Then with less than five minutes remaining Doug Moser scored from six yards out just three plays after a Dan Tyler touchdown had been called back because of a penalty. Craig Busch kicked the extra point and the Bulldogs led 7-0 at the quarter's end.

In the second period the Bulldogs capitalized on two successive Spartan penalties to pave the way for Ray Morscheck's next touchdown on a ten yard end sweep.

Genesee's line was firmed up solid in the second quarter and was putting the pressure on the Timberline quarterback, dumping him for losses several times and then opening up good holes for the Bulldog backfield.

In the final period Dan Tyler scored again for Genesee and Ray Morscheck closed out the game with a 60-yard gallop for another touchdown with the point being converted off the talented toe of Busch.

Kindergarten Discussed At Board Meeting

Genesee—At its regular meeting September 13, the school board decided to dismiss school at 1:30 Friday, Sept. 17 due to requests of parents wishing to take their children to the fair.

Four patrons of the district were present at the meeting to seek information about the kindergarten program this year. As explained by Supt. Diehl the district is not totally aware of funds for the coming year. Because of the increase in enrollment it was necessary to use the kindergarten room for an additional elementary classroom.

The district is also faced with approximately \$9,000.00 additional cost than anticipated this year due to hiring one additional teacher plus supplies and furniture. As explained to the group, kindergarten has always been financed by Title I Funds of PL 89-10 Elementary and Secondary Act. These funds in the past have paid for the teachers salary only. The mothers present asked the board if they could take a survey to determine the number of children eligible for kindergarten and at the same time ask if the parents would be willing to pay a fee for the program. In other business, the board voted to go along with the Federal Wage Freeze thus allowing all wages to be based on last year's salaries.

The request of the North Central District Health Department for a \$1,000 charge per pupil for basic public health nursing services other than communicable disease, was turned down by the board. It was decided that a registered nurse could be hired on a day basis for the eye testing and hearing check.

The board planned to host the teacher reception September 27 at 7:30 p. m. in the multi-purpose room.

The State Trustee meeting was discussed and all board members are planning on going. The meeting will be Nov. 3, 4, and 5 at Twin Falls.

The holidays are just around the corner. Let's hunt up family holiday recipes for the column. Cookies, cakes, candies, puddings, or most anything that has been served at your family table through the years.

WHEAT SALAD

- 2 cups cooked wheat, well drained
- 2 TBspoons finely chopped onion
- 1/2 cup diced celery
- 1/4 cup diced ham
- 1/4 cup diced cheddar cheese (medium or sharp)
- Mix and chill overnight. Same for dressing.

DRESSING:

- 1/4 cup Best Foods mayonnaise
- 1/4 cup Miracle Whip salad dressing
- Mix well and add two drops of liquid smoke and two heaping TBspoons sweet pickle relish.
- Mix dressing with salad several hours before serving.

WHEAT RELISH

- 2 quarts cooked wheat
- 2 cups red pepper, chopped
- 2 cups green pepper, chopped
- 1 quart diced celery
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 quart cider vinegar
- 2 TBspoons salt, PLAIN
- 1 tsp. mustard seed
- 1 tsp. celery seed
- Mix last nine ingredients in kettle.
- Mix 1 tsp. tumeric, 1/4 cup flour, and 1/2 cup water and 2 TBspoons hot mustard. When smooth, add wheat and mix. Then add to mixture in kettle and simmer 5 minutes stirring constantly.
- Pack into hot, sterilized jars and process 10 min. in boiling water bath.
- Makes about 5 pints.

IDAHO DEPT. OF EMPLOYMENT

Nineteen Latah County workers were given job finding help during the past week by the Moscow Office of the Idaho Department of Employment. Frank J. Hartstein, Moscow Office Manager said that this was a slightly lower figure than the 23 reported for the previous week, and also slightly below the 25 workers placed on jobs during the same week a year ago. The Labor Day holiday was somewhat a factor, he said. Jobs were still available at the end of the week for farm workers, bookkeepers, cafe workers, domestic workers and a seamstress. Unversity students continue to visit his office in increasing numbers, Hartstein reported, seeking part time and short jobs. He urged area employers to call whenever a short job needs to be done, or a part time job needs to be filled.

Hartstein's report also indicated that there are currently 168 persons seeking jobless pay through his office. He said that this was a decline from the previous week's total of 196 benefit claimants, but was still considerably higher than last year's at 114. The decline from last week was due to additional workers returning to school connected employment and others returning to classes. Nineteen workers filed new claims for unemployment insurance during the week. Included in this total were woodworkers and a number of new comers into the area. Of the total workers seeking benefits now, 71 are filing claims against states other than Idaho. Twelve of those filing new claims during the week filed claims against other states.

DATE & RATE AFFECT YIELD OF HARD RED WINTER WHEAT

Seeding dates and rates make a difference in the yield and quality of hard red winter wheat in dryland areas of Southeastern Idaho.

After six years of trials at the University of Idaho Tetonia Branch Experiment Station, plant scientists recommend seeding as early as possible in September at a rate of 40 pounds of clean wheat per acre. This date-rate combination on produces highest yields in areas similar to the Tetonia Station, according to Hugh C. McKay, superintendent of the station.

Add to this 40 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer per acre and wheat quality also improves. It is most desirable to add this fertilizer in the spring of the year. The trials compared yields from Aug. 15, Sept. 1, Sept. 15, and Oct. 1 seeding dates and from 20, 40, 60 and 80 pounds per acre seeding rates. During wet years where above normal rainfall was received in June, July, and August, there was only a four bushel difference between high and low yields. But during dry years there was a 12 bushel difference favoring Sept. 1 seeding date over the Oct. 1 seeding date.

Results of these trials are reported in College of Agriculture Current Information Series 171, "Hard Red Winter Wheat," which is available at local county extension offices.

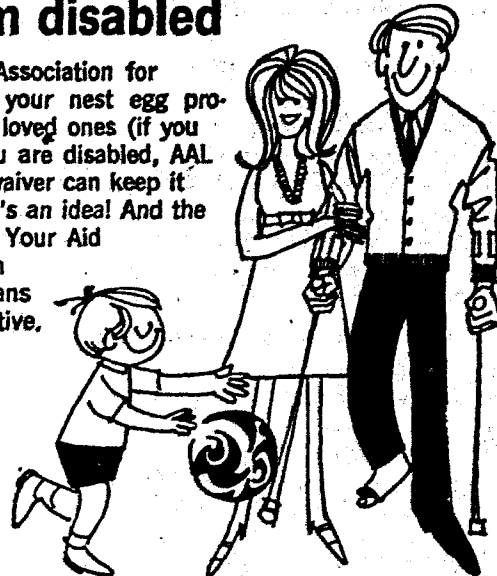

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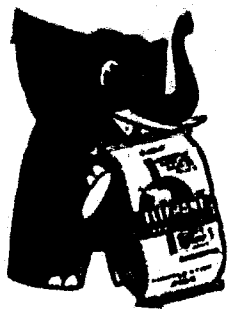

WAGE-PRICE-RENT FREEZE

Authority to deny requests for exemptions from the wage-price-rent freeze has been delegated to the ten Office of Emergency Preparedness regional directors by George A. Lincoln, director of the OEP.

The director says that experience thus far shows that a significant portion of requests either (a) do not need to be processed since rulings of the Cost of Living Council permit the action requested or (b) clearly fail to show that a "gross inequity" is being experienced by the applicant as a result of the Economic Stabilization Program. Regional directors have been furnished guidance, including the case descriptions of requests denied by the OEP national office thus far.

The OEP, which rules on exemption requests stemming from the freeze, has now denied 35 requests. None has been approved.

HUNTER ORANGE THE SAFEST

A lot of research has gone into proving that the best accident-prevention color for hunting jackets and caps is fluorescent orange. In Massachusetts about five years ago they made it a law that hunters must wear at least 400 sq. inches of the color. They haven't had a hunter wearing the color shot by mistake for game since.

So, in Idaho hunting this fall, let's be seen and safe—wear fluorescent orange.

Beaver Transplanting Goes On

District conservation officers are busy these days with fishermen all over, bear damage complaints, game bird brood counts and a myriad of other jobs. And, among them—beaver complaints. Nature's engineer just doesn't mix with irrigation, either for crops or pastureland. Livetrapping at this time of the year is the answer, and officers all over the state are doing just that. In the process a lot of areas that are a little short of beaver formerly are being restocked. Current reports show beaver going into upper Pack River near Sandpoint, upper drainages in Latah county from Elk and Potlatch creeks, Payette River in the Smiths Ferry region, Middle Fork of the Payette, upper Grimes Creek near Idaho City, Smiths Prairie, Little Lost River, and Willow Creek and Moody Meadows (Madison County) in eastern Idaho.

Few Nonresidents on Trophy Hunts

A law change by the legislature and resulting action by the Fish and Game Commission this year dropped the number of out-of-state hunters on at least 2 trophy hunts. No more than 10 per cent of any hunt was allowed for non-residents, and in hunts with 10 or fewer permits, only one could go out-of-state. The result—nonresident moose hunters dropped from 23 to 13 percent and goat hunters from across the border changed from 25 to 7 per cent. Antelope hunters didn't change much due to its great popularity with resident hunters. Sheep hunting was on a general hunting basis last year, but this year, it's all controlled and 9 per cent of the big horn sheep permits went to nonresidents.
