## Liquor By Drink Proposition Faces Juliaetta Voters July 13; Kendrick Soon

With a valid petition presented to them requesting it, the Juliaetta City Council this week set Tuesday, July 13, as the date when the city will again decide to approve or disapprove the sale of liquor by the drink within the city limits. The legal notice setting forth voter requirements appears elsewhere in this issue of the Gazette-News.

The election will be held Tuesday, July 13, between the hours of 12 noon and 8:00 p. m. in the Juliaetta City Hall.

This will be the second time in three years that this same issue has come before the residents of Juliaetta. In August of 1968, the same issue was defeated.

At the present time only the sale of beer is allowed within the Juliaetta city limits. There is no state liquor dispensary in Juliaetta.

**An Issue In Kendrick**  
Mayor Bob Watts of Kendrick said Tuesday afternoon that the liquor by the drink issue will soon be facing Kendrick residents, too. He stated a petition requesting an election on this issue was presented to the council at the June meeting and then withdrawn for technical reasons, with the understanding that it would be presented at the July meeting. Mayor Watts said the council does expect the petition at the next meeting and that the city then has five days to decide on an election date to be held within thirty days.

Simple majorities are required to approve the issue.

## Cancer Claims H. W. Freytag

Henry William Freytag, 64, a native of Kendrick, died Wednesday, June 2 at 8:10 p. m. of cancer at Gritman Hospital where he had been a patient one day. He had been ill three years.

Freytag, who had been a logging truck driver in the area, purchased the grocery store at Helmer in 1959. He bought the McCulloch franchise after he retired from truck driving in 1966.

He was born at Kendrick August 31, 1906, and married the former Violet Shostrum March 16, 1946, at Superior, Mont. She survives him at the family home at Helmer.

Funeral services for Freytag were conducted June 5 at Shor's Chapel in Moscow with Rev. Eldon Clark of Deary officiating.

## Largest Crowds Ever Attended Genesee's Community Day, Centennial Celebration

Genesee—The weather cooperated beautifully last Saturday and held off the almost daily rain shower until late afternoon, as Genesee staged its biggest and best Community Day celebration to date. Crowds estimated in excess of 2,000 swarmed into town to enjoy a variety of entertainment under a bright, warm and sunny sky.

The day began with a breakfast of sausage, eggs, pancakes and coffee for at least 250 people who filled through the Fire Station until 9:00 a. m. The serving got off to a slow start, then picked up pace about 7:00 a. m. and was steady until 9:00 when the lines were closed.

In the kiddie parade which preceded the main parade, 5-year-old Beth Martin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Martin, and her pet Air-dale dogs, won first place for outstanding entries. In the main parade, which was led by Grand Marshall Emma Shirod, the Genesee Lutheran Parish, with an outstanding float depicting a church, complete with singing congregation, won first place. The Genesee Future Homemakers of America took second place. Bill Haxton won first place in the novelty entry division.

In the beard-growing contest, Carl

Simons, sporting an Amish type growth, won first place and Carl Scharnhorst with an untamed mass of hair, placed second.

Mrs. Al Zenner was awarded first place for the best old time costume and Mrs. Wayne Hickman, Lewiston placed second.

Some 1700 hungry people feasted on 500 pounds of barbecued beef, 250 pounds of cabbage, 10 cases of beans and many pounds and gallons of pop, coffee, potato chips, etc. at the noon meal while being entertained by the Moscow oldtime fiddlers and a group of Clarkston Boy Scouts doing Indian dances and a group of square dancers from the Lewiston-Clarkston area.

During the afternoon, the trap shoot continued to draw good crowds, a queen contest talent show was held at the high school, Kendrick's Little League baseball team defeated Genesee 13-2, and two sky divers provided the crowd with a breath-taking display.

All during the day there were exhibits at exhibition hall, an art show and many carnival type games for the children. Over 300 people from five states signed the guest book in exhibit hall.

Also gracing the occasion was the presence of Mrs. Happie Wilson, who recently celebrated her 101st birthday anniversary and is Genesee's oldest living resident, although she now stays at a Moscow nursing home.

## June Will Set Rainfall Record

With the month only half gone, rainfall figures have already exceeded all records for June as the area sloshes through mud and lush growth to go about its daily routine.

John Luedke, who maintains rainfall figures in Genesee, reported on Monday that 3.35 inches of rain had been recorded for the first 14 days of the month. In the Kendrick area last week the figure was up to 2.54 without calculating the heavy week end rains.

June of last year saw a total of 3.14 for the 30-day period. In 1969 there was only .83 of an inch during the entire month.

The heavy rains of the weekend flattened barley severely in several locations, especially in the wake of the wind which also accompanied the rain.

Almost all of the pea crops in the area are looking very good.

## Abner Corkill, 83, Passes In Spokane

Abner Corkill, 83, longtime resident of the Troy, Idaho, area died Saturday afternoon, June 12, at Holy Family Hospital at Spokane where he had been a patient for the past five days.

He was born Sept. 25, 1887 at Foxdale, Isle of Man, England, a son of John and Anna Corkill. In 1908 he married Eleanor Amy Craine. She preceded him in death in 1928.

In 1910, he came to the United States and worked for a time in Wyoming, before moving to Troy, where he started farming in 1912. One year later his wife and two children joined him at the Troy farm. He farmed in the area until 1940, then moved into Troy where he established his home and continued his active interest in livestock dealing.

In 1968 illness required him to enter the Latah Nursing Home at Moscow, where he has been since.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Rudy (Annie) Anderson, Troy; Mrs. Kenneth (Laura) Grim, Clarkston; Mrs. Ray (Mildred) Farrell, of Pullman; three sons, Roy, Vancouver, Wash., Wilbur, Kendrick, and Herbert, Grand Forks, N. D., and fourteen grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren.

The family suggests memorials be made to the Troy ambulance fund.

Funeral services for Corkill were held Tuesday, June 15 at 2:00 p. m. at Short's Chapel in Moscow. Rev. Donald Humber of Troy officiated.

Serving as pallbearers were Austin Swanson, Harold Milton, William Bendell, Rudolph Smith, Melvin Procyer and James Arnot, all of Troy.

Burial was at Burnt Ridge Cemetery near Troy.

Main business for the meeting consisted of board reorganization, selection of Auditor Glen Utzman of Moscow to audit district and student body books; a report on the summer maintenance program; review of the 650 State Statistical Analysis; approving dates July 25 through August 7th as vacation dates for the school superintendent.

Bills totaling \$6,281.29 were approved for payment. Two thousand dollars of this amount is reimbursable from the State Vocational Dept. and a check is expected soon.

GENESEE—At its regular meeting on Monday, June 14, the Genesee School Board reorganized for the coming year.

Tom Boyd was elected chairman of the board for another term and Ray Wedin was elected vice chairman. Wayne Hampton was also re-elected treasurer of the board. The other two members are Marion Holben and Ray Stout. Stout was not present at the meeting. Mahlon Pollett was hired as clerk of the board for the coming year.

The board heard a report by Supt. Lester Diehl on the work and repairs being done for summer on the school building. New shelving for the high school library has been ordered, and should arrive before school starts.

The board also approved the hiring of a new Home Ec teacher for the coming year, Miss Elaine Woodhouse from Montana State University.

After considerable discussion, the board approved hiring of a half time Women's P. E. instructor to instruct girls P. E. and coach girls' athletics. No one has been hired for this position yet.

A request to waive tuition to attend school at Genesee was turned down by the Board as the person requesting the waiver lives out of the district.

Considerable discussion was given to an anticipated increase in enrollment for the district in the elementary grades for the coming school year especially at the primary level. The board directed Superintendent Diehl to do some planning for the anticipated increase, and action will be taken if the anticipated increase does occur at the start of school.

1 tablespoon chopped parsley  
1/4 teaspoon garlic salt  
Roll biscuit dough to 1/4 inch thick. Combine all other ingredients and mix well. Spread mixture over dough. Roll as for jelly roll and cut into about 1 1/2 inch slices. Bake in greased dish 375 degrees for 1/2 hour or until lightly browned.

Combine drained off liquid with 1 cup salmon and 3 cups milk. Bring to a boil and thicken with flour or cornstarch. Salt and pepper to taste. Serve over rolls as a gravy.

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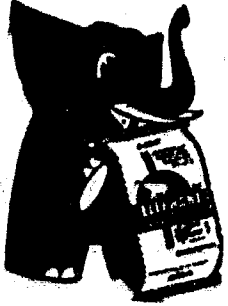
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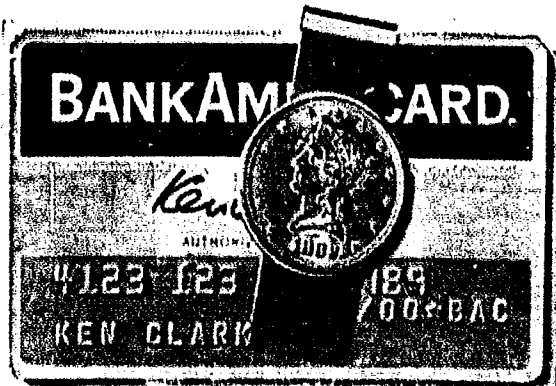

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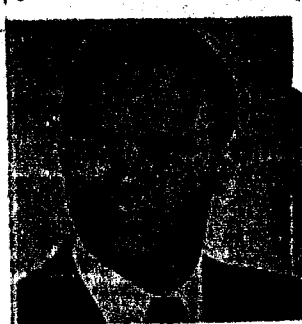

### SHEEP RAISERS TO VOTE IN PROMOTION REFERENDUM

A producer referendum on the wool and lamb market-development program will be held June 7 through 18 by mail.

"Any wool producer in Latah County who has owned sheep six months of age or older for at least 30 consecutive days during 1970 may cast a ballot in the referendum", said Melvin Procutier, member of the Latah County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

The mail referendum will be conducted by ASCS county offices. Ballots may be mailed in or producers may cast their vote by coming into their ASCS county office.

The outcome of the referendum will determine whether or not deductions from wool payments to producers will be continued. The deductions, as authorized in the National Wool Act, would be up to 1 1/2 cents a pound on wool and 7 1/2 cents a hundredweight on unshorn lambs, the rates for the past five years.

These deductions are used to enlarge the market for wool and lambs through advertising, merchandising

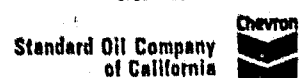

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and education. The promotion program is carried out under an agreement made between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers Council.

Producers have voted 4 similar agreements into effect since 1955. For the agreement to be extended through 1973, the June referendum must show approval nationally by at least two thirds of the producers voting, or by producers having at least two thirds of the volume of wool production represented by the vote.

If a new agreement is not approved by producers, no deductions will be withheld from wool payments on 1971 marketings. The ASPC programs would continue only as long as the present reserve fund permits or until some other agreement might be approved by producers.

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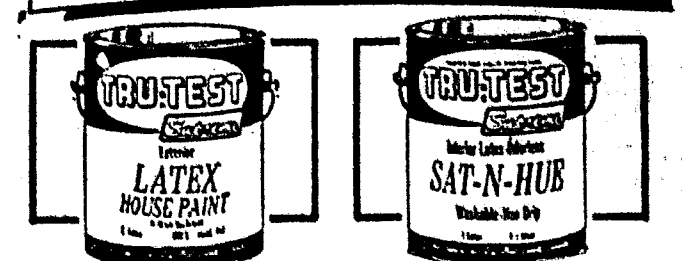

**WILDLIFE VIEWPOINT**

Stuart L. Murrell

Regional Conservation Educator  
It's the time of year when birds are nesting and many questions are sprung on parents about the kind of nests and young birds that children find in their wanderings. So, I'll attempt to cover some of the more common types of nests that birds build in our area and their nesting habits. First, it is not uncommon to find birds that have fallen out of their nests at various stages of their development. If they are not able to fly then it is best to return them to their nest if you can find it or put them out of their misery since they probably won't survive. It is not advisable to keep them as pets since many are on the protected list and it would be illegal to keep them. If they can fly at all, leave them where you find them as the mother is probably nearby waiting to feed and take care of them.

What are some of the common nests you might find in this area? The robin's nest is about five inches in diameter and is lined with mud inside of a grass or stick nest. If it is occupied the eggs will be a pale blue color with a few spots on them. The young robin is much more of a drab color and has numerous black spots on its reddish breast.

Although the English sparrow prefers holes in trees or under eaves of houses, it will nest in trees if these preferred sites aren't available. It builds a large, sloppy nest of about 10 inches across with loosely gathered twigs and grasses. The mourning dove builds a meager nest as it can with usually a few twigs perched on the fork of a limb. The two white eggs are precariously laid on top of these twigs. Wind storms raise havoc with doves' nests because of their poor nesting ability. However, they have an ace up their sleeve, since the dove is one of the few birds in our area that raise several broods a year.

Another common nest that is very difficult to locate is the killdeer's. It finds a nice gravel or rocky area near a stream or water and lays its eggs right out on the ground without building a nest. The eggs are a tan color with dark brown spots and almost impossible to see unless you're very close. The killdeer will act as if it has a broken wing, attempting to draw you away from its nest or young, if you get close. If you chase after the killdeer, it will miraculously recover and fly away once it reaches a safe distance from its nest. The starling is another very common

bird in our area and usually nests in holes in trees or around buildings, in crevices and cracks. I found a young starling in my backyard recently and it looked like it was all mouth. When it opened its beak to be fed the whole inside was a bright yellow color. I'm sure the mother had no problems deciding where to stuff the food down.

Another common nest found in our area is that of Bullock's oriole which is a hanging nest with a hole in the side for the bird to enter. It is a favorite of nest collector since it is very well made out of grasses and has such a unique appearance.

Most of us are familiar with the cliff swallows nest which is so common along the steep rocky banks or under bridges near water. It is plastered together with small chunks of mud and is very well made with a soft lining of grasses.

The greatest find of all is a hummingbird's nest. I haven't seen too many of these birds around here but there are a few. It makes a little nest about 1 1/2 inches across and it is always camouflaged with small lichens stuck to the outside of the nest. It is usually lined with horse hair or other fine materials. The white eggs are only about 1/3 of an inch long. The hummingbird I saw landed on my fishing rod while I was hiking into the Selway Craggs. I guess trees were so scarce on the high, rocky ridge I was on that he had to make do with whatever roosting areas were available.

Nesting materials seem to pose no problem to birds. I even found a great length of monofilament line wound around and around inside a red-winged blackbird's nest the other day so I guess birds will use just about anything in our modern age. It's fun to learn more about the birds around you and discovering the types of nests they build is a good beginning.

The forest is full of living things—birds, animals, trees, and flowers. Do your part and keep it unharmed. Prevent forest fires—Keep Idaho Green!

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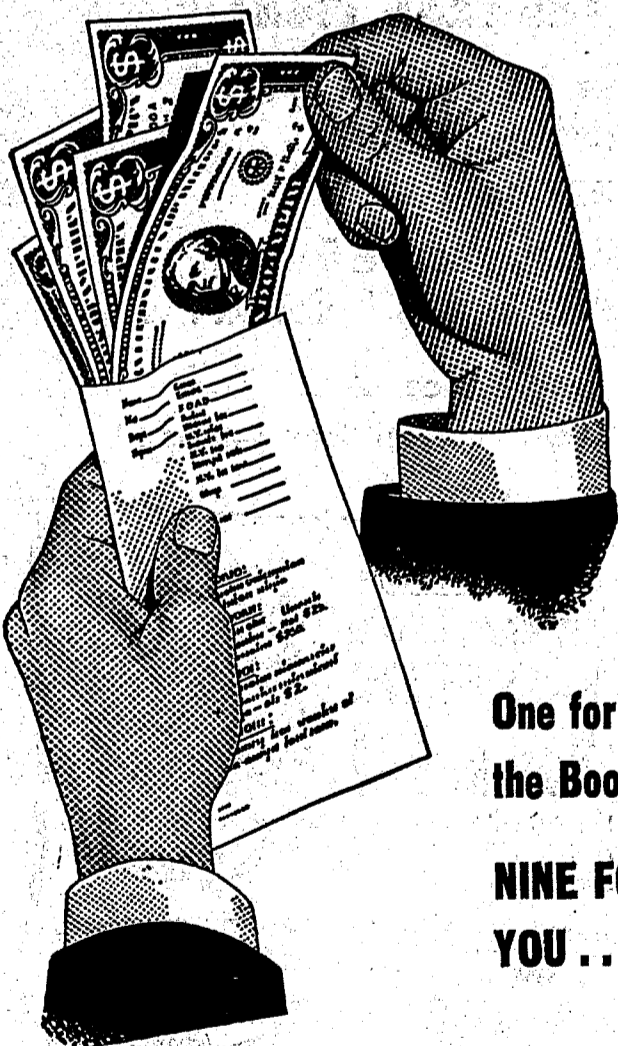

**Duane Musgrave, 42, Passes June 10**

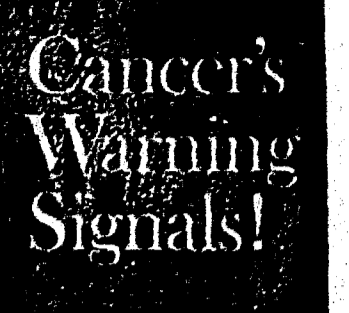
