

## Varied Topics Discussed By Genesee Council

A variety of subjects, ranging from an old bill against the city to repair of city streets was discussed at the Monday meeting of the Genesee City Council.

All members were present except Councilman Walt Moden, who is on vacation. Mayor Dick Scharnhorst presided at the session.

Wayne Roach appeared before the Council with a bill from Burlington Northern Railroad for expenses incurred by the railroad in removing and replacing track for the sewer work performed in May of 1968.

The city will investigate for clarification and explanation as to why the bill was not presented before. No further action will be taken until such clarification is forthcoming.

Sewer hookups were discussed and the city will inspect all sewer connections before trenches are filled.

R. M. (Dick) Wright was present at the meeting to complain of noise made by the Carl Carbon, Inc., at their rock crushers south of town. The city advised Mr. Wright to contact the appropriate authorities in the county concerning the noise.

A request by Inland Asphalt of Spokane for 3 million gallons of water to be used in repairing highway 95 was denied. The Council felt the city might not have sufficient water for its requirements during periods of peak usage.

The Council accepted the bid of Everett Will Tractor, Moscow, for a Case 10-hp lawnmower.

Jay Nelson, a member of the Latah County Regional Planning Commission attended the meeting and explained the Latah County Comprehensive plan prepared as a means of guiding, coordinating and planning the orderly physical development of Latah County. Books and plans are available at the City Clerk's office the library and the high school library.

John Myers, street commissioner, brought before the council the results of the bidding held last Saturday in cooperation with the Genesee Rimrock Highway Commission for resurfacing of various Genesee Streets. The Council moved to accept whatever decision Genesee Rimrock Highway District made.

## Oregon Woman Dies In Kendrick Crash

A Boardman, Oregon woman was killed early Friday morning when the car she was driving rolled over her on the East outskirts of Kendrick.

Patsy M. Reece, 25, her husband, Phillip, and Billy Ziegler of McNary, Oregon, were traveling northeast from Kendrick on State Highway 3 in a 1968 Pontiac which failed to make a curve at the edge of town.

Mrs. Reece was thrown from the vehicle and crushed underneath as the car skidded over an embankment. State Patrolman Edwin D. Strickland, investigating officer, said the accident occurred during rainy weather on a slick highway.

Reece received a laceration on his neck and was treated at St. Joseph's Hospital and released. Miss Ziegler was not injured. Damage to the automobile was estimated at \$200.

The Reeces were on their way to visit friends at Orofino but had taken a wrong road that put them at Kendrick.

## Burglars Strike In Kendrick

Burglars struck at least four Kendrick business firms in an early Wednesday morning robbery, but were frightened off before they could complete their work when Latah County Deputy Dave Wilson discovered the break-ins while on routine patrol.

Money was taken from Oldersness Dept. Store and Brooke TV Store and the thieves were attempting to break open a safe in Fleming's Truck and Equipment Co. when they were frightened off. An attempt was also made to enter the Antelope Inn.

Details of the robbery are sketchy at this time, but apparently the burglars were still in town when Deputy Dave Wilson noticed the front door of Oldersness's open—he then investigated and found the other break-ins.

# Genesee's 13th Community Day Is Saturday, June 12

Genesee will put its best foot forward this Saturday, June 12th, as it celebrates the 13th annual Genesee Community Day and to make the occasion even more noteworthy, observes the 100th anniversary of the settling of the first pioneers in Genesee Valley.

All but the small, last-minute details have been worked out and the workers who have invested months of work and planning for the Saturday celebration are keeping a close eye on the weather, which has been anything but good these past few days.

A full day of fun and activity has been planned to keep the crowds busy and happy. Many of the old attractions have been retained . . . the breakfast, races, exhibits, trapshoot, talent show, dance and the famous barbecue beef dinner at the noon hour. And, in addition, there are some new attractions which should prove interesting. First of these is the beard-growing which has been a topic of discussion for several months. All male residents of the area have been urged to grow beards in honor of the valley centennial. Some haven't let their whiskers sprout and a vigilante committee has been formed to see the non-growers pay the price. The first vigilante court was held Monday night and "justice" was meted out to a number of non-conformists. The penalty was the purchase of additional Community Day tickets or buttons. It is expected that the same court and vigilantes will be in action Saturday. The vigilantes have decided

against physical violence.

**Breakfast Starts Day**

The day will begin with the serving of the Community Day breakfast from 6:00 a. m. to 9:00 in the Firemen's Hall. On the menu will be Genesee sausage, pancakes, eggs, coffee and milk.

The kiddie and pet parade will be held at 9:30 down main street. Jack Magee, parade chairman, has urged all kids to get their bikes and wagon decorated up. The main parade will begin at 10:00 a. m. and many new and interesting entries have been promised. As a special attraction, the parade will honor all Genesee folks over the age of 80 years. They will be offered special places of honor in the parade and all those over 80 who wish to ride are asked to contact Clarence Gilge or Harold Kluss so transportation may be arranged. Merchandise certificates will be awarded for the top three entries in the general parade. Children will receive cash and there will be a plaque for the best novelty entry and a special plaque for the oldest pioneer in the parade.

Following the parade the exhibit hall will open at the old Genesee Motors building. Many hobby and craft displays will be shown as well as old time exhibits. Anyone having any displays are urged to bring them in prior to Saturday.

There will be races for kids at the ball park at 11:00 a. m.; the trap shoot at the ball park will also begin, with classes for all types of shooters; the kiddie carnival will begin, concession stands will open and

the lunch counter at the Fire Hall will open.

**Barbecue At Noon**

Genesee's famed barbecue beef dinner will be served from 12 noon to 2:00 p. m. in the main street park. With a fine, new serving shelter, the meal promises to be better than ever with real barbecue beef, baked beans, cole slaw, potato chips, relish, punch, coffee, etc., on the menu.

During the time the meal is being served there will also be the awarding of the parade prizes, entertainment by the old time fiddlers and awarding of prizes for best beards and old time costumes. Those who want their beards judged are asked to wear a Community Day Derby hat. Judges will be circulating in the crowds all morning.

At 2:00 p. m. there will be a play day at the Rim Riders arena for local and visiting riding clubs.

At three p. m. there will be a talent show for the queen candidates at the GHS multi-purpose room. One of the five candidates will be chosen at this time, but not announced.

Also at 3:00 there will be a little league baseball game between Genesee and Kendrick.

A sky diving exhibition will be held at 5:00 p. m.

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## WILDLIFE VIEWPOINT

Stu Murrell,  
Regional Conservation Educator

The Idaho Fish and Game Department is experimenting with a new approach in their attempt to introduce green pheasants into North Idaho. We presently have 200 Japanese versicolor pheasant hens, more commonly called green pheasants, and 35 of the green roosters at the Post Falls game farm. We've had these for a period of time now and are allowing them to lay eggs in the pens. The eggs from these birds are being collected daily and are being sent to the Washington Game Farm at Deer Park where they are being incubated. We don't have incubation facilities in North Idaho so we enlisted the cooperation of the Washington Game Department in allowing us to use their facilities for incubating the eggs.

As soon as these chicks hatch out they will be returned as day-old chicks to the game farm and held there until fall. We are presently in the process of building a brooder house which will hold about 800 of these chicks and this will be used until they are large enough to fend for themselves in the open pens.

This is the first year that we've have the hens in the pens this early at the farm. It's part of the continuing program to determine the best method, if any method is feasible, of raising green pheasants for release here in Idaho. In the past the birds have been raised at the Jerome game farm in the southern part of the state where we have the facilities for incubation as well as brooding and holding. At the Jerome Game Farm we have had a considerable amount of difficulty with the green pheasants. It seems that only about two-thirds of the eggs are fertile, whereas about 84 percent of the Chinese pheasant eggs are fertile. Also, the number of eggs produced by the Chinese pheasants is almost twice as high per bird as with the green pheasants. These things have combined to hold the hatching success at a fairly low level among the green pheasants.

This spring with the birds in the pens in North Idaho, we are finding the production is considerably higher than it was in the southern part of the state. We're getting more eggs from the 200 hens held at Post Falls than they are from the roughly 400 hens being held at Jerome. Exactly why this is, we don't really know. It would likely be tied in with the difference in weather and climate. Surprisingly enough, we find the birds laying more eggs on cool, cold days than they did on the days when the temperature got into the 80's.

We are doing a little bit of cross checking to see how the fertility will compare with the various areas. For example, we sent about 140 eggs from Post Falls to Jerome to be hatched out at that point. For comparison the Jerome Game Farm sent about the same number to us to have hatched in Deer Park Washington. It will be interesting to see how these different batches of eggs compare for fertility. In addition to that, the Washington Game Department has given us 400 eggs from their birds which will again give us a comparison on fertility rates between their strain of green pheasants and those which we have here in Idaho.

So far we have sent a fair number of eggs to Deer Park. We expect to have over a thousand eggs available, and these combined with those from south Idaho and the Washington Department of Game, should give us about 1,500 eggs in the incubators at Deer Park. From this we expect to get about 800 live chicks. This is all the brooder at the Post Falls pens is presently set up to handle.

With the first batch of eggs going to the incubators on the 9th we anticipate getting the first batch of chicks back from there on about June 4th. Our game farm manager, Mel Branch, has been busy with the adult birds and with getting the brooder ready for the chicks. He'll continue to be busy with the chicks coming in the first week of June.

We'll be through taking eggs from these hens in North Idaho within the next week or so and these birds will still be capable and able to lay for another two or three weeks at the very minimum. Thus we hope to release these birds right away and see if we can get some natural reproduction occurring in the Panhandle, in addition to those that are be-

## ELECTRIC SHOCK.

Electric shock from low voltage household currents is an ever-present hazard, cautions the Idaho Medical Association. The danger is especially great if hands or body are wet. Flipping on a light switch in the bathroom while fresh from the tub or shower has caused many serious shocks, even deaths.

If someone in your household is seized by an electric shock be cautious in the rescue.

Shut off the current if you can. Stand on a dry surface and avoid contact with a grounded conductor, such as a pipe. Use a stick of dry wood to break the flow of current if necessary.

Once the victim is freed from the grip of the current, give artificial respiration if breathing has stopped.

Most important, call a doctor. Avoid home electrical accidents by making certain that light switches and electrical appliances are in good condition.

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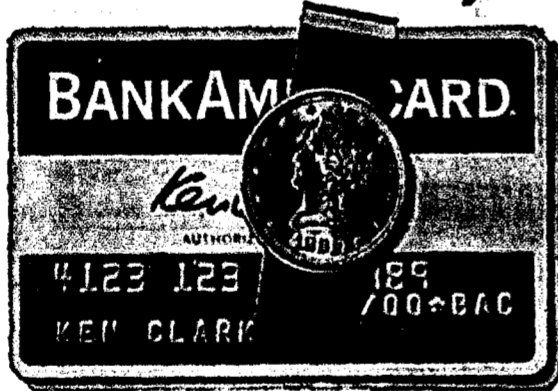


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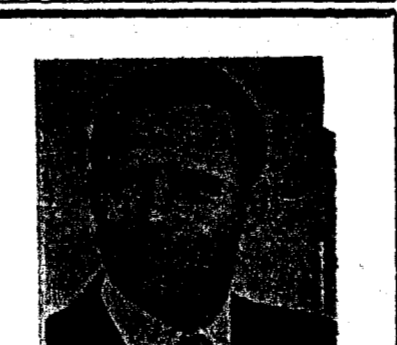

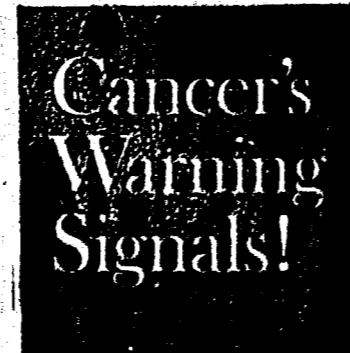
Kendrick Gazette, June 12, 1941 What Happened Here, 20 years Ago

**GOUT—A PAINFUL DISEASE**  
Gout is a painful disease of the joints, which seem to affect the instep, and frequently the knee, ankle, hips and shoulders, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

The joint of the big toe is affected more often than any other.

The joint affected by gout can swell and become hot, red and tender within an hour. Pain persists for a few days or weeks and then disappears until the next attack.

After the disease has been active for several years, chalky deposits may begin to build up in cartilage of the ear, nose, eyelids, and extremities. The deposits are made of material called urate (your-ate), a salt of uric acid.

An excess of uric acid in the blood causes gout. Treatment consists mostly of administration of drugs that are specific for the disease. Anyone with gout should be under medical care.

### Reservoir Turnover Happens Twice A Year

About 600 stream miles are flooded as impoundments behind water storage and hydroelectric power dams in Idaho. People who drive along miles of deep and often clear backwater frequently come up with the idea that the reservoirs should be good fishing.

In all truth, a newly created reservoir sometimes produce phenomenal angling for a few years. This may be just an interlude while a population explosion of carp, squawfish, or some other undesirable rough fish species is occurring.

It takes more than many acres of stream miles of water to provide good sport fishing whether for trout or warm water species such as bass, crappie or perch.

At least three main physical changes takes place when a river is blocked by an earth dam, or concrete and steel, for that matter—or any other type of barrier. These changes are water temperatures, velocities and turbidities.

Other changes occur, too, including the wide fluctuation of water levels found in some reservoirs where seasonal draw downs are customary, sometimes leaving spawned eggs high and dry. But this is not a characteristic that is general to all water impoundments.

Take the matter of temperature, for example. Twice a year the waters of all reservoirs turn over just as they do in lakes—once in the spring and once in the fall. This amounts to the same thing as breathing and is important to all things in the reservoirs, both plant and animal. Hence, its also of interest to anglers.

The reason for the semiannual turnover is that water has the greatest density at 39 degrees. It is lighter when

warmer than that, heavier when colder. Naturally surface water is warmer in summer, cooler in winter, but water at the bottom of a good sized reservoir will stay about the same, 39 degrees, the year round.

Being a poor conductor of heat, water is warmed or cooled by wind and wave action far more than by the sun. That is the reason that reservoirs warm slowly in the spring and cool just as slowly in the autumn. For example, the less dense waters near the surface of a reservoir are near freezing in the springtime, while heavier water at the bottom is a constant 39 degrees. As surface waters are warmed, they get denser and sink, thus gradually mixing all layers of water until the reservoir is 39 degrees from bottom to top.

In other words, wind and waves have mixed the water until it has the same density and viscosity throughout, and meanwhile carbon dioxide and other waste gases of decomposition are released at the surface.

Oxygen is absorbed. Mixing or breathing, stops as summer winds and waves warm upper levels to more than 39 degrees, leading to stratification or layers of variable temperatures with depth.

For example, fishermen have their best success in the narrow middle layer of water called thermocline. The reason for this is that minute floating plants and animals, known as plankton comprise the initial link in the food chain of reservoir and lake fish. The plankton develop in upper water, the epilimnion. But, as it ages, it sinks to the denser water, the thermocline. The Plankton eaters, such as trout and kokanee, converge in this area of abundant food.

Reservoirs and lakes take their second deep breath with the coming of autumn. Winds lower the water surface temperature, causing it to sink as it becomes heavier. The circulation continues all the water reaches 39 degrees. Then winter comes.

The surface temperatures cool to 32 degrees, often freezing. The water seals itself from air with an ice coat and enters a winter stagnation. Winter fishermen move in, finding a difference of only five to seven degrees from top to bottom with no thermocline, and begin hauling out perch and even trout.

Finally, fishermen and fisheries managers both have come to learn through experience that even neighboring reservoirs are not alike. They may be large or small, deep or shallow, alkaline or acid and turbid or clear. They may have soil, sand, gravel or rocky bottoms. Reservoir water temperatures may vary from very cold to extremely warm. General productivity of fish, whatever the species, depends on these factors, and whether the waters are fertile or infertile.
