## Weather Stays Dry; Harvest Moves Into Wheat Fields

Cooling winds broke the back of the most prolonged heat wave in many years over the last week-end, but the skies stayed clear and sunny with harvest operations continuing at an increasing pace as farmers raced to get the 1971 small grains crop into the storage elevators.

Kendrick Rochdale really felt the impact of the west coast dock strike as Robert Watts, manager of the valley cooperative, said all the Rochdale elevators were full on Monday, and they were unable to accept any more grain.

"Ordinarily we ship about 30 percent of the grain we take in right away," Watts said. "But this year we just had no place to go." Rochdale members are now hauling to Lewiston Grain Growers. Watts estimates that at least 40 percent of their grain is still out. "We've got some members who haven't yet started to deliver wheat," he said.

If the strike should break immediately, there would still be the threat of a shortage of grain cars, as just about all the warehouses are facing the same conditions.

Geo. Brocke, Jr., of Brocke and Sons, Seedsmen, in Kendrick, reported Tuesday morning that nearly 90 percent of their spring peas are in but that Austrian black peas were just getting a good start with an estimated 10 percent in. The first lentils of the season came in to Brocke's Saturday and clover seed is just starting.

Brocke and Sons are meeting storage problems up in the Southwick area with a 3-million pound storage warehouse just for black peas. Poles were setup to create a 40x160 foot area. Heavy 2x12s will line the inside and plastic will be placed on the ground to protect the peas from moisture. Black peas will be unloaded into this and when the bins are full, a roof will be placed over the entire area resulting in a permanent storage warehouse which can be used for many years to come.

**Wheat Harvest Boiling**  
Mike Martinez at Genesee Union reported that as of Tuesday morning the Genesee firm had taken in about 20 percent of the amount of wheat they totalled last year and that barley was nearing the 60 percent figure as grain was beginning to come in from almost all areas around Genesee. Peas, Mike estimated, were almost entirely in, except for a few scattered fields.

Wheat continues to look good both in the quality and quantity, he reported. He said the two lots which have been graded and returned by the state have both tested out No. 1. The fear that frost might have damaged wheat has thus far been ungrounded.

Yields continue to be excellent and there are reports of 114 bushel yields coming in from the Rim.

"We have just one grower still cutting," said Leonard Singhose, Agrow Seed Company manager in Genesee, "and he'll be finished in a few days."

Singhose rated this year's pea harvest, yield-wise, as the "best ever." The quality was also good but with some burn showing up.

All of Agrow's storage facilities are full up of this year's bumper harvest and the firm has been milling and processing peas almost continuously since harvest began. Even Agrow has had to resort to using temporary outside storage during the peak of deliveries.

**Evoking Wheat Yields**  
Bill Wood, manager of Genesee Union Warehouse, reminded farmers that they have fifteen days from the date of a letter received from the ASCS office in which to prove their wheat yields or to check with their county ASCS office and sign a letter of intent to do so which will give them some time.

## Joint District 283 Trustees Met Thurs.; Preparations For School Opening Made

Trustees of Joint School District No. 283 of Kendrick met in regular session Thursday evening, Aug. 12, and added the superintendent in completing organizational plans for the start of school, August 30th.

Mobil Oil of Kendrick submitted the low bids for approximately 12,000 gallons of regular gas at 22.7 per gallon, and 13,000 gallons of furnace oil (No. 2 or better) at 14.80 which were accepted by the board.

Contracts for all bus drivers and school lunch personnel were officially signed and have been returned to these employees.

Manning Onstott was employed to drive the Big Bear Ridge Bus Route for 1971-72. He succeeds Frank Holsington, whose farming duties prevent him from driving. A special bus drivers' meeting was rescheduled for Aug. 27th at 8:00 p. m. instead of Aug. 20, due to the pressing harvest season.

The 1971-72 Jr.-Sr. High School curriculum was adopted by the Board. Five new subjects have been added, namely: World Problems, Consumer Education, Home Furnishing, Sociology and French I.

Junior-Senior High students will register Aug. 23 and 24 from 8:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. Elementary registration will be on the same days at the same time.

Student Handbook policies were reviewed and the following policies on School Attire were approved for 1971-72.

School Attire which is disruptive to normal classroom procedures will not be permitted.

Recommended Dress Code is as follows:

**BOYS** — Hair must be clean and neatly groomed. It should not come down on the neck lower than the shirt collar. It should not be over the eyebrows. Sideburns should be neatly trimmed. Mustaches and full beards are not to be allowed.

Shoes and shirts and pants which are neat and clean are a must.

**GIRLS** — Wearing attire should be of good taste. Blue jeans and white T-shirts are not to be allowed. Shoes are to be worn at all times.

**STUDENTS** — Have pride in yourself and your school and show it through your well-groomed appearance.

**Bus Routes**  
Bus routes were discussed at length and will be reviewed on Aug. 27th will all drivers. The only changes from last year were on the Southwick-Cameron and Leland bus routes. An increase of students riding the Southwick-Cameron bus makes it a necessity to reassign some students to ride the Leland bus. There are 70 students in the Southwick-Cameron area to ride a 60-passenger bus. The change of buses for some students will enable the district to operate within state laws with practically no time variation from last year.

Policies relative to Field Trips and out of district students desiring to cross district boundary lines for school attendance at Kendrick were reviewed for the Board.

Medical Service Bureau, Inc., of Lewiston, was awarded the School Insurance contract.

Bills totaling \$5,518.53 were approved. ## Heat Wave Breaks; Still No Rain In Sight

Cool winds swept in from Canada and the coast Saturday morning and brought the first relief from the three-week heat wave which had settled over the area. The welcome drop in temperatures moved the mercury down from the 100-degree mark into the high 80's and low 90's, much to the relief of farmers who were getting into full swing of harvest and to just about everyone in general.

Saturday, the first day of the cooler weather, the temperature registered at a high of 88, which was just 12 degrees cooler than the 100 of Friday afternoon. The night temperatures also receded and Monday night saw a low of 52 in Kendrick and an unofficial low of 40 in Genesee.

Despite the cooler weather there was still no rain and farmers were able to continue harvest without delay.

## Weekend Grain Field Fires Destroy Two Trucks; Burn Wheat and Stubble

Two separate fires over the weekend resulted in the destruction of two grain trucks, the burning of several acres of wheat and wheat stubble, as harvest operations approached full swing under hot, dry conditions. Although temperatures have dropped this week, fire fighters urged extreme caution to prevent fires which could have disastrous effects.

Saturday afternoon fire destroyed a truck full of grain and five acres of standing wheat on land owned by Inez Moore and farmed by the Heath Bros. at the top of Cherry Lane Grade. Six acres of stubble and 30 acres of canyon grass land also burned.

The fire, reported to Kendrick Forest Protective District at 1:35 p. m., started from the 1964 Chevrolet grain truck. The fire started under the truck but it is not known exactly how, Forest Warden Richard Benjamin of Kendrick, said. The truck belonged to the Heath Bros. of Stony Point. Strong wind whipped the fire from the truck through the wheat and down into the canyon, Benjamin reported. Two pumper trucks and four firemen responded from Kendrick. Some 20 farmers and a tractor and plow also assisted in battling the fire.

Fire at Clint Hermann's Sunday afternoon fire destroyed a 1961 Ford truck belonging to Clint Hermann, burned about an acre of standing wheat and several acres of stubble before it was brought under control by members of the Genesee Rural Fire Protection District and volunteer assistance.

The fire started from underneath the truck and Fred Kaufman, the driver, was getting ready to unload

the grain when he noticed flames coming from underneath the vehicle. Clint Hermann attempted to start the truck and get it out of danger but the motor died and the truck went up in flames.

The loss was partially covered by insurance, it was reported.

**Mosses Lose Combine**  
Fire last Thursday afternoon at the Mel Moser farm near Genesee totally destroyed a 151 International combine. The fire started at approximately 3:00 p. m., and despite help from the Rural Fire Protection District and neighbors, the loss was complete. Cause of the blaze is believed to be dust on the hot manifold.

**Grass Fire Near Supple's**  
Monday of this week the Kendrick Protective District crew responded to a grass fire on the county right of way on Little Bear Ridge near the Paul Supple farm, Monday afternoon. The crew extinguished the fire without much damage being done.

Last Saturday fire crews from Kendrick were called back to the Little Rock Creek area about 10 miles south of Potlatch to fight a blaze which was lightning to fight two weeks ago, had been brought under control, then flared up again when whipped by the wind.

**Fire Warden Dick Benjamin** reported this week that despite the cooler weather, the Fire Index is still climbing. "There's just no moisture left," Benjamin said Tuesday morning, as he urged farmers, loggers and campers to exercise the greatest precaution in the fields and woods.

## Over-Eager Volunteer Sometimes A Hazard To Firemen

Genesee — Sometimes volunteer helpers are urgently needed in fighting fires, especially grain field blazes. Chet Green, Genesee Fire Chief said this week. But sometimes, he added, in their eagerness to help, they cause more of a problem than they seem to realize. To help prevent this situation, Green asked that citizens avoid certain practices.

One of these is blocking the entrance to the fire station when an alarm sounds, or at any time. Too many times people will drive down to the fire station just as the trucks are going out, which slows down the trucks, prevents them from having a clear street to drive into, and delays regular firemen from finding quick parking spots.

Another very important concern is the people who want to drive out to the fires to either help or just watch and in doing so block the narrow, dusty roads for the fire trucks. The few extra minutes a fire truck is delayed in getting to the scene of a fire could literally be a matter of life and death, to say nothing of property damage. Regardless of how well intentioned the person may be, private citizens have neither the training or the equipment of members of the Rural Fire Protection District. Private vehicles are sincerely urged to pull off the road and let the fire trucks go first!!

Definition of a family: means a group of related or nonrelated individuals who are not residents of an institution or boarding house, but who are living as one Economic Unit.

Income as the term is used in this Notice, is similar to that defined in the Bureau of Census Reports, dated September 31, 1968.

"Income" means income before deductions for income taxes, employees' social security taxes, insurance premiums, bonds, etc. It includes the following:

- (1) monetary compensation for services, including wages, salary, commissions, or fees;
- (2) net income from nonfarm self employment;
- (3) net income from farm self employment;
- (4) social security;
- (5) dividends or interest on savings or bonds; income from estates or trusts or net rental income;
- (6) public assistance or welfare payments;
- (7) unemployment compensation;
- (8) Government civilian employee or military retirement, or pensions, or veterans' payments;
- (9) private pensions or annuities;
- (10) alimony or child support payments;
- (11) regular contributions from persons not living in the household;
- (12) net royalties, and

In applying these guidelines, school food authorities may consider both the income of the family during the past 12 months and family's current rate of income to determine which is the better indicator of the need for free and reduced price lunches.

Unusual circumstances such as illness and death in the family, temporary disability and seasonal unemployment, are also taken into account when determining eligibility.

The schools will make every effort to insure that the children do not know who is paying or who is receiving free lunches.

## Fertilization of Crops

Many years of scientific tests have shown no important differences in quantity or quality of food crops fertilized equally with organic and inorganic materials, the county extension agent says.

Compost and manure can improve the physical character of many garden soils, he said, but they do not do as good a job as chemicals in supplying plant food. Organic fertilizers are more expensive, in shorter supply, and have problems of distribution.

Furthermore, the agent said, there is no reliable evidence that a chemical fertilizer used in recommended amounts will damage the environment. Very little of the nutrients from properly fertilized soils, leach into the water table. Some may go off if there is erosion, but the same loss would occur if manure or compost were applied.

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## Seal Coating Due On 95 South of Genesee

Lewiston — The Idaho Department of Highways at Lewiston has announced a summer seal coating schedule which began Tuesday, Aug. 10, at Genesee Junction, south to the Washington State line, according to Ralph M. Stone, district maintenance superintendent. Stone said that special crews under foreman Ben Pedigo of Lewiston will be seal-coating highways throughout the district during the month of August and the first part of September, so long as the dry weather holds.

During the period when each section of the highway is being worked, traffic will be controlled by flagmen and pilot cars. Speeds of 35 miles per hour will be enforced the length of the project, and motorists may expect slight delays in traffic while waiting for pilot cars to take them through the operations areas. The seal coating schedule is as follows:

Aug. 16 — U. S. 12 — Orofino bridge west 5 miles. State 7 — Intersection and north approach of Orofino bridge on U. S. 12.

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**YOUR GAME DEPARTMENT**

By Robert L. Satter, Asst. director Idaho Fish and Game Department  
**Grasshopper Control Endorsed**  
 Although damage to browse plants and shrubs on big game winter range is slight from grasshopper infestations in many parts of Idaho the Fish and Game Department endorses the current chemical control spray programs, asking only that a safety zone of several hundred yards be left untouched to protect all water courses. In most years the department has not felt the need for spray control work on critical big game ranges to prevent defoliation of browse plants by insects. Such work has proved unnecessary, except on young plants which may die when leaves are stripped. Older plants have made their annual growth by mid-summer, and the loss of most leaves usually is not fatal to the plant in one year.

Grasshoppers sometimes devour not only all leaves but also soft cellular tissue between bark and wood called cambium, from which new wood grows, and the plant dies. Hoppers now are eating the cambium layer, as well as leaves, on browse plants and shrubs on about 12,000 acres north of King Hill, and the department is endorsing the proposal of the Bureau of Land Management that this tract be sprayed with malathion. "Operation Respect" Planning  
 Plans for statewide intensification of the continuing "Operation Respect" program during fall hunts on private lands will be made by the Idaho landholder-Sportsman Council at the Fish and Game Department headquarters building in Boise the afternoon of September 3. Chairman Dave Bivens, state senator and rancher from Poyette, explains that the goal of the program, now in its fourth year, is to open up more land for small game hunting. Hunters and landowners are urged to wear triangles patches to identify themselves.

**Wyoming Grayling Established**  
 Idaho anglers are reporting grayling catches in two widely separated lakes. For the past two summers they have caught this species, which is not native to the state. Several weeks ago grayling were hooked in Round Lake in the Lake Creek drainage in Copper Basin. The species was introduced into Round Lake by the department and 24 other lakes of the state between 1968 and 1970. For the past two summers at East Dennis Lake in the Harrington Ridge area north of the Salmon river, anglers have reported catching grayling. The main distinguishing characteristic of grayling is the large dorsal fin covered with beautiful iridescent spots that change color rapidly after the fish is taken from water. They feed primarily on insects but will take small spinners, spoons and flies. They are excellent eating but should be scaled as part of cleaning.

**HALF OF GUN ACCIDENTS RULED SELF-INFLICTED**

Idaho's gun hunting accident totals could be cut in half during the state's hunting seasons beginning next month if only people would stop shooting themselves.

That, at least, is the conclusion of Martel Morache, conservation supervisor, who says that there was a total of 49 gun accidents in Idaho during the hunting seasons last year. Of these accidents, 25 were self-inflicted and caused by a variety of acts. Guns involved in accidents included 27 rifles, 15 handguns, and 7 shotguns. Thirty-eight victims were less than 10 yards from the muzzle of the shooter's gun, and 9 were less than 100 yards.

Morache commented that the age ranges of the victims parallels those of the past several years. Thirty-eight of the victims were in the age range 10-29 years; and 37 of the shooters were in the same age range. "Clearly, young people are more vulnerable to gun accidents, both as shooters and as victims. Careless gun handling and a lack of respect for firearms accounts for most accidents," Morache observed. He added that 7 nonresidents were involved in gun accidents last year, compared to 42 residents.

Among leading causes of gun hunting accidents, Morache listed transporting and handling loaded guns in vehicles; mistaking humans for game; and carelessness with handguns. He cautioned hunters to dress so that they will look like people instead of animals when hunting big game. The human eye functions in the same way as the animal eye—it detects movement with in range of vision. Thus, people who don't wear fluorescent colors such as "hunter orange" because they do not want to be seen, take the chance of not being identified as a human being.

Morache added that a good safety rule is never to carry a pistol or other handgun with a live round under the hammer—and never to "horse around" with such weapons. They are not toys. Figures show that hunting does not rank high on the list of dangerous sports.

**LANDSCAPING**

Beauty and utility are the goals of landscaping. You can have them by following suggestions of Tony Horn, horticultural specialist of the University of Idaho extension service. He spells them out in a leaflet called "Landscape Your Home Grounds," published this summer by the College of Agriculture. You can get a free copy at the county agent's office.

Plan before you plant, he advises. Make a scale drawing of your house and yard. It will give you an idea how the whole setup will look.

Here are a few ideas:  
 Plant shrubs at least 3 feet from the house or not closer than one half their mature width from the building. If they are closer, they may get in the way. Plant small shrubs in front of larger shrubs, particularly at corners.

The lawn should slope away from the house for good drainage. Unless you have lots of time, keep the grass area small. A lawn is as effective in landscape design as carpet in the interior.

In areas that have a good deal of snow, concrete walks are preferred. If snow is not a problem, brick or flagstone may be more interesting. Walks should be straight and conveniently located. If they are not, people will make a path in the handiest place.

If you want a tree that grows slowly and lives long, plant a fast growing one near it, for temporary shade. When the slow tree is big enough, cut out the other.



- Beat eggs until thick and lemon colored. Add sugar, milk, vanilla and salt; blend well. Fold into whipped cream. Pour into two cold freezer trays. Freeze until partially set.
