In the third period, Genesee fought their way down to the one yard line where Ray Morscheck cracked over for the score and Craig Busch booted the extra point and that was all the scoring for the game as the two teams struggled to a 0-0 fourth quarter tie.

She married William L. Candler of Teakean, Idaho, July 5, 1912, at Moscow. He died Nov. 25, 1969, at Moscow.

They made their home at Kendrick until 1936, and then moved to Juliaetta, where they had since resided.

She was a member of the Seventh Day Adventist Church, the Dorcas Society and had been secretary of the church for several years.

Survivors include four sons, Donald B. Candler, Bovill; Floyd Candler and Dale Candler, both of Juliaetta, and Neil Candler, Potlatch; four daughters, Mrs. Bonnie First and Mrs. Betty Courtinier, both of El Cerrito, Calif.; Mrs. Orma Riggs, Spokane, and Mrs. Willdean Thornton, North Hollywood, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. Florence Candler, Kendrick, and Mrs. Mabel Hash, Sacramento, Calif.; 29 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Wednesday morning at Short's Funeral Chapel in Moscow.

## Floyd Ochs, Genesee WWP Man To Retire

Genesee — Floyd Ochs, Genesee's Washington Water Power's representative for the past 31 years, ends a forty-five year career with that utility company when he retires effective November 1. He is being replaced by Douglas Lindquist of Tekon who is already in town learning the needs of the area.

Floyd came to Genesee in April of 1940, replacing the late John Black and Kae and the children moved here in June of the same year.

Ochs was born on a farm near Endicott, Washington, October 19, 1906, and began his career with the Washington Water Power Company in 1926.

After moving to Genesee, Floyd was active in school, community and fraternal activities. He joined the Genesee Community Firemen, Inc. soon after coming to town, and has served as president of that group. He was also a school board member for six years, and has also been active in the Genesee Merchants Association, Civic Club and the Knights of Pythias.

Floyd and his wife, Kae, have four children: Mrs. Sam (Shirley) Dahmen, Spokane; Tom Ochs, Milton, Wash.; Mrs. Wayne (Jackie) Reid, Moscow, and Mrs. Geo. (Dee) Crow of Anchorage, Alaska. They are also grandparents 14 times.

## City Elections Are Tuesday, November 2

Residents of Genesee, Juliaetta, and Kendrick will go to the polls next Tuesday, November 2, to elect city officials for terms of four years. In addition to city officials, voters in Juliaetta will decide the fate of a \$150,000 sewer bond election at the same time.

Incumbents Seek Terms  
In Kendrick incumbents Wayne Harris and John Deobald are unopposed in their bids for re-election as city councilmen for another four-year term. Voting will take place in the Kendrick fire hall from 12 noon to 8:00 p. m.

Three Seek Seats  
In Genesee three candidates are seeking two council seats. The terms of Jack Magee and John Myers expire Dec. 31 and while Magee has declined to run again, John Myers has filed to seek re-election. Leonard Singhose and Larry Sorenson have also filed as candidates for the position. Balloting in Genesee will be at the city room in the fire station from 12 noon to 8:00 p. m.

### Juliaetta Race

Juliaetta voters will elect a mayor and two councilmen. Incumbent mayor Gilbert Sproul has declined to seek another term and filing for his office are Dick Groselose, Harold Freeman, and Michael Rishling. Two councilmen will also be elected to fill the expiring terms of Jack Brown and Ted Groselose. Brown will not be a candidate, but Ted Groselose will seek re-election. Fred Clemenhagen and Douglas Johns are also candidates for councilmen.

In addition to the mayor and councilmen, Juliaetta voters are asked to approve, or reject, permission for the city to issue bonds in the amount of \$150,000 for a new sewer system.

Kendrick's high-flying Tigers used a sturdy defense and the power of Dave Hutcheson and Dale Taylor on offense to roll to a 26-2 win over the Plummer Pirates last Friday night for their seventh win of the season. Only the Tigers loss to the unbeaten Nezperce Indians in the first game of the season mars their record.

The Tigers had trouble getting untracked in the first period and they failed to score—but also didn't allow the Plummer team to get on the board. In the second quarter, the running of Hutcheson and Taylor provided two unconverted touchdowns.

Hutcheson climaxed a Tiger drive by going 11 yards for the first touchdown of the game and then Taylor went in from nine yards out to give the locals a 12-0 halftime lead.

Hutcheson added another touchdown in the third period as he ran forty-five yards for the score to make it 18-0 going into the final quarter of the game.

Hutcheson scored again in the final quarter to make it 26-0 for the Tigers on a three yard rush.

Plummer got their two points on a safety in the final seconds of the game as they nailed Kendrick behind the goal line on a pass play.

Taylor rolled up 159 yards in 28 carries and Hutcheson had 104 yards to pace the offensive effort. Eddie Osborn added 78 yards rushing.

The Tigers wind up the most successful seasons in years as they go up to Genesee Friday night for a 7:30 game with the Bulldogs. KHS fans are reminded that the Genesee ball field is one of the coldest in the area and they should dress warmly.

### Quota Set for 1972

Quotas for nonresident big game licenses during 1972 will continue the same as they were in 1971 and the same policy will prevail for nonresident deer-only licenses. The quotas are 9,552 for nonresident big game licenses and 3,821 nonresident deer-only licenses. Nonresident licenses in both categories sold this year by vendors did not exceed 60 percent of their 1970 sales. The commission will allow vendors, next year, to sell their licenses. They are combination nonresident hunting and fishing licenses at \$135, needed for elk, and the nonresident one-deer-only license which will be \$75 in 1972. The legislature increased the nonresident deer license fee from \$5 to \$75 beginning January 1, 1972 which will be good for antlered bucks only.

There's an abundance of pumpkins on the market, so why not try one and invite friends or neighbors to enjoy it with you. Donuts! No Hallowe'en would be complete without them. Have a happy Hallowe'en, and come trickin' an' treatin' at our house! You're welcome!

**Beef in Costume For Hallowe'en**  
 1 4-lb. pumpkin  
 1 lb. lean ground beef  
 1 cup chopped onion  
 Cooking oil  
 1/3 cup chopped red pepper  
 1/3 cup chopped green pepper  
 1 minced garlic clove  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 teaspoon thyme  
 1/4 teaspoon pepper  
 1 7/8-oz. can pitted olives  
 1 8-oz. can tomato sauce  
 2 beaten eggs  
 Cut off top of pumpkin; scrape out seeds and fibers. Simmer in salted water to cover for about 20 to 25 minutes, or until almost tender. Drain. Brown beef and onion in 1 tablespoon oil. Add red pepper, green pepper, and garlic. Cook for 1 minute longer. Remove from heat; stir in remaining ingredients. Spoon into pumpkin; place lid on top. Brush pumpkin with oil. Bake at 350 degrees for about 1 hour. Let stand for 10 minutes; cut into wedges to serve. Yield: About 8 servings.

**EASY-DO DONUTS**  
 Sugar  
 1/2 cup milk  
 1 egg  
 Melted shortening  
 1 1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour  
 2 teaspoons baking powder  
 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 cup seedless raisins  
 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg or cinnamon  
 Blend 1/3 cup sugar, milk, egg and 2 tablespoons melted shortening together. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together; add to liquid mixture. Stir lightly. Mix in raisins. Drop by heaping teaspoonfuls into melted 355-degree shortening. Fry for 2-3 minutes or until golden brown. Drain on paper towels. Mix 1/4 cup sugar and nutmeg or cinnamon in bag. Shake warm donuts in bag with sugar. May coat in confectioners' sugar without nutmeg if desired. Yield: 2 1/2 dozen.



**EFFORT BEING MADE TO STEADY DRY PEA MARKET**

Moscow — Representatives of the Washington and Idaho Dry Pea and Lentil Association and Commissions met with U. S. D. A. officials last week, in an effort to encourage the department to purchase substantial amounts of dry peas in the very near future.

Members of the industry delegation who met with congressional U. S. D. A. officials were Harold Stueckle, Colfax; Willard Scoville, Potlatch and Harold Blain, Administrator of the Washington and Idaho Pea and Lentil Commissions.

Following these meetings, a joint Congressional letter signed by Senators Magnuson, Church, Jackson and Jordan, and Representatives Foley, McCormick, McClure and Hansen was forwarded to Secretary of Agriculture Clifford Hardin, asking that dry peas be purchased by the Department for its Needy Family and School Lunch programs. The delegation pointed out to U. S. D. A. officials that even though the dry pea and lentil industry, through the Commission, has been doing a good job of expanding and promoting these products in both domestic and foreign trade channels, the current West Coast dock strike, coupled with a near-record crop, has created a disastrous over supply situation. Foreign buyers who normally place future orders for new crop shipments have been reluctant to trade because of the uncertainties of delivery caused by the recent dock strike, and are presently seeking other sources of supply. Some of these markets will be hard to regain, even after the ports open up for business. A good example is in the dry pea market in Japan, developed through the efforts of the U. S. A. Dry Pea and Lentil Council. Australia and New Zealand are currently supplying these markets because of our inability to ship our products.

Department purchases of other commodities, such as dry beans, have also been substantial in recent months. Since July 1, 1970, the Department has put out offers for 10½ million pounds of beans, with the average cost currently at \$10.00 per hundredweight.

It was pointed out by the delegation that considering the current low price differential, coupled with the exceptional high protein value of dry peas, a large purchase of dry peas would seem to be justified. A double benefit could be achieved by meeting the nutritional needs of the department's food program, as well as strengthening current low price levels.

**BRUCELLOSIS FREE**

On October 5 Idaho obtained the status of being certified Brucellosis Free. In 1938 Latah County was the first to have a county program of testing for the eradication of "Bangs" disease. This really means that less than 1 per cent of the herds, or one herd, whichever is greater, is infected. There are nine herds showing infection and 25,000 herds represented. Cooperation of slaughter houses and milk receivers will be required in monitoring the program. Cattle are moved so fast and so far that the disease can spread very quickly without constant checks. Nearly eight million cattle have been tested, vaccinated or milk samples taken since 1934 when the federal program started.
