## Cold, Rainy Weather Still Delays Farm Work; June Moisture Set Records

Haying operations were again delayed early this week as rain fell Monday night and early Tuesday morning forcing farmers to again put off cutting and baling operations for an undetermined period. Unless the skies clear and the weather warms up, it is possible that the haying season may extend right into early harvest — a prospect farmers don't even like to think about.

The rains have been accompanied by wind and temperatures which dropped down into the high thirties and low forties in some of the higher elevations — with even frost in the mountains.

The weather stayed clear, but mild for the Fourth of July holiday with

a chilly breeze blowing across the Genesee area from mid-afternoon until well into the night. Monday was also clear, but not too warm until late in the afternoon, when the first showers fell. Rain fell intermittently during the night and the temperature dipped down into the low forties Tuesday morning!

Many farmers, eager to get at haying work had cancelled out any holiday trips to spend the Fourth of July in the fields, but the Monday night rain still forced a vacation for many.

**June Wet Month**

June set a record rainfall figures in all sections of the country. Dick Benscoter, up on American Ridge, reported this week that June rainfall in his area totaled 3.13 inches, slightly up from the heavy 2.59 inches which fell in the same month of 1970.

There was 4.05 inches of rain on Big Bear Ridge in June, reported Charles Bower. This was way above the 2.61 for June of last year.

Jim Carlton, who maintains rainfall figures on Fix Ridge, said Tuesday morning that he recorded a total of 3.40 inches of rain in his area for June. This is over an inch more than the 2.02 inches he recorded in June of 1970.

## Cedar Ridge Pioneer, Eva L. Smith, Succumbs At Lewiston Hospital

Miss Eva Luella Smith, 78, a pioneer resident of the Cedar Ridge and Kendrick areas, died at the St. Joseph's Hosp. in Lewiston, Saturday, where she had been a patient since suffering a stroke at her home on June 17th.

Miss Smith, a resident of Lewiston for 25 years, was a retired practical nurse and active member of the Civic Club, a garden club, a senior citizen group and past Noble Grand of Alpha Rebekah Lodge.

She was born a daughter of "Dock" and Nellie Smith, pioneer homesteaders on Cedar Ridge east of Kendrick, May 6, 1893. She lived on the homestead after her parents died and lived in the first home to be wired for electricity on that ridge.

She sold the ranch in 1946 and moved to her present home on Idaho Street. She enrolled in a nurses' training course at the St. Joseph's Hospital and became a practical nurse in Idaho and Washington.

In 1959 Miss Smith helped organize the Cedar Creek annual picnic which has been renewed every year since that time. Her hobbies included gardening, of which she once said: "One is near the heart of God when working in a garden."

Survivors include one sister, Mrs. Ellison (Anna) Mitchell, Polson, Mont., two sisters-in-law, Mrs. Geo. E. Smith, 323 16th St., Lewiston, and Mrs. Eva Daniels, Lenore, Ida. Her youngest brother, George, preceded her in death May 7, 1971.

Funeral arrangements are pending at Vassar-Rawls Funeral Home in Lewiston.

## Monday, July 12, Meeting Will Seek Opinions On County Road Consolidation

A public meeting at the Kendrick Fire Hall Monday evening, July 12, will be used by county commissioners and Road District officials to help reach conclusions on how Latah County's nine present highway districts might be consolidated into not more than six districts nor less than two, which is now required by state law. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 8:00 p. m.

The meeting is being conducted under the auspices of the Latah County Committee for Highway Consolidation. Gerald Ingle, county commissioner and chairman of the committee, will be in charge of the meeting. Gerald said last week that the committee had narrowed proposals to two which are now under consideration, but that the two are so close dollar-wise and mileage-wise that it wants to take the pulse of public feeling in Juliaetta, Kendrick and Genesee-Rimrock area.

The two proposals currently under consideration are: Proposal One — Which would divide the county into two districts,

with Genesee, Kendrick and Rimrock District in one portion, the remainder of Latah County in the other. For District One, the Genesee unit, estimated income would be \$825 per road mile; for District Two, \$719 per road mile. A part of Nez Perce County is included in the Rimrock District, so added income for that portion would bring the total to \$692 per road mile for District One.

Proposal Two — Would place Genesee in a district by itself, leaving the rest of Latah County in the other district. District One, Genesee, including a portion of Nez Perce County, would have an income of \$741 per road mile; District Two, \$699 per road mile.

After the Monday meeting, Ingle said, the Committee will meet again, then present recommendations to the County Commissioners, who will make the final decision. At the last election, the commissioners were given the final responsibility of deciding the issue. No time deadline was set by law, according to Ingle.

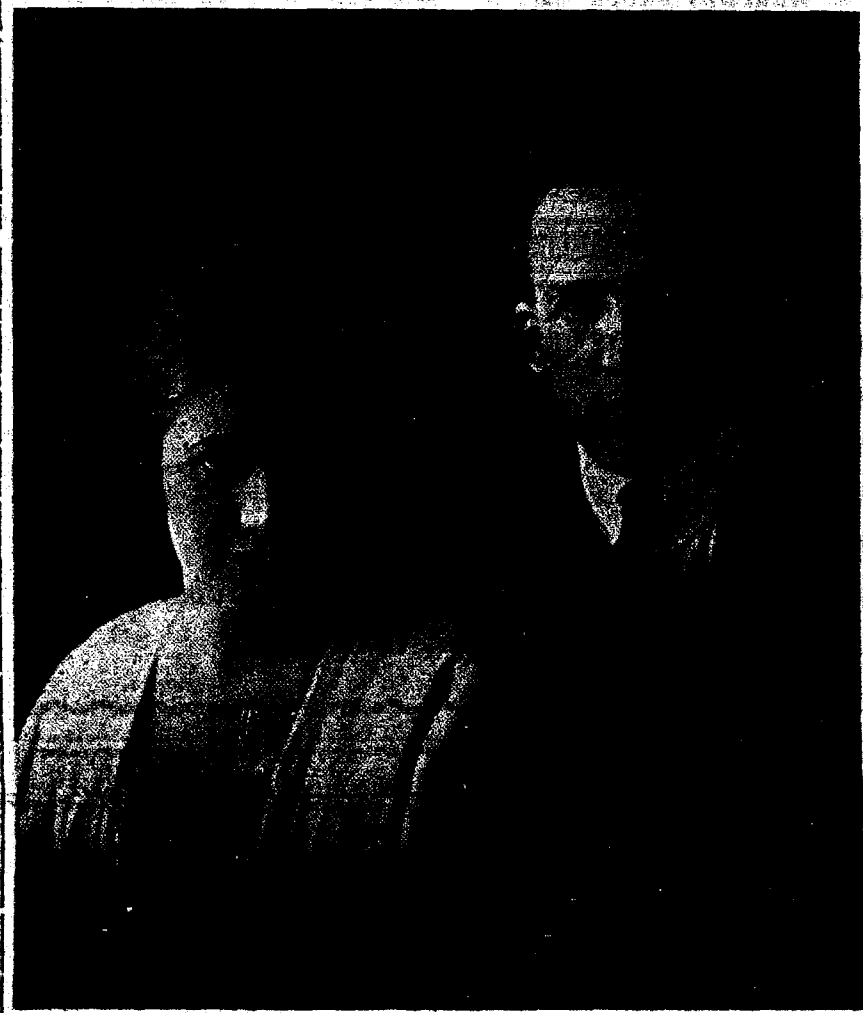

## Kendrick, Juliaetta Voters Face Liquor By Drink Question Tuesday, July 13

Voters in Juliaetta and Kendrick will go to the polls again Tuesday, July 13, to face the question of whether to allow hard liquor to be sold in bar rooms and taverns on a "by-the-drink" basis. Currently only beer can be sold in Juliaetta and Kendrick. The polls will be open from 12:00 noon until 8:00 p. m. in both cities. Juliaetta voters will cast their ballots at the City Hall; Kendrick voters in the Fire Hall.

This is the second time in less than four years that the issue has been raised in both towns. In November of 1967, Kendrick citizens turned down a similar issue by a vote of 83 to 66. In August of 1968, Juliaetta citizens rejected the issue by an even greater margin.

Kendrick has not allowed liquor by the drink for almost 20 years. As far as can be determined, Juliaetta has never allowed it to be served over the bar.

**18-Year-Old Vote**  
Kendrick and Juliaetta may have

the distinction of being the first towns in the state and possibly the nation to give the 18-year-olds the right to exercise their recently granted franchise. Pending a ruling to the contrary from the State Attorney General's office, both Floyd Heimgartner and Bob Magnuson, city clerks for Juliaetta and Kendrick respectively, have indicated they will register and offer ballots to otherwise qualified 18-year olds.

It is the ironic that the first chance that many 18-year-olds will have to vote will be for an issue they can't participate in for possibly another three years.

Basically the qualifications to vote are:

1. At least 18 years of age.
2. Citizen of the United States.
3. Resident of the city for at least three months.
4. Either have voted in the last election or registered for this one before 9:00 p. m., Saturday, July 10.

## Sillflow Brothers Named Nez Perce County Grassmen Of The Year

Nez Perce County's 1971 Grassmen of the Year — Marvin, Emil and Harold Sillflow originally pooled their farming operations, pooling cash and equipment to build three farms near Leland. But they had an advantage over many farmers. Their selection was announced Saturday.

"We had a good boss," one said. The three learned the game and an accompanying way of life from their father Fred W. Sillflow, who celebrated his 78th birthday on Thursday.

"When we first began we would pool our money and buy a place that one of us alone wouldn't have been able to swing," Harold said. As the farms progressed, the brothers have worked more and more independently of one another — but they still co-operate with one another when needed.

"When dad started out he had a few pieces of machinery, made parts of his own harness and had eight head of horses, Emil said.

"We have almost that many head of horses between the three of us now," Harold said — adding that there still aren't enough horses to go around when the entire family goes riding. Today the horses are used for riding and sometimes pulling a scaled-down sleigh that the family uses for hayrides. Formerly the animals turned the sod, planted the wheat and provided muscle for the harvest.

Today some of the machinery is jointly owned by the three brothers, although Marvin's operation is almost independent of the other two. Harold and Emil still harvest together.

The operations include some 1,400 acres of land owned by the three brothers and 200 acres of pasture mostly canyon breaks. Another 1,000 acres of pasture land is leased at the head of Bedrock canyon, which slopes downward to the Clearwater river from the area of the three brothers' farms.

The Sillflow grassman story is one of four generations of farmers who settled near Leland during 1892 — and have been working to improve their operations ever since.

The first Sillflows in the area were the late Mr. and Mrs. Fred Sillflow who left Germany in 1890 and settled at the old German community of Cameron. The first farm, which the family purchased for \$3,600, was lost during an early depression, but the family managed to buy another 160 acres for \$2,400, Fred Sillflow said.

After Fred Sillflow's marriage in 1917, he farmed near Cameron for 30 years, moving to Kendrick in 1947. In 1953 the second generation of the family moved back to Juliaetta, then back again to Kendrick

where Fred W. Sillflow now helps his sons each summer.

The eldest Sillflow now works as a trucker during the harvest and is "pretty good at it," a son said. "If he doesn't help this year it'll be a surprise," Emil said.

From the time that the Sillflow boys are 10 they drive harvest trucks in the field and their grandfather and the older boys ferry the loaded trucks to the elevator and back.

"I was 10 years old the first time that I had a team run away with me," Harold said. He explained that he had been driving a three-horse team and riding a disc, which is a type of rotary plow. The horses bolted, but the youngster couldn't control the team, and Harold, who was still too little to reach the implement's footrests, put his feet on the control handles and hung on. He didn't dare jump, and would probably have been cut to ribbons if he fell. "Finally the doubletrees broke, the team broke loose from the disc and I went flyin'," Harold said. The reins pulled him clear of the thundering machine. "Finally one of the horses ran out of wind and fell down, stopping the team."

The Sillflows' principal crops are winter wheat and barley, dry peas, and a 75-cow beef herd. Emil is experimenting with the production of certified lawn grass seed and all the brothers waterways are seeded to grass and some steep area are also grass.

A feature of the operations are five ponds built with help from the Soil Conservation Service. The impounds provide water for stock and even irrigate the lawn at one home. Some fish are present, the brothers said.

The crop breakdown is 20 percent wheat, 20 percent to conservation uses—including certified grass seed production — and the balance is planted to barley and peas.

Plowing alfalfa under as a green manure crop on the second year instead of the first has worked out well they say. A hay crop can be harvested during the first year, and the crop is more abundant for the plow-down on the second year.

The Sillflow system for getting a boy through college involves leased field and equipment exchange system. The boys work for their father, being paid in equipment borrowing rights. The field, farmed with the youngsters' capital and the father's machinery, finances their education.

"When Fred started college, I leased 160 acres from a neighbor, and he ran it," Emil said. Today, Fred M., 25, is with the US Army in Vietnam. Gary, 22, is working for a degree in the Department of Animal Industries at the University of Idaho, and Ronald, 15, helps with

NO CHANGE EXPECTED FOR SALMON SEASONS

High water flows should limit Idaho's sport salmon fishing through early July. This reduction in chinook harvest may produce the smaller than normal harvest that the run size and nitrogen conditions would dictate. The fishery will be closely monitored and it is possible that if the harvest is larger than desired that an emergency closure could be utilized to close the season a few days early. No extension in season length is anticipated.

Relatively large numbers of chinook were in the Columbia and Snake rivers. However, adverse water conditions and large than normal interdam losses minimized the number of these fish that passed Little Goose Dam.

The established minimum escapement goal at the last dam (Little Goose) is 32,000 spring chinook. During normal years this is considered an adequate escapement to provide adequate

numbers of spawning fish and an average sport fishery in Idaho. The final count at Little Goose Dam was 28,428 spring chinook. However, due to the delayed Little Goose Dam after the normal cutoff date. The delayed spring chinook may have made the actual spring run total around the 32,000 figure at Little Goose Dam. An escapement of 32,000 during 1971 will not be adequate if the anticipated delayed mortalities result from nitrogen disease.

The prospects for 1972 look even less promising than those for 1971. Chinook smolts migrating to the ocean in 1970 were subjected to an estimated 70 per cent mortality due to nitrogen disease. If these losses prove to be accurate we can expect an extremely low run in 1972

**NO CHANGE EXPECTED FOR SALMON SEASONS**

High water flows should limit Idaho's sport salmon fishing through early July. This reduction in chinook harvest may produce the smaller than normal harvest that the run size and nitrogen conditions would dictate. The fishery will be closely monitored and it is possible that if the harvest is larger than desired that an emergency closure could be utilized to close the season a few days early. No extension in season length is anticipated.

Relatively large numbers of chinook were in the Columbia and Snake rivers. However, adverse water conditions and large than normal interdam losses minimized the number of these fish that passed Little Goose Dam.

The established minimum escapement goal at the last dam (Little Goose) is 32,000 spring chinook. During normal years this is considered an adequate escapement to provide adequate

numbers of spawning fish and an average sport fishery in Idaho. The final count at Little Goose Dam was 28,432 spring chinook. However, due to the passage of a portion of the spring chinook passed Little Goose Dam after the normal cutoff date. The delayed spring chinook may have made the actual spring run total around the 32,000 figure at Little Goose Dam. An escapement of 32,000 during 1971 will not be adequate if the anticipated delayed mortalities result from nitrogen disease.

The prospects for 1972 look even less promising than those for 1971. Chinook smolts migrating to the ocean in 1970 were subjected to an estimated 70 per cent mortality due to nitrogen disease. If these losses prove to be accurate we can expect an extremely low run in 1972

**ACCESS TO MOST HIGH MT. LAKES STILL SNOWBOUND**

Yesterday, District Conservation officers from Koooskia and Grangeville made an aerial check of high mountain lakes in the Lochsa, Selway, Buffalo Hump, and Gospel Hill areas. Although a number of lakes are ice-free, roads and trails are still snow-covered in most of the areas. The following reports were received.

**Lochsa-Selway Areas:**  
Rocky Ridge Lake was ice-free; but snow covered several miles of the road. Bald Mtn. Lake was open, but the road was closed. Post Office Lakes are ice-covered, however some water was showing. The road to the lakes was closed. Walton Lake is ice-free but there is lots of snow on the road—five or six inches of new snow in this area. Fish Lake and California Lakes were open, but there was lots of snow on the trail to Fish Lake. No snow was around California Lake itself, however. Long lake is open and ice-free. There was snow on the trail, but probably the best bet in the area for those with horses. Rock Lake was ice-free but there were several miles of broken snow on the trail. Lakes in the seven lakes area are still ice-covered. Maude and Lottie Lakes are ice-covered. Cove Lake is ice-covered. Fog mountain road is open. Parsons Lake is open. Buck lake is still frozen. Ridge Lake is open but heavy snow covers the trail. Coolwater Lake is beginning to break up but the road is closed. Red Lake is open but roads are still snowed in. Running Lake and two lower Burnt Knob Lakes are open, but trail conditions are not open. Two upper Burnt Knob Lakes are ice covered. Tribby Lakes are open.


**Buffalo Hump- Gospel Hill Areas:**  
Hump Lake is ice covered. Wild Horse and Fish Lakes are open and can be fished. The road to the Hump has 10 to 12 foot of snow on top. Crystal Lake is open and can be walked to. Wiseboy, Kelly, Twin Moores and Gospel Lakes are open, but roads closed.

Employment Picture In Latah County This Week

Nineteen Latah County workers were given job finding help through the Moscow office of the Idaho Department of Employment during the past week. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow office manager said that this was just one more than the number placed in employment during the previous week, but was considerably higher than the number given such assistance during the same week a year ago. At the end of the week there were 12 jobs still open, compared with 14 jobs available at the end of the previous week. Needed in the Moscow area were auto mechanics, a body and fender man, diesel mechanics, two-way radio serviceman, carpenters, a legal secretary and domestic workers.

Thirty-seven workers filed claims for unemployment insurance during the past week, according to Hartstein. He said that several of these were filed by workers from the area's woods operations. Some curtailments were noted due to wet and muddy working areas. Others filing claims were persons who have become unemployed due to the closing of schools in the area, and still others are newcomers into the area seeking jobless pay until they can find employment here. The total number of workers seeking unemployment compensation dropped from 264 to 259 through the week. However, a year ago there were only 166 persons in the county seeking jobless benefits.

Hartstein said he had been informed by the Idaho Department of Education that several openings exist for young workers in the Neighborhood Youth Corps program. This program is designed to provide job opportunities during the school vacation period to youngsters from low income families. Details are available either at the Employment Office or at the office of the Superintendent of schools in the various communities.
