have been issued for this area. Clarence, E. Binninger, D. V. M., Rt. 2, Box 18, Potlatch, Idaho, has been issued a collecting permit to take not more than five black bear clinically ill or suspected diseased. They are to be collected by Dr. Binninger or Barney Mackay from the ten northern Idaho counties between July 12 and Dec. 13, 1971.

The purpose of collecting these The purpose rfocollecting these bear is to determine if any nutritional, chemical or microbiological agent is capable of producing disease in bears which may be detrimental to other wild animals, domestic animals, man or to the bear itself.
