Sheri Herman Reports On Girls State Experience

GENESEE—The 25th session of Syringa Girl's State was held June 13-19 at NW Nazarene College, Nampa. I would like to thank the American Legion Auxiliary for giving me the opportunity to attend this well-sponsored program.

My week started at 11:00 a. m. as I and 275 other girls arrived in Nampa for a busy and exciting week. Everyone registered in the student Union Building where lunch was served, then off to city meetings.

Each day began when all of the Girl's Stater's marched out to the flag pole where the U. S. flag and the Girl's State flag were raised and the Pledge of Allegiance said. To me this started the day out right because by saluting the flag I realized the importance of learning about our country's government, freedoms and privileges that few other countries enjoy.

Monday and Tuesday were spent learning about city and county government. The entire state at Syringa was divided into three counties with three cities in each county. I was a citizen of Larkspur City in Democracy Co.

Each city had a motto and ours was "Like the blossom of the larkspur we bloom forth with the prospect of leadership and the responsibility of freedom. Each city elected a mayor and four councilwomen and appointed city officials. I was appointed head of city parks. At this time we filed for county and state offices. I ran for Democracy County Sheriff. Primary elections were Tuesday. This election limited the candidates running to one from each party. We had from 2:30 p. m. Tuesday to noon Wednesday to campaign for state and county offices. Everyone takes the campaign seriously and puts up signs everywhere. I made about 50 stars saying, "Sheri for SHERIFF," which was effective because I was elected.

Tuesday morning political parties were organized. Helping with the organization of the Nationalist party was Mrs. Pat Ehrlich and helping the Federalists was Mrs. James Goller. Party platforms were formed, officers elected and party songs written and sung.

We had a surprise visit from Governor Cecil D. Andrus Monday. We had a chance to ask him questions and find out his personal views on a variety of subjects. Miss Helen Wilson, a professor at Northwest Nazarene College was the guest speaker Monday evening. She gave a most amusing and interesting talk.

Other special events were the traditional syringa bush planting, "The Happening" Wednesday evening where each city provided entertainment, and the inaugural ceremonies Thursday evening.

Friday we visited the capitol, where four bills were passed. I was in the House of Representatives. I, Jack Murphy spoke to us during a joint session of the legislature.

He urged us as Girl's Stater's to become involved in the political process since many of us will be eligible to vote in the next election.

I would like to say how much this opportunity meant to me. I learned more about government and citizenship than if I had read a book on the subject. Thank you to the American Legion Auxiliary or the privilege of attending the 25th session of Syringa Girl's State. —Sheri Herman.

PANHANDLE CHILD DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION

Panhandle Child Development, Assoc., Inc. in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho has been awarded a \$50,000 grant to develop a model to serve preschool handicapped children in rural areas.

It is anticipated the project will serve approximately 72 handicapped children aged 18 months to 6 years residing in Shoshone, Nez Perce and Latah counties. Preschoolers who are hard of hearing, speech impaired, visually impaired, emotionally disturbed, crippled and potentially educationally handicapped will be included.

Applications will be taken for three Master's level teachers for classrooms in Lewiston, Moscow, and Kellogg-Wallace. Classes will begin in mid September and extend through the regular school year.

Pre-schoolers will be screened for placement at Child Development Centers in Coeur d'Alene and Lewiston. Parents who think their child might be eligible for the program may contact:

The value of the wool was down to about twenty-five cents per pound this year. The 1970 price was forty-four cents.

Allen Gillespie, Moscow, Wool-grower Association Director, hauled one truckload with County Agent Gordon Dalley taking another and checking the wool as it was graded and weighed.

Five Genesee Business Firms Burglarized Sunday

Five Genesee business firms were broken into and burglarized sometime between midnight Saturday and early Sunday morning by a group of ambitious, if unskilled, thieves. Robbed were the Pastime Tavern, The Electric Shop, Esther's, Springer Insurance and Esser Construction. The robberies were first discovered by Stub Galtz when he opened his Pastime Tavern for business around seven a. m. Sunday morning. Stub notified Genesee policeman, Chet Green who then called in the Latah County Sheriff.

The thieves gained entry into the Pastime by prying open the front door. Once inside they took 8 pair of gloves, 2 cartons of cigarettes, money from the juke box and pin ball machines and small change from the cash drawer. Stub also stated that the burglars must have been hungry for they also took a partially-filled jar of beef jerky from the counter. Desk drawers were also pulled out and pilfered through.

At the Electric Shop, the thieves also broke in at the front door. Two inexpensive wrist watches were taken and a radio stolen, plus small change from the cash drawer.

The front door at Esther's (formerly Wilson Drug) was also broken to get inside that store where two of three cigarette lighters were taken.

At Springers Insurance the burglars broke their pattern by going through the back door. There they attempted to pry a wall safe open but were unsuccessful. Several desk drawers there were also pilfered but little else bothered.

The front door at Esser's Construction was broken and Loise's wedding ring and a Knights of Columbus ring taken from a safe which had been left unlocked. None of Esser's rock or arrowhead collection were bothered by the thieves.

Receives Master's Degree



June Rainfall Totals 4.58 Inches

Rainfall during the month of June in the Genesee area reached a record-breaking 4.28 inches for 1971, it was reported this week by John Luedke, who maintains rainfall figures for the Genesee area for the SCS. This is the most moisture received during a June in the 18 years since records have been kept.

The previous high for June was reached last year when 3.14 inches was recorded for the 30-day period.

The average June rainfall for the past eighteen years has come out to 1.88 inches.

The smallest amount of rain during June came in 1959 when just a trace of moisture—.06 was recorded.

Federal Grant Received For Nez Perce Tribe

Washington, D. C. — Idaho Senators Frank Church and Len B. Jordan and Representative James McClure announced this week that the Nez Perce tribe of Idaho have received a grant to \$60,140 to continue economic development in emergency food assistance programs for reservation Indians in five counties.

A grant from the Office of Economic Opportunity will be administered by the Latah office for Nez Perce, Lewis, Clearwater, Latah and Idaho counties.

The grant will provide for operation of a voucher system for the purchase of food, health, nutrition and consumer education programs, employment for participants as health aides and establishment of a Nez Perce Arts and Crafts Co-operative.



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**SAGE GROUSE BOOMING
 TO NESTING SURVEYED**

Studies have shown sage grouse hens may travel up to five miles from their booming grounds. The type of nesting habitat preferred by the birds is also being recorded so that land management programs can be geared to provide it. While birds are quite mobile it appears they need protection of important nesting areas and relief from livestock pressures during the egg laying period during the 10-15 day laying period and will readily abandon their nest if disturbed.

Robert Authenrieth, game research biologist, has found excellent populations of sage grouse in the Big Lost River area near McKay in recent studies. Ten Explorer Scouts from Jerome Post 307, sponsored by the Idaho Fish and Game Department, located 127 nests while searching the area around six strutting grounds in the vicinity of a Thousand Springs and Barton Flat. The highest number found in previous studies in the Owyhees, Shoshone Basin and Little Lost River areas was 60 nests.

The main reason for the nesting search is to find the distance that sage grouse travel from their booming grounds to nest. This information can then be used to protect the vital habitat from grazing during the nesting period and in cooperative planning with other land management agencies such as sagebrush spraying.

Information is also being obtained on the birds' movements by tagging and radio tracing. There were 70 grouse marked near McKay this spring in a cooperative program with the U. S. Bureau of Land Management and U. S. Forest Service. Three nesting hens had radio transmitters placed on them so hen and brood movements could be followed more directly. The hen sage grouse usually travels by walking over land with its broods to wetter areas as the succulent vegetation in the nesting country dries up. Hens will not move broods across large areas lacking cover, which is usually provided by sagebrush. Plans call for 200-300 birds to be marked in Copper Basin to determine if they are migrating from the Big Lost or Arco areas.

Large swaths of sprayed or plowed and, which have removed sagebrush can create a block across their migration route. These markers consist of plastic collars paced on the grouse neck. Any person observing marked sage grouse should report the location, date, and color of marking to their local conservation officer. It is hoped hunters will also turn in this information on birds they bag during the hunting season.

Plans also call for capturing 30 to 50 grouse chicks for a special life retirement study being conducted at Idaho State University. They will be placed in a pen where they will be subjected to varying rates of water, temperature, humidity and cover. It is hoped this information can be used in management by being able to predict what the producing might be with varying types of spring and early summer weather. This hope could also be used for setting seasons and bag limits.

IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

Job opportunities increased some what during the past week in the Moscow area. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager for the Department of Employment, reported that his office had placed 18 workers in gainful jobs during the past week. During the previous week only 11 workers were given job finding help, and during the same week a year ago 14 workers were so assisted. At the end of the week there were 14 jobs still open, just one more than at the end of the previous week. Many more job opportunities are needed by college and high school students who are seeking work in this area. Hartstein reported that his office is receiving 25 to 30 new applications each day from students from the area, and that those who have already applied are contacting his office in increasing numbers daily. We could probably fill dozens of jobs if they were suitable for young people, and would be for the summer only, he said.

The number of persons filing claims for unemployment continue to decline from the previous week, leaving a total of 264 persons currently claiming benefits. At the end of last week there were 285 persons seeking jobless pay, while one year ago the total in Latah Co. was only 158. Most of the decline was noted among woodworkers who returned to work during the past couple of weeks, Hartstein said.

Beaver Program Goals
 Beaver trend counts were made last fall and early winter by conservation officers and game biologists throughout the state. A trend count is a statewide sampling procedure to learn the number of colonies present. All or some part of 27 counties which is about 1/3 of the state, were closed to beaver trapping and some areas had a specified number of beavers trapped. In beaver complaint areas, additional sites were opened for general trapping.

Three main objectives of the beaver management program are (1) to keep management complaints at a minimum in agricultural areas, (2) to maintain beaver populations in suitable complaint areas and permit trappers to harvest the annual surplus, and (3) to trans plant beaver to streams that were not stocked.

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YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT

By Robert L. Salter, acting director **FEW REJECTS DETECTED**
This year it is planned that the verification of eligibility for entering controlled hunts will be converted to a rapid automatic computer identifying system and that social security numbers will be used to help check errors in applications.
Preliminary checking indicates that very few errors have been made to date but there is still time for resubmission of a corrected application in the event that an error is found. Early application for controlled hunt permits is urged to allow time for correction of errors and filing of new applications with in the deadline cutoff date, July 13.
Because of the new quota system for nonresident license sales, the odds this year of residents drawing controlled hunt permits have been improved. The sale of nonresident combination hunting-fishing licenses (\$135) at the Boise office is brisk, but a supply of licenses of this class is available.
The first drawing for moose, sheep and goat will be July 29. If sufficient applications are not received for the first drawing those applicants having submitted a complete, correct application will be given a permit and a second drawing will be held for the remaining permits.

Rough Fish Control
Squoxin, a selective squawfish killer, will be used soon to eradicate the 30 miles of the St. Joe River without harm to trout or other game fish or aquatic insects. About 110 miles of the North Fork of the Clearwater River above Orofino also will be treated with squoxin prior to the closure of Dworshak Dam in August. Squawfish spawners moving into approximately 40 miles of the main tributary streams of Cascade Reservoir in late June and July, depending on water and weather condition can also expect a facefull of squoxin for the fourth straight year.
Work in 1971 is again performed under the terms of an experimental permit issued by the federal government. Strict control will insure that only a small portion (30 parts per billion) of squoxin will be dispersed.
"Before and after" biological samples will insure that insects, crayfish, clams and nontarget species of fish are not harmed. In a series of similar tests since 1965, department fisheries biologists have never noted any mortalities to organisms other than squawfish.
However, a series of tests over several years are needed to complete all federal tests.
Application envelopes and other materials for controlled trophy hunts are in the hands of vendors for public distribution. Sportsmen are reminded not to use the old application forms for the controlled hunts printed last year. It is necessary that social security numbers be listed because clarification of eligibility procedure will be converted to a rapid computer identification system. The new system of verification will bring to light situations such as one last season when a violator was arrested for having filed eleven applications for the same controlled hunt.
