Summer Weather Moves Into Region This Week; First Heat Wave Pushes Temperature Above 100

The first heat wave of the summer season moved into the area over the week-end, pushing the mercury into the high nineties and exceeded the 100 degree mark each day since Sunday. The added humidity from the exceptionally wet June and early part of July added to the uncomfortably hot weather. Friday the heat wave started moving in and sent the temperatures over 100 in Lewiston and close to that in the Kendrick and Juliaetta areas. The higher elevations, such as Genesee, felt middle and high 90-degree weather. Saturday was also clear and hot and finally broke over the 100-degree mark, Sunday. Monday found the hot weather

still prevailing with temperatures registering in the low 100's during the afternoon. A slight cloud cover moved in late Monday afternoon and kept the usually cool night air temperatures from dropping. The temperatures never dropped out of the seventies Monday night and was already at 72 degrees at 5:30 Tuesday morning in Genesee and even warmer in Kendrick. The business district in Kendrick was sweltering in a damp 80 degree reading by 10:00 a. m.

Farmers were back in the fields despite the hot weather attempting to finish up haying operations as the sudden turn in the weather picture these past few days hastened the ripening of feed peas and winter barley.

The Genesee Rimrock Highway District and the City of Genesee used the hot weather to advantage as they both had road crews seal coating part of the Valley road leading to Pine Grove and portions of Fir and Pine Streets in the city are being surfaced.

Pea harvest in the Genesee area is still about one week away from starting, reported Leonard Singhose manager of the Genesee Branch of Agrow Seed Co. He added that despite the frost and root rot, his firm was expecting good yields from the fields grown under Agrow contract.

First Day of School

Regular classes will commence at Kendrick Junior-Senior High School and at the Juliaetta Elementary School on August 30 at 8:40 a. m., according to Supt. Don Blakeley, who reports all in readiness for the opening.

Bus students are asked to be at their regular pick-up stations maintained throughout last year and at approximately the same time for the first day of school. The schedule adjustments will be made the first week of school if necessary.

Parents who have questions on bus routes and pick-ups of students are requested to meet with the Board of Trustees at their regular meeting on August 17th at 8:00 p. m. Trustees and the superintendent will ride all bus routes on August 11th in an endeavor to smooth out any complex transportation problems.

Kendrick, Good Roads Highway Districts Would Consolidate

At a special meeting of taxpayers of Kendrick Highway District and Good Roads District No. 1, held Monday evening at the Kendrick Fire Hall, it was voted to try to consolidate these two units into one highway district rather than join into either of two plans presently under consideration by the Latah County Highway Consolidation Committee. If this is not permitted or feasible, then the Kendrick and Good Roads districts would prefer to consolidate into a unit with Genesee Rimrock Highway District as suggested under the study committee's plan 1.

Plan No. 1 of the County Consolidation Committee would put Genesee-Rimrock Highway District and Good Roads No. 1 into one unit and the rest of Latah County in the other.

Plan No. 2 would leave Genesee-Rimrock as one unit and the remaining part of the county, including Kendrick and Good Roads in the other unit.

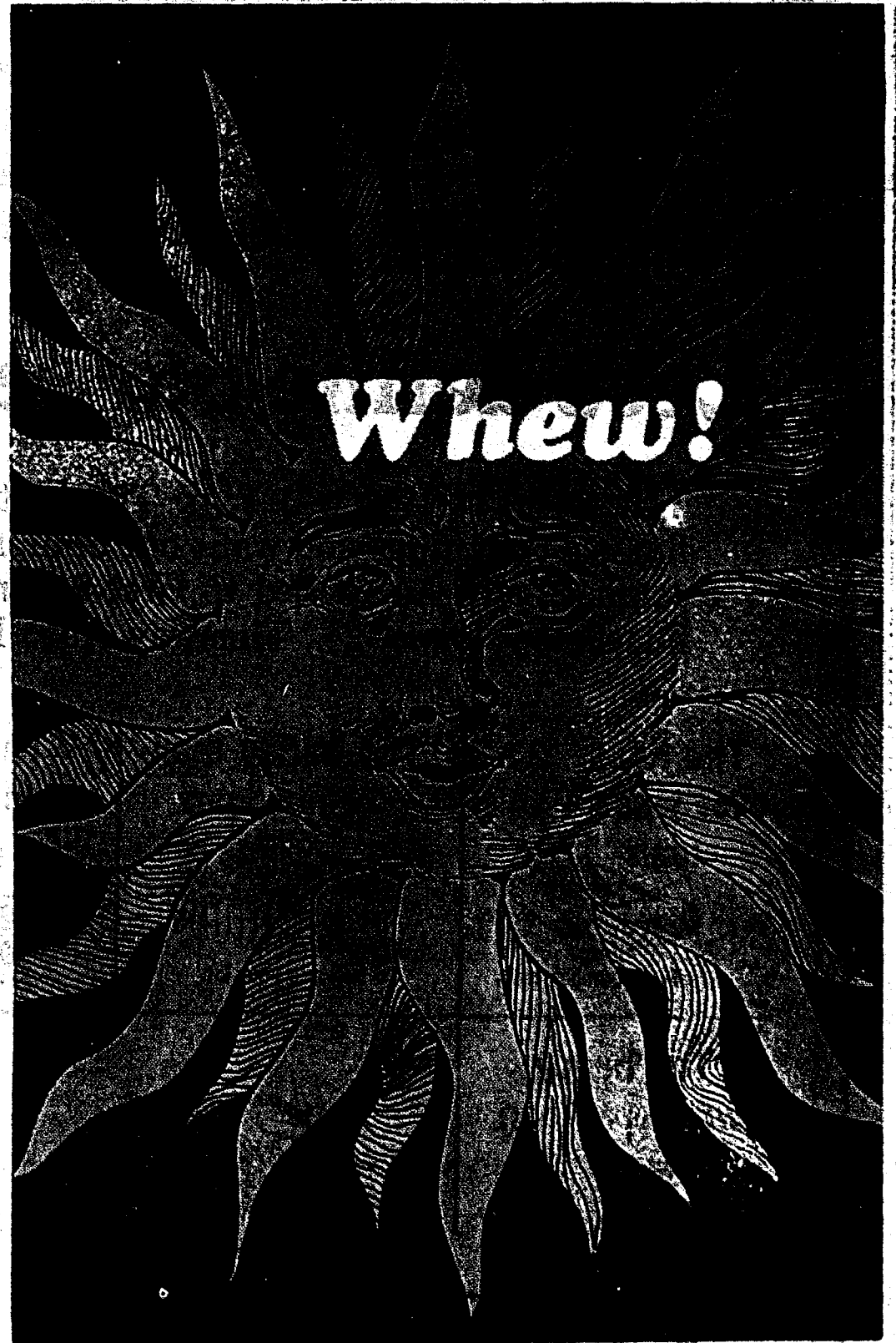

Collection Permits Are Being Issued

Three scientific collecting permits have been issued for this area.
Clarence E. Binninger, D. V. M., Rt. 2, Box 18, Potlatch, Idaho, has been issued a collecting permit to take not more than five black bear clinically ill or suspected diseased. They are to be collected by Dr. Binninger or Barney Mackay from the ten northern Idaho counties between July 12 and Dec. 13, 1971.
The purpose of collecting these bears is to determine if any nutritional, chemical or microbiological agent is capable of producing disease in bears which may be detrimental to other wild animals, domestic animals, man or to the bear itself.
Blood samples are to be taken from tranquilized animals and/or the killing of bear only by daylight use of firearms at dump grounds or where said bears are creating problems. The carcasses are to be burned or incinerated.
A collecting permit has been issued to Harry W. Vaughn, D. V. M., Research Associates, Department of Veterinary Science, Moscow, to collect two elk calves or one adult elk visibly and critically ill (or already dead) to be collected in daylight with a firearm or taken already dead. The elk are to be taken in the Clearwater drainage during the months of July, August and September, 1971. Carcasses to be burned or incinerated. The purpose of this collection is diagnostic examination to determine factors relating to elk calf mortality in the Clearwater drainage.
