

### HELL ROARING LAKE REHABILITATED

Hell Roaring Lake in the Sawtooth Primitive Area was treated with a fish toxicant dispensed from aircraft earlier this month to eradicate trash fish, reported Don Corley, regional fisheres bologist for the Fish and Game Depart-ment at Salmon. He said the depart-ment plans to plant the lake with grayling in the spring. The stream below will be planted with native cutthroat trout.

A detoxifying agent was placed in the outlet stream below the lake which turned the water a beautiful violet color. The process, which takes approximatetwo weeks, is to insure that game fish populations below the lake will not be affected.

Since there are primitive restric-tions on the use of outboard motors or other motorized equipment on the ground, it was necessary to treat the lake with a helicopter. Some 227 lbs. of Fintrol solution was used to set a mixture of three parts per billion in the 57-acre lake. Only one hour of flying time was required to complete
