With one of the most successful seasons behind them, the Kendrick High School football team checked out its statistics and found the squad looked as good on paper as it did on the gridiron as it ran up a 7-win, 2-loss record.

According to Tiger coach Wayne Dust, the team piled up an impressive 32071/2 yards of total offensive gain-averaging 356 yards per game.

The big gun for the Tigers this season proved to be Dave Hutcheson. who picked up 1489 yards of individual offense. Included in these fig-ures were 172 yards passing, 380 yards on punt and kickoff returns and 93714 yards rushing. Close behind Hutcheson was Dale

Taylor who added 967 yards rushing with one passing yard for a total of 968 vards.

Young quarterback Eddle Osborn completed 27 of 70 passes for a total of 435 yards with a 16-yard average for the 9 games. Eddle also rushed for 330 yards.



Brocke and Harold Snow, Latah County Republician representative, co-sponsored the bill that provided for annual sessions of the legislature. His determined fight to protect Idaho's wildflowers from extinction earned him the nick-name "Wildflower George", a title he accepted with amused resignation, but, among serious students of Idaho politics his determined efforts for Latah County, the University of Idaho and the State earned him the respect and admiration he enjoyed.

A native of Latah County, Brocke was born Oct. 8, 1904, on American Ridge. His parents, Frank and Julia Brocke, were farmers there. After graduating from Kendrick High School he was employed for a time in a local hardware store. Later he worked for the International Harvester Co. in California, and was an IHC salesman in the Big Bend area of Washington,

Returning to Kendrick, Brocke became manager of the Kendrick Bean Growers Association in 1934. In 1950 he formed his own company, George F. Brocke and Sons, Seedsmen Al-though semi-retired, he could still be found at the plant's office during the busy seasons of the year and kept up with the latest development in the seed and farming industries.

He was a member of the Moscow Elks lodge and in earlier y been active in the Kendrick City Council, Boy Scouts and the old Kendrick Commercial Club.

He married Emma Rennick of Lind, Wn., at Moscow on June 8, 1929. She survives at the family home.

In addition to his wife, Brocke is survived by three sons, George, Jr., Kenneth, both of Troy; eight grandchildren and three great grandchild-

In the House, Brocke served on the Education Committee, Resources and Conservation Committee and Agricultural Affairs Committee. He was a member of the Legislative Council, served on two interim committees: the State Lands Study Committee and the Fire Study Committee.



Children in school are more aware of and concerned with pollution control than these self-righteous citizens of Juliaetta. Children are taught to fight pollution; these people of Juliaetta defend and en-

courage it. A meeting was held to discuss and explain the proposed sewage collection system. The meeting was poorly attended. Pamphlets and the engineer's full report were available to any citizens for the asking from the city clerk, Mayor Sproul, or any councilman. Many voted negatively or stayed away from the polis because of false information heard and believed. Typical examples of false information were:
(1) the city would charge \$300

hook-up fee-hook-up is free. (2) the engineer is getting too much money—the engineer's centage is set by the state.

People would rather believe their own lies and infect others with these lies than to face themselves with clear facts.

When offending individuals are forced to clean up this unsanitary conditions (and they will be forced the city as well as the state have laws against such filth), it is going to cost them a great deal more than the \$7.75 a month with no hook-up fee the sewer system would have cost. They may have to fix their sewer system every year because the ground has become so saturated in many spots that it will not hold!

By the time these people realize the town does need a sewage collection system, the cost will be enormous. Each time a study is initiated, an initial outlay of \$500 is necessary. When a bond is defeated, as it was November 2, this \$500 is lost along with other incurred expenses. The study is thrown out and all the paper work, the \$500 plus, the going through of all channels is lost, Juliaetta had top priority on 50% federal funding. Now they have nothing. And you, citizens of Juliaetta, took it upon yourselves to defeat this

desperately needed project!

We are ashamed to live in a town where such ignorance exsts!


