Tigers Blast Deary 62-6 For Sixth Victory

Coach Wayne Dust's 1971 K. H. S. Tigers rolled to a surprisingly easy 62-6 victory over a bigger, stronger or Deary Mustang squad last Friday evening before a large Homecoming crowd at the Kendrick ball field. This was the sixth victory of the season for the Tigers against a single defeat.

While Coach Dust was justly proud of his squad's team effort in the win, he pointed to the performance of back Dave Hutchison with special pride. Dave collected a total of 272 yards individual offensive gain, including 193 yards rushing for an average of 8.3 yards per carry. Dale Taylor added 115 yards; Kim Trout 72 yards and Eddie Osborn picked up 52 yards rushing and passed for 87 yards with five completions in 10 attempts. Altogether the Tigers ran up over 500 yards total offense to bring their net yardage average to 354 in seven games.

Kendrick wasted no time in getting on the score board as they stopped a Mustang drive off the opening kick-off on the 9-yard line and then drove down to the DHS 28, where Dave Hutchison packed the ball around the right end for the first touchdown. Taylor banged through the Deary line for the two-point conversion.

After stopping the Deary squad cold on the kick-off play, the Tigers moved the pigskin down to the Mustang 10 on a series of hard-driving line plays. Eddie Osborn moved down to the three, and then Dale Taylor carried the ball across on the next play for another six points. The extra point try failed.

Leading 13-0 going into the second quarter, the Tiger defense put on a flashy exhibition for the home crowd as they dumped the Deary quarterback 3 times in succession for a total loss of forty yards with Dave Wilken getting two of the tackles and Dave Hutchinson the other. Taylor then picked up his second touchdown of the game, going four yards and then adding the conversion.

Kim Trout made it 28-0 on a reversing play a few minutes later, scampering 35 yards for the tally. The extra point try failed.

Deary scored their lone touchdown in the second quarter with Greg Miller going 75 yards on a kick-off return for the longest run of the game. Deary couldn't convert the extra point.

The third quarter was almost an official game, as they penalized the Tigers 60 yards to stymie the KHS attack. The crowd groaned as they watched an Osborn-to-Trout-to-Hutchison pass play for a touchdown called back, but on the next series the Tigers repeated the play with Hutchison getting the score. Taylor carried for the two-point conversion.

Osborn passed to Hutchison for the next Tiger score in a combination play covering forty yards as Dave broke free from two tacklers to cross the goal line standing up and then ran his own conversion.

With the clock showing only forty seconds remaining, Dale Taylor added his third and final score from inside the ten to make it 52-6, as the extra point try was good.

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FISHING CUTBACKS PROPOSED

Field and staff personnel of the department have proposed some rather far reaching restrictions in fishing for 1972 in their recommendations to the fish and game commission. The commission will meet in Boise beginning on October 14 for the primary purpose of setting the fishing seasons and regula-

tions for 1972.

The proposed restrictions include cutting back the statewide daily trout bag limit from 15 to possibly 10, because of the steadily mounting fishing pressure and the continued loss of good fishing habitat. Other proposals include putting the Middle Fork of the Salmon River on a catch and release only basis to protect the declining cutthroat trout, set aside the Henry Fork of the Snake River where it flows through the Railroad Ranch for fly fishing only; expand the fly fishing only section of Silver Creek; and cut back the daily, weekly and season bag limits of salmon and steelhead about one-half due to the crisis brought about by the nitrogen supersaturation condition below the downriver dams that has resulted in losses of migrating fish.

The commission will hold its usual open meeting on the afternoon of October 14. The public is invited to come in and express their views on these proposals or on any other subject—or write a letter to this office.

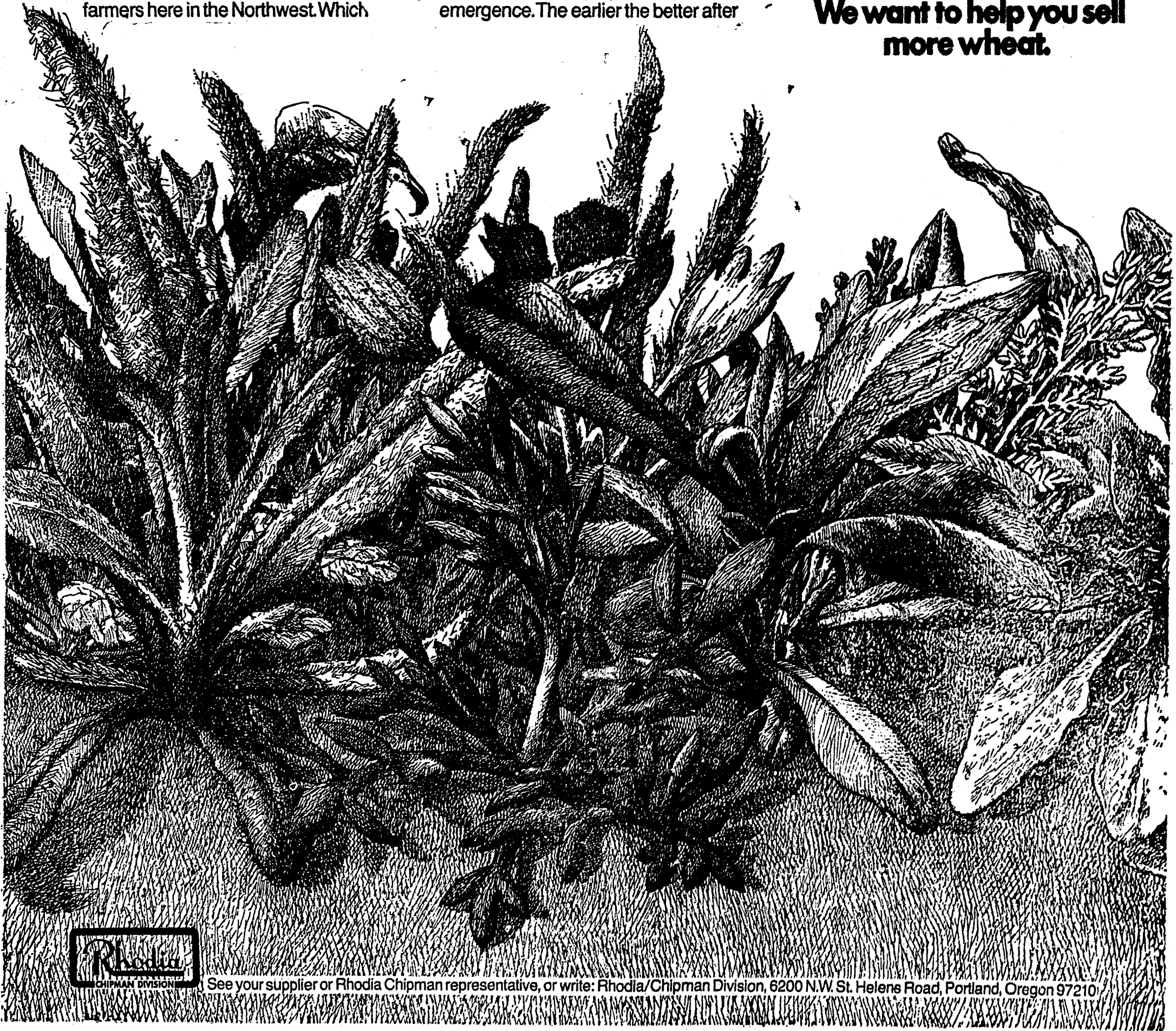
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SOUTH IDAHO PHEASANTS TARGETS ON OCTOBER 23

Upland game bird hunters and their dogs will learn for themselves what kind of a pheasant season Idaho will have south of the Salmon River, beginning Saturday October 23rd, (noon), the Fish and Game Department announced today.

Field reports from department workers indicate that the season this year will be average or better. Closing dates in southwestern Idaho will be December 5 in the McCall, Western, and Magic Valley Regions; November 21 in the Salmon and Upper Snake Regions, and November 28 in the Eastern Region.

The bag limit will be four cocks except November 27 through December 5 in the Western and Magic Valley Regions when the bag limit shall be four pheasants, one of which may be a hen. In the counties of Bingham, Power and Bannock, bag limit shall be four cocks except November 20 through November 28 when the bag limit shall be four pheasants, one of which may be a hen.

Note Regulations: Salmon and Upper Snake Regions close pheasant season November 21; counties of Bingham, Power, Bannock, Caribou, Oneida, and Franklin close the season November 28.

Pheasant season in northern Idaho opened Oct. 9 and continues through November 14, with a bag limit of two cocks. Since hunting success is based largely on hatchery-reared birds, this year's experience in the Clearwater and Panhandle regions cannot be compared with southern Idaho, where natural production in the field is the controlling factor determining "good" or "bad" pheasant years.

Pheasants are ranked as the most popular upland game birds in Idaho's wide assortment of species, both native and naturalized, including three kinds of quail, two species of partridge, 3 forest grouse, sage and sharp-tail grouse and Merriam's wild turkeys. Chukar partridge easily ranks second in popularity.

Recent pheasant mercury contamination tests were found to be negative and hunters this season can eat the birds they shoot without fretting about contamination.

FIRST SECURITY NEWS LETTER Idaho Business Rated Fair To Good

Business in Idaho by the end of the third quarter was rated fair to good compared with previous months and the economic climate one year ago.

This is the report of the First Security Bank News Letter being distributed this week. It was announced by Wm. Phar and James Hoogland, managers of the First Security Banks in Genesee and Kendrick.

Increases in production, employment, personal income and trade are equal to, or slightly higher than the national average. There has been a substantial increase in housing construction and the outlook for the fourth quarter for additional stability in prices and a decrease in the rate of inflation is anticipated.

The News Letter reports that total personal income in Idaho for 1971 is estimated at \$2.5 billion an increase of \$167 million or 7 percent over that reported by the Dept. of Commerce for

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last year. After correction for decreased purchasing power of the dollar, real income in projected at 3 percent above that of 1970.

Personal income through July in the Gem state is estimated at 7.4 per cent above a year ago, slightly above the national average of 6.8 percent. Incomes during July were handicapped by both the copper and railroad strikes which slowed down production and employment because many goods could not be shipped.

Wages and salaries are expected to total \$1.5 billion for an increase of \$97 million over that of last year. Income from this source represents nearly 60 percent of total personal income.

Net farm income, according to the News Letter is estimated at about \$245 million, about the same as in each of the past two years. Proprietors income at \$185 million should increase about \$2 million while property income is up almost \$22 million.

Cash receipts from farming in the state may be slightly lower than in 1970. The price outlook for potatoes has improved slightly, with production of the fall crop about the same as one year ago. Per capita consumption of frozen potato products continues to increase and will account for up to 75 percent of Idaho's potato crop.

Wheat production is above that of last year and prices are approximately the same. The dock strike on the Pacific coast has curtailed shipments to foreign countries.

Lumber production for the first six months was reported at 1,014.5 million feet board measure, some 6 percent above that reported last year. Increases have been shown every month since January due to increased demand by the construction industry in the marketing territory.

First Security reports that employment in Idaho during August was 306,900, an increase of 5,000 or 1.7 percent over a year ago. Employment in agriculture declined, as is the case nationally, but non-agricultural employment increased by over 5,400.

Employment during August was estimated at 18,400, an increase of 3,400 from last year. The percentage of the labor force unemployed was at 5.7 percent, an increase of a full percentage point from one year ago.

Total construction in the leading cities totaled \$75.5 million in the first eight months of the year an increase of 10.8 percent from last year. Total construction valuation as shown by contracts awarded amounted to \$105 million, 35 percent below 1970.

Mineral production for the first seven months was slightly down. Production of gold was considerably below that of a year ago, while silver output was approximately the same.

Peters Tells of Aims Of N. F. O. Today

Gordon Peters, President of the Nez Perce County N. F. O., said today that farm bargaining bills before Congress invite government domination and regimentation of collective bargaining that would complicate efforts of farmers to bargain for better prices without adding anything whatever to farm bargaining rights under the Capper-Volstead Act.

Involving the government in collective bargaining is unnecessary, he said, and the bargaining bills being pushed now in Washington should be killed.

"In the National Farmers Organization we are unwilling to accept the idea that the government must take charge of collective bargaining," he said.

"The government has failed to achieve fair prices necessary to keep family farming economically healthy, and it will continue to be subject to the same processor and consumer-political pressures that have weakened price support programs."

What farmers need now, he said, is legislation to prevent handlers, processors, integrators, and other big corporate buyers from producing their own agricultural commodities to escape collective bargaining with farmers.

"A move is underway by big business to take over American agriculture and turn our farms into the bottom rung of a giant ladder-like corporate system that plants, harvests, processes and retails all the nation's foods," Peters said.

"The legislation we seek would curb this corporate grab for power in agriculture and help the people of N. F. O. maintain private farm ownership and our free enterprise system."

Gordon said N. F. O. has developed a nation-wide collective, dispatch and delivery system during 10 years of collective bargaining under the present law. The organization, he said, has negotiated more than 3,000 contracts so far this year with every type of buyer of agricultural commodities.

"Supply contracts have been negotiated with several hundred pack-

ers, grain dealers, millers, soybean processors, poultry integrators, potato processors and foreign buyers," he said.

"We have learned enough in testing collective bargaining techniques to be convinced that the N. F. O. is the farmers' only hope for getting prices that return cost of production plus a reasonable profit."

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
