EFFORT BEING MADE TO STEADY DRY PEA MARKET

Moscow - Representatives of the Washington and Idaho Dry Pea and Lentil Association and Commissions met with U. S. D. A. officials last week, in an effort to encourage the department to purchase substantial amounts of dry peas in the very near future.

Members of the industry delega-tion who met with congressional U, S. D. A. officials were Harold Stueckle, Colfax; Willard Scoville, Potlatch and Harold Blain, Administrator of the Washington and Idaho Pea and Lentil Commissions.

Following these meetings, a joint Congressional letter signed by Senators Magnuson, Church, Jackson and Jordan, and Representatives Fo-ley, McCormick, McClure and Hansen was forwarded to Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin, asking that dry peas be purchased by the Department for its Needy Family and School Lunch programs. The delegation pointed out to U.S.D. Some of these markets will be hard to regain, even after the ports open up for business. A good example is in the dry pea market in Japan, developed through the efforts of the U. S. A. Dry Pea and Lentil Council. Australia and New Zealand are currently supplying these markets because of our inability to ship our products. Department purchases of other

commodities, such as dry beans, have also been substantial in recent partment has put out offers for 10½ million pounds of beans, with the average cost currently at \$10.00

It was pointed out by the dele-gation that considering the current low price differential, coupled with the exceptional high protein value of dry peas, a large purchase of dry peas would seem to be justified. A double benefit could be achieved by meeting the nutritional needs of the department's food program, as well as strengthening current low price levels.

BRUCELLOSIS FREE

On October 5 Idaho obtained the status of being certified Brucellosis Free. In 1938 Latah County was the first to have a county program of testing for the erad-ication of "Bangs" disease. This really means that less than 1 per cent of the herds, or one herd, whichever is greater, is infected. There are nine hords show-ing infection and 25,000 herds represented Cooperation of slaughter houses and so fast and so far that the disease can spre ad very quickly without constant checks. Nearly eight million cattle have been tested, vaccinated or milk samples taken since 1934 when the federal pro-
