Pre-nuptial showers included two in Bovill and one at the Valley church in Genesee.

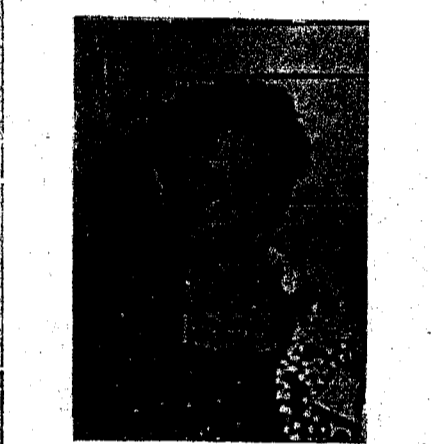
Masons, OES Will Honor Wedding Anniversaries With Picnic June 27th

Mrs. Rose Bartlett, Early Day Nurse, Passes In Lewiston

Mrs. Rose E. Bartlett, 77, early day practical nurse and a long-time resident of the Kendrick-Juliaetta area, died Sunday afternoon, June 13 at Orchards Nursing Home, Lewiston. She had suffered a stroke in April.

Born at Mayview August 26, 1893, she was the daughter of Francis and Josephine McNeal. She moved with her parents to Bartlett, Ore., in 1906 and on Nov. 23, 1910, was married to Lawrence, the son of the community's founder.



They moved to Pomeroy in 1922 and to Kendrick in 1927 where Bartlett farmed until 1952 when he retired and moved to Lewiston.

While living at Kendrick, Mrs. Bartlett worked for several years as a licensed practical nurse and delivered some 25 babies in the area. She later worked at Lewiston's St. Joseph's Hospital until returning to Kendrick in 1961. Her husband died March 24, 1963. Mrs. Bartlett moved to Juliaetta in 1967 where she remained until her death.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Hazel Wilson, Lewiston, Mrs. William (Maxine) Fry, Juliaetta; four sons, Harold and Loren, both of Lewiston; Lawrence A. of Espanola, N.M.; Wayne of Clarkston; 13 grandchildren and 19 great-grandchildren. She was a member of the Assembly of God Church at Kendrick.

The funeral was Wednesday afternoon at 2 at Malcom's Little Chapel of Flowers, Lewiston, with the Rev. Ronald Perkins, pastor of the Assembly of God, officiating.

The family suggests memorials to the Juliaetta ambulance fund or the building fund of the Assembly of God Church at Kendrick.

Burial was at Lewis-Clark Memorial Garden, Lewiston.

directors in advance of the whys, whores, whens and hows of upcoming fish and game projects. When these men are convinced that it will benefit wildlife resources and is in the public interest, the newspapers, both daily and weekly, and radio-television outlets will do the best promotion job obtainable anywhere for any consideration.

Just as an informed editor or program director will help promote wildlife management projects, there is nothing more damaging to a public information campaign than an ill-informed newsmen. But no agency, either federal or state, can afford the luxury of just telling him off when he "boots" a story.

One of Idaho's outdoor editors put it this way "First, there is a simple matter of prudent human relations. Familiarity breeds respect. It is easier to criticize someone in a vacuum than it is if you know you might be running into him the next day. Frequent personal contact will moderate more criticism and improve relations. That's why the United States gets along better with

the Soviet Union than with Red China. We have contacts with the Soviets, and these contacts are a moderating influence.

"Being candid improves credibility with a chronically and professionally suspicious newsmen. Public information is not a faucet to be turned off when you want publicity and turned on when you want to hide those inevitable mistakes. If you level with the press when you do make a mistake, the press—and therefore the people—will be more inclined to believe you the next time you are trumpeting an achievement."

What is the big story that affects everybody directly or personally?

In a nutshell, it is that man's mastery of the earth will pay him greatest tribute when he achieves the forbearance to leave some of it alone. This theme was spoken even more simply by Isaiah many centuries ago, as follows:
 "Woe unto them that join house to house, that lay field to field till there be no place that they may be placed alone in the midst of the earth. (Isaiah 5.8)

LIVESTOCK

Cattle and sheep are helping in the management of the Boise Front rangeland by "hedging" brush species, and by preventing grass species from crowding out bitterbrush, sagebrush, rabbitbrush and other browse plants on critical wintering areas. It is now recognized that a limited amount of grazing by domestic livestock can be used as a management tool. Other techniques are chaining, seeding, and planting nursery seedlings in range vegetation work.

EGG PRODUCTION INCREASED

Egg production from Japanese green pheasants has been increased significantly this spring by changing the brood station from the Jerome game farm to Post Falls in the Panhandle Region. About 200 hens are producing more than twice as many eggs as 400 green pheasants layed in southern Idaho. Differences in climate may be the underlying reasons for the upswing.

IDAHO HEALTH NEWS

Farm accidents kill and injure thousands of people each year, notes the Idaho Medical Association, and of all farm equipment, the tractor is involved in the most injury-producing accidents.

Major factors in tractor accidents are tractor tipping or flipping on or off the highway, falls from tractors, collision, and accidents with exposed power take-off shafts.

Also many farmers get burned while trying to refuel a hot or running engine or when smoking while refueling.

It will pay the tractor operator to keep a few simple safety precautions in mind.

Keep speed at a safe level. Tractors aren't built for it and turns at high speeds cause many upsets. Backward flips are a danger when going up or down slopes, crossing slopes and ditches or pulling heavy loads. For heavy loads that push down on the drawbar, set the drawbar at its lowest position and weight the front end.

High hitches, such as to the axle or seat to get extra traction, can cause a backward flip when pulling or trying to pull a heavy load. Always hitch to the drawbar.

When attempting to start pulling an extra heavy load, such as stump pulling, apply power gradually. If the front feels as if it is going to rise, stop.

If wheels stick, be especially cautious to avoid having the chassis

Craters of the Moon National Monument is in full bloom with Wild Onion, Anderson Larkspur, and the well known Dwarf Buckwheat and Dwarf Monkeyflower. National Park Service officials recommend traveling to the park between now and the next couple of weeks to see and photograph the flowers at their best.

The full complement of visitor services begins this weekend with the visitor center open from 8:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. with its exhibits, displays and audio visual devices. Naturalist lead walks and evening campfire talks will also begin daily operation. Officials advise those planning an overnight stay to arrive early since the campground is usually full by 4:00 p. m.

Visitation to the Monument, as with most National Park Service areas, continues to increase with over 26,000 people enjoying the park compared with 25,000 at the same time last year. 1970 was a record year for the area with 223,502 visitors.

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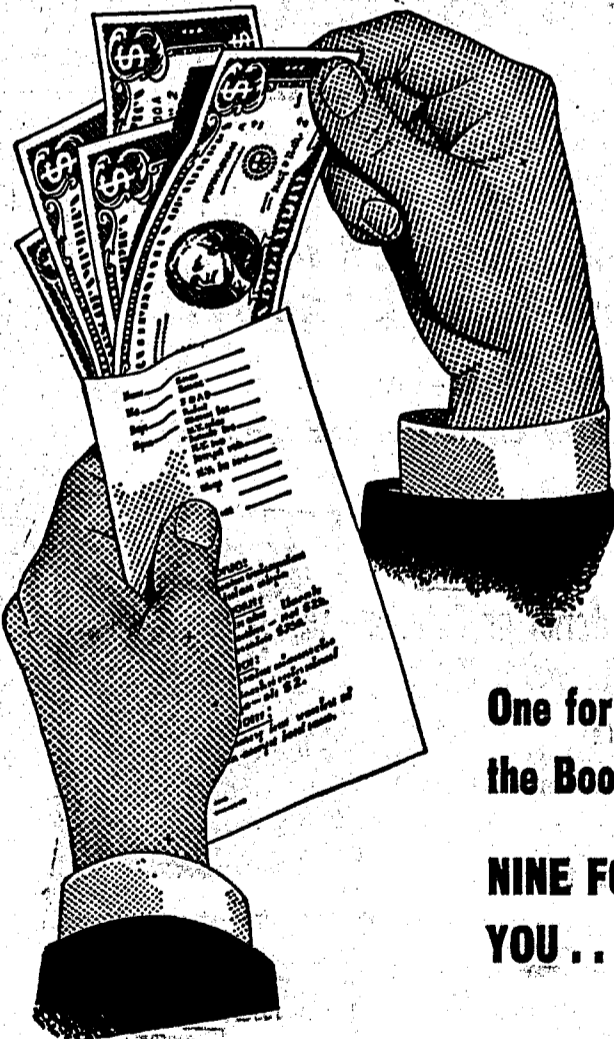
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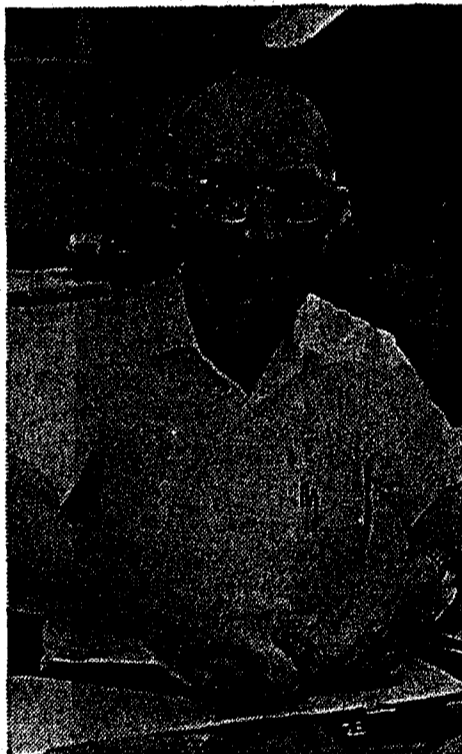

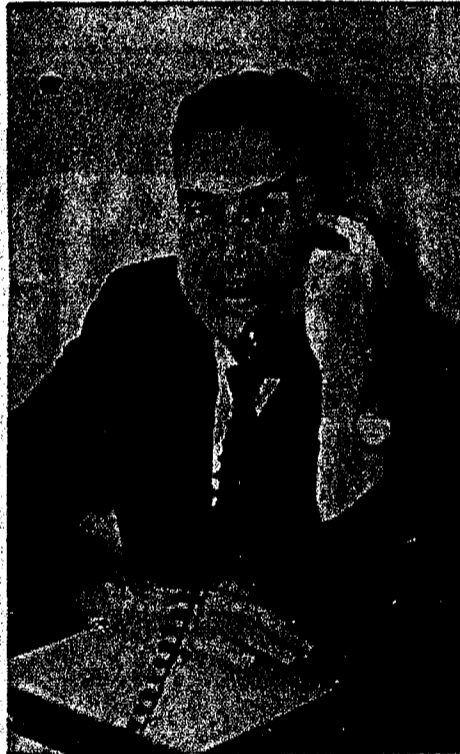
