## Bulldogs Edge Tigers 27-18 As Season Ends

After battling on almost even terms throughout the game, GHS quarterback Doug Moser sent half-back Terry Green over tackle on a delayed trap play for thirty-five yards and a touchdown as the Genesee High School Bulldogs defeated the Kendrick Tigers 27-18 in the final game of the season for both teams. The win gave the Bulldogs a final record of 3-4-1 and the loss was only the second for the Tigers, who finished up with a 7-2 record.

Genesee kicked off to the visiting Tigers who drove the ball down the field from their own 35 to the Genesee 20-yard line before a fumble cost them possession. Genesee picked up one first down before they were forced to punt. Kendrick took possession on their own 40 and battled back down to the Genesee 25 before the Genesee line stiffened and forced the Tigers to give up the ball via the four-down rule. Little Dan Tyler scooted the ball back to mid-field just as the first quarter ended in a 0-0 tie.

As the second quarter began, Genesee's Ray Morscheck and Tyler started cracking open the middle of the Tiger line and moved the ball down inside the K. H. S. 10 where Tyler ran the ball over two plays later for a touchdown and the Bulldogs led 6-0 after Craig Busch's kick attempt went wide.

Genesee's lead didn't hold up one play as Dave Hutcheson picked up the return kickoff on his own 34, got a beautiful block from one of his team mates on the Tiger 40 and went 66 yards without being touched to tie the score at 6-6. Kendrick tried a two-point conversion but failed.

Genesee took the Tiger kickoff and moved down to the K. H. S. 20 before a series of penalties and fumbles cost them the ball. The Tigers got the ball back on their own 25 and moved down to mid-field before they gave up on downs. Genesee's Doug Moser opened up a passing game for Genesee and finally hit Bill Schlueter for a touchdown bomb covering 30 yards, and Busch's extra point was good for a 13-6 half-time lead.

As the second half opened it looked like Genesee's ball game with Morscheck driving hard down the middle and Tyler sweeping the ends. The Bulldogs moved it down to the three and Morscheck smashed through the Tiger line from three yards out for another 6 points. Moser's pass attempt for the extra point was no good, but the Bulldogs 19-6 lead looked good.

The Tigers were far from finished, however, and began a sustained march down the field which culminated in Hutcheson's sixteen yard sweep around left end for a touchdown. Dale Taylor attempted to run the conversion, but failed, and the score was 19-12.

Genesee was still using their aerial game as the third quarter neared an end and Kendrick's Kim Trout read a Bulldog play just right and picked off a Moser pass on his own 40 and came back to mid-field before he was stopped.

The Tigers still had their momentum going in the fourth quarter as they drove down to the Genesee 15 and then Eddie Osborn passed to the three and on the next play Taylor, by just determined strength alone, smashed across the goal line dragging two Genesee linemen with him. The extra point try failed and Genesee was ahead but a single point, 19-18.

Both teams were playing no-holds barred ball in the final minutes with Ray Morscheck and Craig Busch both going out with injuries. With just two minutes left, the Bulldogs reached into their bag of tricks and called the trap play that baffled the Tigers long enough to send Terry Green 35 yards for the touchdown. A pass from Moser to Schlueter was also good and the Bulldogs had it 27 to 18.

Both Genesee and Kendrick fans turned out in goodly numbers and endured below freezing temperatures to root for their favorites.

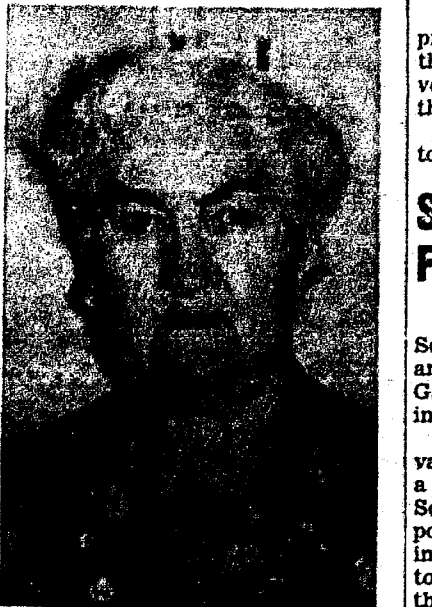
## From Out of the Past . . .

## October Rainfall Near 3 Inch Mark

Moisture in the region came close to the three-inch mark for the month of October on Big Bear Ridge, reported Chas. Bower, who maintains rainfall figures for the Soil Conservation Service. Mr. Bower recorded a total rainfall of 2.93 inches for the thirty-one day period. Over on American Ridge, Dick Benscoter recorded a total of 2.60 inches for the same period.

In Genesee, John Luedke reported that he had recorded 2.49 inches in his government rain gauge for October for the first 10 months of 1971 to 21.28 which is slightly below the 22.02 inches for the same period of 1970 and well above the 15.10 inches of 1969.

The first two days of November produced 47 inches of moisture, Mr. Luedke also reported. October closed out cold, wet and wintry all over the region with the temperatures dropping down to readings of 8 or 10 above, depending on whose thermometer you were looking at. Thursday of last week was the coldest to date with reports of 12 and 14 in Kendrick and Juliaetta and down to 10 above in Genesee.

Snow has fallen intermittently over the weekend in Genesee and the Ridge areas. Genesee had, at the most, two inches on the ground, but in the country there were drifts of up to 8 inches.

Power Outage In Genesee A wind and sleet storm knocked out the power in the Genesee area from 1:05 a. m. Monday morning until 8:00 a. m. the same day, as iceladen lines in the Leon area shorted out. Classes were dismissed at Genesee schools.

## City Elections Drew Interest of Voters

Incumbent councilmen in Genesee and Juliaetta were defeated in city elections held Tuesday, November 2. In Kendrick, both incumbents were returned for terms of four years. Also in the Tuesday balloting, Juliaetta voters failed to give a \$150,000 sewer bond issue the necessary two-thirds approval which failed the issue.

Freeman Juliaetta Mayor In a three-man race for mayor of the city of Juliaetta, Harold Freeman won handily over Richard Groseclose and Michael Rishling in his bid to replace outgoing Mayor Gilbert Sproul, who declined to seek re-election. Freeman received 83 votes; Groseclose 50, and Rishling 39.

Two council seats were up for election and in three-man field, Fred Clemenhagen and Douglas Johns both polled more votes than Ted Groseclose, the incumbent. Clemenhagen received 110 votes; Johns, 105; and Groseclose 88.

Of the 234 voters registered in the Juliaetta election, 179 cast ballots Tuesday. The city's proposal to issue bonds in the amount of \$150,000 to help pay the cost of the installation of a new sewer system failed to carry by the necessary two-thirds majority. Of the 176 votes cast, 82 favored the bonds and 84 opposed them for a 52 percent margin.

Genesee Elects Leonard Singhose, manager of A-grow Seed Company in Genesee, and Larry Sorenson, a retired SCS employee squeaked into office by a narrow margin over incumbent John Myers, Jr. in Genesee's city election. Singhose polled 86 votes; Sorenson, 84, and Myers, 83. These two will replace Myers and Jack Magee on the council next January 1. Of the 175 voters registered in Genesee there were 131 ballots cast. Wednesday morning, Genesee City Clerk Mike Martinez, said the ballots will be canvassed by the council at 7:30 Thursday evening in the City Hall.

Incumbents Unopposed With a strong registration of 200, due to the recent city liquor-by-the-drink election, only 76 eligible voters cast ballots in Kendrick's city election Tuesday. Incumbents Wayne Harris and John Deobald, unopposed on the ballot, were returned without opposition. Harris received 72 votes and Deobald 70.

## Waterfowl Sex Identification Required

Waterfowlers are reminded that both federal and state regulations require that one fully feathered wing or head must be attached to all field dressed migratory birds shot in the state while enroute from the field to home or commercial food processing or storage plants. The reason for this stipulation is that it provides evidence of species and/or sex.

When hunting upland game birds in Idaho, the state regulation that has been standard for years is the retention of one fully feathered wing or other readily discernible evidence of species and/or sex. Regulations also provide that no person shall transport for another; receive for cleaning, processing or storage, or accept as a gift any game animals, birds or fish, or parts thereof unless the game animals, birds or fish are accompanied by a written statement showing the numbers and kinds, the date taken and the name and address or hunting and fishing license number of the shooter.

When hunting waterfowl the law requires that every person 16 years of age or older must have in his possession a federal migratory bird stamp of current issue. The stamp must be signed in ink with the holders name. A state hunting license is required for each hunter 12 years of age or older.

## A Stroke and Its Effect

Boise — A stroke is the result of disease in the blood vessels of the brain, according to the Idaho Medical Association.

An artery to part of the brain may rupture, or it may become clogged by a clot, thus depriving the affected portion of the brain of blood, and reducing its function.

The victim may experience paralysis and have difficulty in speaking.

Physicians have learned a great deal about strokes, and with present knowledge, some can be prevented by treating conditions that lead to strokes.

Surgical treatment of some ruptured blood vessels is possible and some conditions associated with blood clot formation can be controlled. Clots can be surgically removed in some cases.

Sometimes a major stroke is preceded by a series of small strokes — brief attacks of numbness or difficulty in seeing. These are danger signals, and should be regarded as warnings to seek medical help.

Beauty can be dangerous, though, and the Idaho Medical Ass'n suggests some precautions, especially in the marking of glass doors.

The elusive quality of the material has intrigued generations of architects and homebuilders. Yet it is estimated that each year some 40,000 persons try to walk through glass doors, glass walls, and picture windows.

Almost 6,000 of the accident victims require hospitalization. Children from five to 14 account for one-third of the injuries.

Decals or bright tape placed on the glass at the eye level of both children and adults are helpful in bringing attention to doors.

Other types of markings which can warn of the presence of large glass panels include paint, chemical etching and sandblasting. Decorative door pulls or push bars that extend across the width of doors can also be helpful.

## Teen Agers and Acne

Boise — Teen-age acne is caused primarily by hyperactive oil glands in the skin, not by improper diet, reports the Idaho Medical Ass'n.

These glands over-secrete and become plugged, producing acne, according to the American Medical Ass'n.

The hyperactivity of the glands is presumably caused by hormonal imbalance especially during the early teens.

Contrary to some reports, there is no evidence that milk plays a part in the appearance of acne. In fact, eliminating the important nutrients supplied by milk — calcium, vitamin D and riboflavin — for the diet would have harmful rather than beneficial effects.

Although not caused by diet, once established the acne condition may become worse with poor eating habits.

People with acne react individually to different foods and can soon learn whether a particular food aggravates their condition.

Since nutrient demands are greatest during the growth phase of adolescence, every effort must be made to assure a good supply of calories, proteins, vitamins and minerals.

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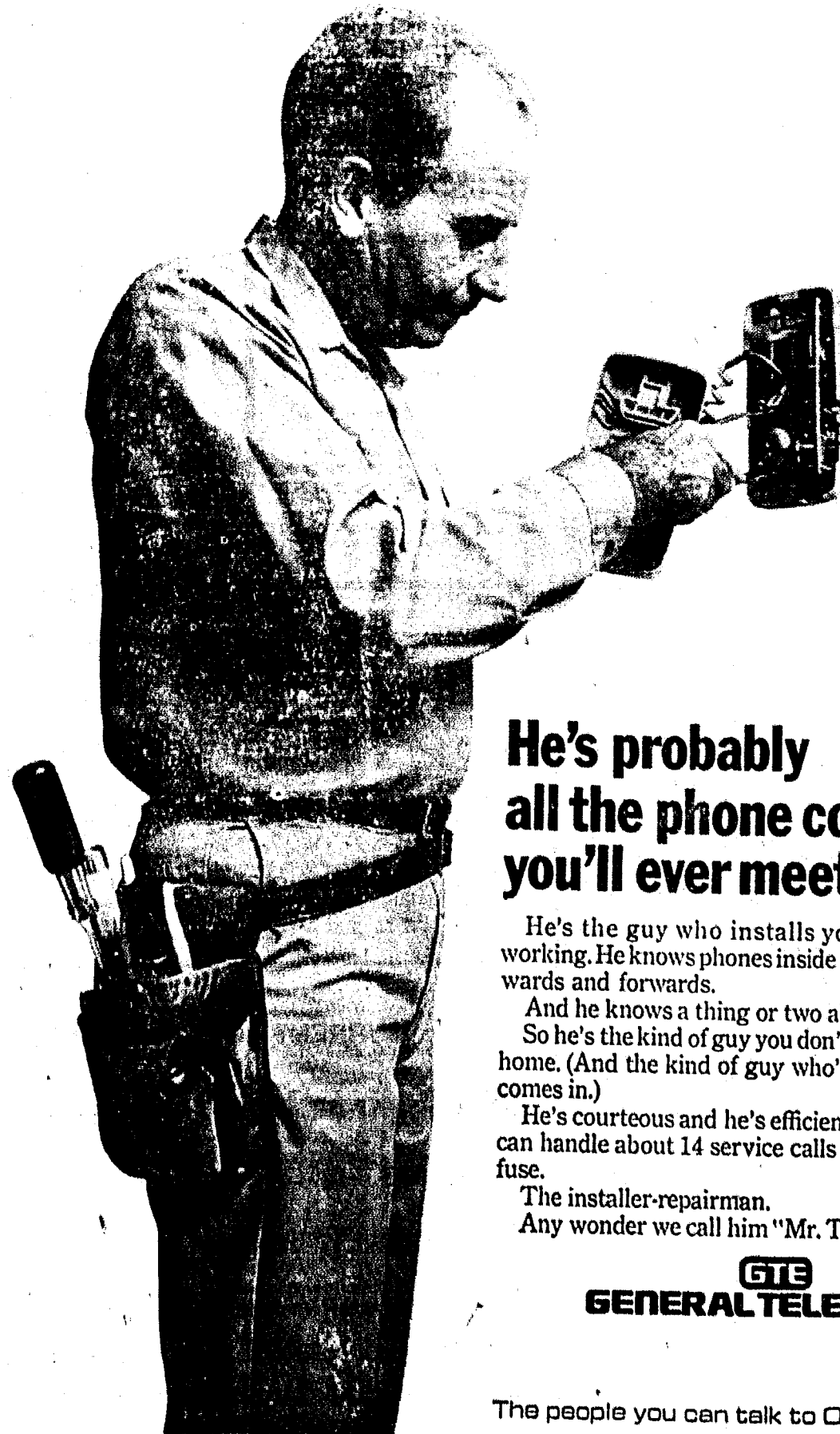

Pesticide Contamination Decreased  
Continuing statewide tests to detect residual traces of several types of hard pesticides in animal and fish tissue indicate no Idaho problem at this time. In other words, hard pesticides like mercury contamination now are below human tolerance levels according to test results. It will be recalled that last year the Idaho tests for mercury contamination showed some birds contained traces higher than recommended levels and the health department placed some restrictions on consumption. This year hunters can feast on the pheasants they shoot without fret-

(Polish Doughnuts)

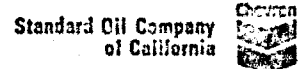
- 1 cake yeast

- Grated rind of 1/2 orange or lemon
- About 7 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- Dissolve yeast in lukewarm milk.
- Add 2 cups flour. Let stand in warm place 1/2 hour. Then beat eggs, sugar, vanilla, grated rind of orange or lemon and scant teaspoon salt until light. Add this sponge. Melt butter and add this to sponge. Add 5 cups of flour. Cover and allow to rise for 1 hour or until double in bulk. When light turn on floured board, pat with hands until dough is 1/2-inch in thickness. Cut with doughnut cutter, cover and let rise again until light. Drop in deep fat and fry until done. Fry with raised side down first.

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### Salmon Smolt Begin Long Journey To Sea

Melvin Reingold, Idaho Fish and Game Department fishery biologist stationed at Salmon reported that 500,000 chinook salmon smolts were released recently from Decker Pond near Stanley. The four-inch babies are now beginning a hazardous 820-mile journey to the Pacific and must return over the same route as spawners two or three years from now.

These chinook will join other substantial releases from Idaho state hatcheries and those financed by Idaho Power Company to replace dam caused losses and to supplement natural runs which are in trouble because of loss of spawning and rearing habitat and downriver dams.

Successes at Rapid River hatchery and on the Clearwater River give hope that release at Decker Pond, Hayden Creek Ponds, and the Pahsimeroi Ponds will likewise result in increased catches for Idaho's anglers in the future.

### Best Steelheading

Reports from the Riggins-Whitebird stretch of the main Salmon River, and near the mouth of the Middle Fork, indicate the fishermen success for steelhead recently has been an average of about 18 hours per fish. Success near the Middle Fork averaged nine hours per fish. Anything ranging from 20 hours or less per steelhead is excellent angler success. Fishermen are reminded that through December 31 they are still fishing under the 1971 regulations and bag limits.

The 1972 steelhead regulations, which are effective January 1, 1972, list the daily and possession bag limits at two steelhead, with no more than two steelhead during any consecutive seven-day period. And the calendar year bag limit will be only ten steelhead. Anglers are reminded too that beginning January 1, 1972 steelhead trout permits will need to be renewed in addition to a new fishing license in order to fish for steelhead in Idaho waters. As soon as a steelhead has been hooked and reduced to possession, the angler must immediately record in the spaces provided on his permit card the month and date of the catch and the name of the stream from which the fish was caught. Stream and date entries are required to be legible and accurate.

### Trout Season To End

General statewide trout season ends November 30, but many waters in all sections of the state remain open for fishing for some or all species of fish, sometimes on a year-round basis. New regulations were established recently for the 1972 calendar year. Current regulations do not expire until December 31, 1971. Waters remaining open year-round or for special seasons are listed by name and area in 1971 regulations in this format will be continued in the 1972 regulations.

### Fur Prices Down

Pelt prices were lower during the 1970-71 fur season than last year and fur sales decreased \$58,907.10 for a decline of 29 per cent from the previous season's revenue of \$200,545.11. There also was a decline in the number of trappers in the field and the number of pelts taken.

The 1970-71 beaver harvest of 2,933 pelts is down by 32 per cent from the preceding year. Average price received for beaver pelts decreased \$1.84. This is the lowest price since 1964-65. The average beaver price during the base decade period 1945-46 through 1954-55 was \$18.31. Altogether, 14 species of animals are included in the fur catch. The closure for fisher and wolverine was continued. This season's catch increased for two species and declined for twelve.

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### Arthritis Suffers Are Many

Arthritis, the nation's number one crippling affliction, afflicts some 13 million Americans and costs the economy almost four billion dollars each year. About 700,000 persons are unable to work, keep house, go to school, or engage in recreational activities because they have arthritis, reports the Idaho Medical Ass'n.

It is estimated that direct medical costs exceed one billion dollars annually. Furthermore, the Arthritis Foundation says that Americans spend \$300 million each year for quick remedies and misrepresented devices. The costs of social and emotional problems resulting from arthritis cannot be estimated.

Although there is no cure for arthritis at present, there is still a serious gap between what is known about it and its application in practice.

Right now, disability can be arrested, often reversed. It has been well documented that chances of improving are directly related to the duration of the disease before the institution of therapy.

### Systemic Insecticides In Grub Control

Systemic insecticides give excellent control of grubs in beef cattle, the county agent reminds. So do sprays and dippings.

There is still time to do an effective job in most areas of Idaho before severely cold weather sets in. Treatment for grubs is advisable, the agent said, because they probably cause greater losses than any other pest of cattle. They damage meat and hides and reduce weight. Losses begin when heel flies lay their eggs on cattle. The flies cause no pain but they frighten the animals and make them difficult to manage. Interruption of normal eating decreases gains.

Treatment time ranges from summer to late fall in northern states. Systemic insecticides may be used in cattle feed. Make certain adequate feeding space is available when grub controls are fed, the agent said. Provide one feeder to 15 or 20 head. If cattle do not eat enough, add a palatable feed such as soy bean meal. Feed this for a few days. Then return to the regular treated feed mixture.

Sprays, dips and pour-ons are also useful. Use wettable powder or apply a pour-on solution—always heading directions of the manufacturer.

### Long-lived Antelope

What happens to pronghorn antelope that are trapped, tagged and released in the wild? Returned tags show that in one case an animal tagged nearly ten years ago at Crooked Creek about five miles northwest of Liddy Hot Springs in Clark County (Unit 59) was shot this fall during a controlled hunt approximately 88 miles south and 17 miles west of the trapping site. This animal was found dead by Glen Duffen of Aberdeen.

Another animal killed by an unidentified hunter was 12½ years old at the time it died. It was tagged in December, 1959, about one mile below the junction of Burnt Creek and Mahogany Creek in the Upper Pahsimeroi drainage. It was shot this year in controlled Hunt 437 about a mile from the site where it was originally trapped and tagged as a fawn.
