Kendrick, Good Roads Highway Districts Seek More Time For Consolidation Decision

Taxpayers in the Kendrick Highway District and Good Roads District No. 1 voted unanimously to delay making any decision regarding the proposed county highway consolidation recommendations until the two districts held a meeting of their own patrons and gained their consensus. The decision came at a meeting held in Kendrick Monday night, July 12, to hear a discussion and explanation by the County Highway Consolidation Study Committee; the group appointed to initiate plans to consolidate the county's present nine highway districts into not more than six or less than two. The decision to make this consolidation was approved by the voters in Latah County in the 1970 general election. The study group, appointed by the county commissioners, held a series of meetings and two proposed plans were deemed most acceptable and feasible. Plan No. 1 would have all of Latah County in one district except Genesee, Kendrick and Good Roads District No. 1. Plan No. 2 would have all the county in one district except Genesee. This meeting Monday night was held to determine how the taxpayers in Kendrick, Good Roads District No. 1 and Genesee felt about the proposals. Gerald Ingle, chairman of the study committee, presided at the meeting Monday night and he and James Armitage, newly appointed chairman of the Latah County Planning Committee explained the two proposals, gave a brief resume of why this action was necessary, and then opened the meeting to questions and answers. During the open discussion period two main themes seemed to emerge. The first was the question, "Do we have any other choice?" and the second, "when do we have to decide?" Some present at the meeting objected, feeling individual district patrons had not been consulted enough. Roy Glenn, a commissioner of the Kendrick Highway District, summed up this attitude when he stated: "We want some say in what we do." Andy Cox, American Ridge farmer, then moved that taxpayers in the Kendrick and Good Roads Districts meet to discuss the proposals offered and gain a better opinion. The motion was seconded by Harley Eichner. Some talk was also heard on the possibility of leaving the Kendrick and Good Road District out of the consolidation. Adrain Nelson, a commissioner from the Genesee-Rimrock Highway District, said his district was not adverse to consolidating with the other two districts, but that Genesee-Rimrock felt Kendrick and Good Roads should be the ones to decide which way they wanted to go. "Any decision you make is all right with us," Nelson stated. Ellis Anderson, Troy farmer and a member of the study group, defended the study committee's two recommendations by stating that what the committee was attempting to do was to equalize the amount of money available for roads in all parts of the county to eliminate having a few rich districts and then some so poor they could barely maintain any adequate systems. Bill Bondel, Troy, another member of the committee, spoke to say that if Kendrick and Good Roads go off by themselves, then others would surely want to follow and all the work and planning would have failed. Jack Parsley, Cedar Creek, also a member of the county planning group, seemed to sum up the situation by remarking, "Nobody wants to change, but it's coming and we have to work together to make the best of it."

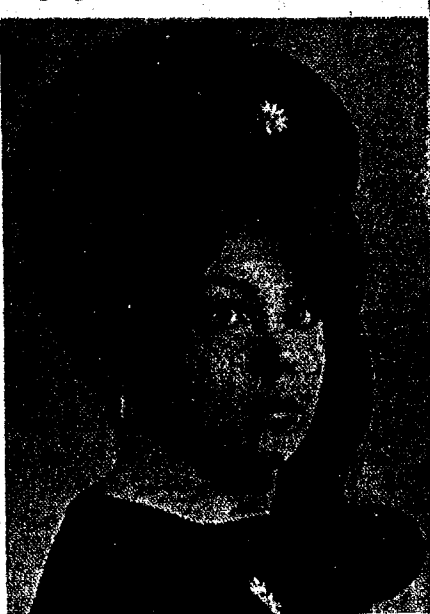
Genesee Service Station Changes Hands

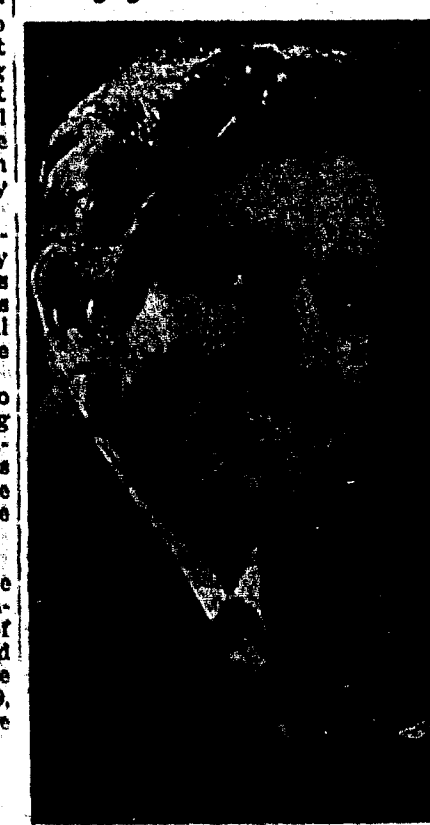
Home From Hospital

Genesee Council met Monday, July 12

The July meeting of the Genesee City Council was held Monday evening in the Genesee City Hall. Present were councilmen Myers, Moden and Magee. The meeting was presided over by Mayor D. F. Scharnhorst. The council approved the sale of water to Inland Asphalt Co. with the stipulation the sales would stop should a water shortage develop during the summer months. Bills for the rest rooms in the park area were accepted by the council. The council approved and passed ordinance No. 215 permitting the retail sale of wine in the City and also granted such a license to Ron Asker, manager of the the Food Center Thrift Store. The council also reviewed and discussed the condition of sewer and water lines and streets within the city limits and discussed possible improvement projects.

Public Abuse Forces Lloyd Craig To Abandon Litter Barrel Project

Lloyd Craig, Leland district foreman for the Nez Perce County Highway department, announces this week that he has given up one of his private projects to combat highway litter because of the abuse of the program by some individuals. Some time ago, Craig, at his own expense and on his own time, provided 15 litter barrels along the roads in the county to provide highway users a convenient place to deposit litter that might otherwise be thrown out of cars. He would empty the barrels and dispose of the litter on his own time. Just as a part of his own battle against pollution. But as with so many well-meaning plans, some people took advantage of the litter barrels to dump in family garbage and other refuse that should have gone to the dump grounds. Lloyd recalls having to take deer hides and guts out of the barrels; sacks of family garbage; 27 rabbit heads and hides, and other similar refuse. Even the best intentioned person can only take so much of this type of abuse, so Lloyd this week decided to cancel the whole project and will remove the litter barrels.

Kendrick Voters Approve Liquor Sale Proposal; Issue Defeated In Juliaetta By Narrow Margin

Voters in Kendrick and Juliaetta filed to the polls in record-breaking numbers Tuesday, July 13 to cast their ballots on one of the most controversial issues to come before either city in many years—whether to permit the sale of liquor by the drink. When the results of balloting was counted the issue had carried in Kendrick by a substantial margin but lost in Juliaetta by a narrow edge. Kendrick voters, 172 of them, went to the polls and cast 107 votes for the sale of liquor by the drink. A total of 65 voters cast ballots against the sale. Included in this total were 9 teenage ballots, the first time persons under 21 could vote. There were 199 register voters in Kendrick. Mayor Bob Watts said Tuesday evening after the results of the balloting were completed that the council would probably meet within a few days and pass an ordinance officially approving the sale of liquor by the drink within the city limits. "The ordinance will have to be drawn up and approved for its legal technicalities" by the city attorney. Juliaetta Says No

School District No. 283 Trustees Held Meeting

All of the school lunch employees and bus drivers were officially hired at the Board meeting Friday night, July 9th. Contracts will be issued to these people at the August 12th meeting. Supt. Don Blakeley reports that there is a possibility the Gold Hill-Cedar Creek, plus Big Bear bus drivers may not return. However, it is hoped that they will. Trustees and the superintendent are slated to ride all bus routes on Aug. 11th, so that any problems involving transportation may be resolved at the Aug. 12th meeting. The superintendent urged parents to attend the Aug. 12th meeting at the Kendrick High School at 8:00 p. m. Trustee Floyd Helmgartner reported that about 300 feet of pipe has been laid at the Elementary playground, so that lawn watering would be a big improvement over the present garden hose system. Stand-up pipes have been tied to the water line, so students on the playground can get a drink of water when desired. All Trustees made a tour of the building and saw the new Freezer-Cooler installation in the school lunch kitchen. The unit will be completed in the near future and in operation by May 1st. The Trustees were informed by the superintendent that all student body books were ready for audit by Glen Utzman of Moscow. He also stated that all District, State and Federal projects were complete and up to date for 1970-71. Bids for 13,000 gallons of furnace oil (No. 2) and 12,000 gallons of gasoline (80 road octane or better) were being called for and will be opened at the August regular meeting. Bills totalled \$2,992.45 for the month of July and were approved for payment. Some of the larger ones were: Music Center for budget supplies \$204.40; Washington Water Power Co. \$800.00; Conley Chemical and Supply for janitorial supplies \$349.45; Inland Audio-Visual Co. \$373.89 for supplies and maintenance; Abrams Hardware \$179.74 for repair work at Juliaetta and maintenance supplies; Photo and Sound Co. for records under Title III \$162.43.

Genesee Faculty Filled

GENESEE-The faculty of the Genesee schools is now complete with the hiring of Lynda Rearick as Girls' PE instructor. Miss Rearick graduated from the University of Idaho in June of 1970 and has been working in the Seattle area for the past year. New Faculty Members for coming year: Kenneth Olfert, German and Jr. high math.; Miss Elaine Woodhouse, home ec. and Miss Lynda Rearick, Girls' P. E. and coach. Bids will be let for gas and furnace oil at the August meeting. The board also looked at several different student insurance programs for the coming school year and will decide at the next board meeting on the one to carry. Heibling Brothers reported to the board that the new school bus was ready for delivery. Mr. Lettenmaier will leave for Mississippi sometime around the first of August to pick the bus up and bring it back to Genesee. The board also decided to put steps in the bleachers located in the high school gymnasium. The factory has developed a special step which can be installed and still fold up with the rest of the bleachers. Supt. Diehl reported to the board on the progress of the work being done on buildings and rooms. The new shelving for the library has been ordered and will arrive before school starts. Supt. Diehl also reported that with all teachers now being hired the schedule is now complete for the high school and will be a 6 period day instead of a seven. School will start at 9 a. m. and finish at 3:25 p. m. The board also discussed the dress policy of the school and decided to leave it as is. It was the feeling of the board that far more people were satisfied than dissatisfied with the present policy. Until more patrons of the district show dissatisfaction the policy will remain the same. Supt. Diehl is attending a workshop for Superintendents at the University of Idaho this week.

While carrying in Kendrick, a similar proposal for the sale of Liquor in Juliaetta went down to a narrow defeat. There were 105 votes against the issue and 91 in favor. This is the largest turnout in Juliaetta history and reflected the intensity of the feeling such proposals always seem to generate. There were 210 people registered for the election and 196 voted—an exceptional percentage. There were 15 voters under the age of 21 years who cast ballots for the first time. Three years ago in August, Juliaetta also turned down a liquor proposal, but by a much greater margin.

Final Rites Held For Eva L. Smith

The funeral for Miss Eva L. Smith, 75, who died July 3, was conducted July 7, at Massar-Ravie Funeral Home in Lewiston. Officiating was Rev. J. E. Byers of the Lewiston Orchards Baptist Church. Organist was Mrs. Joseph P. Blasko and soloist was Robert E. Schmidt, both of Lewiston. Members of Alpha Rebekah Lodge No. 1, and Ladies Auxiliary Patriarchs Militant of Lewiston participated. Pallbearers were nephews, Jerry Smith, Dewey; Donald Smith, Moscow; Clem Smith, Clinton Smith; and James White, Lewiston, and Roscoe Hunter of Lenore. The chapel was filled and overflowing with friends who came to pay their last respects, and many went to the Gold Hill Cemetery on Cedar Ridge where burial was in the family plot. Survivors include one sister, Mrs. Ellison (Anna) Mitchell, Polson, Mont.; two sisters-in-law, Mrs. Geo. E. Smith, Lewiston, and Mrs. Vester Daniels, Lenore, and several nephews and nieces.

Miss Eva Luella Smith was born May 6, 1893 on Cedar Ridge east of Kendrick. She was the eldest in the family of six children of "Dock" and Nellie Smith, pioneer homesteaders. When the mother died in 1912 Eva took over the task of helping her father run the household. He died six years later, but she continued to maintain the home. A natural cook, seamstress and housekeeper, as necessity demanded, she learned to milk cows, do garden work, raise chickens, cows, hogs, and help in the hayfields. Most of the school teachers boarded with her from 1919 until the District was consolidated and the children bussed into Kendrick and Juliaetta. She was interested in all community activities—Sunday School, church, club, she served on election boards many years; was a director on the Telephone Board; also of the Co-operative Creamery in Kendrick; was a member of the Bean Growers Association, and also of the Kendrick Grange. Hers was the first home to be wired when electricity came to the ridge. The ranch was sold in 1946 and she moved to 1408 Idaho St., Lewiston, which had been her home since. Reared in a community where families helped each other in sickness and death, she was quite efficient in the sick room. Soon after her arrival in Lewiston she took up Practical Nursing at the St. Joseph's Hospital and obtained her license for practicing in Idaho and Washington, where she worked until retiring. She was active for years in the Rebekah Lodge work; was a Past Noble Grand of Alpha Rebekah Lodge No. 1, Lewiston, and a member of Ladies' Auxiliary Patriarchs Militant. She was a Past President of the Civic Club; a Garden Club; the Licensed Practical Nurses Association, and a member of the Senior Citizens' group. She helped organize the Cedar Creek Annual Picnic in 1959, which has been held each year since in Beach View Park in Clarkston, and always with her helping hand. Flowers were one of her hobbies and her yards on the ranch and in Lewiston were evidence of her "Green Thumb" and love of working with them. One is "near the heart of God" when working in a garden. June 17 she suffered a stroke from which she never recovered. She died at the St. Joseph's Hospital on July 3, 1971 at 4:20 p. m. She never married. Survivors include a sister, Mrs. Ellison (Anna) Mitchell, Polson, Mont.; a sister-in-law, Mrs. George E. Smith, Lewiston, and several nieces and nephews. Her youngest brother, George, whom she had helped raise from a young child, preceded her in death, May

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF GENESEE, IDAHO, PROVIDING FOR THE RETAIL SALE OF WINE IN ACCORDANCE WITH CHAPTER 156 SECTION FORTY-FIRST REGULAR SESSION FORTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE, STATE OF IDAHO BY PROVIDING DEFINITIONS; REQUIRING A CITY LICENSE; DETERMINING THE QUALIFICATIONS OF A LICENSEE; ESTABLISHING THE LICENSE FEE; SETTING RESTRICTIONS ON TRANSFER OF LICENSES; REGULATING PLACES OF CONSUMPTION; SETTING FORTH CONDITIONS OF POSSESSION; PROHIBITING MISREPRESENTATION OF AGE FOR PURPOSES OF SALE, CONSUMPTION OR POSSESSION; PROHIBITING PERSONS FROM DRIVING UPON A PUBLIC HIGHWAY OR STREET WHILE CONSUMING OR IN POSSESSION OF AN OPEN CONTAINER OF WINE; PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Almost 2 Million Dollars In Social Security Benefits Paid Monthly In Area

Social Security benefits in the far-west area serviced by the Lewiston Social Security Office amount to almost 2 million dollars each month, according to D. Gene Shaw, District Manager. This figure includes the 10 per cent increase recently received by social security beneficiaries. With the 10 per cent increase, nationwide the average monthly social security benefit being paid to a retired worker increased from \$114 to about \$126; for a retired couple, from \$199 to about \$219. A widowed mother with two children will receive an average social security benefit of about \$324, up from \$295. For a disabled worker with a wife and one or more children, the new average monthly payment will be about \$296, increased from \$269. There is a total of 18,868 beneficiaries receiving monthly retirement survivors, and disability insurance benefits. Of the above, 1,029 are receiving disability benefits in the area serviced by the Lewiston District Office. The area includes Clearwater, Idaho, Latah, Lewis and Nez Perce counties in Idaho, plus Asotin and Whitman counties in Washington. The following figures recently released indicate the monthly benefits being paid as of December 1, 1970. Latah county showed the largest net increase in beneficiaries. As of December 31, 1970, there were 1,041 persons receiving \$107,000 each month from social security, a net increase of 162 persons for the year. Second was Nez Perce County with 4,314 people receiving \$444,000 in monthly benefits, a net increase of 132 persons from the previous year. Idaho county increased by 123 individual payments for a total of 1,748 receiving \$187,000 each month. The Washington county across the river, Asotin, increased by 109 for a total of 2,486 receiving \$250,000 in social security benefits. Whitman county has 3,508 persons receiving \$378,000, an increase of 76. The smaller counties in Idaho recorded the least gain. Clearwater county had 1,041 people receiving \$107,000 a gain of 64. Lewis county recorded a gain of 37 for a total of 817 individuals receiving \$82,000 monthly in social security benefits. About 25 per cent of the new claimants starting to receive social security benefits in 1970 were children under age 22. In the State of Idaho, there is a total of 93,062 people receiving \$9,170,000 each month from a social security. A further breakdown indicates there were 48,508 retired workers receiving \$5,672,000 monthly. There were 4,904 disabled workers receiving \$645,000 monthly in the State of Idaho. Washington State had 412,310 beneficiaries receiving \$44,096,000 each month. It was also interesting to note that there are 7,020 people age 72 and over receiving benefits in the 7-county area. This is the largest group of any in the various benefit categories. Anyone interested in a more detailed breakdown of these statistics may get in touch with the Lewiston Social Security office, the manager said.
