The Tigers added another touchdown in each of the remaining quarters including a 78-yard gallop by Dale Taylor who was sprung free on a fine block by Dave Wilken.

Dennis Lukekart also contributed a touchdown for the Tiger effort, as the KHS team brought their season record to 3 wins and 1 loss.

Coach Dust said later he used only three basic plays throughout the game and kept his passing attack to a minimum as there were several scouts from Troy watching the game. The Tigers will be at Troy this Friday at the Trojan homecoming celebration.

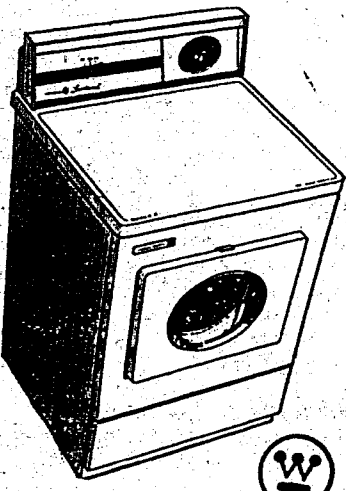

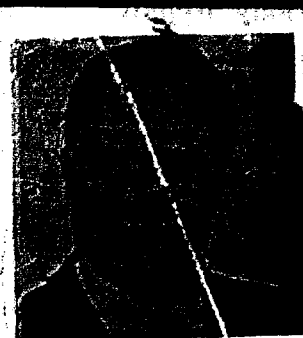

**HELL ROARING LAKE REHABILITATED**

Hell Roaring Lake in the Sawtooth Primitive Area was treated with a fish toxicant dispensed from aircraft earlier this month to eradicate trash fish, reported Don Corley, regional fisheries biologist for the Fish and Game Department at Salmon. He said the department plans to plant the lake with grayling in the spring. The stream below will be planted with native cutthroat trout.

A detoxifying agent was placed in the outlet stream below the lake which turned the water a beautiful violet color. The process, which takes approximately two weeks, is to insure that game fish populations below the lake will not be affected.

Since there are primitive restrictions on the use of outboard motors or other motorized equipment on the ground, it was necessary to treat the lake with a helicopter. Some 227 lbs. of Fintrol solution was used to get a mixture of three parts per billion in the 57-acre lake. Only one hour of flying time was required to complete the project.

A stock quantity of suckers, shiners and dace along with a few stunted kokanee were killed with the treatment in what was figured to be a 100 percent eradication of fish in the lake. The toxicant is not harmful to other fish food organisms, birds, mammals or people.

Hell Roaring Lake is located about 5 miles west of the Sawtooth Valley Ranger Station on trails which lead back into the Sawtooth Primitive Area. It is a popular stop-off point for back packers and trail riders.

**YOUR FISH AND GAME DEPT.**

By Joseph C. Greenley, director Idaho Fish and Game Dept. (release Thurs., Sept. 30, 1971)  
**Drawing For Beaver Permits Held**  
A public drawing for 37 controlled beaver trapping permits was held at the state office last week. The permits are for specified numbers and will allow a total of 645 beaver to be taken in areas around the state. There was a total of 117 applications for the beaver permits from the 670 licensed trappers in the state.  
Controlled beaver trapping units are used to limit the harvest of beaver, since arts of some streams might be overtrapped if regular open seasons were permitted.  
**State Line Problems**  
Idaho borders on six states and one Canadian province and a number of conservation enforcement problems are the result. The most difficult situation was on the Snake River where it forms the boundary between Idaho and the states of Oregon and Washington. This was solved when the various state legislatures passed reciprocal type legislation making the hunting and fishing licenses from either state good anywhere on the Snake so long as one didn't tie up a boat and fish or hunt from the opposite shore. The same thing was worked out with Utah for fishing on the waters of Bear Lake.  
Most of the other state line problems have to do with migratory game such as deer with Nevada and elk with Utah.
