Bulldogs Shade GV Rams 15-8

Genesee's Bulldog football team used a safety and two touchdowns to edge out the Clearwater Valley Rams 15-8 on the Kopskia field Friday night and gain their opening league win of the 1971 season. The Bulldogs had dropped a non-conference game to Kamiah the previous Friday night.

Big Curtis Hermann gave Genesee its first points of the game in the first quarter when he caught a Ram pass behind his own goal line and tackled him for two points. In the second quarter, Genesee blocked an attempted Ram punt on a bad pass from center to take over on the Ram 16-yard line where Jerry Meyers passed to Craig Busch for the touchdown minutes later. Busch booted the conversion and the Bulldogs had a 9-0 halftime lead.

A "Meyers to Schluter to Tyler" combination clicked for the Bulldogs in the third period as quarterback Meyers passed to Bill Schluter, who lateraled off to Dan Tyler who raced 32 yards for the final Bulldog score. This conversion try failed for the Bulldogs.

The Rams rounded out the scoring in the final period and then ran the ball for the two-point conversion.

Ernest M. Becker, 92, Retired Genesee Farmer, Succumbs Sept. 1

Ernest Michael Becker, 92, a retired Genesee farmer, died Sept. 1 at St. Joseph's hospital of infirmities of age.

He had been a resident of a nursing home for the past three years.

Becker, who was born Feb. 1, 1879, left Beaver, Minn., his birthplace, and came to Idaho in 1901. A year later he was joined by his parents, Fred and Anna Becker, who had a flour and feed mill at Beaver.

The young man worked at various jobs on farms and for a year was night miller in the flour mill on Lewiston's Main Street which later became the feed mill and elevator for Lewiston Grain Growers, Inc. Residing at Clarkston until 1903, the Beckers bought the Thomas J. Sampson ranch outside of Genesee, now operated by Donald Becker, oldest grandson of the deceased.

In Jan. of 1904, Becker returned to Beaver and on Jan. 19 was married to Nell Richardson, and they returned to the Idaho farm where three surviving children were born to them. A fourth child died young.

Living at Lewiston after their retirement from farm life, Mrs. Becker died Sept. 3, 1955. Becker continued to live in Lewiston until he was hospitalized in 1968.

He was a communicant of St. Stanislaus Catholic church and a charter member of the Genesee Knights of Columbus. He served several years as a commissioner for his community school and highway district boards.

Survivors include two sons, Stanton Becker, Genesee, and Dwight Becker, Bothell, Wash., and a daughter, Mrs. Jerome (Margaret) Brink, Pocatello. Survivors also include a sister, Mrs. Della McLean, Fair Oaks, Calif., six grandchildren and 23 great grandchildren.

Requiem mass was celebrated Saturday at 10 a. m. at St. Stanislaus Catholic church with the Rev. William Elliott, S. J., officiating. Soloist was Eugene Rainville and organist was Mrs. Eugene Gussenhoven.

Palbearers were Neil Sweeney, Omar H. Kries, Albert E. Maybry, Fred Morescheck, James Archibald and Donald J. Linehan. Burial was at Normal Hill cemetery.

Fire Destroys Barn

Dworshak Dam Causes Fishing Closures

The construction of Dworshak Dam has created fishery problems on the North Fork of the Clearwater River that require protective measures for the cutthroat and steelhead populations. The trout fishery on the North Fork before Dworshak construction was supported primarily by juvenile steelhead. Dworshak Dam does not allow fish passage as it is infeasible to pass juvenile steelhead downstream through the reservoir. Steelhead have been eliminated upstream from Dworshak Dam. Native cutthroat and Dolly Varden must now bear all of the trout fishing pressure. The native cutthroat is a rare and endangered fish and will be unable to withstand the intense fishing pressure during the next few years. It is hoped that the cutthroat will be needed so badly in the near future are extremely susceptible in the fall months; therefore, the Idaho Fish and Game Department has announced the following fishing closure:

"North Fork of the Clearwater River and tributary streams from Dworshak Dam upstream closed to fishing for trout, September 7, until further ordered by the Commission to protect adult cutthroat trout which have moved into the river from tributary streams."

The adult steelhead returning this year to the North Fork of the Clearwater River will be greeted by a temporary weir that is being constructed downstream from the Ah-sahka Bridge. The weir is designed to divert adult steelhead into Dworshak Hatchery. Flows in the North Fork below the Dam will be reduced to approximately 80 cubic feet per second this fall. The extreme low flows and an anticipated reluctance on the part of the steelhead to enter the hatchery flayway would concentrate steelhead and other game fish species in the lower section of the North Fork of the Clearwater River. The aforementioned conditions created by the construction of Dworshak Dam has necessitated the following closure to fishing in order to provide needed protection for the valuable steelhead run and other game fish.

"North Fork of the Clearwater River from its mouth upstream to Dworshak Dam closed to all fishing, September 7 and until further order by the Commission to protect steelhead and other species of game fish while Dworshak Reservoir is filling."

Vester K. Daniels Dies When Truck Leaves Highway, Overturns

Vester K. Daniels, 68, well-known area rancher was killed instantly at 9:20 Wednesday morning, Sept. 1, when his pickup truck rolled over an embankment about 700 feet west of the Agatha school on the north side of the Clearwater River 25 miles east of Lewiston.

Daniels had just left the Agatha school, where he and his wife have been living, enroute to their new home at Julietta. He had some 30 chickens in the crates of the truck. The crates broke open and the chickens were loose on the hillside until captured. Daniels sustained crushing head injuries when his 1969 Datsun rolled 75 feet over the embankment after he apparently lost control of the vehicle. He was thrown from the pickup by the impact of the crash, landing on the tracks of the Camas Prairie railroad.

Daniels and his wife had been ranching in the Lenore area 15 years, raising Charolais cattle. They recently purchased another place at Julietta and he was the process of moving. Mrs. Daniels is a patient at Gritman Hospital in Moscow, where she recently underwent surgery. She also is suffering from pneumonia.

Daniels was born July 26, 1903, at Lake Cheslet in Nez Perce County. He lived there until the age of 6, when his family moved to Clarkston. They later returned to Agatha.

Daniels spent several years in Canada, where he worked as a guide and a packer. He returned to the Lenore area in 1953 and married Mrs. Eva S. Smith on June 3, 1956. He was a member of the Julietta Seventh-day Adventist Church.

In addition to his widow, he is survived by his mother, Mrs. Effie Wright, Lenore; a sister, Mrs. Silvie (Elizabeth) Cook, Troy; a brother, Daniel, Lenore; five step-children, Mrs. Roscoe (Anna) Hunter, Lenore, Ben J. Smith, Deary; P. Donald Smith, Moscow; Mrs. Clinton (Ethel) Smith, Lewiston, and Clem W. Smith, Lewiston; 15 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Home Vandalized
The Daniel's home in Lenore was broken into and ransacked, food splattered and flooded sometime during the weekend, it was reported by Donald Smith, Moscow, to the Nez Perce County sheriff's office Monday.

Smith, the son of Mrs. Daniels, was watching out for the property while she is in Gritman Hospital. He reported that entry had been gained by forcing a screen off a screen door on the east side of the house, which is located north of the Lenore bridge opposite U. S. Highway 12.

Food had been taken from the refrigerator and deep freeze and thrown against the walls in every room of the house. Furniture was broken in the one-story frame house and the water was left running in the kitchen, which flooded the basement with 1 1/2 feet of water. Items stored in the basement were soaked and many items ruined, according to Smith.

Deputies also found two dead chickens outside the house and discovered the family dog was missing.

Dump Grounds Closed To Bear Shooting

The Idaho Fish and Game Commission has ordered a closure to protect bears within 200 yards of the perimeter of any dump ground in Clearwater, Latah, Lewis and Nez Perce Counties, and that portion of Idaho County north of the Salmon River. This order adds these five counties to the five northern counties which have had this protection for several years.

Several dumps in these counties have had concentrations of bears this year, so the closure was ordered to avert problems. Shooting on the dumps may have endangered the safety of other persons using the dump. The Department also urges bear hunters to use extreme caution in hunting outside the legal closure, but in proximity to the dumps. It's only common sense and courtesy to be sure of your field of fire.

This year's big game regulations also prohibit the killing or capturing of a cub bear, or killing a female bear with cubs at side except during the period September 4 to Dec. 15.

Bob Webster Passes Away September 2

Robert H. Webster, long-time Moscow resident, and former Genesee rural mail carrier, died in Gritman hospital Thursday, Sept. 2. He was 50.

Webster was a rural mail carrier until the time of his death.

He was born Sept. 11, 1920, and married Pearl Miller March 28, 1940. She survives at the family home.

In addition to his widow, he is survived by a son, Allan, who is serving with the U. S. Navy; two daughters, Mrs. Richard (Diane) Tatterson, Moscow and Mrs. Thomas (Betty Ann) Taylor, of Germany; one grandchild; his mother, Mrs. Geo. R. Webster, Boise, and two sisters, Mrs. Hollis McClellan, Rupert, and Mrs. John Koehler, Alaska.

The funeral was Tuesday at 10 a. m. at Shorts Chapel, with the Rev. David Almon of the United Methodist Church officiating.

BROWN TROUT THRIVE IN LITTLE WOOD RIVER

Trout fishermen will be glad to know that brown trout have apparently caught on quite well in the waters of the Little Wood River below Silver Falls between Carey and Shoshone, reported Bob Bell regional fisheries biologist for the Idaho Fish and Game Department at Jerome.

Bell said that small fingerling plants of brown trout were made in the stream in 1970 and last spring, and fish from both plantings are now showing up in the anglers' creel. The 1970 fish are running 9 to 10 inches long and the 1971 fingerlings are now 4 inches and better. Some 53,000 fish were planted last year and another 30,000 were added this spring.

Experimental plants of brown trout were also made last year in Salmon Falls Creek, Sublett Reservoir and the Big Wood River. So far no returns have been noted from these waters, but further tests will be made.

Brown trout have a little more tolerance for warm and silty water than do other species. They are a beautifully colored rich, golden brown and have a reputation of being hard to catch. This latter characteristic makes them much sought after and a real test of the fly fishermen's skill.

1. At home: Cut in one-inch cubes, two lbs. of chuck, 6 medium potatoes; diced; 6 T. onions, chopped; parsley, if desired; 6 carrots, cut in 1/4-inch slices; 2 cans golden mushrooms; beef consommé or beer. Salt and pepper to taste.
2. Divide into portions. Place in 2 layers of foil. Add salt and pepper; pour liquid over all. Bring foil up to top and twist. Place meat bundles two inches above hot grey coals or 350 degree oven for about 1 hour.
SAUERKRAUT SALAD
2 cups sauerkraut
1 large red or green pepper
1 cup onion
1/2 cup sugar
Drain sauerkraut and mix together with onion, pepper and sugar. Cover

tightly and let set for six hours in refrigerator before serving.
PUMPKIN GINGERBREAD
1 cup flour
1/8 teaspoon soda
1 tablespoon pumpkin pie spice
2 tablespoons dark molasses
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup butter
1 large egg
Sift dry ingredients, then in a large bowl, cream butter, sugar and egg. Stir in pumpkin.
