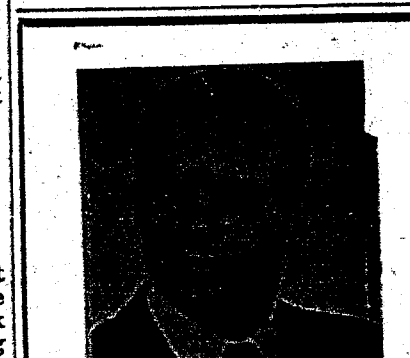

Unemployment Up Due To Inclement Weather

Moscow — Wet weather in the area's forests resulted in a number of new claims for unemployment insurance being filed through the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment during the past week. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager said that a total of 32 persons filed new claims during the week. He said that 26 of those were filed by workers recently laid off by logging operators in the area. During the previous week only 10 new claims were filed, and during the same week a year ago the total was 7. Workers were returning to construction jobs, however, and the total number of idle workers receiving jobless pay dropped slightly from 301 a week ago to the current total of 294. At this time last year the total was 259.

Employment opportunities decreased during the week, partly because of the adverse weather during the early part of the week. Only 8 workers were given job finding help during the week. During the previous week 21 county workers were placed on jobs. There are job openings in the Moscow area for such workers as auto, truck and tractor mechanics; salesmen, cafe and domestic workers, good secre-
