Speech Therapy Work 'Success'

(Ed's note—this is a story taken from the Great Falls, Montana newspaper and tells of the outstanding work of Larry Heimgartner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eldon Heimgartner, who is now working as a speech therapist in the Great Falls school system.)

A pair of speech therapists who have worked in local public schools only about a year have developed a successful new therapy program for grade school children that has drawn national attention and will be presented as a research paper next month at the annual meeting of the American Speech and Hearing Association in Chicago.

Dramatically reducing the time necessary to correct frustrating speech defects, the new methods involves counseling at home by mothers as well as in-school counseling by a professional therapist.

Cooperating to develop the method were Larry Heimgartner, a therapist who graduated last December from Eastern Washington State College, and Douglas Wing, speech and hearing coordinator who started work in Great Falls in July of 1970.

Heimgartner recently told district trustees of one exceptional case in which a student at Skyline Elementary school had progressed to the fourth of five "levels of difficulty" of usage of a speech sound in a matter of weeks, instead of the customary six months to two years.

Formally, the paper written by the young men is entitled "Programmed Carryover Procedures for Articulation Therapy Administered by Mothers."

The key word, Heimgartner explained, is "carryover", or the child's ability to learn a speech sound correctly from the therapist and then "carry it over" into other speaking situations.

"Often, a child learns to use a speech class, but when he's outside class, he reverts back," Heimgartner said, adding, "We're using mothers to force children to use correct speech at home, to reinforce the speech class learning. In about 45 minutes, mothers are taught to be able to hear the correct and incorrect sounds, so they can tell when the child makes an error. The parent must demonstrate that she can pinpoint the child's errors. If she's unsure, we have another session, and there is a telephone conference once a week to check on progress."

"And we check kids, too, to make sure that they are the same level reported by the parents," said Heimgartner, who did the field work on the project and is prime author of the paper.

About 415 students, Wing said, are now in active therapy, and see a traveling therapist twice a week for a half-hour in their own school buildings. There already are 93 students on the waiting list, Wing said, so the total number of students served this year probably will exceed last year's total of 522 in grades kindergarten through six. Wing noted that junior high students also are being served this year, denoting an expansion from serving only elementary students last year.

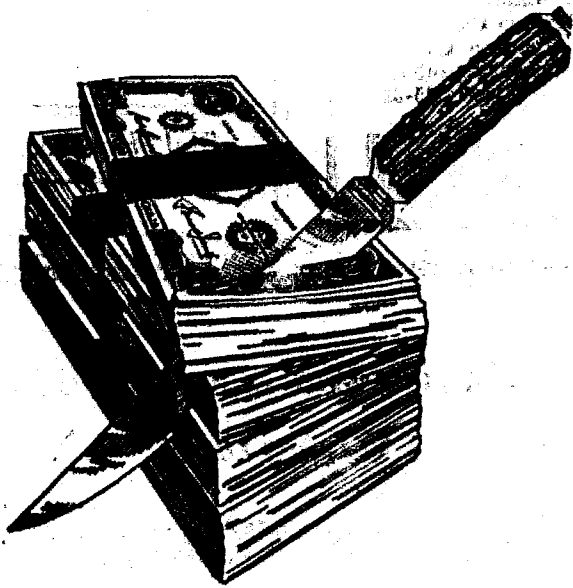

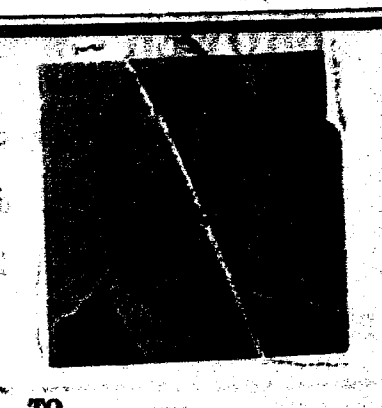

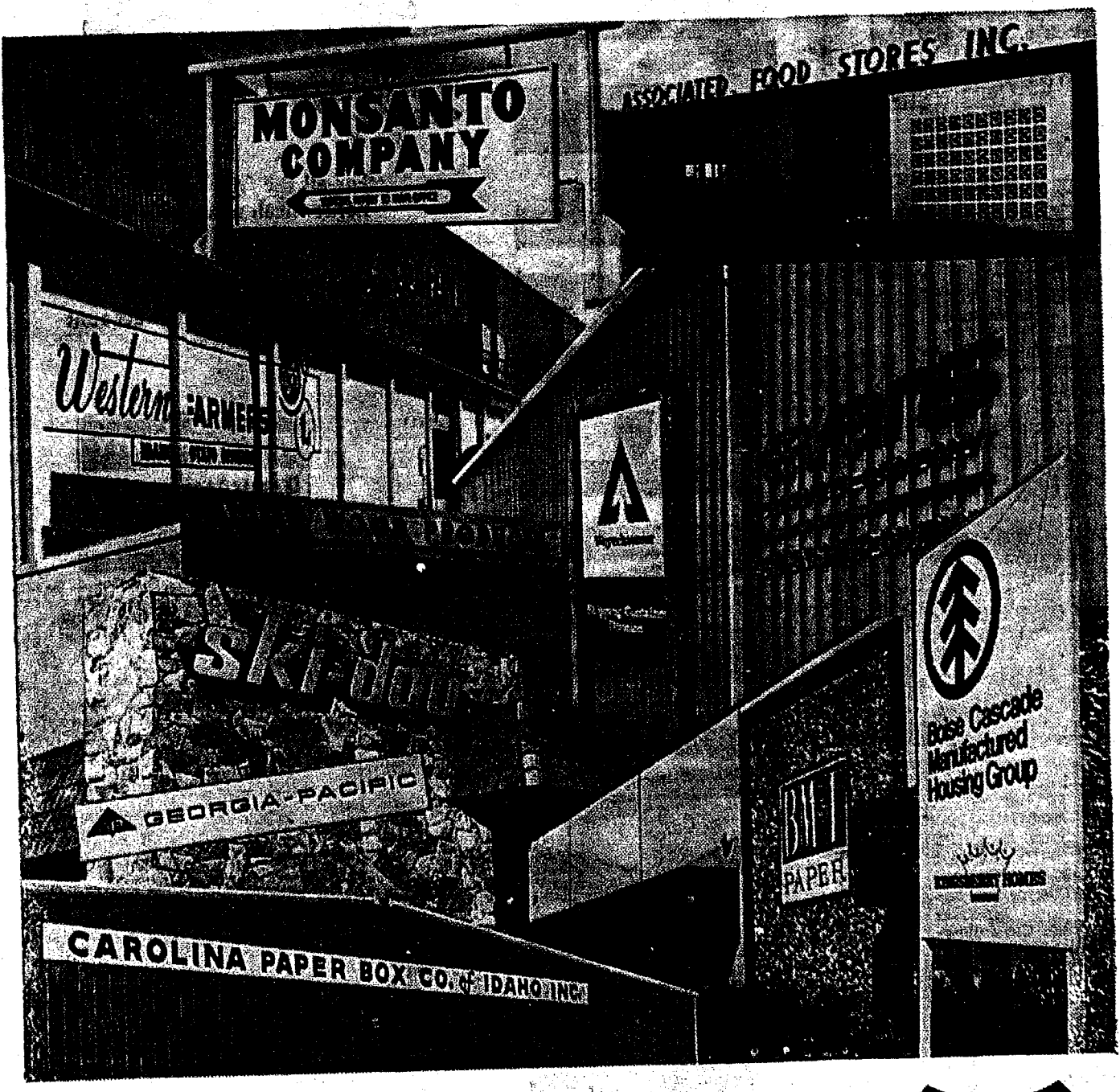

Home Cookin' . .

Our good friend, Janet Nail brought us more recipes this week, and one is especially different, and gives us another way to prepare our holiday fowl. She says this recipe has been used many times in her family and she wanted to pass it on. To stuff the turkey, she offers a fruit stuffing, which may be right delicious. And no holiday meal is quite complete without the taste of Mince-meat—so how about a mince-meat cake? Happy Thanksgiving, filled with the richest of blessings to one and all!

ROAST TURKEY IN BLANKET

1 recipe stuffing
1 turkey
4 cups or more of flour
1 1/4 cup water
Place stuffing in cavity of bird. Grease bird with small amount of fat. Place on rack in baking pan. Bake 425 d. until brown on both sides. Remove from oven, mix flour and water make stiff dough. Roll out on flour-d board 1/2-inch thick. Cover turkey with dough, tucking straight down. Do not allow to extend below rack into drippings. Press dough gently to seal. Reduce oven temperature to 325d., bake until turkey is tender. Lift blanket from turkey. Test for doneness by pressing flesh of leg with fingers; turkey should be soft and pliable.

Roast Turkey with FRUIT STUFFING

1 8-10 lb. turkey
4 cups toasted bread cubes
2 cups diced celery
3 T. grapes grapefruit peel
1/2 cup raisins
1/2 cup crushed pineapple
1/4 cup chopped nuts
1/3 cup melted butter
Salt to taste
Hot water or broth
1 or 2 cloves of garlic
1 medium grapefruit, halved
Combine first six ingredients, 1 tsp. salt. Toss mixture lightly with enough water to moisten. Rub to key inside and out with garlic and salt to taste. Fill turkey with stuffing mixture. Do not pack. Close and secure cavity and the legs to body. Grease turkey with fat. Arrange breast down on baking rack in baking pan. Cover loosely with foil. Bake at 325d. for three hrs. and 30 minutes. Turn turkey, squeeze half of grapefruit over turkey. Bake uncovered for about 20 minutes. Cut the holding legs to body. Squeeze remaining grapefruit over turkey. Increase temperature to 375d. Bake uncovered until turkey is brown. Yield 10-12 servings.

MINCEMEAT CAKE

Can be prepared in advance. Wrap in foil and refrigerated.
Combine—
1 cup mincemeat
1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts
1 t. rum flavoring
1 t. vanilla
In a separate bowl, blend
1 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup buttermilk
Into this mixture, sift
3 1/4 cups flour
1 1/2 cups sugar
1 teaspoon salt
3/4 teaspoon soda
Add the grated rind of one orange and mix well. Stir in mincemeat mixture. Pour into tube pan lined with heavy brown paper. Bake at 325d., 2 hours. Frost with fruit flavored butter icing.
