

New releases of hatchery-raised birds were also made within the last few days as the country roads reveal several groups of confused, young pheasants looking for the feed pans. They are more tame than the few wild birds and more easily fall victim to cars and trucks as they attempt to pick up the grain which has fallen from the harvest trucks.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick, County of Latah, State of Idaho, as follows:

the State of Idaho. Section 10. This ordinance shall become effective and shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.
