## Funds Allocated For Kindergarten In Kendrick, Juliaetta Area

Kendrick Joint School District No. 283 has been allocated a Kindergarten under the Emergency Employment Act for 1971-72 absolutely free, provided sufficient number of parents sign and the School Trustees approve, according to Supt. Don Blakeley.

Sessions would be daily in the mornings or afternoons from October 1st to the end of the year—May 28th at an undisclosed classroom in Kendrick or Juliaetta depending upon successful negotiations and board action.

Under such a set-up students who will be 5 years of age before midnight, Oct. 15th, would be eligible to attend, ride the bus one way and eat in school lunch cafeterias for 35 cent each if desired. Parents would have to provide transportation one way even if double sessions materialize.

Search for a qualified teacher will pose a problem, but the Superintendent feels a good one can be secured from nearby universities and employment agencies.

Candidates for kindergarten teaching positions under the Federal act must have a degree, possess an elementary primary or standard elementary certificate, taught in grades 1 through 3 or had practice teaching the last five years. Teachers would obtain application blanks at the superintendent's office, and would be on the District adopted salary schedule.

State Curriculum Guides would determine the course of study, learning activities, supplies and equipment. Heat, janitorial service, water, and electricity would be provided by the District, but would be a small factor. The entire teachers salary and fringe expenses will be paid by the Federal Government.

Record keeping and reporting would be the same as for any other District student, a physical exam is necessary, there is no compulsory attendance and suggested class size is 18 to 22 children.

The superintendent urges all interested parents to call or write him if they are interested at once, so he can call a special meeting of the Trustees for approval of such a plan.

## Weather Has Nip In Air

Although only a few of the leaves have started to turn, autumn can't be too far away, as the days have that fall "nip" of chilly mornings and cool spots wherever the sun doesn't shine.

Despite a small shower in the Genesee area Sunday night, the skies have stayed clear and sunny for most of the past two weeks and farmers have been cleaning up the final portions of the 1971 harvest, after a rainy spell early in the month forced a delay. Over one inch of rain fell on American Ridge during the first two days of September, reported Dick Benschoter.

After that delay the farmers were able to get back to harvesting and other fall work. The rain also put a halt to fire threat.

Temperatures have been staying in the low and middle 70's during the day and dropping down to the 30's at night. Heavy frost in most areas have killed many of the gardens and flowers, unless they were protected.

Bird Season Opened  
The first of the year's bird seasons opened last week-end as hunters are now able to legally take partridge and quail in this area. The dove season ended. Some hunters were in evidence over the weekend, judging from the amount of shotgun shells and beer cans, and other trash on the roads Sunday and Monday mornings.

New releases of hatchery-raised birds were also made within the last few days as the country roads reveal several groups of confused, young pheasants looking for the feed pans. They are more tame than the few wild birds and more easily fall victim to cars and trucks as they attempt to pick up the grain which has fallen from the harvest trucks.

## Tigers Roll Over Kootenai 30-6

Kendrick's Tigers piled up a 16-point first quarter lead and then scored 14 more in the third quarter as they rolled to an easy 30-6 victory over the Kootenai High School team on the St. Maries field last Tuesday afternoon. The win brought the Tiger record to 2-1 for the season.

Kendrick scored first when Dale Taylor ran for 6 yards out following a 60-yard kickoff return by Hutcherson. Taylor also ran the extra point for the Tigers.

Kim Trout got the next Tiger tally with a 15-yard run and Hutcherson ran the conversion to make it 16-0 for the K. H. S. team. Kootenai got on the score board on the second period on a two-yard pass play. Hutcherson scored both touchdowns in the third period as he scored from close in to give the Tigers their victory margin. Hutcherson had an outstanding day, gaining 228 yards for the Tigers — 98 on the ground, 50 in the air and 80 in the kick returns.

The Tiger defense was outstanding, holding the Kootenai squad to less than 100 yards gained.

Culdesac Wednesday Night  
Because of the Nezperce County Fair, the Tigers will play Wednesday evening, hosting the Culdesac Wolves on the K. H. S. field.

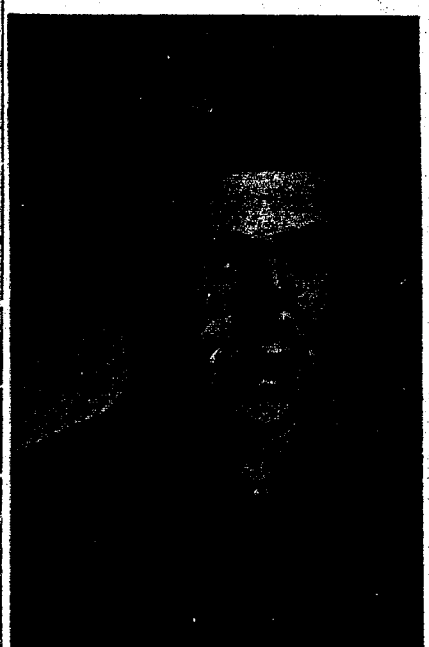
At Orofino Friday

Mr. and Mrs. Eldred J. Thomas, Mrs. Belle Isaksen and I, Emma Shirrod, left Lewiston August 27th at 8:00 a. m. by auto for Seattle, Washington. Made a short detour to Palouse Falls where we took a few pictures then continued on to Seattle. We first went to the office of the Interpacific Investors Services Inc. where we met the President of the company. We then went to the Edgewater Hotel where we spent the night. The next morning we began our 12-day tour including Alaska and a portion of B. C.

1st day: Aug. 28th. 8:30 a. m. at the foot of pier 64 we boarded the Princess Marguerite for a four-hour cruise through Puget Sound and the Straits of Juan de Fuca to Victoria where we were transferred to the hotel. After lunch we were taken on a tour of the Island and the Grand Gardens. The hanging baskets were most beautiful, the Rose Garden, The Sunken Gardens— not enough words to express how wonderful they were—just gorgeous. We spent the night at Victoria.

2nd day: Aug. 29th. Leaving Victoria and the southeast corner of Vancouver Island, and traveled northwest by Stage Coach to Kelsey Bay where we boarded the M. V. Queen of Prince Rupert, a ferry boat, enroute to Prince Rupert. We were on this ferry one night, it being a 20-hour voyage. Beautiful scenery all the way.

3rd day: Aug. 30th. We were transferred to the hotel at Prince Rupert, also known as the Halibut Capital of the World. The bus being loaded we were taken by private car and a lady driver on the tour. We were first taken to the dock where they were unloading the fish the fishermen had brought in. Went through the plant where the fish were de-entrailed, beheaded, sized, washed, cleaned, rinsed and inspected, and the stamp of approval placed on each one, then transferred to the deep freezing section. You could never imagine how many fish. You would have to see to believe. We then toured the city for an hour and a half.

4th day: Aug. 31st. We now entered the Alaska State Ferry for two nights. The first night, the ferry ran into a fish net which seemed to have been stretched across the channel. This delayed the ferry for a couple of hours. Then when we got as far as Juneau many of the passengers left the ferry. Among them were 20 on a tour from Texas who were traveling together. But our itinerary did not include Juneau so we continued on the ferry another night, and the last night we passed through the Narrows. It was quite a sight to see lights placed on both sides of the narrow passage, an equal distance apart so the Captain or who ever had control of the ferry was able to steer it through.

5th day: Sept. 1st. We reached Skagway late in the afternoon, and transferred to our hotel. Had beautiful scenery all the way.

6th day: Sept. 2nd. We left Skagway by the Narrow Gauge Railroad. It is the famous trail of 1898 when the Gold Rush was on. They said that 10,000 people lived in one of the Valleys. We could see from the train, there was nothing there now but a valley of trees, rocks and water. We then passed a spot where so many horses had lost their lives. The mountains along this route were simply grand, and a wonder how they were ever able to build such a Rail Way of course curving around and climbing upward all the time. There were glaciers at the top of the many, many creeks running down the mountain sides. Very lovely to look at. After reaching the top and coming down the other side, we saw many lakes, and on reaching the bottom at Bennett Lake, we had dinner Family Style at the Restaurant, after which we pulled into Whitehorse in the Yukon Province.

7th day: Sept. 3rd. At Whitehorse we left by plane for Fairbanks. We were taken by bus to the University of Alaska and Museum and a tour around the city.

8th day: Sept. 4th. It was Saturday, and Mrs. Isaksen phoned Mrs. Winifred Lande and she came to the hotel that afternoon so we had a nice visit with her. She brought us several pamphlets pertaining to her school work, and among them was a dictionary of the Eskimo language for each of us. I expect to donate mine to the Library.

At the age of 6 months, they begin to train them, and at 9 months they are put to work with the older dogs. We were shown a team of 5 dogs. How they were hitched up, their harness, the sleds and they even had them start up and pull the sled and bring it back to the place where they started.

10th day: Sept. 6th. We left McKinley Park again on the Alaska Railroad for Anchorage. Upon our arrival at Anchorage we were transferred to our hotel.

11th day: Sept. 7th. We were taken on a 35-mile trip to the Ski Resort and the chair lifts where we had dinner and went up the Alaska chair lifts: 20 minutes each way, and at the top 10 minutes. ## OPERATION RESPECT MAKES HUNTING AVAILABLE

By E. Kluss Brown, Chief Information and Education division Idaho Fish and Game Department

Operation Respect is now four years old and still holds promise for improving landholder-sportsman relations in Idaho, a much needed program if the fine old American tradition of freedom in hunting is to be preserved.

About 2,000 Idaho sportsmen are buying the Operation Respect membership kits each year and sewing the bright yellow triangle patch on their hunting jackets. The number should go to 10,000 a year at least and it could if more people would take on the selling job.

The whole idea is simple. The key to good relations with landholders depends on their knowing who is on their property. A quick, easy way to identify the good hunter and true sportsman was needed to let the landholder know at a glance what kind of person wants access to his land. The familiar triangle patch was the answer.

Designing the hunting jacket patch was easy. The triangle came from the familiar brand on the "Hunting By Permission" signs distributed by the Idaho Landholder-Sportsman Council for many years. The triangle represents the three cooperators to the whole idea, the landholder, the sportsman and the Fish and Game Department.

Operation Respect kits are available from local sportsmen's clubs, scouts, other groups or the Fish and Game Department. A kit sells for a dollar and the money goes right back into the program for more triangle patch kits, signs, and related materials.

**BICYCLISTS**

American motorists are sharing the roads with a rapidly growing number of bicyclists.

The burgeoning popularity of the bicycle, in its bewildering array of colors, styles, and types, calls for added caution on the part of both drivers and the cyclists.

To make bicycle riding safer, the Idaho Medical Association urges attention to the following bike safety tips:

Be careful to keep your bicycle under control. Bikes, especially the 10-speed models, are capable of high speeds and the rider should be sure his speed does not surpass his ability to control and stop the bike.

Ride single file and never zigzag. Be sure the bike is in good condition, especially the brakes.

Do not ride after dark unless you have to. If you do, increase visibility by wearing light-colored clothing and be sure your bicycle is equipped with lights that work and reflectors.

When traffic is heavy at a busy corner, dismount and walk the bike across.

Do not make sudden or unexpected moves on streets or roads. Motorists may not have time to second-guess a cyclist's impulses.

Most injuries involve a violation or traffic rules. Know and obey them. Watch out at all times for cars and trucks. Let them go first. A car or truck driver deserves courtesy from the cyclist, just as the rider expects courtesy from the driver.

**ORDINANCE NO. 557**

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF RETAIL WINE LICENSES IN KENDRICK, IDAHO; DEFINING TERMS; PRESCRIBING QUALIFICATIONS OF APPLICANTS; PROVIDING FOR APPLICATIONS FOR LICENSES; PERIOD OF LICENSES AND LICENSE FEES; PROVIDING REGULATIONS FOR THE RETAIL SALE OF WINE; PROVIDING THAT A VIOLATION HEREOF IS A MISDEMEANOR; PROVIDING PUNISHMENT FOR VIOLATIONS UPON CONVICTION; AND PROVIDING THE EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick, County of Latah, State of Idaho, as follows:

Section 1. The following terms as used in this ordinance are hereby defined as follows:

(a) "Wine" shall mean any alcoholic beverage containing not more than fourteen per cent (14%) alcohol by volume obtained by the fermentation of the natural sugar content of fruits or other agricultural products

containing sugar whether or not other ingredients are added.

(b) "Person" includes all individual, firm, copartnership, association, corporation, or any group or combination acting as a unit, and includes the intent to give a more limited meaning is disclosed by the context in which it is used.

(c) "Retail wine license" means a license issued by the City of Kendrick authorizing a person to sell wine at retail.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for a person to sell or otherwise dispose of any wine at retail within the City of Kendrick without a valid retail wine license issued by the City of Kendrick, which license shall be posted and displayed in a conspicuous place within the business premises covered by said license; provided, however, that provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to sale of wine by the drink by a person having valid license for the sale of liquor by the drink.

Section 3. Applications for retail wine licenses shall be made to the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick on forms provided therefor by said City; applicants for such licenses must have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and if the applicant is a copartnership,

each partner must have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and the applicant must meet all of the qualifications of an applicant for a license for the retail sale of beer as provided in the Ordinances of the City of Kendrick and all the amendments thereto as have or may be enacted.

Section 4. Retail wine licenses shall be issued for a period of one (1) year beginning January 1 and expiring December 31 of each calendar year.

Section 5. The retail wine license fee shall be Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per year or any fraction of a year; provided, however, that the retail wine license for the year 1971 shall be issued for the period of the date of the issuance of the license to December 31, and the license fee shall be Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00).

Section 6. The transferability, revocation and suspension of retail wine licenses issued pursuant to this ordinance and any amendments hereto shall be subject to and governed by provisions of the Ordinances of the City of Kendrick and all amendments thereto as have or may be enacted pertaining to retail beer licenses.

Section 7. A person shall obtain a separate retail wine license for each place of business wherein said person offers wine for sale at retail.

Section 8. No person holding a retail wine license shall permit the consumption of wine on or within the licensed premises, and wine shall be sold only during the hours that beer may be sold as provided by the laws of the State of Idaho and Ordinances of the City of Kendrick.

Section 9. Any person who violates the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall, in addition to suspension or revocation of license, be punished by a fine or imprisonment or both as provided by the laws of the State of Idaho.

Section 10. This ordinance shall become effective and shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF RETAIL WINE LICENSES IN KENDRICK, IDAHO; DEFINING TERMS; PRESCRIBING QUALIFICATIONS OF APPLICANTS; PROVIDING FOR APPLICATIONS FOR LICENSES; PERIOD OF LICENSES AND LICENSE FEES; PROVIDING REGULATIONS FOR THE RETAIL SALE OF WINE; PROVIDING THAT A VIOLATION HEREOF IS A MISDEMEANOR; PROVIDING PUNISHMENT FOR VIOLATIONS UPON CONVICTION; AND PROVIDING THE EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick, County of Latah, State of Idaho, as follows:

Section 1. The following terms as used in this ordinance are hereby defined as follows:

(a). "Wine" shall mean any alcoholic beverage containing not more than fourteen per cent (14%) alcohol by volume obtained by the fermentation of the natural sugar content of fruits or other agricultural products

containing sugar whether or not other ingredients are added.

(b) "Person" includes all individual, firm, copartnership, association, corporation, or any group or combination acting as a unit, and includes the intent to give a more limited meaning as disclosed by the context in which it is used.

(c) "Retail wine license" means a license issued by the City of Kendrick authorizing a person to sell wine at retail.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for a person to sell or otherwise dispose of any wine at retail within the City of Kendrick without a valid retail wine license issued by the City of Kendrick, which license shall be posted and displayed in a conspicuous place within the business premises covered by said license; provided, however, that provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to sale of wine by the drink by a person having valid license for the sale of liquor by the drink.

Section 3. Applications for retail wine licenses shall be made to the Mayor and Council of the City of Kendrick on forms provided therefor by said City; applicants for such licenses must have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and if the applicant is a copartnership,

each partner must have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and the applicant must meet all of the qualifications of an applicant for a license for the retail sale of beer as provided in the Ordinances of the City of Kendrick and all the amendments thereto as have or may be enacted.

Section 4. Retail wine licenses shall be issued for a period of one (1) year beginning January 1 and expiring December 31 of each calendar year.

Section 5. The retail wine license fee shall be Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per year or any fraction of a year; provided, however, that the retail wine license for the year 1971 shall be issued for the period of the date of the issuance of the license to December 31, and the license fee shall be Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00).

Section 6. The transferability, revocation and suspension of retail wine licenses issued pursuant to this ordinance and any amendments hereto shall be subject to and governed by provisions of the Ordinances of the City of Kendrick and all amendments thereto as have or may be enacted pertaining to retail beer licenses.

Section 7. A person shall obtain a separate retail wine license for each place of business wherein said person offers wine for sale at retail.

Section 8. No person holding a retail wine license shall permit the consumption of wine on or within the licensed premises, and wine shall be sold only during the hours that beer may be sold as provided by the laws of the State of Idaho and Ordinances of the City of Kendrick.

Section 9. Any person who violates the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall, in addition to suspension or revocation of license, be punished by a fine or imprisonment or both as provided by the laws of the State of Idaho.

Section 10. This ordinance shall become effective and shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.

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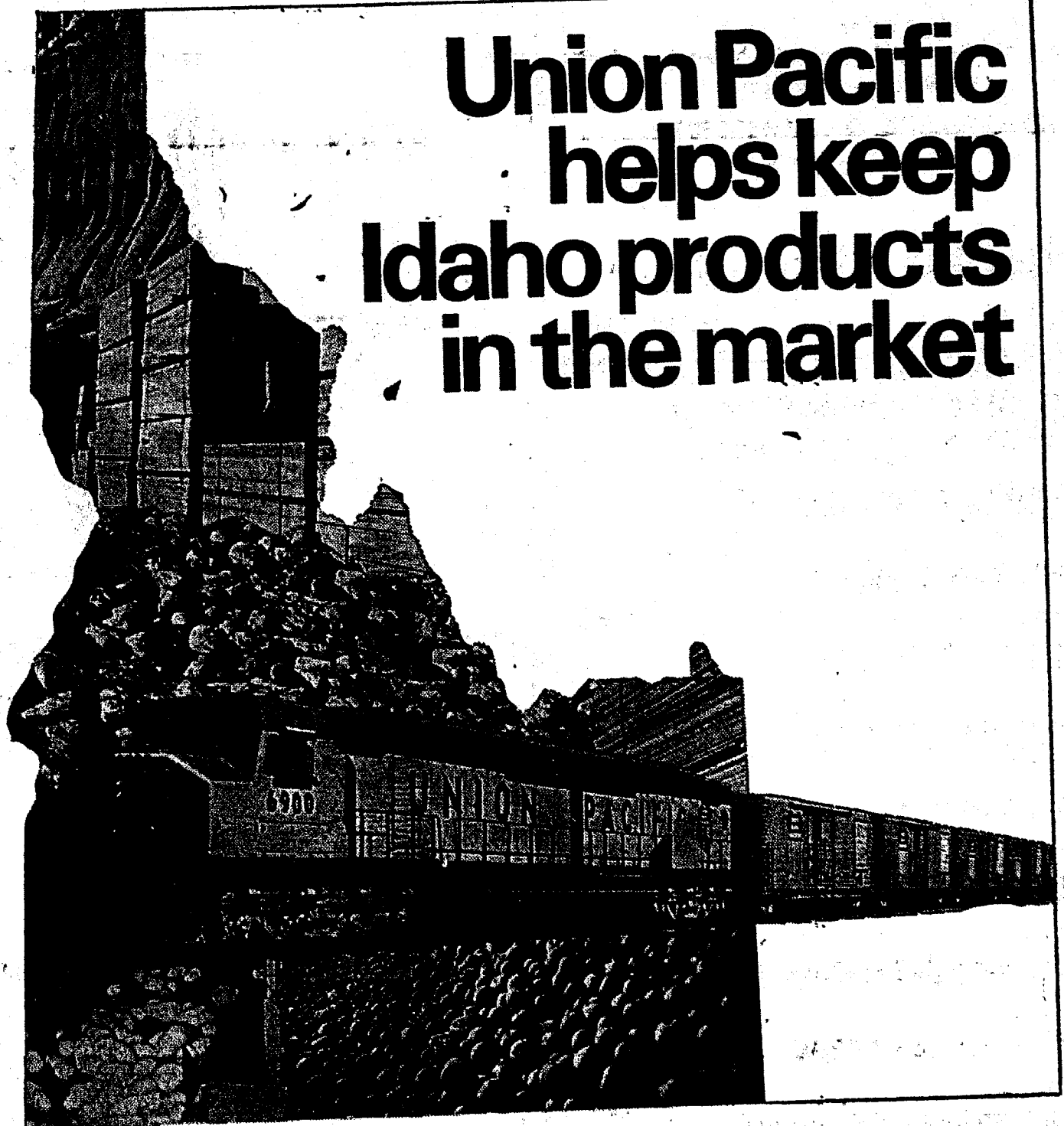
