## Tigers Looked Good On Field and On Paper

With one of the most successful seasons behind them, the Kendrick High School football team checked out its statistics and found the squad looked as good on paper as it did on the gridiron as it ran up a 7-win, 2-loss record.

According to Tiger coach Wayne Dust, the team piled up an impressive 3207 1/2 yards of total offensive gain—averaging 356 yards per game. The big gun for the Tigers this season proved to be Dave Hutcheson, who picked up 1489 yards of individual offense. Included in these figures were 172 yards passing, 380 yards on punt and kickoff returns and 937 1/2 yards rushing.

Close behind Hutcheson was Dale Taylor who added 967 yards rushing with one passing yard for a total of 968 yards.

Young quarterback Eddie Osborn completed 27 of 70 passes for a total of 435 yards with a 16-yard average for the 9 games. Eddie also rushed for 330 yards.

Kim Trout, senior veteran, and a stand-out on defense, picked up 139 passing yards, 40 yards on punt returns and 70 yards rushing for a total of 249 yards.

Dave Wilken had 46 yards passing; Steigera 44 1/2 yards rushing; Lukehart, 17 yards rushing; Holt 10 1/2 yards rushing; Candler 4 yards rushing; Siffow 2 yards rushing; Schmidt 23 yards passing; Kelly Clemenhagen added another 20 yards rushing.

The offense yardage gained was not the whole story of the Tiger success—much of the credit must go to Kendrick's rugged defense and players such as Deobald, Trout, Wilken, Candler and others whose determination, even when outweighed was a vital factor in the 7 wins.

## Community Shocked, Saddened At Sudden Passing Of George F. Brocke

Still in a state of shocked sorrow, Kendrick residents said goodbye to one of their favorite sons Monday afternoon as final services were held for George F. Brocke who had died suddenly at his home Thursday night of an apparent heart seizure.

The founder and one of the owners of Geo. F. Brocke and Sons, Seedman in Kendrick, he was also the ranking Democrat in the Idaho House of Representatives.

Brocke was first elected as a state senator in 1942. He served one term, then was out of office for two terms before returning as a representative in 1955. He had served continuously since that date. His personal popularity and respect as a representative

of the people of this district were so great that he had no serious opposition at election time for the past ten years.



## Arthur Clark, 61, Former Juliaetta Man Passes

Arthur (Bud) Clark, 61, former resident of Juliaetta, died Monday, November 1, 1971, at Tacoma, Washington.

He was born at Bucoda, Wn., April 20, 1910. He attended school at Juliaetta leaving about 1926 but returned periodically to renew acquaintances with old friends.

He is survived by his wife, Caroline at the family home. Three sons, Dick of Tacoma; Larry of Puyallup and Gail of Montesano. Also a half sister, Doris Hassman, Medford, Oregon; a step sister, Irene Tallia, Hills, California; his step father, William Graves, Meridian, Idaho; 6 grandchildren, nephews and nieces as well as a wide host of friends.

## Few Objections Heard On Trailer Ordinance

Only one letter of protest was submitted to the Genesee City Council Monday night as it met in regular session and also to hear objections to a proposed ordinance which would set up rules and regulations for trailer parks in the city of Genesee.

The letter was submitted by Walter G. Mitchell, owner and manager of a mobile home park on Walnut Street. Mitchell was unable to be present at the meeting and had given the letter to Clerk Mike Martinez.

After considering each of Mitchell's objections, the council agreed to pass the ordinance as it was. The vote was unanimous and the new ordinance will be in effect January 1, 1972.

## Wants Curfew Enforced

Wayne Roach appeared before the council to request the city's curfew on children under the age of 18 years be enforced. The present ordinance requires that children under the age of 18 years be off the street by 10:00 p. m. unless accompanied by their parents or guardian or when returning from a school or church event.

With the council's concurrence, Mayor Scharnhorst directed Police Chief Chet Green to see that the curfew is more closely observed.

In other business the council approved building permits for the erection of a machinery building for the Genesee Rimrock Highway District.

In addition to his wife, Brocke is survived by three sons, George, Jr., Eugene and Darrel, all of Kendrick; a sister, Mrs. Gus (Margaret) Blum, Pullman; two brothers, Frank and Kenneth, both of Troy; eight grandchildren and three great grandchildren.

In the House, Brocke served on the Education Committee, Resources and Conservation Committee and Agricultural Affairs Committee. He was a member of the Legislative Council, served on two interim committees: the State Lands Study Committee and the Fire Study Committee.

Funeral services were held Monday at 1:30 p. m. from Brower-Wann Chapel in Lewiston with the Rev. Theo Meske officiating.

## Dorothy Meyer, Missionary In India, At Valley Church

Miss Dorothy Meyer, an educator and evangelist in India for the past 30 years spoke and showed slides at the Valley A. L. C. W. meeting on October 27th.

Miss Meyer's home is in Cameroon, India, and she currently runs a mission complex in Nayaduh, Andhra Pradesh, India. The complex includes an orphanage, an elementary school for girls, an industrial school for women, a home for widows and an institution for the aged. Since the late 40's she has spent most of her career in cities, villages, and rural areas in southern India providing spiritual and educational guidance wherever she is needed.

Saturday, Nov. 6, Miss Meyer was recognized for her long service to the church and to humanity. A 1949 graduate of PLU, she became the 7th person to receive the university's Distinguished Alumna Award.

The presentation, was made by Dr. Roy Virak, PLU Alumni Association president.

The Rev. Milton Nesvig, assistant to the president for church relations and publications at PLU, observed the mission program at Nayadupet first hand last year during an extended overseas tour.

"Not only has Miss Meyer provided a vital service to mankind throughout her own career, she has inspired others to help carry on the work," Mr. Nesvig said. Among those who have followed in her footsteps are her sister, Hermina Meyer, a 1954 PLU graduate, who has served in various medical capacities—nurse, laboratory technician, medical pathologist—since 1957, and Katsuhama Benjamin, a young Indian woman whose advanced education in America was underwritten by Miss Meyer and her family.

The Meyer family and the veteran missionary also were responsible for the construction and financing of Immanuel Chapel at Nayadupet, in memory of Herman Meyer, Miss Meyer's father.

The mission complex serves communities within a 150-mile radius of Madras in heavily populated southern India.

"Miss Meyer's life has been a saga of love and devotion," Mr. Nesvig said. "She has given of her time, talents and possessions for the cause of Christ and his kingdom. She has touched the lives of thousands of India's populace, and gained their admiration, respect, and gratitude."

In addition to her bachelor's degree from PLU, Miss Meyer holds a master of religious education degree from New York Theological Seminary. A great deal of her furlough time over the years has been spent in furthering her education.

Idaho Fish-Game Dept.

Fall hunting seasons are up staging most fishing in Idaho, even though the general trout season runs through November in waters open for year-round fishing are found in all regions of the state.

But the shooting sports now are front center with over 240,000 license holders either in the field or planning to be soon if this year runs true to form. Joseph C. Greenely, director of the Idaho Fish and Game department, extends his wishes for the best of success to the fraternity of hunters. He also urges them to observe the highest standards of outdoor ethics in their quest for game this fall.

"We cannot condone unsportsmanlike conduct," Greenely said, "if we are to continue to enjoy for long the outdoor privileges in Idaho." He urged everyone to watch their own outdoor manners as a means of insuring the continuance of using private as well as public lands for hunting privileges.

Greenely urge sportsmen to be on the lookout for careless outdoorsmen and those who do not respect either public or private property, who vandalize who litter, who break game laws and even steal game. Hunters can play, and often do, a leading role in bringing about improved conduct on the part of those who fail to abide by the rules of a fair play when in the fields.

"Hunter cooperation with the department is essential," Greenely added, "if we are to apprehend this undesirable element."

"Game is the property of the state which is all the people," the director said, "but many of the hunting areas are on private lands. Hunting on such property is a privilege, not a right, and this privilege can be withdrawn by the landowner. Many choice areas for up land game bird hunting, chiefly pheasant and quail, already have been withdrawn by the landowner. It is of primary importance to seek the landowner's permission before entering private property."

Greenely requested hunters to be extremely careful with fire and firearms. Idaho hunters have an enviable fire and hunter safety record. He urged them to continue their full cooperation to minimize these dangers.

Same gun handling techniques probably should rank highest on anybody's list of points for good outdoor etiquette. This will cut down the odds on becoming a victim of a gun hunting accident this fall, or the odds of becoming a shooter in a gun hunting accident this fall.

Martel Morache, conservation education supervisor for the Fish and Game Department, summarizes that last fall there were 49 gun hunting accidents, including 11 fatalities. The last three years averaged slightly over 49 accidents and 9 fatalities each year.

"Don't fall into a routine of complacency around firearms," he cautions. "This could cost you your life."

Morache points out the unwelcome truth that half of the accidents

Senior citizens who have doctor bills covering Oct. 1, 1969 through Sept. 30, 1970 and have not sent them to Medicare for payment should do so immediately, according to D. Gene Shaw, Social Security District manager in Lewiston.

After December 31, 1971, bills for the above period can no longer be reimbursed by Medicare. Some people still believe doctor bills have to

be paid before sending them to Medicare. However, a change in the law several years ago eliminated this requirement, Shaw said.

If you have an itemized bill, it may be sent to Medicare for payment of 80 percent of the reasonable charges. Medicare claimants are urged to submit their doctor bills on a continuing basis. Of course, Medicare will make no reimbursement until the bills reach more than \$50.00 each

year and your total medical expense is \$50.00 or more for each year. If you have doctor bills you received since Sept. 30, 1969, send them to Medicare today. If you wait you might forget to submit them and then lose the Medicare money which might be payable.

Letter to the Editor:  
The defeat of the sewer bond for Juliaetta in the November 2 election is a disgrace to the town.

Every block in town is plagued with sewer problems. One has only to drive around the town to see the problem spots—seeping or in many cases running. Or whiff the air on a hot, summer day. In one draw in town, every house on this draw drains their own sewage here. At least two homes in town drain into the Potlatch River. And Juliaetta citizens think the town doesn't need a sewage collection system!!!

Especially parents should be among the greatest concerned. Do you really like your children skipping, running, and playing in places like this? The school has been closed several days because of sewage problems. We hope the town is proud of itself when the school is closed. Children in school are more aware of and concerned with pollution control than these self-righteous citizens of Juliaetta. Children are taught to fight pollution; these people of Juliaetta defend and encourage it.

A meeting was held to discuss and explain the proposed sewage collection system. The meeting was poorly attended. Pamphlets and the engineer's full report were available to any citizens for the asking from the city clerk, Mayor Sprout, or any councilman. Many voted negatively or stayed away from the polls because of false information heard and believed. Typical examples of false information were:

- (1) the city would charge \$300 hook-up fee—hook-up is free.
- (2) the engineer is getting too much money—the engineer's percentage is set by the state.

People would rather believe their own lies and infect others with these lies than to face themselves with clear facts.

When offending individuals are forced to clean up this unsanitary conditions (and they will be forced—the city as well as the state have laws against such filth), it is going to cost them a great deal more than the \$7.75 a month with no hook-up fee the sewer system would have cost. They may have to fix their sewer system every year because the ground has become so saturated in many spots that it will not hold!

By the time these people realize the town does need a sewage collection system, the cost will be enormous. Each time a study is initiated, an initial outlay of \$500 is necessary. When a bond is defeated, as it was November 2, this \$500 is lost along with other incurred expenses. The study is thrown out and all the paper work, the \$500 plus, the going through of all channels is lost, Juliaetta had top priority on 50% federal funding. Now they have nothing.

And you, citizens of Juliaetta, took it upon yourselves to defeat this desperately needed project!

We are ashamed to live in a town where such ignorance exists!

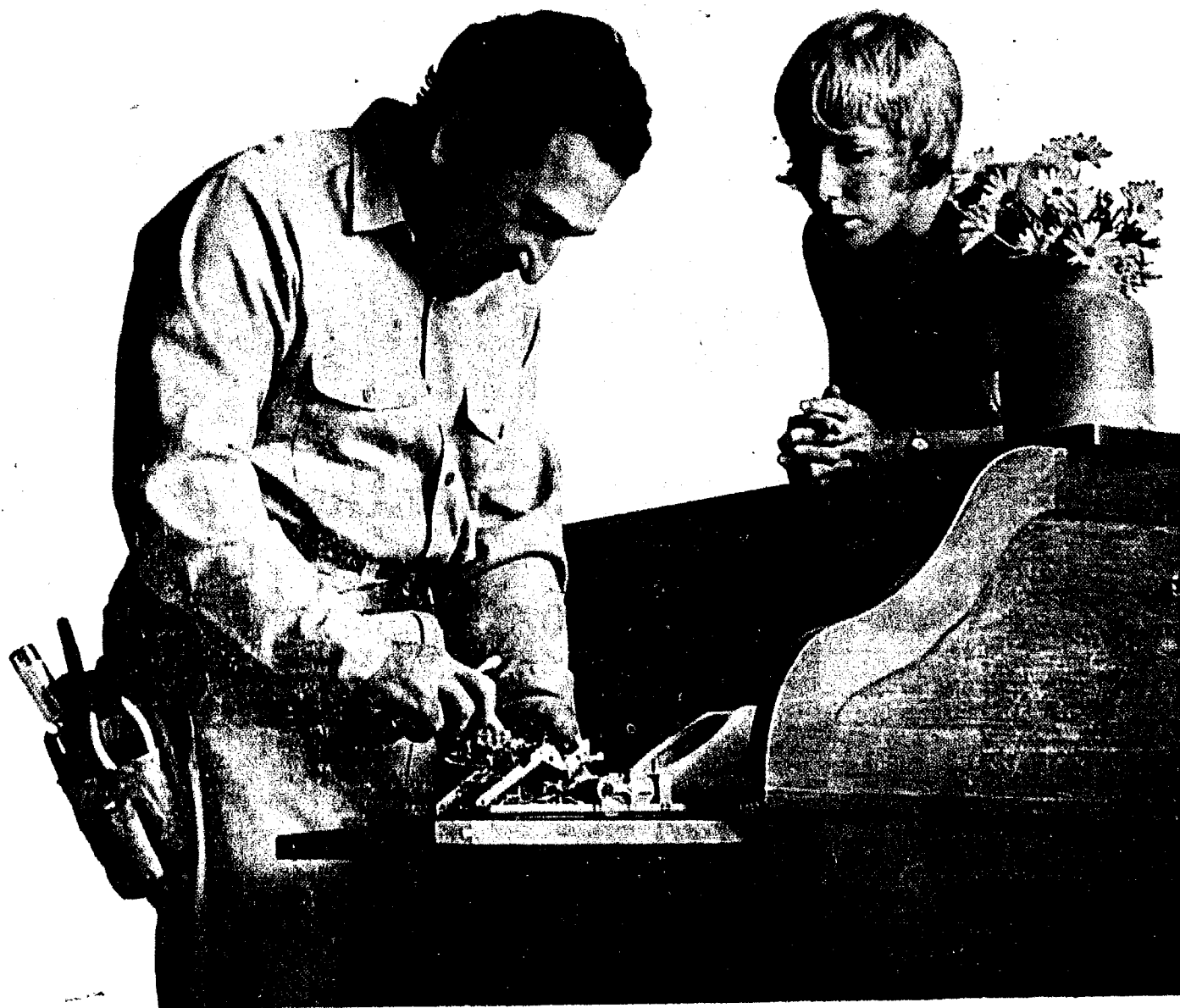

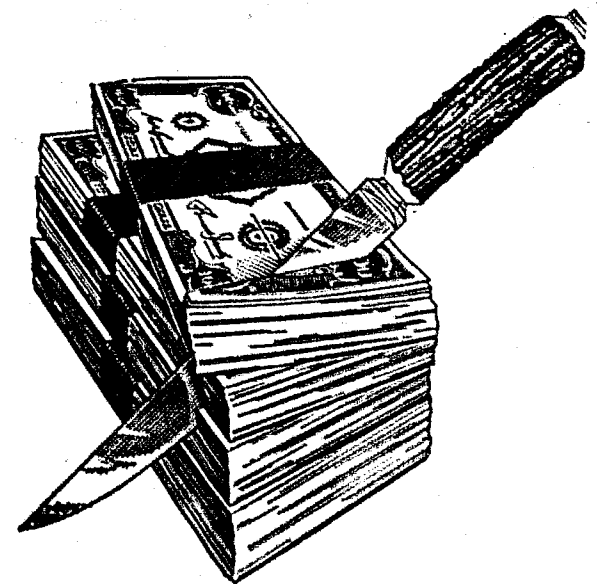

**CELERY & CHEESE CASSEROLE**

1 stalk fresh celery  
3 tsp. butter  
1/4 cup water  
1/2 tsp. tarragon leaves, crumbled  
2 tsp. flour  
1/2 cup milk  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese  
1/4 tsp. paprika  
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Trim leaves from celery. Cut ribs into 1/2-inch diagonal pieces to make about 6 cups. Combine celery with 1 table-spoon butter, water and tarragon in medium saucepan; bring to a boil.  
Cover. Reduce heat; simmer for 10 minutes. Turn into a 2-quart casserole; set aside. Heat remaining butter in saucepan. Stir in flour; brown lightly. Add milk gradually, stirring until smooth. Add soup, heat thoroughly. Stir in cheese. Pour over celery; mix lightly. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake uncovered for 15 minutes, until mixture is bubbly. Serve hot. Yield: 6-8 servings.

1 lb. ground beef  
2 T fat  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1 10 1/2-oz. can tomato soup  
1/4 cup chopped olives  
1 cup grated cheddar cheese  
1/2 cup water  
1/2 8-oz. pkg. noodles  
salt and pepper  
1 No. 2 can creamed corn  
Brown meat in fat. Add onion and cook until golden brown. Add soup, water and noodles. Cook until noodles are tender, stirring frequently. Season to taste. Add corn, olives and 1/2 of cheese. Pour into greased 2-qt. casserole. Sprinkle remaining cheese on top. Bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Yield: 6 servings.




